e know it will be a tough match particularly as the Cherry & Whites have made a better start to the season. However, we have an excellent home record against Gloucester and a growing confidence after our encouraging displays and wins at Newcastle and Swansea.

The media speculation of rifts with the RFU over a number of contentious issues continues to fill column inches. Release of players for training, central contracts and buying stakes in premier clubs are all topics that have aroused passionate debate by concerned

supporters of the game.

The reality is that there are official meetings taking place between the clubs and the RFU over the release of players for training. Informal negotiations should not be conducted through the press! Premier Rugby, for example, have honoured the initial agreement to release players for the training schedule for the autumn internationals and suggested a compromise for the rest of the season.

Supporters and sponsors have paid good money, in good faith, to see the best players in a thrilling and keenly contested domestic competition.

There are no official meetings taking place over central contracts. Unlike County cricket the Premiership has established a vibrant following and can sustain professionalism. The suggestion, from whatever source, of the RFU recruiting the best 50 players is impractical and does not meet with supporters approval.

Bath Rugby has remained loyal to the policy of meeting a player's aspirations to play for his country. We do not want to promote a situation that puts a player in a club v country predicament. Central contracting is not the solution



in my opinion and a sensible working arrangement can be achieved if all parties are willing to discuss a practical way forward.

There has been no contact from the RFU with regards to buying into Bath Rugby. Any offer would be rejected as their motive would be personally unacceptable. When I agreed to take responsibility of the custodianship and stewardship of Bath Rugby it was based on the principle of preserving a great sporting institution for the community. I still have a genuine passion for our city and what the club represents and contributes in so many ways to so many people. We will continue to focus on our commitment to the community but it would be gratifying if our efforts were recognised and given practical support to secure a sound future relationship. We will remain positive and forwardlooking.

We also need to move forward and up the league with a good performance this afternoon and I hope you will give the team your full vocal and visual support.

English fans will be happy to see Phil Vickery back to his rampaging best, and combined with Grand Slam winning hooker Mefin Davies, Oliver Azam and Patrice Collazo, Gloucester have a firm platform in the front row this season. South African international Quinton Davids will add beef to the pack when he arrives, whilst England squad member Alex Brown is in fine form in the second row, Adam Balding, Jake Boer are streetwise back row players.

The return of Ludovic Mercier is also a big boost. The Frenchman controls a match well, whilst also possessing a metronomic boot. Last season goal kicking was possibly a weakness for this Gloucester side, but with Mercier having already racked up 60 points in the Guinness Premiership this season, this area has been well addressed.

However, think again if you believe that Gloucester are

a big pack with a kicking game. The Cheery and Whites have scored nine tries in the Premiership to date and possess some wonderful ball players. The back line is littered with talent. Bath fans will be all too aware of the talent of Mike Tindall: the World Cup winning centre, whose committed approach to his game and work rate is a strong aspect of Gloucester's momentum this season. Add to that the likes of Henry Paul, Peter Richards, James Simpson-Daniel and Marcel Garvey, and it is clear to see that this is a Gloucester backs divison not to be sniffed at.

Paul, given the cold shoulder treatment by England coach Robinson, is, on his day a sublime ball player with great skills. The New Zealand born England international has been given a new lease of life alongside Tindall in the centres. Simpson-Daniel, another England squad member, is also a player of undoubted quality. A player

who can make things happen, he has shaken off injury to near his best form this season.

James Forrester, the back row player who was recently named in the England squad, is a superbly player. Once though of as being too lightweight to become a world class back row, Forrester's rise to prominence is a triumph of brains over brawn.

However, there are also some unsung heroes in this

side too. Adam Eustace, Terry Sigley, Nick Wood and Andy Hazell are all quality players, whilst in Haydn Thomas Gloucester have one of the best up and coming players in the Guinness Premiership.

This will be a fascinating encounter, there is little doubt about that. A full house at the Rec will provide a charged atmosphere and with both sides after victory, this is a match that simply cannot be missed.

Every successful team should have a number of players who step up to the mark in terms of leadership and direction and Gloucester is no exception. Keen not to name a club captain for this season, the Kingsholm club's head coach Dean Ryan has spread his captaincy around

With last season's skipper Adam Balding sidelined through injury, Ryan has called upon Mike Tindall and Phil Vickery this term, whilst former skipper Jake Boer has played a prominent role.

Tindall is an obvious choice to lead the side despite only arriving at the club during the summer. Vastly experienced (he is now one of the senior players in the England squad), Mike has held the vice captaincy for both England and former club Bath. He is a physical and vocal presence in midfield and has been a leading light in Gloucester's back play so far this season.

Vickery, another player to have captained his county, epitomises Gloucester's spirit. A hard-nosed competitor, he is one of the strongest scrummagers around, whilst also contributing significantly in the loose. He is hugely respected by the Gloucester squad and with a whole host of experience behind him (including that World Cup victory), Vickery is a natural leader in the pack.

James burst onto the scene in 2003 in the England A team under the captaincy of Bath's Steve Borthwick. Having already shown glimpses of his vast potential on the Premiership circuit the 6'5" number eight was a towering presence in the lineouts, whilst also playing a prominent part in some extremely good loose play. In those England A appearances he also stamped out thoughts that he was too lightweight to compete at international level.

A full England cap followed, but despite the demise of England A fixtures and ankle and shoulder injuries took their toll on Forrester's international progress over the next couple of seasons, James still managed to impress when taking to the field with Gloucester. With England Head coach Andy Robinson openly acknowledging that he is looking to develop a highly mobile pack, there is reason to suggest that this could be Forrester's year. Dean Ryan, his coach at Gloucester, has already stated that the number eight has made significant strides forward with his physical game so far this season, and Gloucester's recent results point to that observation.

His potential is enormous and he is showing increasing signs that he is ready for international rugby at number eight. This afternoon's match promises to be a highly physical one against a strong Bath pack and with Andy Robinson watching closely, the Gloucester player could well cement his place in the England
