Over the season, and particularly after some of our recent results, I think we deserved it, but that is life.

Now we have achieved our initial goals we have to move on to our next goal, which is to win the Zurich Championship. Today, we start three games away from a Twickenham final and a trophy. Opportunities like this should never be passed up because they don't come around very often and all the players have

bought in to the idea of winning this competition.

Morale within the squad is high again after two very good wins in the Premiership. We have developed a better balance to our play in recent weeks and that means it is difficult for opposition teams to know where to defend against us. We have tightened up our own defensive line and therefore reduced the points-against column and we continue to turn over a lot of opposition ball, which is also good.

We are scoring tries, more so in the backs than in the forwards, which again shows that we have more to offer than a nineman game. Our play in wide areas has been very promising and we have shown that we haven't got to rely on the boot to win games.

I said after the Bath game that you can only beat the teams in front of you and I believe we stuck to our task well. However, our opposition in recent weeks has not been of the highest standard and we are still looking for players to prove things to themselves.

I don't see this part of the

season as the end of term but rather the beginning of next season. We are not going to be downbeat and looking for a holiday, what we achieve in this Championship will be the foundation for what we achieve next season.

Of course, there will be much written and spoken surrounding this game today that may not pertain to the rugby. As far as the coaching staff and the players are concerned, what has happened in the past is just that, in the past. At the start of this season we said that we wanted to finish in the top three and thus qualify for the Heineken Cup and we have done that. We have finished off our Premiership season well with two very good wins.

The last one was particularly pleasing as it was away from home. Now for us the pressure is off but we have a new focus, we are two games away from a Championship final appearance at Twickenham.

We have finished third, which was our original goal but we could have made second had we not lost some poor games away from home at the start of the season that we should have won. We were deservedly beaten by Wasps and Northampton, but you always go through stages in such a long season where you don't play well and get beaten, but it's the games that we should have won that have come back to haunt us.

That said, I am very pleased with the way all the players have coped with this season. It has been a difficult year for us with Philippe leaving and Nigel coming in and lots of other happenings that I'm sure people don't need reminding of. At the start of the season we introduced twelve new players and it can take months, or even a full season for players to get to know one another and understand how their teammates play. On the back of

that I think we have knitted together very well and if we can keep the nucleus of the squad together for next season, without changing too much, then we will start off next season a few steps ahead of where we were this season.

One of my most abiding memories of this season was the Powergen Cup game at Bristol. It was a great personal game for James Forrester and a lot of younger guys came through. It was much like the Bath game the year before when a lot of young players pulled together and caused an upset.

It has also been nice that towards the end of the season, we have started to run in some tries, with guys playing a lot with the ball in hand. That is not to take anything away from Ludo though, who has kicked us out of lots of trouble this year.







Andy Hazel on the run against Saracens. Luke Smith enjoyed a wonderful day with the boot and Bloucester lost 34-30




Diego Albanese feels the force of an Austin Healey tackle as the Tigers are the only team to win at Kingsholm this season.





Chris Catling dislocates a shoulder whilst scoring a try in the fifty-point drubbing of Gloucester's West Country rivals.










Adam Eustace scores the first of Gloucester's three tries from a stolen line out. Unfortunately an otherwise excellent game will be remembered for other reasons.






Gloucester needed to bounce back from their previous defeats and scored an important away victory against the Shoguns. In a nail biting finish the Cherry and Whites held on by a point.

The Zurich Championship - an exciting climax to a riveting domestic season or a cosmetic waste of time and money at the end of a draining campaign?

I will let you make up your own mind at Kingsholm today when the Cherry and Whites entertain Newcastle in the quarter-finals, but I know how I feel.

Gloucester, as usual, will do their utmost to progress to the semi-finals of the competition - you wouldn't expect anything less - but this is a stage and competition too far for most of the men at Castle Grim. Last Sunday's victory at Leeds ensured Gloucester a third place finish in the Premiership - the result of a seasons work in which two teams - Sale and Leicester - proved superior to Gloucester over a campaign of 22 games.

Gloucester's work is done. They have qualified for the Heineken Cup to ensure Europe's Premier competition returns to Kingsholm next season and now deserve a long rest.

Last year's play-off final between Bath and Leicester was played before a half-empty Twickenham between two teams seriously affected by injury. It does nothing to enhance the reputation of this great game.


Interest is minimal with the supporters and players who, with international tours around the corner, would prefer to be resting while directors of rugby cannot plan ahead for the following season.

If Gloucester get to the final on June 8, Nigel Melville's squad face a season stretching into 11 months. It is no wonder that players such as Phil Vickery, tremendous for the British Lions and England, has been used sparingly by Gloucester. He has trodden the international and domestic treadmill for over a year and needs a rest. The play-offs add nothing to a season that has already been completed.

Melville, still bedding himself into his job at Gloucester, will only really be able to concentrate on assembling his squad for next season when the rugby finally stops. It is unrealistic to think England have a chance of winning the World Cup when their key players are asked to flog themselves through every month of the calendar year.

The pinnacle of the season should still be around the corner. The Heineken Cup final should be the closing chapter of the season without the play-offs to muddle the issue and get in the way. You would suspect that Mr Melville and the rest of his squad may not shed too many tears if Gloucester did not reach Twickenham next month, but they will probably be too tired to cry.



THE BULL AND THE PASTY-

Before I do anything else, I must convey our sincere sympathy to Mark Cornwall, whose broken arm, suffered during the complete obliteration of Bath the other week, deprived him of his place in the England squad to meet the Barbarians, and almost certainly, a berth on the plane to Argentina.

'Pasty' has been on the brink of such honours for so long that it is a particularly savage stab of fate for a highly likeable bloke who so conspicuously deserves such recognition. I can think of periods when Mark would have walked into the England side, and it is just his bad luck to be playing in the era of the Johnsons, Grewcocks and Kays of this world. To have had the door opened to him in the

way that it has, and then have it slammed shut so cruelly is particularly galling. We must just hope that his chance comes again - and soon.

The reverse side of the penny is the news that Phil Vickery has been given the England Captaincy, following the injury to Lawrence Dallaglio's hand.

This is very hard on 'Dally' who, as all the world knows, has missed most of the season

through injury, and has now had the chance of skippering his country on tour snatched away from him. Hard luck, but he's probably right to have the damage repaired right now, rather than risk serious problems should he have

"It's an ill wind" as they say, and I'm sure that our own 'Raging Bull' will do a hell of a job when he gets down to it. The other thought is that, Phil's elevation to a higher plane might just be good news for one or two other Gloucester hopefuls. In any sport, a national captain likes to have a few familiar faces around him when he goes into battle, and a wise manager tries to see that he gets them. I've no doubt that 'Vicks' will be making his feelings clear on the matter at the appropriate time and place.

NOT THE FIRST-

You probably know that Phil Vickery will be the first Gloucester player to lead England since John Orwin, who also took the side on tour; to Australia if my memory serves me correctly.

You may not, however, recall that Phil won't be the first Elver Eater to skipper England on a tour to Argentina.

That honour goes to that efficient lock forward from between the Wars, John A'Bear. That tour does not seem to feature in the official lists, so I imagine it was a non-Cap affair, played in the early

stages of Argentina's development into the tough opposition they are nowadays.

John A'Bear, an accountant by trade, was one half of one of the more legendary Gloucester second-row partnerships. The other component was the late Roy 'Digger' Morris. To quote the press of the time, they 'hunted as a pair, One could

throw a blanket over them'.
That closeness even persisted
off the field: John acted as
best man at the Digger's
wedding.


Actually, according to Roy himself, the proximity didn't have much to do with deep strategic thinking. He once told me that, as a beginner at the game at first team level, he

didn't really know what he was about. John, on the other hand, knew everything there was to know, but was as blind as a bat without his glasses. John would tell Digger where to go, and stick by him while he went there.

Nice story, but the Digger, of course, could have been pulling my leg. He was like that.

FULL CIRCLE -

I was interested to read that James Simpson-Daniel's hat trick against Bath obliged Zurich to pay £2,000 to charity under the terms of the sponsorship agreement. A little investigation attracted yet more of my attention.



Apparently, the money was split between Three charities, one of which was the Tommy Voyce Youth Trust.

What could be more appropriate? Tommy was, of course, one of Gloucester's legendary players (he also turned out for Cheltenham, Blackheath and Richmond). He virtually invented wing-forward play, or at least, raised it to new levels. Dubbed the 'blonde destroyer with a smile' by one contemporary South African commentator, Tommy played 27 times for England, a huge number for an era which didn't see half as many international games as we do these days, and in the process scored five tries. Later, he became a

distinguished administrator, and served as President of the RFU. Older supporters will get the point if I say that he once bought me a drink.

His first Cap was won against Ireland in 1920, so I only ever saw him on fairly rare archive film. However, I am bound to-say that the young James Forester does remind me quite a lot of what I have seen of Tommy Voyce - all speed, energy and ferocity.

Tom complete the circle, when JSD scored his hat trick in the demolition of Bath, there, on the opposing wing, was young Tom Voyce, great nephew of the great Tommy. Odd how things work out, sometimes.
