



"THE PRE-MATCH STUFF IS ABOUT WHAT YOU HAVE DONE ON MONDAY TO THURSDAY."

MATCH PREVIEW

AT Twickenham today it will be a case of the immovable object up against the irresistible force as the country's top two clubs battle it out to be named England's best.

The immovable object is in the shape of the Leicester Tigers pack and the Gloucester backs have been this season's irresistible force in England.

Not one point separated these two powerhouses in the regular season and both duly won their Premiership Semi Finals to make it to Twickenham todau.

Both sides have bad memories of Premiership Finals so something will have to give today.

In 2003 Gloucester topped the Premiership by 15 points and then suffered a 39-3 drubbing against London Wasps as their title hopes were blown to shreds.

While last season Leicester lost 45-20 to Sale Sharks a year after being defeated 39-14 by London Wasps.

So while Leicester have a treble of trophies on their mind - the Heineken Cup Final follows on 20 May - they also have a hat trick of Premiership Final defeats to avoid.

Gloucester coach Dean Ryan believes his side will not be affected by the 2003 hammering by London Wasps.

"Parallels will obviously be drawn with what happened in 2003, but this team won't carry that burden," said Ryan "If we carried history around with us, then we would be burdened, but we don't." Gloucester showed how potent their backs could be in their Guinness Premiership Semi Final scoring seven tries in a 50-9 rout of Saracens.

"Fifty points was flattering," Ryan admitted, "and we will have to step up again at Twickenham.

"Finals are a different environment. It will be on a big stage against an outstanding side, offering us a very physical challenge.

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"We have a lot of confidence in our game and we'll be keen to go out and do ourselves justice in the final."


The victory over Saracens in their Guinness Premiership Semi Final meant that Gloucester were the only side in the competition to remain unbeaten at home during the campaign. Their only defeat in their last eight matches was 12-19 at Newcastle on 13 April and they became only the second side to pass the 50-point mark in the semi-finals, following London Wasps in 2003-04, who of course went on to lift the title.

"We played some great stuff. We see ourselves as a side that needs movement - we can't get caught up in a static contest - and we need to keep the game moving," Ayan added.

The Gloucester coach will also have an unusual problem today as he is banned from the touchline and dressing room after being found guilty by the RFU of threatening and verbally abusing referee Rob Debney, so expect to see him somewhere in the stands.

Ryan can of course be relaxed about the effect this has had on his team when they are winning.

The pre-match stuff is about what you have done on Monday to Thursday," said Ryan. "People don't take too much in pre-match. I have a good coaching staff around me and we tend to talk about the same things."

Laicester were forced to grind out their Guinness
Pemiership Semi Final victory, 26-14 over Bristol, and had
to rely on their world-class forwards to get them home.

They made it to the play-offs for a third successive season and it is probably no surprise that they beat Bristol as the Tigers have lost only one of their last 38 Premiership encounters at Melford Road.

Laicester have at least won a Championship final at Twickenham but that was back in 2001 when Bath were beaten 22-10.

Leicester coach Pat Howard is returning to his native Australia at the end of the season, and he watched his side run in tries through Hamy Ellis and Geordan Murphy, while Andy Goode contributed 16 points with the boot in the semi.

Howard also believes his side are in better shape that they were a year ago.

"A year ago, we won easily against London Irish and didn't turn up the next week," Howard said.

"So we're in there. It's a one-on-one game and the best team will win."

Leicester also have the advantage of a victory at Twickenham this season as they took EDF Energy Cup last month.

"We've been to Twickenham once this year and we won. We've played in some pretty big games, some pretty big one-off games and we've dealt with that," said Howard.

NEW SIGNINGS





How Gloucester Rugby Can Win

HE MAY NOT be from the deepest, darkest depths of the Forest of Dean or have been reared on inter-city rivalries like so many of his predecessors but Marco Bortolami was made for Gloucester and its ruobu.

For one, he is far too good looking to have spent endless hours at the bottom of a zillion rucks and he is fluent in three languages, some would say that is precisely three more than many who have pulled on the famous Gloucester shirt down the years, but the thing about him that those who regularly sardine themselves into Kingsholm love is this: He cares. Get beneath the Italian exterior and he will have Cherry and White blood running through his veins.

Bortolami has been a revelation this season and carries with him that unmistakable whiff of a genius in the making. His contribution as a player has approached stratospheric heights but it has been the levels he has attained as captain and figurehead that has been most significant.

If he appeared this afternoon in the colours of Leicester you could be forgiven for thinking that a younger Martin Johnson had rolled back the years for the all-rucking, all-mauling Midlanders such is Bortolami's significance to Gloucester these days.

There maybe more eye-catching performers in the Kingsholm ranks just now – Andy Hazell has been in remarkable form all season, Carlos Nieto has set about opposition set-pieces with a cruel intensity, Nick Wood has emerged to force his


way into England's summer tour and Peter Buxton has been one of the most consistent performers all year – but Bortolami brings that something extra, leadership qualities, physicality and presence that made Johnson such a star.

Speaking after Saturday's 50-9 semi-final victory over Saracens, Bortolami said: "We must reproduce everything good that we did against Saracens - and we were very good - if we are to beat Leicester," "We must remember we have brilliant young backs who can hurt any team, we must deferid and tackle like we did today against a tough Saracens side and build pressure, and we must take care always to protect our set-piece ball.

"If we do all that, and our fans can transport the passion of Kingsholm to Twickenham, then who knows? Leicester are a magnificent team, but if we remain confident and bring all our qualities into the game we can claim a big breakthrough victory for the club."

Gloucester may have shifted the emphasis away from their tried and trusted modus operandi – a general forward mayhem of yester-year – to a fledgling brood of bright young backs who have space and attack on their minds, but there is still room for a dynamic forward here and there.

As a consequence, Bortolami's star has risen spectacularly since his move from Narbonne. When he joined Gloucester a year ago he was in the top seven or eight locks in the world, now he is surely in the top four or five and life and rugby in England have enhanced him even further.



"I love the English mentality," he said. "In England, everything is done properly – in life and rugby – and that to me is very important.

The level of organisation and professionalism at Gloucester is something I was not expecting. We have an environment here between the players and the coaches that is very special and that is something not easy to create.

"For me, I am working in the best environment. I am someone who needs to push themselves every single day. I don't just want to sit in the comer to do my job because then I will not try and become the best.

"I think that is why we have reached the final. We have worked so hard as a group to get where we are and that is what has impressed me most. I am in a place where I want to be successful – Gloucester is a great club, the supporters live and breathe their rugby and that makes it very special for me and the rest of the players."

From the very moment he traded blows with Bath's formidable duo of Danny Grewcock and Steve Borthwick on the opening weekend of hostilities back in September, Bortolami has become a totern of excellence thanks to his on-field leadership skills, consistency and durability.

"Marco has been everything we expected him to be and then a little bit more," said his club coach Dean Ryan, who knows a thing or two about forward play. "He is a wonderful athlete and is already an exceptional captain. To me, he has been one of the signings of the season, anywhere, and one of the most influential players in the Guinness Premiership.

There is a natural presence about him that not only inspires but leads too and that is very important. To have been singled out to captain his country at such a young age is testament to how people view him and he has been fantastic for us."

Bortolami (26) is now on the cusp of great things with Gloucester and should Ryan's fledging side win the ultimate domestic prize this afternoon, the Italian national captain's contribution over the last ten months will have been a crucial component.

He may not be the flashiest, well known or biggest and nastiest lock forward in the Premiership but Bortolami is one of the best – as anyone in Gloucester colours could tell you.
