







travelling support behind them.


Of course, we would like to be coming into this game on the back of a win, but there was so much to be positive about last weekend against Tigers.

Enjoy the game!



Anyone who was at the Stoop last May will appreciate how much it meant to both the players, staff and supporters to beat Edinburgh and lift the Challenge Cup.

One of our primary goals for this season is to be the first team to retain the Challenge Cup and winning Pool 4 unbeaten and finishing as one of the top two seeds has given us home advantage this afternoon.

History has shown how hard it is to win games away from home in the knock-out stages of any competition, and your support will play a major role in another big afternoon of European rugby at Kingsholm.


do to win the game and taking confidence from what was a muchimproved performance against Leicester Tigers.

THE FIRST MATCH: NEWPORT 0 GLOUCESTER 0

Rodney Parade, 7 December 1878

GLOUCESTER first played Newport on 7 December 1878, five years after the Gloucester club was formed. Newport, formed a year later in 1874, had acquired the Rodney Parade ground the previous year. Both sides were unbeaten. It was Gloucester's first match against Welsh opposition and the first of countless trips across the Severn into Wales. The trail-blazing captain was Frank Brown, who did much towards establishing Gloucester as a first class club. A CLEAN SWEEP: **GLOUCESTER 12 NEWPORT 9**



Kingsholm, 29 January 1921

only defeat of 1878-79. Newport

WHEN Newport came to Kingsholm on 29 January 1921 they were undefeated that season and had not lost to Gloucester for 13 years. The Gloucester Citizen commented, "Not since the famous All Blacks came to Gloucester in 1905 has a match aroused such tremendous interest as the visit of the Invincible Newport XV to Kingsholm this afternoon."

The match lived up to



expectations, Gloucester winning a tense contest largely through superlative performances by their half backs Dix and Robbins who controlled the game. "Father" Dix scored a try and Robbins kicked a conversion and dropped a goal; a try from forward Joe Harris completed the scoring. Welsh international scrum half Tommy Vile instigated the best of the Newport moves, scoring a try himself and creating tries for Holland and Plummer.

The Citizen said, "A notable day for Gloucester football. I doubt if a more exciting match has ever been seen at Kingsholm." and the South Wales Daily News summed up, "The record has gone; it has found a last resting place like so many other Welsh records at Kingsholm. All Wales will sympathise with Newport."

The players were each presented with an inscribed silver cigarette case to commemorate the victory and Gloucester went on to defeat all four top Welsh clubs (Newport, Cardiff, Swansea



and Llanelli) at Kingsholm that season.

THE DOUBLE: NEWPORT 6 GLOUCESTER 10

Rodney Parade, 14 January 1933

THIS was the second time that Gloucester had achieved the double over Newport, the first being in 1881-82. The Cherry and Whites had not won at Rodney Parade for 50 years and arrived on a foggy day with a three quarter line missing Kit Tanner and Roy James, but their young replacements Bob Hook and Francis Edwards, at the start of long and distinguished careers with the club, both had outstanding games in attack and defence. In the pack, England international back row Peter Hordern, an ex-Newport player, gave one of his storming performances.

Gloucester's tries were scored by Vernon Sheppard and John Brooks and converted by Bob Hook. Conditions were slippery underfoot but the Citizen rated Gloucester's victory as "one of the best exhibitions of football a Gloucester side has given on Welsh soil for many years."

Gloucester went on to complete the double with a 10-0 win at Kingsholm in March. It was an outstanding period in the club's history, under the captaincy of Fred Wadley.



A "DING-DONG THRILLER": GLOUCESTER 17 NEWPORT 13

Kingsholm 18 October 1975

IN 1975 the Anglo-Welsh rivalry was still at its height at club level and nowhere more than at Kingsholm where, throughout the seventies, Gloucester had an outstanding record against Welsh sides. This close and thrilling game was headlined in the Citizen, "Gloucester win the big one – a ding-dong thriller".

After Gloucester had taken an early lead through two Peter Butler penalties, Newport's right wing Ken Davies scored in the corner. Back came Gloucester with a try from Dick Smith in which he sold an outrageous dummy to go over to the delight of the crowd. Newport replied with a Fuller penalty and then right on half time went ahead with a try from Richard Taylor which Fuller converted to make the score 10-13.


Gloucester regained the lead in the second half when a kick ahead by Peter Kingston was taken by Richard Mogg who eluded several tackles to put Eddie Pinkney away, Kingston taking the final pass to go over in the corner. Victory was secured when Peter Butler landed a 40 yard penalty to make the score 17-13.

THE LAST MATCH: GLOUCESTER 44 NEWPORT 19

Kingsholm, 17 March 1995

IN an era of national cup and league competitions with the game about to turn professional, the "friendly" matches between English and Welsh clubs on the traditional fixture list had started to lose their relevance and teams were rarely at full strength.

however, this match could not be faulted. With almost an hour gone, the Cherry and Whites were 19-12 down from tries scored for Newport by no. 8 Mark Workman and centre Simon Enoch and were now playing into a strong wind.


But, having struggled to win quick possession all night, the home team suddenly sparked into life and ran in five tries – some from deep in their own half. Man of the Match Mike Roberts, Pete Miles, Chris Dee, Robin Saltmarsh and Tim Smith all scored against a tiring defence. Gloucester were running penalties from everywhere – even in front of their posts. Hylton Brown had scored for Gloucester in the first half.

Sadly, this was to be the last fixture played between the two clubs. When hostilities ceased in 1995 one of the longest standing rivalries in senior club rugby worldwide came to an end after 117 years and 195 games.

For the next eight years
Newport RFC continued to
compete in European competition,
but the two sides were never
drawn together. Then, with the
formation of the Newport-Gwent
region (the "Dragons") in 2003,
the opportunity to continue the
ancient rivalry was gone perhaps
forever, although the Black and
Ambers do continue to thrive
in the Premiership of the Welsh
Principality League and share their
Rodney Parade headquarters with
the regional side.







NOT WITHOUT A FIGHT

GLOUCESTER RUGBY HAVE ENJOYED THEIR OUTINGS IN THE EUROPEAN RUGBY CHALLENGE CUP IN RECENT SEASONS, AND WHEN CLUB CAPTAIN BILLY TWELVETREES LIFTED THE TROPHY ALOFT LAST MAY, THE SMILES AND JOYOUS SCENES SHOWED THE DESIRE IN THE SQUAD TO SUCCEED.

THE knock-out journey begins again this afternoon, and the challenge is even greater as the holders look to take a step closer to retaining their title a year on, this time in Lyon, as well as secure the passport to the top table of European Rugby.

"It's an Anglo-Welsh clash, with a lunchtime kick off, so there is a huge amount to be excited about for players and staff in both camps.

There is no burying their heads in the sand for the Cherry and White camp, with Twelvetrees admitting the disappointment of the last few weeks, but the team have to be able to draw a line under recent run outs, and push ahead in a big end of the season.

"Every week we run out is massive for us, and we were looking for that, especially after the win over Wasps, and the boys know what they need to do now to step up in performance and the results will come.

"This week's game is a big one for us, as is every week, but in terms of our European ambitions, and momentum on the field with plenty of rugby still to be played.

"Our campaign last year will hopefully stand us in good stead as a squad, and with a number of injuries across the squad, we have been delighted with the lads that have come in and made a big impact.

These experiences will no doubt be crucial this weekend. We back ourselves to take on anyone, and the squad have shown their desire this season.

"When called upon we'll be ready, and the squad has shown that it can rotate around and adapt when we lose a few lads, we have another hungry guy ready to step in.

"We want to build momentum and enjoy ourselves, first and also whatever team turns up on the | foremost!"





Bath, we would have come away with wins in all three games.





Prop Shaun Knight left Kingsholm for the Dragons last summer, a Gloucester boy putting his career before the sentiment of staying at his home city club.

"I felt professionally I had to do it, and I don't think I had a great deal of choice" Knight told me.





naughty step.


Blair Cowan was driven over from the resulting drive, and with Tonks' conversion, Gloucester trailed.






