

If it is possible to forge a victory in the principle image of its chief creator – namely the immensely durably but extremely savvy Dean Ryan – then Leicester may be expecting a bit of a slugfest today.

But times are

They come into this afternoon's Guinness Premiership encounter against one of the grand institutions of the game with a stream of fresh talent cutting teeth at the sharp-end of the domestic game.

A clever mix of power and presence is combining very healthily with youthful inventiveness and although Gloucester have yet to produce the type of consistent performances Ryan and

his assistant Bryan Redpath would have liked, the signs are very encouraging.

Gloucester have lost only once this season – somewhat predictably 18-16 at the Rec against Bath – but the one blemish has not detracted from a ferocious work ethic, togetherness and commitment that has been the backbone of their season so far.

Rookies Olly Morgan, an immensely gifted full back, Anthony Allen, a centre with outstanding feet and balance, and scrum half Haydn Thomas are mixing superbly with established cornerstones of the team like James Simpson-Daniel and Ludovic Mercier, the points specialist from France.

Throw in the up front experience of prop Patrice Collazo, who returned to the club in the summer after two years with Toulouse, hooker Mefin Davies, James Forrester, the ridiculously talented Andy Hazell and the returning Adam

They currently sit in third place and saw off Newcastle last weekend by 27-20 at Kingsholm. Morgan and Allen dazzled despite their lack of experience and it followed on from back-to-back victories in the European Challenge Cup.

An opening weekend triumph in France against Bayonne was built upon when Simpson-Daniel led the way with four tries in the 16-try, 106-3 romp against Bucuresti.

Gloucester opened the season with a 15-15 draw against Worcester - Mercier's boot ensuring the points were a penalty try in injury-time to seal a 21-18 victory.

Bristol were then dispatched at the Memorial Stadium 41-9, before Northampton were beaten 28-24 at Kingsholm, when Simpson-Daniel found the try line again in the second half following his return from injury.

On the injury front, Gloucester will be without lock Alex Brown and hooker Olivier Azam today. Brown has a neck injury that ruled him out of England contention, while Azam has a damaged shoulder.

But one man who will be back at Welford Road this afternoon is former Tiger Balding. He is expected to make his first start since the opening day of the season when he shattered his cheek against Worcester at Sixways.

He will add yet more power to the forwards as Gloucester go searching for another victory in one of the toughest environments in the Premiership today. It should be well worth watching.
