

I'M sure you'll provide the usual warm Gloucester welcome to Steve Diamond and all the Sale Sharks' staff, players and supporters.

November has been a busy month with fixtures in the Aviva Premiership, the Challenge Cup, the A League and of course, the visit of the Barbarians.

For many of our young Academy players, the opportunity to play against a star-studded Barbarians team was an experience they will never forget, and the queue to swap shirts at the end of the game reminded me of one of the great traditions of the amateur days!

Off the field, we were all saddened by the news of the untimely death of Jonah Lomu.

Like many of you, I watched him do unbelievable things on a rugby pitch but the title of the BBC documentary on his life, "The Man Who Changed Rugby", sums up the contribution Jonah has made to our sport.

His performances at the 1995 Rugby World Cup gave the game its first global superstar and redefined what everyone wanted in a professional rugby player.

At international level, the fall out from Rugby World Cup 2015 has continued with the appointment of Eddie Jones as England's Head Coach.

Hugely experienced and with the benefit of knowing the English club system, we're looking forward to working with Eddie over the next few seasons to deliver a successful

club game and a successful International side.

Despite what some commentators would have you to believe, success at both levels is not mutually exclusive!

After two good wins in Europe we're all excited about being back playing in front of our home crowd at Kingsholm in the Aviva Premiership, and we know that we need to produce a big performance against an experienced and physical Sale Sharks team.

After the disappointment of last Friday's game against Northampton, there's been a real edge to training all week and we know the areas we need to improve upon for tonight.

JONNY BELL IS DETERMINED TO MAKE GLOUCESTER ONE OF EUROPE'S FINEST DEFENSIVE TEAMS BY INSTILLING A HUNTER'S MENTALITY.

THE former Ulster and Ireland centre is now five months into his role as the Cherry and Whites' defence guru after succeeding John Muggleton.

And while there have been plenty of frustrations during the opening weeks of the season, Gloucester's rear-guard action has been one positive and is steadily improving.

Bell has been impressed with the progress made but he knows it will be a long journey and he is not afraid to set his sights high.

He said, "Defence is a cornerstone of the game and in recent years Gloucester have played with a freedom that's been at the expense of defending with energy.

"It came back last season. John Muggleton did a very good job, the technique in the tackle here is very good and there is a lot of physicality. I was brought in to bring in clarity and specific roles, to really push the defence forward and take it to the next level.

"I make no apologies for saying I don't just want us to be one of the best defensive teams in England, I want us to be one of the best in Europe. That is our ambition and it



will take time.

"I'm passionate about defence and certainly in the northern hemisphere it's a huge part of the game. All the top clubs here, their foundation is defence and set-piece.

"We want a culture that sees defence as a defining part of the team, something we can build around. You need energy, passion and a hunger and I have upmost respect for the players here because they have bought into everything.

"It's all about more connection,

more focus on doubling up in the tackle, decision-making at the

"I want a hunter's mentality – a real hunger and desire to get the ball back. We can't be happy to sit back and wait."

Gloucester's defence, on paper, appears to be improving – they conceded seven tries in the first three games of the season but have shipped just three in their three latest encounters.

Currently they concede just 1.8

That comes from an improved service, with the exception of less week's defeat to Northampton saints, and a much stronger maul

And Bell can attribute many of the 'tries against' so far this season to system errors which will be roned out over the weeks and

Bell continued, "We're definitely moving in the right direction but with everything it takes time to bed and implement ideas and systems.

We have seen some system errors which from experience I expected - we have conceded some soft, sloppy tries.

At Ulster it took a couple of ears to get that consistency across the beliefs and cultures I want in

With time we will get better and better and the players will have a much clearer grasp of what I want. That will come with repetition and habits

The maul is also a huge part of the game, it's in voque right now,

and we don't want to give teams energy there. It was a problem last year but there's been a massive improvement this year with Trevor Woodman and Laurie Fisher doing a lot of work.

"We kept our try-line intact against Northampton Saints who are regularly one, two, three in England and competing in Europe. That comes down to a huge amount of work from everyone and we can take confidence from that."

But Bell is also keen to stress that it is the players that must drive the continued progress.

He has made Tom Savage, Matt Kvesic, Bill Meakes and Billy Twelvetrees defensive captains at the club and expects them to live and breathe the culture

Bell said, "We regularly talk to them for feedback on how they're feeling, to talk tactics and what we want to impose.

"It is their defence, I can give them the frameworks, systems and structures but by having ownership they can take it to the next level."

Bell's move from Ulster to Gloucester, just a year behind former teammate and close friend David Humphreys, ended an association with the Northern Ireland province that spanned more than 20 years.

Despite the strong ties to Ravenhill, it was not a difficult decision for the 36-cap international and Heineken Cup winner.

He knew it was time to challenge himself in a new environment and both Bell and his family are loving life in Cherry and White.

The 41-year-old said, "I had been at Ulster as a player or coach for more than 20 years, which is an extremely long time. I felt it was the right time for me to make a change, the opportunity came up at Gloucester and it was an easy decision to make.

"From my time playing in the English league I knew all about the culture of the club and how well respected they are.

"There are a lot of similarities with Ulster in terms of that culture, being a very strong rugby county and city, and having a very strong and passionate fan base. It was a great chance to work with new players and challenges, just taking myself out of my comfort zone.

"Obviously I've known David for a long time and I have huge respect for him both as a player and today. From what he did at Ulster, towards the end of our playing days they were at a low ebb and, amongst others, he was instrumental in putting in place the right people and structures that has seen the province become a consistent European club side.

"That takes time but David knows what he wants, he is ambitious and wants the right people in place – we want to see Gloucester back at the level they are accustomed to.

"Gloucester are an ambitious side, David's ambitious and there's a great opportunity to push the club back to the top table of rugby.

"It takes time, it doesn't happen overnight. There is huge expectation here but it takes time to bed things in and to grow a team but I firmly believe we're on the right path."

He played 272 1st XV games for Gloucester between 1924 and 1934. His 20 caps for Gloucestershire included the rare distinction of making his County Championship debut

on the winning side in the final against Lancashire at Blundellsands in 1930.

He went on to win a second Championship against Durham at Blaydon in 1932 and was on the losing side in 1934 at Franklin's Gardens against East Midlands.

when required and was a first team regular from 1927 until he retired in 1935, playing 210 games. He captained the club in his last three seasons and also captained Gloucestershire. He was on the winning side in three **County Championship Finals** and was an England triallist.

Alfred James "Fred" Wadley was born in Gloucester in 1902. He made his debut for Gloucester in 1926-27 and became a regular the following year. He was a reserve for England trials at Kingsholm and Northampton in December 1929. and later that season played for

Gloucestershire in their County Championship Final victory over Lancashire at Waterloo.

Fred played for The Rest against England in the final trial at Twickenham in January 1931 and two weeks later was a reserve for England against Wales. He played in Gloucestershire's Championship Final victory over Warwick at Kingsholm. The following year he played in a third consecutive Championship Final victory, this time over Durham at Blaydon.

In 1933-34 he captained the club to a record 29 victories. That season The Times considered Gloucester to be the Club of the Year. At the end of 1934-35, his third and final season as captain. he retired and was elected a life member of the club. He later served on the Committee, as did his son Doug.

TOM PRICE

TOM PRICE, renowned as a formidable opponent in both the tight and the loose. made 152 appearances for Gloucester from 1934-1948. He played 35 games for



Gloucestershire and won six England caps. He captained Gloucester in 1946-47.



Thomas William "Tom" Price was born in 1914. He made his debut for Gloucester in December 1934 and went on to play regularly in the second half of that season. He made his county debut in October of the following season and played for Gloucester throughout 1935-36.

In 1936-37 he suffered serious muy and even contemplated etirement at the age of 22. However he recovered to start the 1937-38 season and played for Gloucestershire and for the Possibles in the second England that Tom Price continued as a first choice for club and county up to the outbreak of WW2.

in 1945-46 he returned to play for Gloucester and was selected for an unofficial International against Ireland that season. He was appointed club captain for 1946-47 but only played in the first few games and resigned the captaincy in January due captain due

Tom Price joined Cheltenham in 1948 and continued to play for Cheltenham and for Goucestershire until 1952. He played in all four Home internationals of 1948-49 as a Cheltenham player.

TOM DAY

TOM DAY made 236 appearances for Gloucester at prop between 1938 and 1951. He captained the club in 1950-51 and played 16 games for Gloucestershire and for Western Counties. In retirement, he was a leading administrator in club and county rugby.

Sidney Thomas "Tom" Day was born in Gloucester in 1914. He made his debut for Gloucester in 1938-39 and played 19 games in his first season

His career peaked in 1946-47 when he made his debut for Gloucestershire, playing through the season which culminated in a drawn County Championship Final against Lancashire. Tom also played for Western Counties against the Australian tourists and was a reserve for the final England trial that season.

Tom Day played for Gloucestershire in County Championship semi-finals in 1947-48 and 1948-49 and captained Gloucester in 1950-51, which was to be his final season.

After retirement he served as Gloucester Chairman for several years and was Gloucestershire RFU President in 1976-77 and Gloucester President in 1995-96.

GEORGE HASTINGS

GEORGE WILLIAM HASTINGS was born into a farming family in Dursley in November 1924. He made his debut for Gloucester at the start of the 1947-48 season and was a regular in the Gloucester side until his retirement in 1959-60.

Big and mobile, he started his career as a utility forward but went on to become one of the great England props. He was Gloucester captain in 1954-55. George made 260 appearances for Gloucester and was capped 13 times by England. He played 34 games for Gloucestershire, culminating in a County Championship Final against Warwickshire in April 1959. He captained the county in 1955-56.

George Hastings first gained wider notice when he played for Western Counties against the All Blacks in 1953-54. The



following season he played in all three England trials before gaining his first cap against Wales at Cardiff. The Times said of his selection "the powerful Hastings of Gloucester, as a lusty forward, is well worth his place, but is not everyone's idea of a front row prop."

He went on to play in all four matches in the Five Nations Championship that year, scoring a try against Ireland.

In 1956-57, he played for England's grand slam winning side in all four Home Internationals and again in 1957-58, when England retained the Championship, he played in all four Home Internationals and against Australia.

Although George Hastings missed selection for the Lions tours of 1954 and 1959, he played no less than 20 times for the Barbarians, playing first on their Easter tour of South Wales in 1954-55 and touring Canada and South Africa in 1957-58.

The Times said in 1960: "C R Jacobs and G W Hastings helped to form the best front row that England have had since the war"
















A SAFE PAIR OF HANDS

A summer arrival from Super Rugby side Crusaders, Heinz made the bold move to up sticks and head to the Northern Hemisphere and Kingsholm, a decision he is delighted to have made.

"I'm loving it so far, I guess, coming in from Christchurch, it's a long way to come. But the boys have made me feel really welcome and they weren't shy with the banter early on which helps you to settle into the groove of things on the whole.

Swapping one rugby mad city for another, Heinz admits that he can see plenty of comparisons between the home of the Crusaders and his new base on the edge of the Cotswolds.


"I can draw massive comparisons. Christchurch is crazy about the rugby and have very one-eyed supporters and are very passionate. So there's certainly some similarities there.

"One thing I am noticing the most is the vocal support, and running around in front of The Shed in the warm up, it's pretty spine tingling stuff.

"Throughout the games when they get into their chants and get behind the boys, it's pretty awesome and definitely helps to lift us."

Swapping Super Rugby for the Aviva Premiership, Heinz admits that the challenge is on the same level, but the style of rugby played can be somewhat different.

"Absolutely expected this challenge, talking to people about the standard of rugby to expect, it's really tough games each week, really tight games with low scores



and hanging tough.

"That's the stuff that I enjoy being part of, and I guess in the Aviva Premiership this season, from my experience, there are absolutely no easy games, and the teams that historically have struggled in the competition, are



really challenging now.

"It's a really enjoyable competition for me so far."

The last fortnight was one of firsts for Heinz as he made his first European appearance for the Cherry and Whites, and a first visit to France and the win over La





So tonight, then. Sale. Above us in the table with two wins and a draw. 12 points to our nine. Look,




it's far too early to worry about league tables and where things will be at the end of the season. There's a heck of a long way to go yet and, despite last week's set backs, I'm still positive.

LAST weekend Sale became the first team not to beat Newcastle, although with Danny Cipriani missing a late penalty, they should have done and Director of Rugby Steve Diamond made it pretty clear after the match he wasn't too chuffed with the Sharks' display.

On that basis Gloucester had better be careful.

Mariano Galarza's return to the fray a week ago backed up David Humphreys' view that from an availability perspective, Gloucester's bill of health is almost completely clean.

Only Gareth Evans, James Hudson and Tom Marshall are some way off playing, with the 25 year old Kiwi still recovering from the



operation on his left knee which is delaying his debut.

"It was a three hour procedure and the recovery is renowned for being slow," he told me.


"I'm doing lots of rehab work as we try and build up the strength in the tendon. I can cycle and swim, and running is the next stage.

Once I start running I hope getting fit will be a quick process. In a perfect world I'd like to be running this month and playing at some point after Christmas- that's with no hiccoughs...."

Marshall's Newcastle-born grandfather was a key factor to him playing in England. It qualified him for a four year ancestry visa which eased the registration process, as was his agent asking questions of former scrum half Jimmy Cowan which helped Gloucester's cause.

"When you are on the other side of the world a move like this is a bit of a stab in the dark sometimes" Marshall went on.

"You want inside knowledge and Jimmy was really helpful. He didn't have a bad word to say about the club, which on top of my conversations with David Humphreys on Skype helped sell Gloucester to me. I've only been



here three months but I'm happy with my decision."

With dual qualification. I wondered about Tom's international ambitions. If his side step on the field is as good,

supporters will revel in his abilities.

"I really want to get back on the field and play some good footy for Gloucester," Marshall smiled.

Given his versatility, I wanted to know where he saw his name appearing on the team sheet.

"I enjoy playing full back because it is the best seat in the house - you can see everything. When you do chop and change it is difficult to show your best form everywhere. Ideally I'd like to settle in one position but coaches like players they can move around if it means keeping your best ones in the team. Ultimately it's their call."

The Kiwi mafia at Kingsholm is now a strong group - Afoa. Heinz, Thrush and Latta as well as Marshall himself - although four are new acquisitions this season, which means getting up to speed with who's who and what's what in the Premiership, and even though he's

still getting fit Marshall is banking knowledge for the future.

"The English game tends to be more structured. There are a lot of stoppages, and it feels as though there are a lot more set pieces and the mindset of the teams is a bit different.

"Exeter have caught my eye and although we were comprehensively beaten by Wasps, that doesn't look too bad when you see the results they've had since. We've not quite clicked vet but we won't be far off when we get some continuity.

Before Marshall headed off for another rehab session, he sidestepped me again when I asked about Gloucester's chances of a top six finish.

"It's all new, mate, I'm just soaking it in" came his cheery reply. "The pressure gauge comes on after Christmas."

Succinct, but no less accurate for that.






