

chance to show what they can do, and this can only be a good thing for what we're trying to do as a team.


The United side have recorded some excellent results on Monday nights, and we have a lot of competition for places, so the coaches have a few tough selection decisions, but it's a good place to be.

IN WELCOMING EVERYONE BACK TO KINGSHOLM FOR ROUND 5 IN THE EUROPEAN CHALLENGE CUP, I'M SURE YOU ALL RECOGNISE THE IMPORTANCE OF THE NEXT FEW WEEKS.


There are a number of players getting another opportunity this afternoon, and I'm looking forward to watching them perform in front of a loud and passionate Kingsholm.

HOOKER RICHARD HIBBARD HAS BACKED FELLOW WELSHMAN NICKY THOMAS TO HIT

THE young tight-head prop came through the Ospreys age-grade ranks where Hibbard was one of the star players and now finds himself in the same Gloucester front-row.


Thomas has been thrust into action in recent weeks, following injuries to John Afoa and Paul Doran-Jones and has exceeded expectations.

He held his own and more against England's starting loose-head Joe Marler and British & Irish Lion Tom Court in the draw with Harlequins and victory over London Irish respectively.

And he was once again effective against another tough and grizzled front row when Gloucester took on Exeter Chief at Sandy Park last weekend

Hibbard, who forged an international career alongside legendary Welsh tight-head Adan Jones, has always known the 21-year-old was a scrummaging gem and he reckons there is no end to his potential.

"He was a young boy at the Ospreys so I didn't speak to him," joked the big hitting hooker.



"But I know him well, he's a good scrummager and you could see that when he was coming through the Under-20s and now he has a chance.


"He did phenomenally well when he came on against Harlequins, he was really thrown in the deep end but he did wonders.

"Irish was also a tricky surface to scrummage on but he also did well. In training he has been solid - I really think he's a gem.

"Potential-wise he is right up there. In the Under-20s him and Nicky Smith were destroying teams and if he can keep doing that at this level he has a very impressive future ahead of him."

Gloucester now boast enviable strength in depth in the frontrow and that is a luxury David Humphreys and Laurie Fisher are determined to develop across the entire squad.

Humphreys added, "He's the perfect example, and has



benefitted from injuries to Afoa and Doran Jones which would be a loss to any team.

"Huge credit to Nicky, he's come in, performed very well, scrummaged very well. Players improve and get experience from playing regular games at this level and this will benefit him not just now but for the rest of his career."

With Afoa and Doran-Jones both expected to miss a couple more weeks, Thomas looks set to start both of the final two European pool games against La Rochelle and Zehre

It's his moment to shine and, on the basis of what he's shown so far, he's determined to make the most of it.

The fourth of five articles on great Gloucester props takes us from the eighties into the professional era.

MALCOLM PREEDY

LOOSE-HEAD prop Malcolm Preedy was a formidable presence both in the scrum and in the loose from an early age. He played for Gloucester in the 1982 and 1990 cup finals and for Gloucestershire in the 1984 County Championship final.

in his first year.

After featuring prominently in Gloucester's record-breaking 1981-82 season, he was promoted from the Under-23 squad to take part in England's summer tour of North America.

He played for Gloucestershire in their County Championship victory over Somerset at Twickenham in 1984 and was then chosen for England's summer tour of South Africa, alongside Steve Mills and Phil Blakeway.

in a second Twickenham Cup Final in 1989-90, his last full season.

RICHARD PASCALL

RICHARD PASCALL, aka "Pasc", was a powerful and mobile tight-head prop who made 257 appearances for Gloucester and propped alongside Malcolm Preedy in the 1990 Cup Final. He played for South West Division against the 1988-89 Australians and won an England B cap against France the same season. He made twelve appearances for the South West in the Inter-Divisional Championship.

Born in Greenford Middlesex in January 1958, Pasc learnt his rugby at Upton Manor Secondary School, Gillingham and joined the Beckenham club from school. He played County Championship rugby for Kent at the age of eighteen before enroling at St Paul's College Cheltenham to train as a PE teacher.

While there, he played for British Colleges and for English Students against Japan. After two years of teaching in Northamptonshire and playing for Bedford, Richard Pascall moved to Cheltenham and joined Gloucester RFC in winter 1980.

He made his 1st XV debut for Gloucester in September 1982 and, once established, held his place for the next nine seasons, a very successful period in the club's history. At times he was on the verge of greater things, as testified



He toured North America in 1982 and South Africa in 1984, where he won his only England cap. He made 313 appearances between 1979 and 1992 and captained his club in 1986-87.

Malcolm Preedy, born in September 1960 in Gloucester, learned his rugby at Hucclecote Secondary School and arrived at Kingsholm at the age of 19 from Longlevens RFC, playing 24 games The trio formed an all-Gloucester front row for the first test and appeared to have held their own against the formidable Springboks in a 33-15 defeat. All were dropped for the second test, however, and it was to be Preedy's only cap.

The durable Preedy played with distinction for Gloucester for another eight seasons, captaining the side in 1986-87. He appeared









by his selection for the South West and England B.

Richard Pascall returned to Bedford to captain the club in Division 2 for the 1991-92 season, before ending his career playing for Cheltenham. He has since coached Stroud and assisted Gloucestershire as forwards coach.

PETE JONES

SCOTTISH born Pete Jones played 184 times for Gloucester from 1983 to 1998. He won a Scottish cap as a replacement and also represented Scotland A. Before playing for Scotland he played for the South West Division and had an England Under 23 trial.

Peter Martin "Pete" Jones (also nicknamed "Jonah") was born in Arbroath in December 1963, but was educated at Hucclecote Secondary School. When he made his debut for Gloucester in 1983, Phil Blakeway and Gordon Sargent were soon to retire but Gloucester still had a succession of formidable props and competition for places was fierce throughout his career.

Playing regularly in 1985-86, he won an England Under 23 trial but during the next few seasons he was in and out of the side. Pete regained a regular first team place in 1990-91 and changed his allegiance to the country of his birth.


He played for Scotland A several times before getting a full cap as a replacement against Wales in 1991-92. He toured Australia with Scotland In Summer 1992 but was not selected for the internationals.

Although his last big game was in 1994-95 Pete Jones played occasional 1st XV games until the end of the 1997-98 season.

ANDY DEACON

IT'S well documented that, when the game turned professional in 1996 and the 31 year old tight-head prop from Longlevens RFC Andy Deacon was handed his first professional contract by Richard Hill, he said that "...it was just like winning the pools."

A 10-season veteran, "Deacs" had captained Gloucester in 1994-95 in a backs-to-the-wall struggle against relegation and had made 116 1st XV appearances in all as



an amateur. He went on to repay Hill's faith in him tenfold and to play a further 184 games as a professional (starting in 144 of them) in a distinguished career that spanned 18 seasons and made him a Shed hero.

Perhaps the highlights of his long career were first in 1998 when he toured South America with the Barbarians playing twice in a three match series against South American Barbarians, then in 1999 when he played for England A in a 28-21 victory over Ireland A at Donnybrook and finally in 2003 when he was sent up first by his victorious captain to receive the Powergen Cup at Twickenham, an indication of the regard in which he was held by his fellow players. He made 10 Heineken Cup appearances and started in Gloucester's only semifinal against Leicester in 2001.

After retirement Andy went on to become Director of Rugby at Cinderford and Cirencester.

TONY WINDO

YET another durable prop from the Longlevens nursery, Tony Windo had an equally remarkable career, playing 190 games for Gloucester between 1988 and 1999 and a further 228 games for Worcester between 1999 and 2008. A mobile prop with good hands, he played for England at Under 21 and A level and toured Australasia and South Africa with England in 1998.

Anthony John Windo, or "Reg" to his fellow players, was born in Gloucester in April 1969. He came to Kingsholm in 1988 and although his 1st XV opportunities were limited, gained his first England Under 21 cap against France in 1990. By 1995-1996 he was well established and on 2 December 1995 he made his debut for the South West Division against London Counties. A week later he played for the South West against Samoa at Kingsholm.


During the first years of professionalism Gloucester struggled, but the strength of their front row was never in doubt. As a result, Windo was selected for England A in 1998 and this was followed by a summer tour of Australasia and South Africa with the full England side, alongside Phil Vickery.

After one more season with Gloucester, he signed for Worcester and played a pivotal role in the club's successful 2003-04 promotion campaign in which they won all 26 games. The ultimate team man, he was named in the 2005-06 Sky Sports Dream Team.

Tony Windo played his last professional game in May 2008, for Worcester against Bath in the European Challenge Cup Final at Kingsholm, but six months later, now Assistant Forwards Coach at Worcester, he played for Barbarians against Combined Services in his final big game.







BURNS IS ALL FIRED UP

THE EUROPEAN CHALLENGE CUP **CONTINUES TO BE A COMPETITION OF** GREAT IMPORTANCE FOR THE CHERRY AND WHITES AND, WITH A MAN OF THE MATCH PERFORMANCE UNDER HIS BELT IN ROUND 3, BILLY BURNS IS ENJOYING HIS CHANCE TO SHINE.

THE holders welcome La Rochelle to Kingsholm today, a tricky opponent in Round Two in November, and Burns is challenging the Cherry and Whites to build on a solid pool stage campaign so far.

"As far as Europe goes, we have done all we can and performed really well in the games we've had. Going away to La Rochelle, a really tough place to visit, and getting the result there was huge.

"We took massive confidence from that game into the two games against Worcester. They were two really tough games against an opponent giving the competition a really good go as well.

"So, we've taken a lot from the tournament so far, and we're all massively looking forward to playing La Rochelle this Saturday."

With no LV= Cup on offer for the squad this season, the Challenge Cup has thrown up a good chance for the squad to shine and, along with the Gloucester United exploits on a Monday night, Burns knows that there are plenty of members of the wider squad ready to sten un

"This year, we've had a good response in the A League, and the boys are pushing their cases to be involved in the first team. This European Rugby Challenge Cup tournament is another chance to show our stuff too.

"We're still fielding strong sides, but there is also that bit of youth in there as well who aren't necessarily

playing every week. They're given the chance to show their skills.

"People like myself, we massively look forward to a game like this weekend, and it's our chance to put down a marker and continue the good work of the whole squad."


And with Burns' impact on the first team growing, he is enjoying his development in the Gloucester environment, during his second season as a first teamer.


"I've already said that since I've been at Gloucester, there have always been great players ahead of me, and they've been great role models.

"Obviously the presence of James Hook, with 90-odd caps for Wales, he's been massive for me watching his games and learning bits and bobs.

"James is never shy off the pitch to help me out, and sit down and talk through things. He's been great along with Greiq Laidlaw too.

"With his experience in his career, he knows what he wants from his fly-half outside him and, to be fair, I've been luckily over the years with Tim Taylor and Freddie






who have been a big part of my career since I started at the club and being involved with the first team.

"I definitely feel like a real part of the squad this year, but I know personally that I'm still a long way off where I need to be. The great thing with David Humphreys is that he's always keen to give young players a chance to go out and play.

"I hope that I get better and continue to improve but I know I have to be patient, as it is not easy to manage a squad where everyone wants to play.

"All I can do is focus on my own performance and keep making an impression in training, then I can back up my chances of being considered for that starting jersey. But I've got my feet firmly on the ground at the moment, and I am fully aware of what I



he feels like he is forging a real reputation of his own in Cherry and White.

"Certainly I do feel like I am developing my own identity, and definitely when I was growing up and developing as a player, I learned everything from Freddie. So it's no surprise that we're similar players, so I can see where the comparisons can be mentioned.

"Freddie has moved on now, and at Leicester they play a completely different style of play to what we do at Gloucester, and that has changed since Freddie was here.

"Although Freddie was here at Gloucester, he played in a different role to what I'm doing. I'll still take bits from his game when I look at his clips on a Monday morning, and I'm sure he does the same with me.

"I'd like to think I am working on my own identity, but I guess that is for people outside of my circle to judge on."

And being surrounded by his peers, Burns experienced age-group rugby with the likes of Callum Braley, Henry Purdy and Elliott Stooke to name but a few, now the young generation are showing their worth on the top domestic stage.

"It's awesome to be in that position, we always get on the pitch and it's special to be together. Not only is it rare to be playing together in a Premiership rugby side, you're doing it with your best pals. It's awesome.

"It's not just us young boys with the good bond, it's the older lads



as well – we're all a really close knit group.

"Us young lads genuinely spend as much time off the field together as we do on it. So it makes it ten times better to share the good times, and ride the bad times to help each other out."

With La Rochelle this weekend's opponents, Burns is aware of the importance to take momentum back into a prolonged Aviva Premiership run in the spring.

"We've obviously know it's going to be a long old stint when we get back into the Premiership with some hugely tough games. With guys going away to the Six Nations, it's going to be a stage where we're going to need our wider squad, and we will all get opportunities.

"This European block is huge for the squad, for boys to come in and put down a marker and get up to speed with the plans.

"We want to go out and win this tournament again, and do something no other team has done before. It's another cog in that wheel and use to progress with our domestic business as well."

EDUCATED in Bedfordshire at Redborn Upper School, the 21 year old did his A levels at Hartpury College and was spotted in his second year by Billy Clark, at the time Gloucester's Academy Manager.


He was invited to train with the under 18's and ended up captaining the side in the Academy League. At the end of that season nearly 20 boys, including Ludlow, were offered Academy places, yet a year later only four were retained.

Ludlow has now earned a two year deal as a professional from the start of next season, and he's the only one left.

"I was pretty set on playing rugby at school even though my parents and my teachers always told me to have something to fall back on," Ludlow said.

"I went home at Christmas and saw my best mates, one is a buyer in the fashion industry and one works in computers. They didn't think we did any contact training in the week, but I told them we do on two or three days and most of the time you wake up sore from training or being in the gym.

"The day after a game you struggle to move sometimes but I wouldn't swap it for anything." Ludlow has learned his back

row trade on a dual registration deal with Hartpury as well as in the Championship at London Scottish, where former Gloucester scrum half first year in the Academy, and then National Division 1.

'To go there and get into the play offs and face Worcester, it was about 7kg, and with the prolonged pre-season where we were training a lot without playing I was able to keep the weight on."

Ludlow started pre-season with the first team squad and after playing in a couple of the warm up matches, David Humphreys took him aside and told him that despite being on an Academy contract, he would be regarded as a first team squad player for the whole season.

He has already played in the Challenge Cup against Worcester and should get more game time both today and against Zebre in the remaining pool games, despite having picking up two yellow cards.

"I'm one of the most competitive people in the squad. It's how I play, and it's my point of difference" Ludlow added.

"Laurie and David want that aggressive physicality which I bring to training out there on the pitch, and being involved with international players day in day out you're learning all the time.

"I'm known for my work rate and they want that energy, an edge if you like. I've enjoyed playing at no 8 where you get your hands on the ball a bit. But at 6 you're defending more and I'm fine with that because a big tackle lifts the team."

This afternoon we may see Ludlow alongside a clutch of players from the year above him at Hartpury - Braley, Burns, Moriarty, Stooke and Nicky Thomas - as Gloucester look to tie up a home quarter final in April.

La Rochelle have lost all their away games in the Top 14 season but Ludlow isn't expecting an easy







THE curtain came down on 2015 with one of the games of the season so far in front of over 70,000 at Twickenham, with the Cherry and Whites running in five tries to earn a 39-39 draw in a festive thriller.

Very few gave Gloucester a chance up against the much-fancied Quins, bang in form and ready to up their game for Big Game 8. But the Cherry and Whites were tenacious, patient and more than deserved the three points that they took away from Rugby HQ.

Twickenham has had its fair deal of drama in recent months

with the Rugby World Cup, and this game was no different, as the lead changed hands throughout with both sides captivating the bumper crowd as play flowed from end to end.

On the whole, however, Director of Rugby David Humphreys was left to rue the result as a five-point haul was snatched away late on, with Gloucester almost leaving with just the single point as Nick Evans strayed just wide with a last gasp drop goal.

The Cherry and Whites were struck a triple blow during the game, coupled with a re-jig of the starting line up in the build up to kick off, with John Afoa, Henry Trinder and Jonny May all limping off as the match progressed.

A Try of the Round effort from Rob Cook gave the visitors a tenpoint lead with ten minutes left, but the boot of Evans and Ross moments of controversy, with the game providing a platform for many a rugby newcomer.





The scoring was then monopolized by Dawidiuk as he finished off some powerful,










