TWELVETREES SCORES A BRACE AS GLOUCESTER RUGBY TAKE FIVE POINTS FROM WASPS.

What happened?

It was a freezing cold November evening, but the Cherry and Whites scored four tries and came away from Coventry with the bonus point win.

Jonny May was the first to get over the line after Adam Hastings put in a good chip over the top which set up the attack which saw the England winger score.

The Scottish international was accurate from the tee as well and slotted the conversion as well as two penalties in short succession to open the scoring nicely.

Despite the strong start, Wasps were still in the game and proved this through a clever move at the lineout which saw Thomas Young dive over to score.

However, Gloucester Rugby were next to land a blow and it was Billy Twelvetrees who collected the short ball from Mark Atkinson and ran all the way to the line to score his first of two tries.

Wasps had the final say of the half and Gabriel Oghre got over for the home side just before the break. Jacob Umaga's conversion put them right back in the game with the score 12-23.

In the second half, Twelvetrees went over for his second try, and Hasting's conversion gave the Cherry and Whites a healthy lead.

Jack Clement also went over from the driving maul to make up for a try that was chalked off in the first half, but Wasps were rampant and were on the comeback.

A try from Alfie Barbeary and Jacob Umaga made things really close going into the final few minutes.

With just over a minute on the clock, Umaga scored another great try to set up a tense finish.

Nailing the conversion, there were two points in the game with just seconds left.

Wasps were awarded a penalty, but the Gloucester Rugby defence was strong and Wasps were forced into a knock on.

Hastings collected the ball and booted it to touch to end the game much to the relief of the Cherry and White fans in attendance.

Billy Twelvetrees and Mark Atkinson linked beautifully with each other throughout the game but it was the set up to Billy's second try which was really special. The centre collected the short ball and went over to score!



GLOUCESTER RUGBY

The first Gloucester players to face Argentinian opponents were Peter Hordern and John A'Bear, who toured there in 1936 with a British Isles (now Lions) side which won all their matches. Hordern played in the only "Test" match, which was won 23-0 in Buenos Aires, although caps were not awarded, and he got a bit carried away over dinner when giving the Argentinian politician sitting opposite him a ketchup shampoo.

This was probably forgotten by 1973, when an Argentinian club, Belgrano, made a short tour of England and played Public School Wanderers at Kingsholm. PSW fielded eight internationals, and Gloucester provided most of their pack with Robin Cowling, Mike Nicholls, Jim Jarrett, Alan Brinn, and John Watkins, as well as John Spalding at scrum-half. PSW won 38-20. For the Kingsholm faithful, the highlight was a stirring gallop by Brinn ending in a try, Watkins scored another, and Nicholls kicked their only conversion.

In 1978, the Argentina national team played the second game of their tour at Kingsholm against English Students, who selected Ian Wilkins of Gloucester and Lydney, and several future international stars in Marcus Rose, Clive Woodward, Paul Ackford, Steve Bainbridge and Nick Jeavons. Wilkins scored a sizzling try, running it in from 30 metres, but the tourists won, 15-9, their trump card being their worldclass captain and stand-off, Hugo Porta.

ARGENTINIAN CONNECTIONS



One match was played at Kingsholm in the 1991 Rugby World Cup – New Zealand v USA. The 46-6 victory for the All Blacks was refereed by E. Sklar of Argentina.

Kingsholm was awarded four matches in the 2015 Rugby World Cup, which included Argentina v Georgia. Local supporters were disappointed that Gloucester favourite Mariano Galarza was unable turn out for Argentina because he had been suspended following the Pumas' previous game against New Zealand. But it was a first appearance at Kingsholm for Matias Alemanno, who would later join the Club. Argentina scored the only try of the first-half to lead 14-9, and soon after the break a yellow card for Georgian captain and inspiration, Mamuka Gorgodze, ended the match as a contest. His team conceded 21 points in his absence, and Argentina went on to win 54-9.

PUMAS AT KINGSHOLM

Diego Albanese (2001-02) was the first Argentinian to play for the Cherry and Whites. In his one season he made quite an impression on the wing, appearing in 18 games and scored three tries. It did not help that, on his wing, he was in competition for game time with James Simpson-Daniel. He won 55 caps for Argentina, and scored ten tries. He played in three World Cups and. in 1999, scored a try against Ireland which helped the Pumas to reach the quarter-finals for the first time. He later played for Leeds and helped them to win the Powergen Cup in 2005.

Qualified doctor Rodrigo Roncero (2002-04) was a favourite of the Shed. He was a prop who could play on either side of the scrum, but his

talent did not end there; he was a strong runner, and deceptively fast in the loose. This was illustrated in 2004 when he ran in a 50 metre interception try against Sale, to huge acclaim from the crowd. He scored another try in the same game. He made 33 appearances for Gloucester and scored five tries. For Argentina he won 55 caps, and played in three World Cups. After leaving Gloucester he played with great success for Stade Francais for several seasons.

Matias Cortese had one season (2011-12) at Kingsholm, and made 11 appearances. He was a hooker with 15 Argentinian caps. He played for Northampton from 2006-08, before spending time at Biarritz and Bayonne. He then returned to Argentina to play for Pampas, which won the Vodacom Cup in 2011. After leaving Gloucester Matias moved to Colomiers to play D2 (the second level) rugby in France.

Mariano Galarza, 26 times capped, was a sizeable piece of Argentinian beef, who played for Gloucester from 2015-18. He was a powerful force in the second row and made 62 appearances. He had previously played for Worcester. His first start for the Cherry and Whites was in the semi-final of the European Challenge Cup against Exeter, and he was a replacement in the successful final against Edinburgh. In 2017 he was again a replacement in the final of the same competition, this time against Stade Francais. In 2018 Mariano played through all the knock-out stages of the Challenge Cup, including the final against Cardiff Blues that was lost in the final kick of the game. Galarza went on play for Bourdeaux and Bayonne.

No fewer than three Pumas are currently playing at Kingsholm, Matias Alemanno, Santiago Carreras and Santiago Socino.

Second row forward, Alemanno, has won 71 caps for Argentina. Arriving in 2020, Matias has added his considerable bulk to the pack. He is destructive at the set piece,



and in the loose. He was in the team which won a thrilling Champions Cup game against Ulster, and scored tries against Worcester and Northampton. In the current season he scored a try (one of eight) in the rout of Benneton in the Challenge Cup. To date he has made 29 appearances, and scored four tries. For Argentina, he scored a try on his debut and, in November 2020, he started in the team which beat New Zealand for the first time ever.



Santiago Carreras is a versatile back, capable of performing at full-back or wing. He is extremely aggressive as a back, and has won 20 caps for the Pumas. Until today Santiago has made 25 appearances for Gloucester, scoring eight tries. He has quite a penchant for snapping up interception tries. Last season he scored two tries against Bristol, and successive tries in the last two games of the season. Carreras was also in the Argentine team which beat the All Blacks for the first time.

Santiago Socino, another hooker, made 34 appearances for Newcastle, before signing for Gloucester. His game time has been limited, due to having to compete with Jack Singleton for the hooking start. So far, he has made 27 appearances, but only seven starts. Nevertheless, this season he has already scored four tries, two of them in Gloucester's last game at Sale. The club obviously thinks highly of him, as he signed a new deal in January to keep him at Kingsholm. Santiago has won seven caps for Argentina.

After the Northampton game, the three Pumas were walking together on the club's "lap of honour", when the Shed took up the chant of "Argentina, Argentina".

SANTIAGO CADERA CIONECTER DICOMUNE ADMAN

SANTIAGO CARRERAS IS GLOUCESTER RUGBY'S SWISS ARMY KNIFE. WITH A SKILLSET THAT MEANS HE CAN PLAY ACROSS THE BACKLINE; HE IS A KEY ASSET TO THE CHERRY AND WHITES AND HAS BEEN A VITAL MEMBER OF THE SQUAD SINCE JOINING THE CLUB IN 2020



Growing up playing in Argentina, Carreras started his career at Córdoba Athletic Club and stayed there until he was 19 before pulling on the Jaguares shirt.

"I started playing rugby when I was 10 years old in Cordoba. I loved playing for my club and I do miss it now. I played there until I was 19 and then joined Jaguares and I played there for two years before coming here."

Carreras has settled in well to life in Gloucestershire and is enjoying being at Kingsholm.

"For me, it's a really good experience and the boys here are really good with me. They make me feel comfortable here, like it's my home. Obviously, the crowd and the Shed here is massive so I'm feeling really happy here."

Gloucester Rugby's fans are famous worldwide, but Carreras didn't believe that the crowd would be as passionate as they are and was blown away when he first played in front of the Compeed Shed.

"I couldn't believe it the first time I came here! Honestly, every time that we play here they bring a lot of energy and it's always an advantage for us to play here. It's massive for us.

"When I see the opponents try and take the high ball in front of the Shed, I think that it must be horrible for them! I'm glad that the fans are on my side."

One of the key reasons for Carreras signing for the Cherry and Whites was the fact that Matias Alemanno was already at the club and he gave his fellow countryman the insight into life at the Premiership club.

"For sure, he was a big influence. He told me everything about the club and the group. He was a big part of the reason for me coming here.

"He really helped me with everything when I came here. Santi Socino too. We spend a lot of time together so it's really good."

Carreras' English is good, but he admits that it is still something he is working on.

"I'm still having English lessons. The boys are really helping me with that. I'm really thankful to them for helping me with everything.

"Jack Clement speaks Spanish really well. So he is a good translator! It is difficult for me because he's a forward so in the meetings, the other guys are with the forwards! But the boys help me and have a lot of patience with me to help me understand everything.

"In our spare time with the boys, that's where I can learn best."

Santi is not only putting time into learning his language skills but also spends time doing extras out on the field, kicking from the tee for example.

"I practise it. I think it's worth practising everything so that you keep getting better day by day so that you are always ready."

Part of the reason for Sant spending time practising his kicking is because he is the ultimate utility player, with the ability to play at fly-half, fullback or on the wing.

"I don't have a preference. My preference is to be on the field! I'm enjoying playing on the wing now but if I play at 15, I'll enjoy that too.

"If you understand rugby then I think you can manage to play in any position. It's rugby! Just play rugby!"

Carreras has played fly-half for Argentina but his most memorable moment representing his country was when he helped his side beat the All Blacks in the November of 2020.

"It was crazy. No one expected it but we were all ready for it. The preparation for that tournament was perfect. It was obviously in the pandemic and everything but the boys were really positive about everything and we got the result and it was really good for us."

He loves representing his country and is very proud of where he is from. Traveling over to England in the middle of the pandemic, he had to spend a long time without seeing his family but was pleased that they were able to visit this Christmas.





"I saw them in December. They came over. It is difficult to be away sometimes but the group here and the boys make you feel at home. The club has a family feel and that's why Mati played a big role in my decision coming here."

Life is very different for the Argentine compared to what he is used to and it has taken some time to adjust to life in the UK.

"Life is quite different in Cheltenham compared to Argentina. It's more safe here but I don't like the weather here! It's really cold. But everything here works how it's supposed to."

At training, one of the biggest thrills for 24-year-old, who celebrated his birthday on Wednesday, is the fact that he can train with world class players in the same position as him.

With Jonny May, Louis Rees-Zammit and Ollie Thorley all competing for starting places, there is great competition for places. In training they all learn from each other and drive each other to be the best.

"I see them, and I watch them every day and watch what they do. I try to copy it and they are all really fast and they've got a good game.

"It's really easy to get better when you are surrounded by such talented people in your position."

Having not played for a couple of weeks, the winger is really looking forward to getting out at Kingsholm against Wasps on Saturday.

"We're really disappointed that the Friday game was cancelled last week but I think the crowd will bring an added energy on Saturday and everyone knows that it's a massive game for us.

"It's massive for us if we are to get the position that we want. Of course, the crowd will be vital for us if we are to get the victory.

"We've got a plan and everyone is taking it really seriously. We want to get the top four obviously, but we need to work week by week to get it."

Looking past the blindside snipes, audacious passing range, and keen eye for an acute switch pass with carrying forwards, Varney boasts a strong game management style of play with a strong ability to get box kicks away, and with distance, a skill which is crucial in this Gloucester Rugby side.

Varney has played several times with fly halves such as Lloyd Evans, Billy Twelvetrees and George Barton (especially through academy level) and partnerships are clearly flourishing. The arrival of Adam Hastings this season will be an exciting one for fans to keep an eye on as the duo will no doubt thrive with an increase of game time going forward. - Gloucester Rugby have lost just one of their last eight Premiership matches against Wasps (W6 D1); however, their last two wins have come by margins of just one and two points respectively.
- Gloucester Rugby have won just one of their last four Premiership matches (L3) after winning six of their previous seven; they conceded exactly four tries in each of those three defeats.
- Gloucester Rugby have won their last two Premiership home matches, with their last home game seeing them score five tries for the first time at Kingsholm this season (35-30 v Northampton Saints); they have only been trailing at half-time on one occasion at home this term (versus Leicester Tigers in round two).
- Wasps have lost their last three Premiership away matches in a row, despite scoring a minimum of 19 points in each fixture; however, their last win on the road also resulted in a four-try bonus point (27-26 v Exeter Chiefs in round 15).
- Wasps won their most recent Premiership match (27-24 v Newcastle Falcons) after losing three in a row previously; only two of their nine wins this season have come by margins of greater than 10 points.
- Gloucester Rugby have made the fewest number of carries (1549) and carry meters (10226) amongst all teams in this season's Premiership; however, they actually rank fourth for meters ran per carry this term (6.6 meters/carry).
- Wasps have both scored the most points in the last 20 minutes of games (169) and conceded the fewest number of points in the same period (69) amongst all teams in this season's Premiership.
- Wasps have the highest line-out success rate amongst all teams in this season's Premiership (94%); additionally, they have also stolen a greater percentage of their opposition's line-outs than any other side this term (16%).
- Gloucester Rugby flanker Lewis Ludlow has averaged the most tackles per game of any player with 10 or more appearances in this season's Premiership (14.6); teammate Freddie Clarke also ranks fourth in the same regard (12.4).
- No player has beaten more defenders in this season's Premiership than Wasps' Tom Willis (72); Willis also ranks fifth for carries made this term (189).
