CODAYS OPPOSITION

Gloucester Rugby come into this afternoon's game knowing that they have to win against the Newport Gwent Dragons to have any chance of continuing to compete in Europe this season.

The win over Biarritz Olympique last weekend sees Bryan Redpath's men currently occupy second place in Pool 2 with 12 points from their five fixtures so far.

Qualifying for the Heineken Cup quarter finals as one of the two best second place finishers would appear to be unlikely at best but qualification for the same stage of the Amlin Challenge Cup remains a possibility.

At least one result elsewhere would have to go Gloucester's way but business first needs to be taken care of at Rodney Parade this afternoon and that will be far from easy.

The Dragons showed when they travelled to Kingsholm in Round One of the Heineken Cup back in October that they



are a side that cannot be underestimated. In fact, the Dragons could well have left Gloucester with a victory that evening as, on a damp and gloomy night at Kingsholm, tries from Joe Bearman and James Arlidge had the Dragons in the box seat until Nicky Robinson's late penalty secured the win for Gloucester.

So, absolutely nothing will be taken for granted as Gloucester seek to keep their European ambitions alive and build on some recent good form and a flurry of positive press releases emanating from Kingsholm.

When the two sides last met, Gloucester were in the middle of an injury crisis that left them unable to play fifteen against fifteen on the training paddock due to a lack of healthy bodies.

That situation has eased somewhat in recent weeks and Head Coach Bryan Redpath finally has the luxury of competition for places in the starting line up.

In addition, several of the first team squad have put pen to paper on contract extensions in recent weeks adding to the feelgood factor at Gloucester.

It's a welcome change in fortunes given that the 2009-10 season was shaping up to be a difficult first one in charge for new Head Coach Redpath.

The afore mentioned injury situation, coupled with a number of suspensions for disciplinary reasons, left the Scot desperately short of resources and a number of close results went against Gloucester. Several narrow defeats could so easily have been victories.

Throughout it all, however, Redpath has remained admirably positive and maintained that his side are more than capable of delivering big performances.

That was in evidence in impressive home Guinness Premiership victories over the Leicester Tigers and Newcastle Falcons prior to Christmas as well as Heineken Cup triumphs over the Glasgow Warriors and Biarritz.

The self belief in the side has been visibly rising in recent weeks and the two most recent displays, against Worcester Warriors and Biarritz, could have seen an absolute hatful of tries but for some untimely errors at key moments and a modicum of bad luck.

The challenge now is to maintain that good form and translate it into a victory on the road.

That is a big ask in itself. The Dragons have a formidable home record having only lost once at Rodney Parade this season (their home defeat in this competition to Biarritz was played at Parc y Scarlets) and they have taken some notable scalps along the way.

They also expect several players back from injury this afternoon and, although their European ambitions may be over for this season, I'm sure nothing would give them more pleasure than to make things difficult for Gloucester this afternoon.
