So today, local rivalries will be renewed and we will be going all out to ensure that it's our supporters who have the bragging rights come the final whistle.



Gloucester Rugby stalwart Nick Wood left the club at the end of last season after 15 years of sterling service and was subsequently forced to retire from playing due to injury.

The 33-year-old loosehead, who joined the Academy from Radley College in 2001, spent his entire playing career with the Cherry and Whites, making his first team debut in the 2003-4 season.

'Woody', as he was dubbed by the club's supporters, was voted Young Player of the Season by them in 2004-05, and their Player of the Season in the 2011-12 season as well as being nominated for Premiership Player of the Season in the same year.

In total he made 278 competitive appearances for Gloucester, a club record, as well as becoming the first Gloucester player to make 200 Premiership appearances.

However, the club was conscious that supporters didn't get the opportunity to bid Nick a fond farewell at the end of the season and vice-versa.

Accordingly, Nick and his family are our special guests at the game today, dining in the 1873 Ricoh Lounge before the game and will be interviewed on the pitch by Graham Spring at half-time.

Nick's playing record speaks for itself. To play so many games in such a physically demanding position speaks volumes of his skill, commitment, bravery and loyalty to the only club he played for.

It's terrific to see him back here today and he's sure to get a terrific reception.








THE GREAT LOCAL DERBY

Today we welcome back Bristol Rugby to Kingsholm for the first time in eight long years and resume a rivalry that goes back to 1892, four years after the founding of the Bristol club and the year after the opening of Kingsholm.

For over 100 years the County Championship dominated the English domestic season, and to play county rugby was the first step towards gaining international recognition. Gloucestershire, the most successful and best supported of all the counties during that period, drew their team almost entirely from the Bristol and Gloucester clubs and rivalry for places was intense. Most of the crowd came to both club and county games and knew the players from both sides. Teammates one week were fierce rivals the next, adding an extra spice to proceedings.

Bristol Football Club (RFU) was founded in 1888 with the merger of the Carlton and Redland Park clubs and the County Cricket Ground in Nevil Road was leased for home games. This arrangement continued until the First World War.

The first season was fairly successful despite a strong fixture list, but the second was not and Bristol, unable to raise a side for their first scheduled fixture against the Gloucester 1st XV in October 1889, lost heavily to the 2nd XV at The Spa in November the following season.

The club recovered, however, and in 1891-92 won 20 of their 24 matches. Home and away fixtures with Gloucester were arranged for 1892-93, and so the great rivalry began.

THE FIRST MATCH GLOUCESTER 15

BRISTOL o Kingsholm, October 1 1892

Described as "Gloucester's first big game of the season", the match was spoilt as a spectacle when Bristol's talented full back, Gibbs. dislocated his shoulder after ten minutes and Bristol were reduced to 14 men. The highlight was a try by Gloucester centre Walter Jackson, who had toured South Africa with the British Lions the previous summer. Receiving the ball on the half way line, he ran through the entire Bristol team to score under the posts. Gloucester's other tries were scored by wing Walter Taylor, who was Gloucester's leading scorer that season with 18 tries, forward H G Brown and half back Albert Collins.

The return fixture at Nevil Road, Bristol was drawn 2 points all, each side scoring a try.

BAPTISMS OF FIRE

The matches became highlights of the season for both clubs. Here, two players describe their first experience of a Bristol v Gloucester derby:

BILL HOOK

Memorial Ground, September 1938

England and Gloucester full back Bill Hook was just 17 and a schoolboy at Sir Thomas Rich's School when he played his first away game for the 1st XV at the Memorial Ground against Bristol in September 1938. It was the start of Bristol's Golden Jubilee season and, having lost narrowly to Gloucester both home and away the previous season, they were more than usually keen to get their revenge.

Bill told how the legendary Gloucester hooker "Bumps" Carpenter took him under his wing, introducing him to the Bristol changing room with the words, "This is the babby we've brought down. He'll take anything fair and square, but you drop him anything below the line and I'll be looking for you." Then, beckoning to the youngster, "Come on me babby, you'll be alright, now.'

Bumps was right, Bill need not have worried. Gloucester won the match by 6 points to 0, Bill's elder brother Bob scoring both their tries, and the Times reported, "The most notable features of the match were the forceful rushes of the Gloucester pack and the back play of W Hook, a seventeen year old schoolboy."



ALASTAIR HIGNELL Memorial Ground, February 1973

England and Bristol scrum half and full back Alastair Hignell tells of how he joined Bristol as a raw 18 year old, hoping to play Colts rugby. Turning up for his first mid-week training session, he was told by the coach, "There's no Colts game this week, but you're playing on

Saturday. United are a man short." He added, "It's the big one this weekend....Gloucester United." The whole team bristled and looked suitably stern. Somebody said "Who's the scrum half?" "Here he is - it's Alastair," said the coach. "Poor sod!" was the reply.

The match was played in inches of mud - a typical pitch at the "Mem" in the '70s. In the first few minutes, Bristol lost their hooker and Alastair spent the rest of the game being trampled by his seven man pack going backwards - or if he was unlucky and the Gloucester pack stayed bound - by all fifteen! Somehow Bristol held on and there was only the odd point in it at the end. Alastair survived and went on to run out many times at Kingsholm for Cambridge University, Bristol and Gloucestershire. Rejoicing in the Shed's nickname of "Alice" he always got that little bit of extra attention when the fans thought that local hero Peter Butler should have been playing for the county or for England - in his place.

ALL-CONQUERING GLOUCESTER GO DOWN AT BRISTOL

BRISTOL 12 **GLOUCESTER 6**

Memorial Ground, September 26

1980-81 was Gloucester's greatest season of the amateur era - a season in which they lost only three of the 48 games played. The first of these was at Bristol in a typical "no quarter asked or given" derby game.

Gloucester trailed to a Phil Cue penalty in the second minute, but gradually gained some control, leading to Tony Durkin replying in kind to level the scores at half time. Cue and Les Jones exchanged penalties early in the second half, but after twenty minutes, Bob Hesford and Nigel Pomphrey shattered the Gloucester defence with Pomphrey crashing over in the corner. Cue added a further penalty and when John Fidler was sent

off following a monumental freefor-all, the match was all but won for Bristol. The back-row play of Hesford and Rafter and the pinpoint kicking of outside half Cue had swung the game.

GLOUCESTER AT HOME AT ASHTON GATE

GLOUCESTER 35 BRISTOL 13


Ashton Gate, April 28 2007

As the demolition of the old South Stand at Kingsholm was already under way, the home match with Bristol was rearranged to be played at Ashton Gate. It was the last match before the play-offs. Gloucester were top and Bristol were in third place, just two points behind, in their best season since the game turned professional. The first match, at the Memorial Ground in November, had been wort by Bristol in foul conditions. Now, the weather was perfect.

13,000 travelling Gloucester fans turned Ashton Gate into a sea of red and white and created a "home" atmosphere. Gloucester played with pace and precision. Bristol, having beaten Leicester 30-13 in a rearranged fixture earlier in the week, faded as the game went on. Tries were scored for Gloucester by Willie Walker, Mark Foster, Jake Boer and Andy Hazell and for Bristol by David Lemi and Brian Lima. Walker kicked 3 penalties and 3 conversions to total 20 points for the match. An otherwise perfect day for the travelling fans was marred by a knee ligament injury to James Forrester, which eventually was to end his career.

The following week, Gloucester beat Saracens by 50 points to 9 at a reduced capacity Kingsholm and Bristol lost by 24 points to 16 to Leicester at Welford Road, Leicester going on to beat Gloucester 44-16 in the final at Twickenham.

Just two seasons later, Bristol were relegated.



ONWARDS AND UPWARDS

For much of the season, amidst the action-packed nature of each contest and the unpredictability of every run out, there has been one calming influence in the eye of the storm in the Gloucester pack

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Totemic Argentine Mariano Galarza is the gentle giant that has been an ever present in Cherry and White this season and, thankfully, shows no sign of slowing down.

The Puma second row assessed the start of the season this week, and ahead of the busy run into the Festive period, confirms that there is plenty still to come from a Gloucester side desperate to turn piles of promise into points.

"It wasn't the best start to the season for us, after a lot of changes that we had during preseason. We had some really good new staff coming on board for the squad and, coupled with the coaches and the players already here, we were in a really good place.

"However, we probably didn't have the start to the season that we wanted. I think that we showed during each game some really good stuff, and I think now we are looking to put all of this stuff into each game and being more consistent.

"I think the team is showing a real improvement over the last couple of weeks, and now what we need to do is, despite the poor results, we need to keep believing in what we are doing, and in the long term this is going to come good, because we are not playing badly."

Galarza can often be found in the upper levels of the Opta stats when published most weeks, heavily involved in the tackle charts, carries and line-out takes. But the 30-year old lock is happy to be involved wherever, so long as he does everything to his own high standards.

"Well my role is mainly on the line-out for the team. I work with Trevor Woodman and a couple of the senior players in the forwards to focus on these areas, so I am always having conversations with Joe Latta and Jeremy Thrush who also look at the line-out, to find out where we can improve, and where we can target our opponents.

"We are all in charge of the line-out, and all together we have been working well on our individual roles too.

"For me on my individual role, I aim to bring work rate, and what I try to do is drive the team forward. Of course, I try to give my best in every game, and to add quality in every bit of work that I do.

"I think I am doing the best that I can do, I've had a good run of games and I hope I can keep giving my best for this team."

After joining the Cherry and Whites two summers ago, Galarza has become a true favourite at the club, his calm and personable nature backed up by his comfort in his environment after swiftly settling into his surroundings.


"My wife and I have settled really well in Cheltenham and we are really happy here. It is a completely different culture of course to what we are used to, but we are getting used to it every day.

"We really like living here in England and in Gloucestershire, and the experience is really nice for us, where you can go to a lot of lovely places, meet a lot of people and also it's exciting and challenging to be learning a new language.

"It is also an education for me to try a different level of rugby, and I am really enjoying my time in a Gloucester shirt. I have of course got a number of years still to play here and I am excited for what is to come. Who knows what the future holds!"

With Bristol in town today, the job in hand is no different from previous weeks where Wasps and Saracens stood on the other side of the white lines. Galarza knows that without getting too focused on the opponents, Gloucester have to get their own game in order first, and believe in the qualities that they

"They are a really dangerous team for us, and I think we need to give a really good performance to win the game. We need to work well during the week, and make sure that our preparations are spot on, and then we have to play for the full eighty minutes.

"In this competition, I have learned that you have to play for the full game, as you can win or lose a game against any team. So to win a game, you have to be really focused for all eighty minutes, and we will do just that this weekend."



It does them no favours as they cannot really try to recruit until the play offs are finalised, and by then most other teams are away on pre-season. I hope they can get some results together and stay up - though not today, obviously - as the trip down there is always fun.

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RANDALL on ROUGBY

WELCOME BRISTOL, WHO COME TO KINGSHOLM IN THE PREMIERSHIP FOR THE FIRST TIME SINCE NOVEMBER 2008.

Three of their current squad - which numbers 60 players - started that fixture just over eight years ago, so it will be interesting to see if Luke Arscott, David Lemi and Adrian Jarvis are on the field this

It's fair to say Bristol's adaptation to being back in the top flight hasn't gone too well. A paltry four points from a possible 45 leaves them well adrift at the foot of the table, so I sought out one of Gloucester's Jacob Rowan, to see if the gap really is the chasm it appears. His first thought was not about the quality of their play either last season or this, but the system by which Bristol were promoted.

"You don't know if you are going to go up until the end of May, which in terms of recruitment is a Director of Rugby's nightmare" Rowan said.

"You have to try and sign players who are available at that time and before you know it you are into preseason. Bristol have found it hard but they have made some signings since then and you don't know how far their improvement will take them."

Rowan's own graduation from the Championship has now progressed

to a point where he's played more minutes this season than Matt Kvesic. He'll be 27 in January, has the security of a Chemistry degree behind him, and still carries the statistic of never being yellow carded in Gloucester colours.

"As a seven, you try and play on the edge and push the boundaries but discipline is a big part of the game" Rowan went on.

"Look at what happened at Exeter in the last few minutes, where we conceded two penalties which gave them field position and an opportunity to score a try.

"Over the last two seasons I've worked a lot on my breakdown skills, especially defensively, and I knew I had to increase my lean body mass too. I was a bit light



when I came here and I was a bit taken aback by how strong the guys were in the gym."

Rowan was brought through at Yorkshire Carnegie by former England coach Stuart Lancaster, who also had Luther Burrell and Calum Clark in the same youth system. He went on to play more than 100 first team games for the club before his move to Gloucester and sees it as a good grounding on a personal level for his career.

"In terms of physicality, the divisions are not too far apart because there are some big and expressive players in the Championship. The big steps are the tempo and the skill level, and being able to execute those skills at high page for 80 minutes."

"The more you get used to it, the more you can do it, and it applies in training too. We're all trying to put questions into the heads of the coaches on a weekly basis when they come to select the team. We all want to be in the starting XV."

Rowan played the whole game at Allianz Park last Sunday as Gloucester were edged out by the "THE MORE YOU GET USED TO IT, THE MORE YOU CAN DO IT, AND IT APPLIES IN TRAINING TOO. Premiership leaders. The league table may not make happy reading at the moment but with three of the next four games at home, starting today, the chance is there to overhaul some of the other teams in the bottom balf.

As for Bristol, their key game appears to be the one at home to Worcester on Boxing Day, but Rowan acknowledged they would see today as an opportunity too

"There is an extra fizz to a derby and we have to use that better than they do" he concluded.

"Bristol's start was a shock to them, but they beat Sale in the Anglo Welsh, ran Bath close and then got a losing bonus point against Leicester last week. Their training will have been better because they'll have seen things starting to work, and they'll see Gloucester in 10th place and think they can come here to have a go a us as well."

before half-time when hooker Charlie Clare touched down after a catch and drive.

Looking back on the game, Gloucester might thing that they didn't quite get the rub of the green in terms of the referring decisions.

Eastmond and the quiet Christian Wade lost the ball and Matt Scott hacked it on. Henry Purdy raced after the loose ball before showing good footballing skills to kick on and dot it down for Gloucester's fifth to inspire sheer delight all around the stadium.

It left many wondering where this Gloucester display had been in the home defeats to Newcastle and Bath, but all of sudden, there was a renewed optimism around Castle Grim.
