The season is now beginning to take shape for every team. We have made a great start and we need to continue our momentum with every performance. Please get behind the players this afternoon because the support is fantastic and help get us back to winning ways today.

Review of the year - 2006





THE year of 2006 begins with the news that number eight Adam Balding has signed a new two-year contract at the club. On January 8, a try from Peter Richards and 14 points from Ludovic Mercier steer Gloucester to a 19-9 victory over Saracens.

Two days later, head coach Dean Ryan continues his development of the club by signing former Great Britain and Wigan rugby league star Denis Betts.

On the 10th, Welsh sevens specialist James Merriman agrees to extend his contract by a year and four days later in freezing conditions, tries from Richards, Rob Elloway and Jake Boer ease Gloucester to a 27-13 victory over Bucuresti in the European Challenge Cup.

Ryan continues to strengthen his squad when he confirms the arrival of Cornish Pirates lock Will James, who will join the club for the start of the 2006-07 season.

Gloucester continue to sweep all before them in Europe buy beating Bayonne 32-19 at Kingsholm. Tries came from a Gary Powell brace, Mike Tindall and Olly Morgan.

But perhaps the most significant news of the month is that James Simpson-Daniel agrees a new contract extension until 2009. In the only defeat of the month, three Mercier penalties are not enough to get the better of London Irish, who win 13-9 at Kingsholm.



FEBRUARY proves to be a huge month for the club and it is dominated by the confirmation that Gloucester have signed Italian national captain Marco Bortolami and tight-head prop Carlos Nieto.

They bounce back from their defeat to London Irish when they beat Leicester under the lights at Kingsholm 34-16. James Bailey and Mark Foster score the



tries and it is also confirmed that young centre Jack Adams has extended his contract by a year.

The positives vibes continue when the club announces that both Bailey and Jon Goodridge have agreed deals to remain at Kingsholm until 2008.

On the pitch, Fanolua scores the only try as Gloucester beat Newcastle 13-9 at Kingston Park.

Jake Boer, the brilliant flanker, agrees a one-year contract extension and Henry Paul and Simon Amor are selected for the England Sevens squad.

But the month ends badly when Bath beat

Gloucester 18-15 at Kingsholm, despite tries from James Bailey and Foster.



RYAN LAMB, who had been making a name himself in the number 10 position following his elevation into the senior side, signs a contract until 2008.

However, Gloucester legend Terry Fanolua announces he will not see out the final year of his contract and joins Brive.

But the recruitment continued when Ryan signed scrum-half Rory Lawson on a

two-year contract from Edinburgh.

On March 11, Richards again finds the target alongside Mercier, but Gloucester lose a thriller by one point 21-20 to Northampton.

Duncan McRae, the former Australian A stand-off, announced his retirement due to a persistent knee injury and heads home with immediate effect.

On the field, the poor month continues for Gloucester and despite tries from Anthony Allen and Simpson-Daniel, Gloucester lose a west country derby to Bristol 20-15 at Kingsholm.

Off it, Willie Walker, the former Otago

play-maker, announces he will be joining the club on a two-year deal for the start of the new season.

In the Guinness A League, Fanolua scores the only try as Gloucester are beaten by London Irish.



APRIL proves to be a highly significant month for the club in many ways.

It starts with a 46-13 victory over Brive in the Challenge Cup thanks to tries from Tindall, Simpson-Daniel, Andy Hazell, Richards and James Forrester.

Lock Mark Cornwell announces he will become Gloucester's assistant Academy manager and combine the position by playing for Pertemps Bees. He will also skipper the National One side after retiring from Premiership rugby.

Despite five penalties from Lamb an excellent all-round team performance, Gloucester lose to eventual champions Sale Sharks 18-15 in Stockport.

On April 15, two tries from Foster and one from Simpson-Daniel helps Gloucester to a 27-16 win over local rivals Worcester. Lamb and Tindall kick two penalties each.

The club also announce that former South African lock Quinton Davids will be released from his contract with immediate effect.

Phil Vickery also confirms, that after 11 years with the club, he has refused a new deal and will join Wasps.

But Gloucester reach the final of the Challenge Cup final following a second successive victory over Worcester. Foster again finds the try line and so does Allen and Simpson-Daniel in Gloucester's 31-23 win.

They end the month with a four try win over Leeds thanks to scores from Hazell, Richards, Tindall and Simpson-Daniel.





A BRILLIANT individual score from James Forrester sealed glory for Gloucester in the European Challenge Cup final against London Irish in the month's highlight. His injury-time try hands Gloucester a 36-34 win after tries from Foster, Hazell and Simpson-Daniel.

However, despite two scores from Allen, one from Lamb and one from Bailey, Gloucester miss out on a play-off place after a 32-37 defeat against Wasps.

Olly Morgan has surgery on a fractured jaw bone and is out for three months.

As the season comes to an end, Ryan continues his rebuilding process and on the 10th confirms that both assistant coach Bryan Redpath and fitness and conditioning coach Mike Anthony will remain at the club until 2009.

A day later, British Lions full-back lain Balshaw is announced as the latest signing when he joins from Leeds on a two-year contract.

Carl Hogg is names as the new Academy manager and Christian Califano, one of the greatest props of all-time, joins the club from Agen.

On May 23, Hazell is named as the players' player of the year.



WHILE the majority of the squad are now on a well-earned break, Anthony Allen and Ryan Lamb are involved in the Under-21 World Championships and both face New Zealand.

On June 2, Gloucester announce that Under-21 hooker Ross McMillan has joined the club from Nottingham.

On the 20th, Gloucester are grouped with Leinster, Agen and Edinburgh in the Heineken Cup Pool Two.

Ryan's Review

Gloucester begin 2007 with a home game against London Irish and head coach Dean Ryan looks back at the defeat against Wasps and today's visitors to Kingsholm.

Today will be our third game in a week, has last Friday's postponement had any repercussions?

DR: IT was no secret last Friday that we wanted to play and Newcastle didn't. Personally, I was unaware of any safety issues out there. When you were in the middle of the pitch you could see all the corners which to me made it playable.

The decision to call the game off is solely the referee's decision. We can't afford for it to be a decision of teams subject to what shape they are in. I'd be concerned if that's the case.

It's a crucial period for us and we wanted to play. What it did do was effect our thinking ahead of the Wasps game because there was a possibility we would have tailored the starting line-up to suit those opponents and the threat they presented to us.


Now, we need to find another free window that is suitable to both clubs for the re-arranged game and that could prove difficult.

On boxing day we went to Wasps and suffered our second successive Guinness

Premiership defeat, what happened?

DR: I don't think that's the best we've seen of Gloucester over the first 40 minutes this season and that disappoints me and the team. When you go to places like Wasps and Leicester there are certain elements you require in your game but we didn't turn up with a huge amount of physicality and we got caught with a cautious frame of mind. It is not a place or environment where you can flick from page to page of a manual in the hope of becoming successful. It is a place where you've got to be full-out and we weren't in the first half and paid dearly for it.

We were better in the second half, but unless we're prepared to carry that level of physicality and ambition into the contest at the start we'll always be






chasing a pretty big lead. We've just got to get the environment right where we aren't so concerned over what's right and wrong. In the past we have been guilty of playing with too much ambition and while we try and find that balance, Monday's first half was a poor outcome. But I have said many times already this season that winning or losing one week does not lose sight of what we're trying to do with this group. As a team at this stage of its development, we don't lose six or 12 months investment on the back of 40 minutes and that is very important we keep the perspective right and keep building.



What were the plus points?

DR: We don't give up – that is not in the mentality of this group of players and it was also great to see someone like James Forrester make an immediate

impact off the bench with his break and pass for Rory Lawson's try. Mefin Davies also returned from a nasty calf injury and that was also great to see. We do virtually have a full strength squad to select from at the moment and at this stage of the season, that is vital. There were times when we did create opportunities in high field position but we must extract that clinical instinct to make the most of those chances.





DR: They certainly have. I admire the way they try and play the game and the philosophy they use. We know from experience that Worcester, despite their position in the table, are very tough to beat at home and any victory over

Leicester, who have got to the top of the table, is a good one. It was a very significant victory for us when we won in Reading during November but I think they have improved significantly since then. They have some outstanding forwards in Nick Kennedy, Bob Casey and a big, powerful back row and they possess one of the best set-piece games in the Premiership.

We saw on Monday that, a bit like Wasps, they have the ability to make the most of half-chances thanks to their pace and willingness to attack from deep so I think today will be a really good contest.


As a club and a team we appreciate the importance and significance of today's game in terms of getting back on track in the Premiership in what is a huge month of rugby for us.

GLOUCESTER announce their first match in the Heineken Cup will be away to one of the favourites for the competition – Leinster in October.

Bath will be the visitors to Kingsholm for the first game in the Premiership and Ryan's side go to Portugal for a pre-season training camp that involves all the players that are not involved in summer tours.



CARLOS Nieto has shoulder operation

and will be out of action for eight weeks after specialists pick up a cyst.

On August 11, four new signings

- Bortolami, Lawson, Walker and James
- all play in the defeat against Saracens in pre-season.

The following week, Gloucester lose 19-7 away to Llanelli and Simpson-Daniel suffers a fractured collarbone and will be out of action for at least eight weeks.

Bortolami is named as captain for the first time as Gloucester pick up their first pre-season win of the season – 29-22 – to prepare for the launch of the Guinness Premiership in style.



KINGSHOLM is a complete sell-out as Gloucester begin the season with a 24-19 victory over Bath – Olly Morgan and Jack Adams score the try as Ryan's side start the campaign in the best possible fashion.

Pete Richards then inspires Gloucester to a 31-21 win over Harlequins with an early contender for try of the season but in the victory, lock Alex Brown fractures his forearm.

Bath reclaim some west country pride with a win in the A league.

Brad Davies comes off the bench on the 16th to kick an equalising penalty to maintain Gloucester's unbeaten start of the season with a 27-27 draw at Welford Road. Tries come from Forrester and Allen.

Gloucester then beat Northampton 28-7 to go top of the table for the first time in the season. Forrester continues his try scoring form converting a break from the 22.

Ryan makes 13 changes to the side for the start of the EDF Energy Cup campaign and Gloucester suffer a heavy 49-19 defeat in Swansea and get well beaten by the Ospreys in the EDF Energy despite a late fight back.



THE MONTH begins with number eight James Forrester being named as Guinness Premiership player of the month following a series of outstanding performances. 06/10 – James Forrester is named as Guinness Premiership player of the month.

Ryan Lamb returns from an ankle injury as Gloucester thrash an under strength Bristol in the EDF Energy Cup. The final was 63-25 as Gloucester ran in eight tries, including one for the young stand-off.

Gloucester then announce another

major signing with the arrival of former Bradford Bulls winger Karl Pryce. He scored 17 tries in both of his last two seasons and has signed on a twoyear contract.

Two days later, Pryce watches his new club collect another four league points with a 33-24 win over Worcester. Tries come from Adams, Allen and a first try for lain Balshaw.

After five rounds of the Guinness Premiership, Andy Hazell is named as the top tackler.

At the end of the month the Heineken Cup starts with a trip to Lansdowne road to face Leinster. A brave Gloucester side



are out classed by an experienced Irish side to go down 37-20, despite tries from Foster and Adams.

The following week, Agen stun Kingsholm to claim a shock 26-32 victory thanks to their pack and some excellent finishing.

Anthony Allen is rewarded for his consistently impressive performances in both the Guinness Premiership and the Heineken Cup with a call up to join our other England internationals in the squad to face the All Blacks at Twickenham and wins his first cap in England's defeat.



SIMPSON-DANIEL returned from his broken collarbone to help Gloucester to beat Sarries 21-12 on a cold night at Kingsholm. Rudi Keil, who is one of three yellow cards to Gloucester, scores two tries in the first half.

Head Coach Dean Ryan is named as the October Guinness Premiership's Head Coach of the month.

Brown returns from his broken arm to face London Irish at Reading. Gloucester secure a tough away victory which keeps them at the top of the Guinness Premiership thanks to tries from Rory Lawson, James Bailey and Simpson-Daniel.

Mark Cornwall scores on his first cap for

the Barbarians and Bristol end Gloucester's unbeaten run in the Premiership when Jason Strange lands a last minute dropgoal at the Memorial Stadium.

Gloucester Rugby's own lottery – Try Lines - is launched giving fans a chance to win £10,000 daily.




Youngsters Jack Forster and Jack Adams sign new two-year deals. Forster then went on to mark the

Hall of Fame with Dave King



Peter Ford

Peter Ford was one tough nut and was good enough to represent **England in a glittering career**. And today he joins the Hall of Fame.

F EVER the phrase 'a tough nut to crack' summed up a former Glorious Gloucester perfectly, then it would be for Peter Ford.

As a player and a man he has devoted all his efforts to the good of Gloucester Rugby. He is always a familiar and formidable opponent to all who wished to dismantle the Citadel of Kingsholm.

He has an indomitable character and is a

loyal and respected son of Kingsholm who has given great service to this club.

If one player epitomised the traditions and style of Gloucester before the professional era was even muted it was surely Ford. It was an era when Gloucester were renowned for their forward power and total domination up front was the key.

For those of us that are looking in, it is probably apt that Mike Burton describes

Ford when he first witnessed him. It was when he was watching from the terraces when Gloucester were entertaining Birkenhead Park in the early 1960s.




"On the flank was Peter Ford, who was balding, lean and toothless with Vaseline shinning on his head and legs. Early in the

game John Spalding took a savaging from one of the visitors flankers and went down injured. Soon after he recovered and right in front of my viewing position, I saw Ford deal with the miscreant. Neither Ford nor the experienced old guard could accept a Gloucester player being roughed up. Ford landed one fierce punch on the Birkenhead player and he went down."

Normal service was resumed and the match, according to the author, reverted to normality.

Ford was born on 2nd May 1932 and was educated within the city at Central Modern School. His initial playing days were spent with Gordon League RFC before moving to Kingsholm.

However, the powerful and rugged flanker remained faithful to his junior club throughout his playing career. Although his playing days are well behind him he has served the Kingsholm Club in several official capacities since. At present he is







the club's President and also serves on the Kingsholm Supporters' Mutual as a Committee member.

A once proud captain of Gloucester, he led the club in the 1955-1956, 1956-1957 and 1957-1958 seasons. There was a one season break from the tenure before he once again returned to the helm in the 1959-1960 season and in the 1960-1961 season.

Amazingly, Ford is one of a small group of players who have made over 500 appearances for the club, the other four being Alan Brinn, Robert Clewes, Richard Mogg and Dick Smith. He also scored 146 tries for Gloucester, a club record for a forward.

This undisputed, unassuming character was never better illustrated than his reaction to the fact that had been awarded his first international Cap. Contacted by a local newspaper reporter to tell him the good news he replied, 'Eh, hang on a

minute, say that again'

The last Gordon League player to have been awarded an international cap had been prop forward Ken Wilson.

At the time of his selection one newspaper report said: "Peter Ford forced the England selectors to include him in the England team against Wales last Saturday and his first appearance will not be his last.

"To reach international status after such a long career ensures he is not going to make the mistakes a player of less than 31 years of age might. Apart from his maturity and the vast range of his experience he is one of the most consistently reliable players I have seen.

"The road to Twickenham has been somewhat tortuous as several years ago Ford had been asked to standby as an England reserve. Then he was forgotten until after a richly deserved game for the Barbarians last season at Newport when one hoped he would meet the eye of selectors.'

"They had watched him in 50 county matches in the past 10 years. The selectors are human and were as susceptible as the next when it came to the glamour of the Barbarians. He appeared for the Barbarians on Boxing Day and he distinguished himself admirably in the two English trials.

"Peter Ford accepted philosophically the fact that he was not selected for the abortive exhibition by England versus New Zealand. Then came the agonising decision he and the County selectors made when it was agreed he could not risk injury in the Cornwall play off. Luckily, Gloucestershire won and nobody could blame Ford's absence!

As a post script the report then added, 'He made it to Twickenham fit and uninjured. A lifetime dream come true,

you might think, but Ford played as calmly and coolly as if this had been a regular club match.'

The England XV on Peter Ford's debut: -

The referee was Mr K.D. Kellsher (Ireland).

Ford went onto earn a further three caps with England. When his playing career ended he eventually became a RFU selector. He was also chairman of the selectors at Gloucester for a period.

He is a well known and respected member of the local committee, he was a family member of a wholesale fruit traders in the locality. As well as representing the Barbarians, Gloucestershire and this club, Peter also represented the Royal Air Force. Keeping in the family tradition many will recall his son Paul, later playing full back for Gloucester Rugby Club. Peter now

resides at Churchdown on the city outskirts.

For those with long memories you will easily recall many of the stalwarts of Gloucester that played alongside Peter Ford in those days, Micky Booth, Terry Hopson, Don Rutherford, Ron Pitt, John Bayliss and Mike

Nicholls to mention a few.

Ford's enthusiasm for the game of rugby union has never wavered, nor his love of Gloucester. A glance up at the main grandstand will see one of the mainstays of this club seated waiting eagerly for the kick-off and he is immediately immersed within the game.


