

In the New Year we face probably the two toughest away trips at the moment on form, with Harlequins and Exeter to travel to, so we need to continue our good form ready for those challenges.


As this is our final game of 2015, it leaves me to say thank you on behalf of the whole squad, and staff for your unrivalled support over the past twelve months.

There are a number of highlights, which I'm sure you will all be discussing at length in the Shed this evening.



GOOD EVENING AND A VERY WARM WELCOME TO KINGSHOLM FOR THE FINAL TIME IN 2015, AS WE **WELCOME WORCESTER WARRIORS IN THIS ROUND 4 EUROPEAN RUGBY CHALLENGE CUP FIXTURE.**

THE end of the year gives us all a chance to reflect on what has been an important 12 months for Gloucester Rugby. The undoubted highlight of the year was beating Edinburgh to win the European Rugby Challenge Cup in May, and while it was the Club's first silverware in four years, it is only the starting point for this group of players and staff.

It was disappointing to miss out on qualification for the Champions Cup against Bordeaux but in European terms, our goal is now to become the first team to retain the Challenge Cup. We've had a great start to this season's competition winning all of our pool games to date and with two of those wins being away from home.

The second of those was a week ago against today's opponents, Worcester, and it's very important that we back up last week's performance with a win here this

A win tonight would allow this group of players to create another little piece of history. Having equalled Sale's record of 12 consecutive wins in the Challenge Cup last week, a victory tonight would mean 13 games unbeaten and, more importantly, another step closer to achieving our goal of winning Pool 4.


Everyone has been working incredibly hard to ensure that we continue to improve but equally we all know that there is still a long way to go to achieve what this group of players is capable of.



ROY PARRY

FOR much of his career, which spanned the years 1949 to 1956 and a total of 270 games, Roy Parry formed part of a formidable Gloucester front row alongside hooker **Cyril Thomas and England** prop George Hastings. Despite being an automatic choice for Gloucester for much of his career, he played only twice for Gloucestershire, making his County Championship debut against Cornwall at Redruth in his last season.



Roy Parry was born in Gloucester in May 1923 and was educated at Linden Secondary School. He played rugby while in the Army in Palestine and then, on demobilisation, for Fielding & Platt's Atlas Works team, before making his debut for Gloucester at the age of 25 in December 1948.

consecutive games between December 1948 and September 1950 at the start of his career, and 37 games in Gloucester's record-breaking 1953-54 season under John Taylor.

After retirement in 1956 he was immediately elected to the Gloucester committee and served as a selector for a number of years.

ALLAN TOWNSEND

THE durable tight-head prop Allan Townsend had a remarkable rugby career. He not only made 190 appearances for Gloucester between 1959 and 1964 (captaining the club in 1961-62), but also played for Cheltenham from 1951-59 (captain 1957-59), Aldershot Services, Bournemouth (captain 1967-68), Bath United (captain 1969-70) and Frome. His 18 county caps included a semi-final against Lancashire in 1964.

Allan Townsend was born in Cheltenham in 1933 and was educated at Cheltenham Grammar School. On call up for National Service, he joined the RASC and was stationed at Aldershot where he played for Aldershot Services alongside England internationals M J K Smith and John Currie.

He returned to Cheltenham after National Service and in April 1954 played at Kingsholm

following year he made his Gloucestershire debut and played throughout the Championship season. Then, after two seasons as Cheltenham captain, he joined Gloucester in 1959 and was a first choice at Kingsholm for the next five years.

He played throughout Gloucester's record-breaking sequence of 13 wins between October 1959 and January 1960 and became club captain in 1961-62 when he again played for Gloucestershire throughout the season

The Times, commenting on the performance of the Gloucestershire pack which played against Cornwall at Camborne, said, "The Gloucestershire front row of Townsend, Thorne and New formed about as hard and robust a combination as anyone could want."

Career moves took Allan to Bournemouth where he captained the club in 1967-68, Bath where he captained Bath United in 1969-70 and finally to Frome where he was both player and administrator.

On his return to the area, he joined the Gloucester committee, where he served from 1983-96, was a member of the Gloucestershire Committee for 18 years and a member of the RFU Committee from 1991-97.

Allan Townsend was President of Gloucester RFC from 2008 to 2013.



IACK FOWKE

LOOSE-HEAD prop Jack Fowke was renowned as a difficult opponent. Hard working and fearless, he was not outstanding with ball in hand but a good technical prop, both as an exceptional scrummager and as a guardian of the lineout.



He played 267 games for Gloucester and was perhaps unlucky not to be capped more than ten times by Gloucestershire. Keith Richardson quotes John O'Shea, the Cardiff, Wales and British Lions prop, as rating Fowke the best prop he ever played against.

Jack Fowke was born in Gloucester in 1936. His brother Roy, who was five years older, also played for Gloucester, Stroud and Gloucestershire. The two brothers had played alongside each other at Kingsholm in the Stroud front row in April 1959 before joining Gloucester at the start of the following season.

Roy stayed for two seasons but Jack played on to become the cornerstone of Gloucester's scrum for the next ten years. His best years were 1965-66 and 1966-67 when he was an ever-present in Gloucestershire's County Championship side.

TUG WILSON

"TUG" Wilson played for Gloucester in the 1961-62 and 1962-63 seasons, when

serving as a corporal at RAF Innsworth. While a Gloucester player, he was capped by England against France at Twickenham in February 1963 and won five Gloucestershire caps, including a semifinal appearance against Warwickshire at Kingsholm that March. His last match at Kingsholm was for a County President's XV against Gloucester on 2nd May 1963.

Kenneth "Tug" Wilson was born in Newark in 1938 and learnt his rugby at King's School, Grantham. He was an outstanding amateur boxer who won the RAF heavyweight title and gained a points decision over Billy "Golden Boy" Walker during his boxing career.

He played rugby for the **RAF and Combined Services** alongside Mickey Booth, touring Rhodesia and Kenya in 1962. On leaving the RAF in 1963, he signed as a professional with Rugby League side Oldham for whom he played 321 games over the next twelve years. Tug's final game for Oldham was his testimonial match against the full England side in 1974.

MIKE BURTON

THE uncompromising Mike **Burton** is a true Gloucester legend, one of the dominant personalities of English rugby in the seventies. A mobile tight-head prop, both tigerish in the loose and a strong scrummager, his determination and will to win served his beloved Gloucester well, but, on his own admission, his abrasive style of play and his challenging of authority probably cost him England caps and a second Lions tour.

In the second test of the 1975 series in Australia (the infamous "Battle of Brisbane") he became

the first Englishman to be sent off at international level. Nonetheless, his record is an impressive one for that era of 17 England caps, including test wins in both South Africa and New Zealand, and a 1974 Lions tour of South Africa

Michael Alan "Mike" Burton, was born in 1945 in Maidenhead but, moving to



with the Longlevens club. In his autobiogaphy, 'Never Stay Down', he tells of his single minded determination to succeed and of the profound influence of another uncompromising Gloucester character "Digger" Morris on his early career.

at the age of 18 and went on to play 365 games between 1964 and 1978, captaining the club in 1975-76, and playing in Gloucester's cup final victories at Twickenham in 1972 and 1978.

He played 49 times for Gloucestershire and was on the winning side in four of his five County Championship finals (1972-74-75-76). His eight Barbarians caps included Easter tours of South Wales in 1972 and 1973.

After retiring from rugby Mike Burton became a successful businessman. He has kept a close relationship with the club and is a Barbarians committee member.

BUT, as full back Steve McColl explains, the tougher the challenge, the bigger the reward as the season continues apace with the stakes high on every run out.

McColl, by his own admission, took his time to settle following his move from Yorkshire Carnegie to Kingsholm. However, after arriving in the summer of 2014, the flying Scotsman is benefiting from a lengthy summer of hard work.

"I've had one of the best preseasons I've ever had for a long time, it's been an exciting time. A lot of the boys are fit and ready to go, so although we're only six games into the Aviva Premiership, it's

December and there's a lot of rugby to play. We're in a good place at the moment, and personally I feel great as well."

Three tries, in three European Rugby Challenge Cup games for McColl including a crucial try in La Rochelle and one that secured the bonus point last Thursday at Sixways, and the Dunfermline born

back is comfortable in his role and ready to crack on as the New Year fast approaches.

"I think it has been a good amount of time to settle, I was warned that it might take a season or two to get acclimatised. Some people can fit in nicely straight away, and others it may take a bit longer.

"It took me a wee while longer than I hoped, but I am really happy with the place that I am in now, and

I'm hoping to carry on progressing and kick on more from here."

Gloucester sit top of Pool 3 currently, with a chance to take a firmer grip of proceedings, but McColl is fully aware of the challenge that tonight's visitors will pose, with nothing to lose.

"They will be wanting to get the win and come out firing. We've got a number of boys in the squad that have been knocking on the door to get in that first team, and we've been given the nod in the last few weeks to show what we can do, and we're raring to get out and give it a go.

"Worcester are really physical up front, and with a lot of pace in the backline along with a lot of width, so they are quick all over the board.

"We've got to counter that and be quick and sharp when we've got the ball and take our opportunities."

The backs were the beneficiaries of a dominant forward display on Thursday as the Cherry and Whites took the short European tour, up two junctions on the M5, and McColl said they took advantage of

the old adage of earning the right to go wide.

"We spoke ahead of last Thursday's game about it being a grind of a game, and wearing our opponent down to a point where we were able to let loose.

"If we start throwing the ball around early, then we could be playing into their hands so we've got to be disciplined."

As well as his exploits in a first team shirt so far this season, McColl has taken full advantage of more minutes as part of the Gloucester United side that have picked up a pair of wins on the road in the Aviva A League, and he explains how much he has enjoyed a run out, despite the stormy winter weather!

"I think the A League has been great, with the numbers we have in the squad, and the depth, it is great that we are able to put out a strong side on a Monday night,

"Although they've not been the best of Monday nights, with the wet and windy weather, we have stuck at it, and got some great results, going to Leicester and Northampton and picking up wins."

And with the more chances to impress, McColl is loving his rugby at the moment, and is looking to make the most of every opportunity handed to him by David Humphreys and Laurie Fisher.

"That's it, they're watching every minute of every game, and you have that confidence that you are being backed up and the coaches have faith in you.

"That's the beauty of the A League this year, we can really go out and put in a good performance as a squad so we've got no excuses to put a bad one in."

THE CONTRACT SEASON IS UPON US. UNTIL JANUARY THE 1ST CLUBS CAN SECURE CURRENT PLAYERS IN THE KNOWLEDGE THAT OTHERS, ACCORDING TO THE LETTER OF THE LAW, SHOULD NOT HAVE APPROACHED THEM.

LEICESTER, who impressively beat Munster in the Champions Cup at Thomond Park last Saturday, have already announced a quartet of retainees - former Kingsholm fly half Freddie Burns, captain Ed Slater, long time injury absentee Manu Tuilangi and England scrum half Ben Youngs.

At Kingsholm, this promises to be a quieter year on that front. Unlike the spring of two years ago when Gloucester had more than half the squad with deals running out, now it's a much smaller percentage with lock Mariano Galarza the first cab off the rank in terms of a contract extension being agreed.

As a club, Gloucester has had some very personable second rows in the professional era. All Black lan Jones and Italian skipper Marco Bortolami are good examples, and Alex Brown is still known as "the posh Bristolian" for good reason.

Galarza is in that group too, with a commendable grasp of English and an appreciation of the club's loyalty towards him after 18 months in which he has made only nine appearances.

"I'm happy to have signed my contract to be here for a couple more years," he said on the

announcement of his new deal. "I feel the club has done a lot for me. I have been injured twice, and the rehab has been fantastic both times.

"I was banned in the World Cup and the club has supported me through all these situations so I feel that I owe a lot to the club and it is time to show what I can do.'

Galarza is 29 now - in his opinion a good age for a lock - and he believes the shoulder problems which have been a major cause of his absence from first team action

for Gloucester are behind him.

"My recovery is now 100%" Galarza added. "Because of the work I have done with Bob (Stewart, Head of Medical Services) and the Strength and Conditioning coaches (Paddy Anson and Jamie Bain) I feel well and I have a lot of energy. I think my best years are still to come and I hope to have those years here."

Despite his 25 international caps, Galarza knows getting regular rugby from this point on will still be a challenge. He has huge respect for Jeremy Thrush, and knows that in Tom Savage, Elliott Stooke and Tom Hicks he has younger players who will push him for a place.

"I was talking to 'Sav' about that the other day - having good players improves the level of everyone" Mariano said.


"You want to play so you train better. I still want to improve and you can see why players come to the Premiership. It is one of the best leagues in the world."

It was tonight's opponents, of course, who first gave Galarza that opportunity. Typically, he is appreciative of their decision but accepts time moves on.

"Their squad has changed quite a bit. I had a great time at Worcester and it is weird playing against them but I am a Gloucester player now and I try my best for this club. Our target is to win the Challenge Cup and be a top six team in the league.

"If we win this game we will have a good advantage in the pool and more control over qualification for the next stage."

Mathematically, it's possible




Gloucester could indeed be virtually into the quarter finals if results in this round of games are favourable, although Harlequins look favourites to finish the group stages as top seeds.





GLOUCESTER RUGBY made it two wins from two in the European Rugby Challenge Cup with a hard-fought victory in La Rochelle.

It's a cliché to say that wins in France are never easy, but this one certainly wasn't. Gloucester looked well set when they led 19-10 just a minute or so before half time, but a forgettable few minutes either side of the break saw them trailing 20-19 and with a real fight on their hands.

As vital second half minutes ticked by, the Cherry and Whites struggled to find top gear and

as Fortassin, who used his boot intelligently throughout, dinked a kick through the defensive line and Elliott Roudil popped the ball up for Julien Audy to cross.

The partisan home crowd were well and truly back in the game, using the largely metallic stands at the Stade Marcel Deflandre to create an intimidating atmosphere. It was a time for Gloucester to stand up and be counted.

And, to be fair, they did. Taking an iron grip of possession, Gloucester created three penalty opportunities for Greig Laidlaw and the scrum-half nailed all of them.

However, La Rochelle gave themselves a glimmer of hope on the stroke of half time. Just as Gloucester looked set to enjoy a decent half time lead, they lost possession on halfway and were pinned back by another testing kick from Fortassin. The catch and drive was dangerous and was halted illegally, and the fly half narrowed the gap to 13-19.

It got better for the home side after the resumption. They blew one golden scoring opportunity as they threw everything at Gloucester, but they weren't to be




APPLYING THE LAW

Although Saints were on top in









AFTER the disappointment of the previous week's defeat at Northampton Saints, Gloucester Rugby rolled up their sleeves and bounced back with a dogged 23-19 win over a resolute Sale Sharks opponent.

The four points move Gloucester above the Sharks in the Premiership table and into seventh place. However, it had to be done the hard way, Gloucester coming from behind to triumph in a game where there was never more than seven points between the two teams.

It took all of Gloucester's resolve to overturn a five point deficit in

the second half just as it looked as though the game was slipping away from them, two tries from number eight Sione Kalamafoni proving to be the difference.

But it was the defence that won the day in the final quarter as the Cherry and Whites defended a fragile seven point lead. At times the defensive line bent, but crucially didn't break, a penalty from Danny Cipriani the only reward for the Sharks despite a huge amount of possession and pressure.


And it had all started so well for Gloucester on the night. Sale winger Nev Edwards misjudged the kick-off to put his side under real pressure, and Gloucester made the most of it, staying patient to carve out a try for Rob Cook.

In the corresponding game last year, Cipriani had created three tries almost single-handed, and

it was his creative spark that got the Sharks back on level terms. His chip over the advancing defensive line was gathered by Edwards and the winger dived over without a finger laid on him.

Cipriani then nudged his team in front with a 16th minute penalty, but Billy Twelvetrees responded with two of his own to earn his side an 11-8 half time lead.

However, Gloucester endured a rough start to the second half. Cipriani levelled matters with a penalty, before Richard Hibbard was yellow carded for pulling down a maul and the Sharks took full advantage with a second try
