In a short time they invaded the Llanelly quarter but a passing movement by the backs went astray on account of the difficulty in holding the greasy ball.

James kicked well and stopped many of the wild Llanelly rushes, but the home side went ahead through an unconverted try by S. HOWELLS.

Gloucester continued to lose chances when well placed. Once the forwards doubled over the line but failed to ground the ball. Stephens missed with a penalty from half-way.

Abbey was held up on the line after a great run. For the next ten minutes Llanelly held the advantage.
