I think it is definitely something to be happy about that, ever since, our defence in that area has been much improved.

We're in a good place as a squad now. When I last penned my programme notes, we were looking for a spark and some momentum, and scoring nearly one hundred points over the last two weekends, has seen the spring in our step return and we're excited for the challenge tonight.

To get to where we want to be, we need to build momentum, and we found from the last Anglo-Welsh and European window that the whole squad knuckled down and put in some great performances. And, as we see another big block of Premiership games on the horizon in February, we know we can really get up a head of steam.

Late kick off tonight, but the boys will be hugely up for this one and excited to run out in front of the home crowd and secure the valuable prize of a home quarter-final at the end of the game.



pardon the pun! But that's not so easy to organise.

From our point of view, the important thing is that an alternative venue was found, we secured the five points and our destiny is still in our own hands.

Finally, I would like to pay tribute to our supporters who travelled to give us their backing last weekend. For so many to travel, and then show such ingenuity and determination to make the rearranged game speaks volumes.

t the start of every season we highlight the importance of bonus points in both the Aviva Premiership and European competition.

In the Premiership, bonus points have kept us within touching distance of the top 6 despite losing a number of very close games.

In Europe, after last weekend's bonus point victory in Treviso together with La Rochelle's failure to get a bonus point in Bayonne, we can now win our pool and secure a home quarter-final with a big performance and win tonight.

It's also about maintaining the momentum we've built up over the last couple of weeks prior to the next group of Premiership fixtures. After tonight, the next two weeks of Anglo-Welsh fixtures give us the chance to give some players a rest but equally, and just as importantly, an opportunity for a number of players who have waited patiently for game time.


Unlike previous years where injuries have taken their toll on player availability at this stage of the season, we have had 90% players fit for selection







n epic experience in bizarre circumstances that will live long in the memory is how one diehard Gloucester fan has described the weekend's trip to Treviso.

Kingsholm Supporters' Mutual (KSM) chairman Bob Rumble, who has been following the Cherry and Whites for over 40 years and rarely misses a game home or away, said he had never experienced anything like the situation that unfolded in northern Italy on Saturday.

Fans were gathering inside the Stadio Monigo, Benetton Treviso's

home ground, when it soon became clear that the game would be unable to go ahead there due to a massive patch of ice.

However, from the depths of despair that left many facing the prospect of a long, wasted journey it turned into a day to remember for the right reasons as they were transferred four kilometres to the Italian club's training ground for the game to take place on a 4G pitch in surroundings more akin to a lower league local rugby ground with Gloucester claiming a 41-0 win that sent them into the European Challenge Cup quarter-finals.





"For obvious reasons it will live in the memory forever," Rumble told The Citizen.

"It turned out to be epic in the most bizarre way.

"Underpinning it all was the professional performance on the pitch from Gloucester - it was first class.

"How they must have felt having people so close to them I don't know. It must have been different for them as well.

"I think people were incredibly disappointed at the original venue, wondering what was going to happen next, but it was all good in the end thanks to the team performance and we all had a great evening out."

The KSM took 150 Gloucester fans and had their own coaches to transfer their members from one ground to the other, while Treviso arranged transport to take the rest with stories also emerging of others getting car lifts with some home supporters.

It is thought between 300 and

350 visiting fans of the 700-strong crowd were in the Ghirada Sports Centre, standing on the muddy sidelines with tape going around parts to separate them from the pitch.

Rumble, 68, said:

"If you took the 4G pitch out of it, it was very much like a rec or local park but without anyone walking their dogs!

"Treviso were very professional in getting people down there and didn't leave anyone in the lurch.

"From the moment the referee

announced the venue change everything from there was professionally handled.

"Benetton Treviso were hugely hospitable. Apart from the fact it was pretty cold it was all in all job done on the pitch and everyone went away pretty happy because of the result, to get the five points and the fact that we kept them to nil.

"So many of our people said they had never experienced anything like this before and that they would be able to look back in years to come and say 'I was there!"

he 2011-12 season will be remembered by the Gloucester faithful as one in which a talented Gloucester side, who had been tipped to make the Aviva Premiership play-offs, lost their last six games to finish eighth. However, the season was also notable for one glorious highlight – the home and away Heineken Cup ties against the all-conquering Toulouse.

Gloucester had been drawn in a strong group with Toulouse, Harlequins and Connacht. The opening match could not have been more daunting. The opposition was Toulouse, the French champions and the only club to have won the cup four times, on their home turf, the Stade Ernest-Wallon.

Gloucester, reeling after the expulsion of Mike Tindall from the England squad, following incidents at the 2011 World Cup, and the suspension of Eliota Fuimaono-Sapolu, following an outburst on Twitter, had had the worst of weeks in preparation and were very much the underdogs.

TOUCHING GREATNESS

GLOUCESTER AND TOULOUSE IN 2011-12

Given no chance by the pundits, Gloucester rose to the occasion and, in an effort of heroic proportions, almost won the game.

Man of the Match Mike Tindall had a towering game. In a match in which the eyes of the rugby world were upon him he turned in one of his best performances in a Gloucester shirt, creating tries for Charlie Sharples and Henry Trinder and making a number of try-saving tackles

Tindall inspired his young backline in which Jonny May, a late replacement for Olly Morgan at full back, Henry Trinder, coming in for the suspended Fuimaono-Sapolo, and Charlie Sharples were also outstanding.

The Telegraph commented:

"Right wing Sharples should have been in New Zealand with England – his omission remains baffling – and was a constant threat on Sunday...
Trinder is one of the most instinctive
young players in England and he
clearly demonstrated that in the
second half when he appeared on
Tindall's shoulder at exactly the
right time and then showed a fair
turn of speed to score a well-worked
try. Who knows who is selecting
England squads these days but
hopefully somebody out there
noticed."

The visitors had led 10-0 after Freddie Burns landed a penalty and converted a try from Charlie Sharples, created by Mike Tindall, but Toulouse came back through a penalty by Luke McAlister who then put a beautifully weighted chip into the right corner for wing Timoci Matanavou to touch down.

McAlister missed the conversion, but was on target with a simple penalty 11 minutes into the second half after Alasdair Strokosch was sin-binned for slapping the ball out of Matanavou's hands. The Toulouse pack were now dominant with Australian scrum half Luke Burgess giving a powerful display.

Burns missed a relatively straightforward opportunity to put Gloucester back in front minutes later, and Toulouse should have gone further ahead when a rampaging burst from flanker Yannick Nyanga split the visitors' defence, but they wasted a huge overlap on the left when Yves Donguy dropped Poitrenaud's pass with the line gaping.

The hosts then had another try disallowed for a forward pass from Matanavou, and their frustration grew when Lionel Beauxis, on as a



replacement for McAlister, sliced a drop-goal attempt wide from inside the Gloucester 22.

Beauxis was successful from the tee when Gloucester were penalised at a scrum, to make the score 14-10 but then Toulouse attempted to attack from deep only to lose the ball thirty metres out, allowing Tindall to make a halfbreak and send Trinder bursting through to score, Burns converting to make it 17-14 with 10 minutes left

A famous victory was now on the cards, but it was not to be. Full back Clement Poitrenaud gathered a pass from his winger Matanavou that appeared to be forward, but referee Peter Fitzgibbon ruled that the ball had come back off a Gloucester hand and Poitrenaud went over for the winning score.

GLOUCESTER 34 TOULOUSE 24, KINGSHOLM, FRIDAY JANUARY 20 2012


By the time Gloucester came to play the return match against Toulouse, they had lost both home and away to Harlequins and put themselves out of contention for a place in the last eight. Their opponents still had everything to play for, but Gloucester were playing to avenge their defeat in November in the south of France.

Once again Gloucester confounded the pundits with easily their most accomplished performance of the season. They scored tries through Jonny May (two), Akapusi Qera and Charlie Sharples and played with a spirit that suggested that the second half of the domestic season would be significantly more prolific than the first.

The Telegraph commented:

"On the evidence of this, the Heineken Cup quarter finals will be a poorer place without the Cherry and Whites."

A man down in the first minute when Nick Wood was yellowcarded, Gloucester found themselves in front less than 90



seconds later, thanks to Charlie Sharples and Jonny May, who was again at full-back. The pair chased a speculative punt from Freddie Burns and forced Timoci Matanavou into a clearance kick that Sharples charged down behind the Toulouse line. May was on hand to touch down and Burns converted.

It was a lead that lasted five minutes. Toulouse created a platform in midfield and with Gloucester short on numbers, Thierry Dusatoir gathered in centre field and raced 40 metres for a try. Lionel Beauxis added the points from in front of the posts.


The outside half edged the visitors in front with a penalty after 14 minutes and shortly after, Matanavou made up for his earlier gaffe, with a try that highlighted the quality of the visiting three quarters. Beauxis, Florin Fritz and full-back Clement Poitrenaud created the opportunity with three exquisite passes and Matanavou had the simple task of touching


Gloucester struck back with a tremendous try from Qera who powered over after Burns had delivered the scoring pass with Toulouse back-pedalling in front of their own posts.

Then Mike Tindall kicked ahead and May delivered the perfect pass for Sharples to score a try that Burns converted. A Burns penalty increased the lead, but Matanavou's second try, 17 minutes from time, was converted by Beauxis to bring the scores level.

24-24 and anybody's game but then Burns, with a penalty from close in and May with a second try after James Simpson-Daniel had shown a clean pair of heels to half the Toulouse pack, put the seal on a wonderful night for Gloucester rugby.

No less a judge than Peter Ford believed this to be the best performance that he had ever seen from a Gloucester team.











A strange thing happened in Treviso last weekend - Tom Savage left the field of play having only played for an hour. And he wasn't injured!

Just look at a Gloucester Rugby team sheet this season, and you will be able to note a few changes as the squad has rotated with lots of players given the chance to impress.

But one number has been a constant. Tom Savage and the number four shirt have formed a dependable and regular relationship in Cherry and White.

The totemic second row has been an ever-present and his durability, physicality and relentless style of play have earned him rave reviews as, like a Duracell battery (other brands are available), he just keeps on going.

Set to make another start tonight against Bayonne, and still bearing the marks of a recent cut to his head, the 27-year old lock looks well set to add many more appearances to his 137 to date, as he explains ahead of this evening's game.

"Obviously, I've been lucky enough to have a really good run of games this season, and long may it continue. I'm enjoying being involved in the side week in, week out and with that comes the responsibility of playing with a consistency and hopefully I'm doing that.

"I aim to keep my performance levels pretty high, and I'm really looking to crack on now with every chance I get to play and improve as a player, as much as I can."

His story has been well told painting the Hartpury club house one summer, then asking for a trial with the team and subsequently earning a contract. But, after making his bow during Rugby World Cup 2011, Savage has become a true part of the fixtures and fittings at the club. "I still count myself as quite a young player around the place really.
Obviously, I've been here a little while now and I guess you fall into the role of a senior player more than being told.

"I'm someone who aims to lead from the front, and lead by example and try to be as good a professional around the club as I can be.

Therefore it is about ticking all the boxes that I can in my preparation so that I'm in the best place possible come the weekend."

The second row resources at the club are an area of strength, and Savage praises his colleagues and the qualities that they bring to the squad.

"We've got a good stock in the second row, it's a competitive position within the squad, with Jeremy, Mariano both being internationals, and then Joey Latta and Tom Denton in the squad too. On top of this we've got a good

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group of young boys that are pushing on the door.

"The bottom line of this is that you've got to be on top of your game every week to hold onto the shirt, and the boys are just pushing each other every week. The harder we work amongst the second-row unit, the more we can improve and help the team as a collective."

A tricky start to the season for the Cherry and Whites hasn't been one to savour, but Savage knows that the squad are showing so many bring signs of improvement.

"There were all sorts of reasons why it wasn't clicking at the start of the season. Every single game presented a different reason perhaps to why it wasn't working and we weren't closing out games. But it is nice to see now that we are learning every week from our mistakes.

"However, we are not happy where we are at now at all. And I think we're still being hard on ourselves. We're reviewing every fine detail going into each game, and even if we've had a good result we know that there are still areas to improve on those and give that little bit extra."

Bayonne are the visitors to Kingsholm this evening, and Savage knows that the focus is on a positive result first and foremost, without worrying too much about the connotations to follow

"There are no easy games, any time we play, and every team gives their best in professional rugby. We know that we've got to do A before B, then C and D will follow and we are focused on staying on the task in hand and make sure that we go and get it right and we will come away with the result."

After a disrupted trip to Treviso, Savage reflects on a memorable afternoon in Italy, with Gloucester leaving nothing to chance to secure the win.

"That's the way we went into the game, if it could go wrong, it did



go wrong. The day before we were stuck on the plane for a few hours on the tarmac because they couldn't get the stairs to the plane because of the snow.

"The following day we arrived to a frozen pitch, getting told the game was cancelled to then getting told we have to play in an hour. So sometimes these things go out of the window and you have to get on with it

"We still had to get out there and do the job on the pitch and get on with it without making any excuses, and doing the job the best we can."

And as Gloucester end another pool stage campaign, they have a knockout stage to look forward to, in a competition that holds a number of great memories for Savage.

"Those memories are the ones that you remember, and we try to put ourselves back in position to make more memories. Hopefully we can build on what we have done so far in this competition and build on that tonight and give ourselves the best opportunity to go out and do that.

"That night in May 2015 was one of the best nights of my career, and I always remember those moments. This competition is an enjoyable one and one that we want to do well in, and hope there will be plenty more memories to come."



ell good evening and welcome to Kingsholm. I know my memory is not what it used to be so I may well stand to be corrected, but this is the only time I can recall being at Kingsholm for a Saturday night game?

I don't think we should underestimate the difficulty and mental toughness that was called for last weekend. I know exactly how that feels... More than once I have gone to completely the wrong building for a meeting, or been asked to change rooms... it's mentally draining - this artistic temperament needs certainty!

I did enjoy the pictures from the event - poor old Duncan having to sit out pitch side rather in his nice specially heated seat with all his assistants bringing him hot drinks, not to mention our analytics team perching themselves somewhat precariously on top of the kit van. No doubt a complete health and safety risk assessment had been completed beforehand.

Joking aside, it did undoubtedly take a bit of mental toughness to adapt and to then get that kind of result away from home speaks volumes. And let's not forget the great effort made by the travelling support too - for those that made the trip it has no doubt reached legendary status and will soon be talked about in reverential terms along with so many other '... you just had to be there...' matches.

So, we know what we have to do tonight - simple really - score four tries and win the game and that's us done and dusted into the quarter finals and we can look forward to another home tie and no doubt another strange match day and kick off time

Did you notice Wayne taking a sneaky look at the big screen at the Worcester Street end when he jogged back to half way? Had he not picked up the fact from 14,000 people telling him he got it wrong



by then he got to see it in all its glory. No harm done though.

And earlier this week some of the worst kept secrets in rugby got confirmed - Matt Kvesic is off to play his rugby in Exeter - good luck Matt - and we've got a few new faces coming on board too. No doubt there will be more ins and outs announced in good time.

I SUPPOSE IT IS HUMAN NATURE TO FORGET THE ROUTINE AND REMEMBER THE EXCEPTIONAL. LAST SATURDAY WAS ONE SUCH OCCASION.

Games in Italy have proved challenging in the past for my friends at BBC Gloucestershire, notably against Viadana and Roma, but last weekend's postponement and rapid switch to a different yenue was a new one

The plaudits handed out on social media to Andrew Pugh and Richard Martin plus the small team at base were well deserved for delivering a commentary under such

Just as the weather in Italy posed some testing logistical problems, Stephen Vaughan's recent appearance on BBC Gloucestershire's "Cherry & White Wednesday" also saw the CEO questioned on a variety of topical issues as the season heads into an important phase on and off the field.

Events continue to evolve but I thought it was worth detailing some of the main points raised here.

What is the vision for the club over the next few years? Are you satisfied with being 8th or 9th and making a profit, or are Gloucester looking to be genuine top 4 contenders?

"I think we have a squad that can get into the top four, although I



accept that looks a long shot this season now. We are not happy to be 8th and making a profit, and this season we won't make a profit, after investing a lot last year in the playing department, the coaches and the academy.

"Ask David Humphreys, Richard Hibbard or anyone else and Premiership wise we don't like being where we are, but we have some big players fit again and there is still a lot of rugby to be played"

Is Gloucester Rugby paying up to the salary cap?

"At the base level, yes. The salary cap is £7 million pounds, but there are various credits on top, for example selection of academy players and home grown players.


"The various credits could take the cap up to £9.5 million pounds

but most clubs take a sensible approach now and leave a 'rainy day' element in case you get a series of injuries which you cannot cover via injury dispensation. We don't have a benefactor at the club, so we're one of the ones who don't fully use those extra credits."

When can we expect anything definitive on the proposed takeover?

"All the relevant parties have been spoken to and the informal signs are positive. We are waiting for formal approval. The next EPCR board meeting is on February 14th but we have intimated to them that is too long to wait.

"We have to get on with running the club and then, if the answer is yes, we can sit down with Mohed Altrad and his team to discuss what happens next."



What is in this deal for Mohed Altrad?

"He wants to use rugby - and Gloucester Rugby - as a vehicle to market the Altrad brand in the UK. That, even as a passionate Montpellier man, is his prime objective.

"We have been in no rush to sell a majority stake, and Martin St Quinton doesn't need to sell his shares but if it all goes through, and hopefully it does, it will be good financially for Gloucester Rugby

"We cannot be afraid of the future and bringing investment in, but equally we must not forget the DNA of the club."

Is there any update on a new pitch, and will it be a hybrid, plastic, or grass?

"The most expensive option is the Desso pitch like the one they have at Twickenham. Behind that are various new hybrid pitches, and then there's a synthetic pitch with an organic infill, which is what was installed at Worcester.

"Ultimately, we are looking at a new pitch, but the Altrad deal going through would change the dynamic over the decision, and we might be able to afford something different if we wait



"I thought Gloucester fans would be against a synthetic pitch but speaking to some of them in La Rochelle I was surprised by how many seemed keen on it.

"What's certain is that we need a better pitch than the one we currently have and whether it's 2017 or 2018 we need to do it."

How much faith do you have in the coaching set-up?

"I have complete faith in the coaches. I see how much work they put in and how much knowledge they have. Martin St Quinton and I do not shirk making decisions and while everyone will have their opinion we believe they are one of the best units in the Premiership."

What promises can the club give over healthier food options in the Fanzone?

"I accept that is an issue. Our dilemma is trying to please everyone. I'll take up the suggestions over offering jacket potatoes rather than pasties or chips and see if we can trial them, but if they don't sell then they'll be withdrawn."

Stephen will watch today hoping for that additional revenue stream which would come from a home quarter final.

Gloucester now have matters in their own hands after Stade Rochelais failed to get a bonus point win in Bayonne, despite being 24-9 up early in the second half, with three tries already on the board.

Last weekend really was a surprise on so many fronts. If order is restored tonight, clear a space in your diary for an extra game two weeks before Easter.




