Personally, I came through 40 minutes in our Guinness A League defeat at Harlequins on Monday.


I have been struggling with a knee injury for a number of weeks but my fitness, power and strength is returning and I was really pleased to get some match time.

I obviously hope to make a first team return before the end of the season but once again today I am restricted to a watching brief.

Worcester have a formidable record at home - despite their defeat to London Irish last weekend - and are as competitive as any team in the Premiership.

They base a lot of their rugby around a very strong set-piece and a good set of backs who are also very physical.

There will be a lot of emotion and pride swirling around this afternoon, so get behind the boys and play your part in another crucial west country derby.



# Andy Deacon is one of the most recognisable figures at Kingsholm. He spent more than 15 years in the Gloucester front row but is now building a career outside rugby with Yorke Construction, as the matchday programme found out.

ANDY DEACON is a bit of a legend – and then some.

He has spent the majority of his adult life at the sharper end of physical excerption, dishing out all manner of nasties to opposing front row forwards up and down the country in the colours of his city team he served with the utmost distinction.

Deacon rarely complained about the ill justices of life, unless it was to a referee of course in his own use of the vernacular, but he got on with the job and churned out one of the greatest club careers in history.

He was playing top-flight club rugby at the age of 38, which is a fairly remarkable achievement given the demands of the job these days, particularly the job done by tight forwards.

When he retired and despite the fact he enjoyed a successful testimonial year, there was no chance he would be able to put his feet up, count his money and nip down to Kingsholm in his Bentley every Saturday afternoon.

Deacon headed straight back to work in a 9 til 5 job for Yorke Construction. He spent the best part of two decades trying to knock things down and now he is in the construction business – funny old world.

"What professional rugby gave you was time off," Deacon said. "It might only be for an afternoon here and there but you obviously don't work from 9 til five – I had forgotten what that was like.

"There was a lot more down time but obviously in a full-time job, there is no such thing. When I finished playing rugby I had to do something – I just couldn't stop – and this is certainly a new challenge for me.

"But I am loving the challenge and opportunities it has presented me. I am 40-yearsof-age and had to get a career going and this opportunity came around and it was something I really wanted to do.

"Richard Yorke [owner] and I have been friends for about 20 years and hopefully I can use some of the contacts I have built up in and around the city to help the company's development.

"In the building industry, a lot of the work is down to trust because there is a lot of competition. If I can act as a bit of a figurehead for the company as it grows, who can break the ice for people at meetings, then great."

Deacon was the top dog at Kingsholm. What he said and what he did was law and it didn't matter if the guy next to him had two World Cup winner's medals or the thick end of 80 caps for the All Blacks, this was his playground and he ruled it.

"The big thing is that we are expanding and that means we obviously want to attract more clients," he said. "It's an on-going process but it is an exciting challenge, the managing director has been really good to me and I just want to try and learn as much as I can.


"But things change and I had to move on and look to the future.

Mike Tindall said after the game at Sale he relishes playing with the youngsters in the squad, are we seeing Gloucester's future now?

DR: I think we are, yes. For me, above everything else, the long-term future and success of the club is paramount. It can be a tough call to pick a 19-year-old with little experience but I am totally convinced it is the right thing to do. We have to balance maturity and experience with potential and I don't think I would be taking due care of these individuals if I waited 12 or 15 months before getting them in the side.

There is obviously a risk attached to it but I am willing to accept some pain in the short-term because I am convinced 100% that the long-term benefits are potentially huge. I think Mike was the oldest member of the backline at Sale at 27 and if that does not show our willingness to make progress, I am not sure what does.

Those youngsters that day came within an ace of beating a team capable of reaching the knockout stages of Europe's major club competition and I think we can take massive pluses from that.



## What will be the next step for them?

DR: We came close against
Northampton and then again at
Sale to achieving two very notable
victories and, in my view, that is the
only thing these guys are missing.
They deserve a return on the effort
and endeavour they have shown
and once they have achieved that,
I think their progress will only
intensify.

But they have to keep playing and keep learning. Someone like Ryan Lamb showed a tremendous amount of maturity against Sale, Anthony Allen is almost becoming a regular in the centre and Olly Morgan has made 10 starts at full-back.

These guys are demanding to be picked and I think that is great. We have also got players like Jonathan Pendlebury, Luke Narraway, Jack

Forster and Nick Wood who have all shown their qualities this season and I doubt many clubs could match the number of young, English players we have available.



Including today's game against Worcester, we only have three games remaining. What are the realistic aims for those matches.

DR: We would obviously like to win them all and press very hard for a top four spot but our first task is concentrating on Worcester this afternoon. Our recent Premiership record is not the greatest and we just have to try and put it right. We could make the trip to Leeds with them still fighting for their Premiership survival, which makes that game significantly harder and Wasps on the last day of the season at Kingsholm should be a fantastic occasion.

If we could get back onto a role then I am convinced a couple of victories are possible, we just need a victory again.




Worcester have once again done very well in the Premiership this season, what challenge will they present this afternoon?

DR: Worcester are a resourceful side that is well coached and extremely competitive. I think if you look back at their results at Sixways, our two points there at the beginning of the season was not a bad return. They recently

hammered Wasps and will be durable and tough.

They have an outstanding setpiece, which they base their game around, and players with experience of playing in big games at Kingsholm, I am sure they will relish coming down here in front of a sell-out crowd and we will have to get the better of their passion.

It should be a cracking contest with our youngsters against their senior guys - and I am relishing another derby at Kingsholm.


put Forrester away to score the second try.


Although Maxime Petitjean kicked penalties in the 24th and 30th minutes, Gloucester's lead was never threatened. They scored again after 36 minutes when Forrester's outstanding take at a line-out set-up a big drive and Richards darted past two defenders to score to extend Gloucester's lead to 22-6.

And right on half-time, Gloucester went in for their fourth try. They kept possession well before Lamb sent a long pass across the Brive defence for James Simpson-Daniel to pick out a brilliant inside pass to Mike Tindall, who scored close to the line.

The second half was more of the same. Gloucester dominated throughout, without ever really turning on the after-burners.









They could, and perhaps should, have caused even greater damage but Richards got the ball rolling with his second try after 44 minutes when Gary Powell sent him over following a line-out.


Andy Hazell was the next to benefit when Haydn Thomas and Lamb combined before the openside plunged to score and extend Gloucester's lead to 39-6. Gloucester always looked like they could create problems in the wide areas as Brive tired against the tide and Simpson-Daniel grabbed their seventh try when he pushed his way past a number of defenders from 30 metres and gas his way to the line.

"It was a strange game," said head coach Dean Ryan. "The players said there was a lot of running around, but it didn't have a lot of intensity. It didn't look like what we're used to in Premiership games, but it was a different challenge and we had to win it

"I'm pleased with the win. It was very obvious there was one eye on the future and developing players while at the same time trying to get us through knockout football, which is never easy. "There's a risk they will make mistakes in knockout football to learn, but it's a risk we've got to be prepared to take. It's crucial we keep supporting young players because I'm convinced the long-term dividend is huge.

"We can't wait 12 to 18 months and then expect them to come in and play. We have to get them in now."





He scored one of the most important tries in Gloucester's history, was part of the celebrated system of home-grown players and is still doing the business for Worcester Warriors. Tony Windo is back at Kingsholm today and relishing another tussle against his former employers.

OT SO long ago, in the days when a post-training warm down was a couple of pints of something chilled and sparkling and a chicken curry, Tony Windo was cutting his teeth in the mad, bad and dangerous to know territory down in Wales on a Wednesday night.

He was with a group of Gloucester mates as they began to make the transition from United rugby into the senior ranks at Kingsholm that would eventually become the last staging post of homegrown talent representing a city team anywhere in the country.

Windo was not alone. He was joined by-Dave Sims, the legendary second row, Simon Devereux, Andy Deacon and a whole lot more from the thriving junior club system into the colours of Gloucester.

Such was his undemonstrative, technically excellent style he stayed in the Gloucester front row for more than a decade before being shown the door in one of Gloucester's first serious clear-outs.

Without putting too finer point on it, Windo was class. His try against Saracens in 1996 on a sweltering afternoon at Kingsholm virtually saved Gloucester's top-flight bacon but he knows nothing lasts forever.

He now finds himself a Worcester – a thriving going concern that was still searching for a route into the Premiership when he arrived – but the move has been the making of him.

"I spent 10 or 12 years at Gloucester and it was some of the best times of my career," Windo said. "I think I joined the club in 1988 when the majority of players were born and bred in Gloucester and progressed from the junior clubs.

"In those days, 90% of the lads playing at clubs had the ambition of representing Gloucester and the likes of myself and people like Simmo and Deacs managed it. We trained on Tuesday and Thursdays and played on Wednesdays and Saturdays – that was what we did then.

"We progressed through the colts together as mates. Back then you were chucked in on a Wednesday night to go down into Wales and you either sank or swam but it was a great learning curve.

"The ethos has changed massively but they were great times. You either came through it or you didn't and we were pretty lucky that the majority of us did."

Windo was part of a formidable Gloucester pack that went above and beyond the call of duty. Sims was quite easily one of the best lock forwards in the country and slugged it out toe-totoe with the meanest and moodiest in the business.

Deacon and Phil Greening were alongside Windo in the front row, while lan Smith, Simon Devereux and Pete Glanville were the trio who hunted in the back three in a front eight unit chiselled from Gloucester granite.

"We had some great moments but probably not over a long enough period," Windo said. "The stand-out ones where when we beat Leicester under

lights at Kingsholm – that was a special, special night and we also beat Bath on a Tuesday or a Wednesday night – that sticks in the memory too."

But all good things had to come to an end. Under Philippe Saint-Andre, the Frenchman who replaced Richard Hill as head coach, Gloucester's old regime was swept away.

Along with Windo, Sims and Carter were all moved on in one of the most turbulent periods in the club's history.

However, Windo has been by far the most successful. He could be bitter about his departure from Gloucester but if he is, he does not show it.

"I don't think anyone would want to leave their home club

but the move to Worcester re-invigorated my career, most definitely – it's been the making of me.

"Trevor Woodman was coming through at Gloucester and pushed me very hard for the first team spot and looking back, it was the right thing for me to do to move on.

"I had learnt my lessons from those Wednesday nights down in Wales and sometimes you only get better from struggling.

My life-style has changed completely – from what you eat to how you recover – and that is one of the reasons I think I have stayed around for so long.

"I have also been lucky with injuries. Compared to someone like Phil Vickery, I have hardly ever had a serious injury and my form has been pretty good."

Windo has been joined at Sixways by a whole host former Kingsholm men. John Brain, the canny coach, was in charge of the forwards at Gloucester, while Chris and Lee Fortey, Andy Gomarsall and Thinus Delport all find themselves up the M5 these days.

"We want to be challenging clubs like Gloucester on their home ground because Worcester is a developing club," Windo said.

"I think we have done remarkably well in quite a short space of time but we have ambitions to be up there with the best.

"But this weekend, despite all the hype, is just another very big Premiership game."



Charlie Hodgson's mastery of the conditions and his expert penalty kicking to salvage a victory for the Guinness Premiership leaders.




Lamb, who was making his first start in the Premiership, kicked superbly in the conditions and played with the sort of exuberance that has him marked down as a real prospect.

Olly Morgan was brave and committed under the high ball, while Mike Tindall and Peter Richards ran hard and defended solidly all afternoon.

Lamb gave Gloucester a third minute lead with a penalty before Gloucester lost Gary Powell to the sinbin as Sale turned up the heat. Hodgson levelled the scores with a penalty of his own before Lamb kicked Gloucester into a 12-3 lead with a succession of penalties.

But what Gloucester couldn't do was to get the try that would
















have broken the game up. They gave it a real go at the backend of the first half and despite breaks from Mark Foster, James Simpson-Daniel, Hazell and Richards, Sale's defence held up well under pressure.

In the second half, Sale whittled down Gloucester's advantage despite their quite brilliant defensive work. Lamb actually extended Gloucester's lead to 15-3 before Hodgson turned the screw with penalties after 47, 53, 59 and 64 minutes to bring the scores level.

However, it was Robinson's drop-goal that won the contest with six minutes remaining, although Ludovic Mercier's last-minute penalty attempt would have grabbed Gloucester a draw.

"I am very disappointed for the players in the dressing room because those young lads were outstanding against a very good side in very poor conditions," said head coach Dean Ryan.

"I am prepared to accept a little bit of pain in the short-term because I am totally convinced this side has real prospects for the future and that is what we are building for. I don't think I would be doing my job properly if I was not prepared to play guys like Lamb, Morgan and Allen now because they are ready.


"I don't want to wait for another 12 or 15 months to try them out. We came up against a team who potentially could reach a European knockout final so to lose by only three points is encouraging."




