
If you look at some of their recent results they have the ability to be very clinical against the very top teams and that is something we have to be very aware of today because we cannot afford the same start we put together against London Irish.

It is once again a pleasure to be asked


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

Finally, please give us that little bit extra for us this afternoon – the atmosphere against Irish was the best I can recall for some time – please help us to get there again.




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



























### STRIKE POWER



IT MIGHT not have registered on the all-time list of dazzling tries but it is doubtful whether there has

been a more crucial one for Gloucester this side of the last ice age.

For lain Balshaw it was nothing more than a run-in for one of the game's more wonderfully free-spirited talents but delve a little deeper and his effort against London Irish a fortnight ago was far more important than that.

Not only was it the 50th Premiership try of his career - and only the elite of the elite have managed that - but it rescued Gloucester from what would have been a fourth successive defeat, a scenario so grisly that the potential repercussions stretched way down Kingsholm Road and back again.

Gloucester's second half recovery against the then leaders of the Guinness Premiership will rank among the modern day 'I was there moments' and if it is too far fetched to say it saved a season then it certainly breathed life into a campaign that was heading up its own nether regions.

In that respect it was fitting Balshaw delivered the vital try. If it hadn't been for a groin injury then Gloucester's most threatening outside back may well have reached the target before now.

And while he might not possess the same box of tricks as a James Simpson-Daniel there are few more beautifully balanced runners in the game, fewer still who can do it from either the wing or full-back and precisely no-one who has made such an impact on the national team as Balshaw did in 2001.

Judging by the way England were reduced to a stodgy mess against Italy last weekend, a Balshaw here and there may be just what they need, not that he is thinking too much about that.

"I have been around long enough now to look at most things and have a little laugh to myself and there is not much in this game that I have not seen in club or International level" he said.

"I count myself very lucky to have achieved what I have done for England. I believe anything in this game is a possibility provided you are playing well and that is my priority at Gloucester, pure and simple.

"If you look around our squad at the moment there are plenty of players with international experience but our minds are focused on taking this club as far as we can and we are not there yet, not by a long way.

"My full focus is on playing well for Gloucester. If I can do that on a regular basis then I hope I will be in contention for an international spot. That is all I can do - the rest is out of my hands. I feel there are a number of players playing very well for us at the moment but are not getting a look in. All they can do is keep performing well, keep proving the selectors wrong and they will get their chance."

Balshaw has five Guinness Premiership tries to his name from six league appearances this season — a strike-rate that borders on the stratospheric — but what does he think of his landmark and did he ever think it was possible.

"When you make your debut something like that never even crosses your mind," he said. "In fact, I didn't know until after the game I had reached 50. It was a special moment for me personally obviously but of more significance was the fact it won a hugely tight game for us.

"It is a good feeling to know I have contributed no matter where I have played but I would also like to think there is more to come too — I just want to stay fit, stay sharp and keep working as hard as I have done.


"Whatever has gone on this season, there is no questioning our desire to do well and be successful. If that was the case, I am pretty sure we wouldn't have turned round the game against Irish — that was down to guts, character and belief."

Balshaw became the ninth player in the competitions history to hit the half-century – Steve Hanley heads the list with 75 – and he will be back between the shafts this afternoon when the Sharks come to Kingsholm.

"We are top of the Premiership which means we are doing something right, although we know we can get better," Balshaw said.

"Sale are a fantastically good side, they can produce an exceptional kicking game as well as a cutting edge so we appreciate we will have to be really focused and energised to get the right result."

If that happens, Gloucester may well just have to thank lain Balshaw and his first step towards his second half century.

### RYAN'S REVIEW



It would be impossible to start without looking back at the victory over London Irish it was some comeback?

DR: IRISH were top of the Guinness Premiership, at full strength and playing some excellent rugby based on a sound movement game and astute management of their options.

We conceded a couple of sort tries from first phase ball and although we worked exceptionally hard, Irish dominated the first-half.

I think the key was that we didn't panic or lose control of the game. Just before half-time we managed a couple of penalties that dragged the score back and we got in, we kept our composure and just realised we had to build some territory and possession

One try was always likely to be the difference - we kept our shape and composure and that paid off with seven minutes to go. I said immediately afterwards a lot of stuff ad been thrown at us externally but we sat at took it and are now top of the Guinness Premiership.

It was a great testament to our resolve that we hung in there and got the result it was one of those Kingsholm experiences that was pretty special to be involved in - particularly against a side that was previously top of the table.




Since that game, Carlos Spencer has signed for us and Willie Walker has joined Worcester on loan.

DR: THE opportunity to sign Carlos was simply too good to turn down and I am delighted to be able to bring a player of his calibre to Gloucester.

His impact has been immediate - it raised the impetus and energy levels in training, his has tremendous knowledge and ideas and we all found it really refreshing to get his take on things. It is







early days obviously but the players have responded to him and that is great.

To see him in Gloucester colours in the near future is very exciting for everybody involved with the club.



Despite his arrival, we are still really suffering with injuries.

DR: THIS weekend we will have everyone involved somewhere along the line and that is a situation I cannot ever remember. We have recalled two players back from England Under-20s just so we have enough options so it is pretty tough.

We have operated with reduced numbers in the back five of the scrum for weeks and that situation, when you combine it during an international period, is very hard to get through. But we got Gareth Delve back for the Irish game and I thought his

contribution was outstanding considering he had been out of action for nine months.

Andy Hazell is also back and he provides another dynamic option at openside, which is also significant at this stage, but hopefully we will get the numbers back in a few weeks when the season enters its crucial phase.

DR: WE know what a good side they can be from our game at Edgeley Park earlier in the season. They are another very good side who have genuine play-off ambitions.

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## DAVE KING'S WORLD OF RUGBY

Dave King delves into the record books to dig out Gloucester's hat-trick heroes, the sides who have struggled most against the men at Kingsholm and the football stadiums Gloucester have featured on down the years.

Since the innovation of professional rugby we have completed the double in league fixtures on 41 occasions. (Home results are the first figure).

The only league clubs that we have not completed the double over since 1997 are London Scottish, who only met Gloucester for one season in 1997-98 and the other is Bath whom we have defeated at the Recreation Ground this season. Obviously we have a golden opportunity to complete not only the double over our west country rivals for the first time but also a full house against all opponents that we have encountered in the professional age that are currently in the Premiership.

FRANCIS Hartley, the first captain of this club originally played for one of London's clubs - the Flamingoes FC. They were founded in 1865 and were at the time a top class club and included on their fixture list such clubs as Blackheath, Richmond and Harlequins. Their ground was situated at Battersea Park although, their changing were situated at "The Clockhouse" in Battersea Park Road. The club was disbanded in 1877. The majority of their players at that time decided to join Harlequins. Their colours were red and dark blue jerseys, white shorts and red stockings. Francis Hartley, actually arranged for this famous old London club to play Gloucester. The Flamingoes were one of the flounder members of the Rugby Football Union.

OUR match in the EDF Energy Cup at the Ricoh Stadium, Coventry will be the sixth time we have played at the home of a soccer club. With the Ricoh Stadium utilised by Coventry City we have also played at the following soccer grounds. At Edgeley Park – home of Stockport County (Sale Sharks), Memorial Ground – now owned by Bristol Rovers (Bristol), Ashton Gate – home of Bristol City (Bristol), Madejski Stadium – home of Reading F.C. (London Irish), Vicarage Road home of Watford F.C. utilised by (Saracens), we actually played Leicester Tigers on this ground in a European Cup Semi-final.

Adams Park is the home of Wycombe Wanderers (London Wasps). While these clubs play their home fixtures on these grounds, it should be remembered we have also played a home fixture on a soccer ground — Ashton Gate where we played Bristol due to the refurbishment. of Kingsholm on the 28th April 2007 in a 35-13 victory. A win marred by the career ending injury sustained by the luckless James Forrester. Soccer has been played at the home of Newcastle Falcons Kingston Park, where Newcastle United have staged some of their reserve matches.

HAT-TRICKS, are more prevalent in league soccer but we have witnessed this amazing feat in league matches on various occasions. In the 1996-97 season, Mike Lloyd, recorded 3 tries against West Hartlepool at home on the 18th January 1997 in an Allied Dunbar fixture.

Two seasons later, in the 1998-99 season, Chris Catling repeated this feat with three against Newcastle on the 17th October at Kingsholm again in a Allied Dunbar encounter.

The following season of 1999-00, Elton Moncrieff, went one better than his predecessors by scoring four against Bedford in a Zurich League fixture on the 6th May 1999. In the 2000-01 season Frank Schisano, scored a hat-trick against Rotherham on 2nd September 2000 in an away fixture in the Zurich League.

James Simpson-Daniel, joined this






illustrious group by recording a coveted hat-trick of tries against Bath in a resounding 68-12 victory on 4th May 2002 in a Zurich League fixture at Kingsholm.

The 2002-03 season opened with a bang for winger Marcel Garvey when he scored three against Bristol at Kingsholm on 21st September in a Zurich League fixture. James Forrester also found the same opponents to his liking when he scored a hat-trick at the Memorial Ground on 16th March 2003 in that same season.


We had to wait until the commencement of 2007-08 season in the Guinness League for Lesley Vainikolo to not only pass his predecessors but also set a club record in League fixtures by scoring 5 tries on his club league debut at Leeds in an away encounter on 16th September 2007.



Just watching some of the old footage of him brings a smile to your face. He's been there, seen it and done it – our


young players will learn heaps from him – providing that he actually knows what he is doing himself.

I look forward to seeing him play today – I hope he has a nightmare of course, but it's always good to see world class players on the Kingsholm turf.



### Balshaw's try earns remarkable win

IN ONE of those 'I was there moments' Gloucester produced a comeback from almost


beyond the grave to secure a priceless Guinness Premiership victory over London

lain Balshaw's 50th Premiership try of his career capped a memorable fight-back from Gloucester, who at one stage were 18-3 behind.

However, it was London Irish who made the far more purposeful start. They were dynamic from first phase ball and competitive against Gloucester's line-out. Irish took the lead when Paul Hodgson chipped from a scrum and when Rory Lawson failed to gather, Irish piled over and two phases later winger Adam Thompstone burst through from first receiver to score behind the sticks.

It was hardly the start Gloucester wanted and it was to get worse before it got better. Thompstone was again involved with a good carry and when Peter Hewat shifted possession to the right with a flat pass and Delon Armitage put Topsy Ojo in the for the score.

That made the score 15-0 and Irish were flying. Gloucester clung to the fact Olly Barkley was in solid goal-kicking form



and before the break he was to land three penalties to drag Gloucester back to 18-9

Gloucester started the second half with much more purpose and drive, although it was Irish who threatened first when Hewat launched a counter-attack from behind his line and it needed lain Balshaw and Anthony Allen to mop up the danger — although Allen was dispatched to the cooler for killing the ball.

Hewat made it 21-9 and then Barkley dragged it back to 21-12 before Gloucester's scrum went into over-drive. With Greg Somerville, Nick Wood, Gareth Delve and everyone else in red battering on, the home side started to turn the screw.

Barkley cut the gap to six points with another penalty and then to three when he slotted three points when Mapusua was binned for killing the ball. What Gloucester needed was a try and with time ticking by, they got one.

Delve plundered forward from a scrum, replacement scrum-half Ryan Lamb fed Barkley and then Allen produced a lovely miss-pass in midfield, Willie Walker steamed up and sent Balshaw in for the score. Kingsholm burst at the seams and the victory and comeback were complete.
