Worton, the Services' stand-off half, and Wood and Millar, their wing three-quarters, were in a class to themselves, each making some thrilling runs.

E. H. Hughes made a welcome re-appearance for the homesters, but he has not yet overcome a marked tendency of holding onto the ball too long, with the inevitable result, which spoils his otherwise meritorious display.

Williams was a fair substitute for Millington at full back, but Prior was weak at centre three-quarter; he must learn to run straight.

Bayliss and Hall led a pack of triers well, but the City forwards were out-weighted in the tight, whilst Voyce and Dubberley were badly missed in line-out work. Nevertheless, the home eight brought off some fierce loose rushes.

To-day the County should win at Redruth (Cornwall). The City play Cheltenham away, when they should wipe out last week's 21 points deficit.
