CUP MATCHES AGAINST LONDON IRISH

loucester Rugby have met London Irish eleven times previously in cup competitions, and have come out winners in seven of them. The points difference to date is 323-217 in favour of the Cherry and Whites.

The teams first met in the John Player Cup on 28th February 1981 at Sunbury-on-Thames. Tries from Richard Mogg and Steve Boyle put Gloucester ahead at half-time, and Padraig Conway squeezed over in the corner to secure a 22-13 win.

The only success enjoyed by Irish at Kingsholm came in a Powergen Cup match on 15th November 2003. Gloucester were the cup holders, having defeated Northampton a few months earlier at Twickenham. But in their first match as champions, they spent nine minutes of added time at the end of the match, camped on the Irish line, but unable to get over, so went down 29-35.

The most notable encounter was a rip-roaring finale to the European Challenge Cup campaign of 2005-06. Gloucester came into that game having won all six of their pool games, demolishing Brive in the quarter-final, and slugging it out against Worcester in the semi-final. So, on to a nerve-racking but glorious final under the lights at the Stoop on 21st May 2006:

London Irish opened the scoring with a brace of penalty goals before Gloucester responded with a try fashioned by Mike Tindall and scored by Mark Foster. Andy Hazell powered over for a second. Delon Armitage grabbed one back for Irish, but two penalties and a conversion by Ryan Lamb saw Gloucester 18-13 ahead at the interval.

Ludo Mercier replaced Lamb and slotted a couple of penalties, but Irish were pressing when Sinbad intercepted, and there was no catching him over 50 metres, to put Gloucester 12 points to the



good. Irish fought back hard, David Paice and Robbie Russell drove over for tries, but the second conversion was missed, which sent the game into extra time.

The Exiles went ahead with a penalty, but Jamie Forrester brought off a sensational winning try, kicking the ball ahead, winning the race for it, and touching the ball down just as it was about to roll over the dead ball line.

The teams next met in the LV= Cup on 5th February 2011 at Kingsholm:

GLOUCESTER 41 LONDON IRISH 8

Gloucester ran riot in the first half, being awarded a penalty try in addition to those run in by Tim Molenaar, Charlie Sharples and big Jim Hamilton. They had secured the bonus point within half an hour, and another from Olly Morgan gave them a handsome half-time lead at 29-3.

Not surprisingly, Gloucester eased off after the restart, but found their mojo again in the last ten minutes, when Akapusi Qera broke tackles to score and Sharples took a reverse pass from Freddie Burns to secure his second.

The teams were drawn in the same European Rugby Challenge Cup pool in 2012-13, and first met on 8th December 2012 at the Madejski:

LONDON IRISH 22 GLOUCESTER 29

Irish scored first with a fine try by Sailosi Tagicakibau, and Gloucester defended for most of the first half, and could count themselves fortunate to be only 6-10 behind at the break, thanks to a couple of penalties from Freddie Burns. He added a third at the start of the second half, but tries

by Halani Aulika and Anthony Watson left Irish apparently out of sight at 22-9.

But Gloucester then scored 20 unanswered points in the final half an hour. Dan Murphy drove over from short range, as did Burns, who added the conversions and two penalties to complete a remarkable comeback.

The return fixture was played a week later at Kingsholm:

GLOUCESTER 47 LONDON IRISH 3

Gloucester achieved little for the first half an hour, before Sione Kalamafoni powered over the line with three defenders hanging on to him, and Shane Monahan scorched through on a weaving run for a breath-taking try. Kalamafoni then careered downfield to put Monahan in for his second, and Gloucester were ahead 23-3 at the break.

The start of the second half was delayed whilst Monahan threw up in front of the Shed, which raised questions about the half-time refreshment, but then came a golden moment from Rob Cook, who gathered a clearance kick and ran straight through the middle of the defence to score under the posts. Monahan had recovered in time to score his third and fourth tries, but the biggest cheer was for a break by Jim Hamilton, Nick Wood taking it on, and Dan Robson finishing it off.

Gloucester topped the pool, winning all six, Irish came second having lost only their two games with Gloucester. But Gloucester lost to Biarritz in the quarter-final at Kingsholm.

The most recent encounter was in the Anglo-Welsh Cup on 11th November 2017 at Kingsholm:

GLOUCESTER 47 LONDON IRISH 7



Gloucester seemed rusty at the start of each half but settled in, were 19-0 ahead at half-time, and ended the game with a flourish. The seven tries were spread across the team with one each from Heinz, Rapava-Ruskin, Hudson, Thrush, Trinder, Braley and Polledri. The highlights were a touchline dash by Henry Trinder and a 25-metre sprint to the line by Jake Polledri.

NOT TOO LONG AGO, HENRY WALKER WOULD HAVE BEEN GETTING A RUN OUT IN THE PREMIERSHIP RUGBY CUP AS ONE OF THE UP AND COMING YOUNGSTERS IN THE

The competition has long been positioned as being one where the most promising English (and until recently Welsh) talent could gain valuable game time. And Walker, like several other former Academy players, benefitted from that.

However, it's a sign of the progress that Walker has made over the last 18 months that he comes into today's game having made 14 appearances last season, including featuring in all six Heineken Champions Cup fixtures. It was arguably his breakthrough campaign.

But, as keen as he's been to build on last season, he's had to patiently bide his time following an unusually long preseason.

(Laughs) "Yeah, it's been long! And nice to finally get down to some rugby. We've got several boys away on World Cup duty, which is great for them and also great for the club. So, that means that it's a massive opportunity for quite a few other squad members over the next few weeks.

"The World Cup has also meant that we've had a longer preseason than usual, and Dan (Tobin) and the other S&C staff have done a great job splitting the preseason into different blocks – one block focusing on speed, followed by a week off then a strength block. They've kept it interesting which has been key."

The other key difference in the fixture calendar this season means that the Premiership Rugby Cup takes centre stage first up, rather than after several weeks of Premiership and European action.

"We're straight into it, and it's the start of something like 16 straight weeks of rugby. So, it's going to be tough and everyone will need to play their part.

"But everyone is ready and eager at the moment. And that's vital – Johan has emphasized that everyone needs to know their detail as anyone is only ever one injury away from being involved. You have to be ready to go."

Followers of Gloucester Rugby have been watching Walker, along with Ciaran Knight and Alex Seville, making their way through the ranks over the past few seasons. They've all now made several appearances at first team level, so it's no longer about potential but about delivering?





"Very much so. We're keen as a front row trio to step up and show what we can do. And to do that on a regular basis. And it's not just us front-rowers. A few others have stepped up from the Academy – Charlie Chapman, Alex Craig, Tom Seabrook – and we're all keen to show that we belong there.

"Playing European games last season against the likes of Castres and Munster was a massive challenge and step up for all of us. But we've come through that and we should be better for those experiences this season."

But today is all about London Irish, back in the big time following a year's exile in the Championship and they will be coming to Kingsholm today, determined to show they're back where they belong.

"Definitely. They've recruited well and will be trying desperately to avoid relegation again. It'll be a big challenge today as we don't really know what they'll be like. But we're an unknown quantity to them as well so it could be an entertaining game."

After a difficult first evening at the Premiership Rugby 7s, Gloucester Rugby's young squad bounced back on day two and lifted the Plate to reward some never-say-die efforts.


The Cherry and Whites lost their two fixtures on the Friday evening. But they were never outclassed. Indeed, their ability with ball in hand and defensive commitment couldn't be faulted.

However, it was securing possession that was the main issue on the night. The game against Exeter Chiefs, the second of the evening, was a case in point. Gloucester Rugby defended for a good four and a half minutes to keep the Chiefs at bay before finally conceding the game's first try. That effort inevitably took its toll in the second half as Exeter ran out 0-31 winners.

Gloucester Rugby's first game, the tournament's opening fixture, saw the Cherry and Whites battle it out against London Irish. Gloucester Rugby struck twice to lead 7-0 and 14-7, but the Exiles ruled the roost at the restart and the resulting possession allowed them to dominate proceedings and run out winners by 27 points to 19.

They may have been disappointed by Friday night's results, but the young guns showed no signs of letting it affect them and showed real guts to launch two late comebacks and win the Plate.

Taking on the hosts, Northampton Saints, in the Plate semi-final, Gloucester Rugby led at half-time but a dogged fightback by the home team saw them lead by nine points with just over a minute remaining.

Scoring a sensational solo run down the nearside touchline to score with just 13 seconds of the game left. He then did the same again to win it for the Cherry and Whites.

And the final proved to be similarly dramatic! The Cherry and Whites started well, but Sale hit back and looked to have put the game to bed when Tom Curtis went over for two quickfire second-half tries.

But a yellow card for Tom Roebuck as he took out Reece Dunn as the Gloucester Rugby back chased his own kick ahead turned the game on its head.

The Cherry and Whites took a quick tap and Reece Dunn forced his way over. Tom Stanton then went over from close range but, crucially, both conversions were missed and the gap was 27-29 with just the restart to come.

Sale looked to have it covered, but flapped at the restart and Varney needed no second invitation to pin his ears back and make the line to snatch the win.
