



RUNNING COMMENTS

Gloucester, who were defeated earlier in the season at Kingsholm by a weak Newport side, followed up their recent away victory over Llanelly by a convincing win over a strong Newport side in the return game at Newport on Saturday last. Newport, who had last week secured a splendid win over Cross Keys (away) played practically the same team and before the game would not hear of the Cherry and Whites getting their revenge. Gloucester started with any amount of vim and enthusiasm, and appeared to be much quicker on the ball than the 'Usksiders' and on several occasions caught the Newport defence napping and had bad luck in not scoring. Credit is due to Bob Hook on each occasion he scored, his smart following-up was a feature of his play. On another occasion, he crossed with a try but the referee gave a knock-on over the line. The City forwards played magnificiently and 'Bumps' Carpenter was superior in hooking over Travers (this season's Welsh hooker and considered the best in Wales) this went a long way towards Gloucester's victory and naturally affected the 'Usksiders' threequarters' attack. F. Gough and Don Meadows as a combination at half proved to be much superior to the Newport halves. The former was most unfortunate on several occasions to come under the ban of the referee, but his service to Don Meadows was splendid. The ex-City captain, to my mind, gave his best display of the season, his clever kicking and varying tactics continually having the Newport defence in trouble and this was where Gloucester were unfortunate in not scoring more points, either the bounce of the ball or a small infringement preventing a score on several occasions. Harold Boughton, who returned to the team, gave a splendid all-round display, his fine kicking being another feature of the game, his display was considered by everyone to be superior to Newport's International full-back. The number of penalties, in all 15 given against Gloucester, always gave the 'Usksiders' a chance to secure a win, and in fact the last kick of the game was a penalty kick by Newport which only just fell short. Once again Gloucester were full value for their victory and the team under the leadership of the captain, John A'Bear returned to the City singing that popular melody "Star of the Evening."

To-day we welcome another of the leading Welsh clubs to Kingsholm in Llanelly, who are considered the oldest Welsh club playing rugger. Their records are wonderful and outstanding, and for several seasons they have been the recognized Welsh champions and it is a rare thing for any team to defeat them at home. Gloucester's victory at Strady Park three weeks ago is still fresh in our memory, and it is remarkable by the fact that the last English club to win there was the 'Cherry and Whites' on March 7th, 1936. Several wonderful players have represented the club, best known to present-day enthusiasts being Dai John, the International outside-half, who was considered the finest drop-kick in the game. Unfortunately, owing to injuries, Llanelly are considerably weakened in the backs and new recruits to the team are Glyn Jones (centre) from Pontyberem, and Hadyn Fairhurst (centre) from Tumble. W. H. Clement (left wing) is the well-known Welsh International who is included in the selected British Team to tour South Africa this summer. Considered one of the fastest wings playing football to-day, he is clever and dangerous when on the attack. D. J. Thomas (outside-half) is particularly quick and clever, and looked upon as a discovery by the 'Scarlets' and fully expected to get a Welsh 'Cap' in the near future. They have as usual a splendid pack, fast and clever in the open and following-up, with perhaps lvor Jones, the well-known International, as the outstanding forward. I understand

Composed mostly of old Central School boys at an average age of 17 to 18 years, they are shewing exceptional ability in speed and cleverness. They have, so far, played 23 games, winning 22, the other drawn, scoring 351 points against 67. This splendid record has been obtained chiefly through fast open football. The future prospects of the club is extremely hopeful and with every encouragement they should ultimately prove a valuable acquisition to the premier club.
