AFTER A COUPLE OF DISAPPOINTING DEFEATS AWAY FROM HOME, WE'RE DELIGHTED TO BE BACK AT KINGSHOLM FOR A HUGELY IMPORTANT WEST COUNTRY DERBY AGAINST BATH RUGBY.

THROUGHOUT the course of this season, a lot has been said about the competitive nature of the Premiership and the small margins between winning and losing matches in this league.

After two good wins against Newcastle and Wasps, the form team in European rugby, we let ourselves down with the quality of our performances against both Worcester and London Irish.

Despite these two defeats, results elsewhere mean that we are still well positioned to fight for a top six spot and qualification for the European Rugby Champions Cup.

However, there is now very little margin for error and we can't afford to lose many more points in the final five rounds of Premiership competition.

Today's opponents are in a very similar position and with so much at stake, both teams know the significance of four points this afternoon.



"I was happy to do my family and friends proud, the people who have helped me along the way. This is what I always wanted to do.


"The summer tour is a target but we still have a few games left during the Premiership season and in the Challenge Cup which is big for Gloucester.

Gloucester have always been blessed with top class second row forwards. The tradition continued with the approach of professional rugby.

The final part of the story covers the last two decades.

ROB FIDLER

ROB, son of John, had a big act to follow when he made his debut for Gloucester against Cheltenham in December 1994. He had already played for Cheltenham, which was his place of birth on 21 September 1974.

He would go on to make 222 appearances for the Cherry and Whites, including 148 league games. That first appearance was at No.6, where he continued until 1996 when he moved up a row. He soon settled into a formidable second row partnership with Dave Sims.

Rob was a very good front jumper and in addition an aggressive tackler. He was in the teams which lost Pilkington Cup semi-finals in 1996 to Bath and 1997 to Leicester. The transition to professional rugby was proving difficult, and Rob led the club for several games in 1998-99 in the absence of club captain Dave Sims.

Rob was soon considered an international prospect and made 14 England 'A' appearances before winning caps against New Zealand and South Africa on the England tour of 1998.

With the arrival of the millennium, the fortunes of the club rose and Rob was a regular in the Heineken Cup campaign of 2000-01 which led to the semi-final and defeat to Leicester. However, he was in the teams that won the Zurich Championship Final against Bristol in 2002, and the 40-22 win over Northampton in the final of the Powergen Cup in 2003.

After problems negotiating a new contract, Rob was offered one with Bath and played his rugby there from 2004-07. He then played a season with Cinderford accompanied by old colleagues Pete Glanville, Andy Deacon and Mark Cornwell.

MARK CORNWELL

"PASTY" Cornwell was born on 22 February 1973, and first played for Old Richians. He was a very tall 6ft 7ins, and made his first appearance for Gloucester against Cheltenham in November 1992. That was his sole appearance that season, and indeed in the next there would be just one more game.

His league debut was delayed until April 1995 against Bristol. His problem was that he was up against established players like Dave Sims, Richard West and Rob Fidler, and it was not until the 1997-98 season that he became a regular choice. By 1999 he won the first of no fewer than 11 England 'A' caps, although the major prize of a full



cap always eluded him.

He came off the bench in Gloucester's losing semi-final game against Leicester in the Heineken Cup in 2001, and played in the Premiership Final against Wasps in 2003. Wasps won 39-3 after Gloucester had topped the league table by a clear 15 points, and yet won nothing.

"Pasty's" career lasted from 1992 to 2006, and covered the transition to professional rugby. He made 211 appearances, including 133 league games. He went on to play a season at Birmingham/Solihull, then player/coach at Cinderford, before becoming Gloucester's Academy Manager until 2012 when he moved to Hartpury College to become forwards' coach.

ADAM EUSTACE

ADAM was born on 9 January 1979 and played locally for Widden Old Boys and Coney Hill. He was naturally a second row forward but did sometimes play in the back row. He came to the notice











of Gloucester and Phillipe Saint-Andre signed him up for a professional contract.

He would appear in 249 games from 1999 to 2010. His first game for Gloucester was on 21 February 1999 against Leeds in a Cheltenham & Gloucester Cup game, and later in the season he was in the team which won the final against Bedford at Northampton.

Adam continued to make impressive progress in his games for Gloucester and there was the distinct possibility that he could be selected for the England 'A' team when he unfortunately broke his leg in early 2002 against Ebbw Vale.

However, the next season he returned to club action in April 2003 and was in the team which won the Powergen Cup, defeating Northampton. Later, in May, although Gloucester had topped the Premiership, Adam was in the team which lost to Wasps in the Premiership Final.

In 2006 he came off the bench in the European Challenge Cup Final at the Stoop, where Gloucester defeated London Irish. In 2007 he again appeared off the bench in the losing Premiership Final against Leicester.

The 2007-08 season saw him playing for The Scarlets. He then returned to Kingsholm for two more seasons before moving on to Northampton. After his retirement he now works for Gloucester's Community Department.

MARCO BORTOLAMI

MARCO was born in Padua, Italy, on 12 June 1980. He was only 18 years old when he first played for Petrarca Padova, and only 21 when he won the first of his 112 caps for Italy against Namibia in June 2001.

Not only that he became Italy's youngest ever captain at the age of 22. The game was against New Zealand, and the All Blacks won 64-10! He was again made captain for Italy's tour of Japan in 2004. On his return he moved to France to play two seasons for Narbonne.

When Gloucester signed Marco in 2006, he was reckoned to be one of the outstanding forwards in world rugby. He was rated so highly that he captained Gloucester to start the season against Bath, and effectively shared the captaincy for that term with Pete Buxton. He was a natural leader, with great physicality and presence.



That season was a good one for Gloucester. They topped the Premiership table (again), but heartbreakingly once more lost in the final against Leicester. Although selected as captain, Marco missed the final due to injury.

In 2007-08 Gloucester yet again topped the table, and Marco was in the team which lost in the semi-final play-off again to Leicester.

In 2008-09 the Cherry and Whites did make a final and Marco came off the bench, when they played Cardiff Blues at Twickenham for the EDF Energy Cup, but Nicky Robinson and his team-mates cantered to an easy win.

Injuries and a loss of form plagued Marco in the following season, and he decided to return to Italy to play for Aironi, and when that team folded moved on to Zebre where he remains and played at Kingsholm for them this season.

ALEX BROWN

ALEX was born in Bristol on 17 May 1979 and educated at Colston's College, Bristol. After brief stays at Bath and Pontypool he was recruited in 2000 to Bristol by Dean Ryan where, in his first campaign, he was voted the player of the season.

By 2003 Ryan, now coaching at Kingsholm, signed up Alex, when again he promptly won the Player of the Season award, and started every game. He also holds the record for the most consecutive starts in the Premiership, with 86, spread over games for Bristol and Gloucester. He formed a formidable partnership with Marco Bortolami in the second row.

Alex was in the teams which beat London Irish to win the European Challenge Cup in 2006, which lost the Premiership final to Leicester in 2007, and the ill-fated loss to Cardiff Blues in the EDF final of 2009. But he was in the winning team against Newcastle in the LV= Cup Final of 2011.


For some years Alex was on the England selector's radar, but after appearances for England Saxons in the first Churchill Cup, he was not capped until England's tour to Australia in 2006. He won two more caps on the tour to South Africa in 2007.

Alex Brown was an utterly dependable player, whose form never dipped. He made 233 appearances for Gloucester, including 159 in the Premiership. He seemed set to play several more seasons but a shoulder injury in the first game of the 2012-13 season ended his career.

Happily he has remained at Kingsholm and is now the club's Rugby Operations Manager.









APPROPRIATELY, GIVEN IT WAS CHELTENHAM RACES JUST OVER A WEEK AGO, THE MAN DUBBED 'COMMANDER' BY MANY OF THE FIRST TEAM SQUAD, CLEARED A SIGNIFICANT HURDLE RECENTLY.

THE evergreen front rower registered his 274th competitive and 200th Aviva Premiership appearance when he ran out for the Cherry and Whites at Sixways in Round 16 and eased his way to the front of a class field.

It's no mean feat. Consider that Wood is the first Gloucester Rugby player to reach the 200 Premiership appearance mark. Only the likes of Peter Buxton, Andy Hazell and James Simpson-Daniel have come close, but Wood has eclipsed them all.

He has been a constant in the Gloucester front row for much of the last decade and beyond, and is clearly full of pride at the achievement, but also thankful and realistic about it too.

"I think I did my reflection pretty much straight after the game, with the emotion involved and it was there and then at the time.

"Now that it is sort of out of the way, it is somewhat of a relief in some respects. Once that sort of stat was pointed out to me that I was close, it is something that is hanging over your head, it's something that is in the back of your mind.

"But it's out of the way now, and I suppose that it is one less distraction now."

And with 275 first team appearances notched up, Wood is happy to be able to reflect on his time in the Cherry and White shirt, with several run outs standing out in his mind.

"There will always be a couple of games throughout your career that you remember, and aside from

individual performances, certain games that stick in the mind would be the three times that we have won down at The Rec. It seems fitting to mention those on a West Country derby week and in a Bath programme feature.

"The three times were such a hang up around the squad, and around the supporters over the years, about the fact that we couldn't win down there, even when we were at our best.

"Suddenly we had done two back to back, then managed to turn around a lot of bad fortune against them this season.

"Those games stick in the mind of course, as well as the finals that we have got to. Win or lose, they're such big occasions, they do stick in the mind."

Wood has obviously overhauled Peter Buxton and James Simpson-Daniel's professional appearance record at Sixways, and he revealed that the duo have both been in touch to give congratulations, both in their own unique ways.

"They were really good, both of them were straight on the phone, and it's always nice to hear from them.




And in a position as physically demanding, and as attritional as the front row, Wood is able to recognise the significance of his achievement, but also knows that an element of good fortune also plays its part.

"Yeah I think so, I've worked hard to look after myself over the years, whilst also trying to find the balance between stuff on and off the field, with a massive amount of luck as well. I can't deny that.



"Sinbad's advice was pretty good and it was really nice from Pete to hand over my shirt the day before the game, and that was fitting.

"Sinbad just said, '...it's was just a number and another game, so go out and do what you do...' "At any point you can get one bad injury and it is all over. There's obviously some really good fortune in that. I've committed my body and soul to this place for say fifteen years from when I turned up as an Academy kid in 2001. So it's nice to



be sat here now and look back on things."

And after 13 seasons within the Cherry and White first team, Wood knows the importance of the West Country derby, and the added spice it puts on the week and around

"I did enjoy that game, and this week we can probably expect more of the same. Bath back themselves up front, and they will probably have a few guys returning from injury and international duty and so it will be a huge challenge.

"Down there was a huge achievement, especially when you see how tight the game was, especially up front, so we know the type of game that is going to be coming '

And with the Kingsholm crowd set to be in full West Country derby buzz, Wood knows that this is a huge help for the home side, especially in a game with such fine margins between two of English rugby's finest establishments.

"It will come down simply to who wants it more, and everyone





the city.

"It does have the same edge. The crowd gets such a buzz, the players get that same buzz. The whole week leading up to the game is the same.

"The score could be 6-5 or 10-9, it wouldn't be a fair reflection. The game is always going to be so tense with so much riding on it for both sets of supporters and players as well. They just make for great occasions.

And Wood is quick to look back to the reverse fixture in February, as the Cherry and Whites secured a rare win at The Rec, with the front row leading the charge.

WISE words from Ellis Boy 'Red' Redding in the magnificent film, 'The Shawshank Redemption. I reckon Red must have been a season ticket holder at Gloucester Rugby...

The last few weeks have absolutely epitomised the painful experience that it is to follow our team. Go back to the last time we assembled here at Kingsholm for the arrival of Wasps. Our nomadic friends were in in fine form and were, if the experts were to be believed, expected to romp all over us.

But we had hope. We knew that if we performed we could come out on the right end of the result. And so it transpired, and Kingsholm was transformed into the cauldron of years ago as a wall of noise burst from under the roof of the Shed, rolled down the packed stands and





enveloped and inspired the men in Cherry and White.

Even though the medical teams were on the pitch so often that it looked like an episode of Casualty was being filmed in front of us, as far too many players left the field on stretchers or on helping shoulders, the remaining boys stood tall and defended heroically. It was a game to be remembered for a long time, a game to give us hope.

And then the following weekend - up the road to Sixways, Worcester off the back of a win at Newcastle had lifted the pressure on themselves. But still, we were flying, buzzing from the previous week's result and Worcester, well they're still scrapping at the bottom.

But we had hope... misplaced as it happened. 28 - 20... not even a losing bonus point... Tricky things those local derbies....

Last week, then. It'll be OK at the Madjeski... Tom Marshall was making his debut, it was going to be like having a whole new player on the field. We had hope, the points were ours. Or not. Five points in front with not long to go, a defensive effort a la Wasps would see us home.

Ten minutes later, and about as many penalties conceded, we had two in the sin bin and were trailing by five. Hopes dashed. Hope can kill a man.

I'm not going to join any clamour for change in our set up. For what it's worth I have huge confidence in the team at the helm of Gloucester Rugby I really do. I'm not just saying that to keep on their good side. Talk with them and you'll find a bunch of people who are 100 per cent committed to the team. They understand, though, that it is a results orientated business and people will be quick to - rightly - voice their frustrations.




on our own patch. Bragging rights doesn't come close - this is tribal!

Despite those two losses the table is still impossibly congested. We are seven points off fifth place



WHILE the Warriors have gained significant ground, partly because of being largely untroubled by international calls, others have either shown inconsistency or, as in Harlequins case, faded through the unavailability of their major players.

Normal service resumes now, but it remains to be seen if the cream again rises to the top after such a draining sequence.

As Ross Moriarty reports back to Gloucester after his two try impact as a replacement for Wales against Italy, contrast his emotion with that of Matt Kvesic. I said to a friend of mine after he was omitted from the squad against Scotland on the opening weekend that I couldn't see Kvesic getting a cap until the summer at the earliest.




final minutes approached.


