



## Gloucester

Gloucester arrive in the North East this afternoon on the back of a last minute win over their West Country rivals Bath last weekend.

A 13,000 capacity Kingsholm witnessed a good old-fashioned derby last Saturday, with Academy product and Gloucester lad Brad Davies slotting an injury time drop goal from 45 minutes to seal the win.

The win took the Kingsholm club up to fifth place in the Zurich Premiership and back on course for a top three finish, and the target of

an end of season play-off place.
The win over the olf-rivals came on the back of a bad performance away at Quins, and Nigel Melville's team know that a showing like that has to be put behind them if they're to look at a top slot in the Premiership, not only for the play-offs, but also Heineken Cup qualification.

The disappointment at the Stoop came on the back of two West Country derby wins against Bristol Shoguns, in the Powergen Cup, and against Worcester in the Zurich

Premiership in January Putting the Quins result to one side Gloucester have three four and have started to get back in the groove after a disappointing Heineken Cup exit following a defeat to French champions Stade Francais in the middle of January.

The 17-16 win over Bath last ekend was much needed and, Nigel Melville and his team will be keen to put a mixed first half of the season behind them, and maintain that momentum with a win against Newcastle this afternoon.

Back in September Gloucester took the points from the Falcons with a 31-17 win at Kingsholm and the travelling Gloucester fans will no doubt be happy with a similar

scenario today.

Although the Kingsholm club sit in fifth position in the Zurich Premiership coming into this weekend, there have been mixed fortunes for Gloucester in this season's campaign, with an immensely tough schedule through November, December and

January that saw double headers against both Leicester Tigers and London Wasps. The season started well for the Kingsholm club, as it kicked off the season with four consecutive

victories, over Leeds London Irish. Northampton and Newcastle

A defeat away at Bath was the only loss in the opening seven clashes, as the West

Country entered the opening stages of the Heineken Cup.
As the autumn arrived, so did the injuries! The Gloucester



squad was decimated with injury. At one point there were 13 front line players unavailable.
The 55-13 win at home over

Ulster in the Heineken Cup proved crucial, as Gloucester lost Duncan McRae, Olivier Azam, Alex Brown, James Simpson-Daniel, Terry Sigley and Phil Vickery to injury, as well as Henry Paul, Andy Hazell and Andy Gomarsall receiving international


all-ups. But Nigel Melville's team came through and a win over Sale Sharks in the Zurich Premiership at the end of November, back-to-back victories over Cardiff Blues in the Heineken. and a win at Welford Road against Leicester in the Powergen Cup got

the team back into the groove.

As the injuries hit home, Melville and coach Dean Ryan had to go looking for new recruits, with the

hooker position proving key. Olivier Azam was ruled out for more than three months, although he returned to training this week, and

James Parkes, a summer signing from Saracens, made his debut as a replacement for Fortey in the win over the Sharks in November, and was in impressive form in the Heineken Cup clashes.

Welsh international number two Mefin Davies and French 'A' international hooker Noel Curnier both signed on short terms deals, and Davies has been in good form, although he's missing today after

playing for Wales yesterday.

Just like the rest of the Zurich Premiership clubs, fitness and injuries seem to rule team selection. After welcoming back James Simpson-Daniel in recent weeks, Gloucester lost Phil Vickery with a broken arm last weekend. But Welsh prop Gary Powell should return to the match-day squad today after missing the last eight weeks.
