

ean Ryan can welcome back up to five international players into the Gloucester squad today, but he has been faced with a really tough decision when coming to select his side for this evening's winner-takes-all Powergen Cup match.

Gloucester's absent stars over the past couple of weeks that head coach Ryan

ignored reputations in preparation for the match. Youngsters Olly Morgan, Mark Foster, Anthony Allen and Luke Narraway have been in excellent form of late and were particularly prominent last weekend in the victory over a Saracens side that had been going well in the Guinness Premiership.

Fullback Morgan has been a revelation in Gloucester colours this season and has made the number fifteen jersey his own, keeping out the talented Jon Goodridge and Rob Thirlby, whilst in Anthony Allen, Ryan believes that he has a future England international centre. It would be hard to disagree. Allen has also impressed in Gloucester colours this season and has matured with every game that he has played. He is a precocious young talent who looks to have an excellent future ahead of him.

Of course Ryan will welcome back England's Mike Tindall, Phil Vickery and James Forrester, whilst James Simpson-Daniel should also start if he has overcome the knock

that he took against the Samoans. Peter Richards, who warmed the England bench last weekend should also slot back in at nine despite some outstanding performances by Hayden Thomas. Mefin Davies also returns from Wales duty and he will be needed as despite some good form of late Gloucester have got a number of injuries in key positions.

They will miss Alex Brown's presence this evening. The talented lock sustained a nasty neck injury when many were touting him as a certainty for England's recent internationals. He is an outstanding lineout forward and that is an area where Gloucester will need to nullify the effects of the Steve Borthwick/Danny Grewcock axis.

Other key absentees through injury include France international hooker Olivier Azam (shoulder) and South African back row Jake Boer.

This match will be a tough and fiercely competed one. Encounters between these two sides rarely disappoint on the blood, guts and determination fronts, whilst the match should also see the first really intense game of this Powergen Cup competition. After all there is so much riding on the game.

Whoever wins goes through to the semi-final, whilst they will be just two matches away from a place in next season's Heineken Cup - something Gloucester will be keen to achieve given their absence from this season's European competition. Gloucester too are still smarting after the defeat to fourteen man Bath in the Guinness Premiership and will feel that they have a point to prove.

It would be fair to say that Gloucester come to the match as slight underdogs despite their good recent form. There is still the 'Rec factor' to overcome and they are still to record a victory here in the league and that will be playing on the players' minds a little.

However, the Powergen should be a completely

different affair. This
competition usually serves
up riveting matches
between the two sides and
whilst Gloucester's league
form at the Rec may not
be good, their Cup form is
considerably better. Indeed

the last time that the two sides met at the Rec in the competition it was an under-strength Cherry and Whites that progressed. Dean Ryan will be hoping that result acts as an omen this evening.



THECAPTAIN

One of the great strengths of this Gloucester side has been the number of leadership figures who have come to the fore this season. When last season's club Captain Adam Balding spent a the early part of the season sidelined through injury, Dean Ryan found himself looking around for likely successors – he did not have to hunt for long.

Gloucester have a number of outstanding leaders within their ranks and can call upon Phil Vickery, Mike Tindall and Jake Boer to do an effective job. Vickery was the man charged with the responsibility last weekend after his return from England duty and he is a natural choice.

The tighthead prop wears his heart on his sleeve in England colours and always leads by example on the pitch where he is at the very heart of Gloucester. He oozes commitment, determination and pride and has the ability to inspire those around him by the way in which he plays. Vicks also has experience of captaincy at the highest level having skippered England before.

In the backs, Mike Tindall is an obvious choice to lead the side despite only arriving at the club during the summer. Vastly experienced (he is now one of the senior players in the England squad), Mike has held the vice captaincy for both England and former club Bath. He is a physical and vocal presence in midfield and has been a leading light in Gloucester's back play so far this season.

With Stauart Abbott, Josh Lewsey and Aiola Erinle all injured, the scrum half was drafted in owing to his good all round skill levels and footballing ability. It was great testament to Richards that he played extremely well in the centres helping Wasps to another Premiership title.

Richards though desired more game time in his favoured position and when Gloucester came calling he jumped at the chance of joining an ambitions Guinness Premiership outfit. Having settled well in his new surrounds the scrum half is enjoying life playing at nine again and has experienced a good fight for his place with former Bath and Exeter player Hayden Thomas.

On the international front recent seasons have seen Richards climb the England ranks with appearances for England A, Churchill Cup and the England Sevens squad. However, whilst playing centre with Wasps, Richards was always going to struggle making the next step that his undoubted talent deserved.

The signs are good for Ryan. If he can keep the squad injury free then there is absolutely no reason why this Gloucester side cannot challenge the established order for a crack at some silverware


