Q. TWELVE MONTHS AGO YOU WERE PREPARING FOR YOUR FIRST SEASON AS HEAD COACH OF GLOUCESTER RUGBY. **HOW DO YOU FEEL THIS TIME** AROUND?

"Incredibly excited. We've put in a lot of hard work this summer. But, for all the training and preparation you do in the close season, there's nothing quite like playing matches."

"Ultimately, that's why we're all involved in rugby and it all kicks off this afternoon against the Scarlets."

Q. IT'S QUITE A TESTING PRESEASON SCHEDULE?

"Well, it has to be really. There's no point playing friendlies against a couple of weaker sides and racking up a couple of 50 point wins. You learn nothing from that."

"Before the Aviva Premiership Rugby season gets underway, we need to test ourselves against some decent opposition. You can train as hard as you like and play simulated matches in training but it's only in a genuine match environment that you really find out where you are.

Q. LAST SEASON, WE PLAYED THREE PRESEASON FRIENDLIES AT KINGSHOLM. THIS TIME AROUND, THERE ARE TWO ON THE ROAD. IS THERE A REASON FOR THAT?

"Definitely. It's no secret that we were much better at home last season than we were on the road. In the Premiership, for example, we only won away at Leeds Carnegie and Worcester Warriors."

"That's certainly an area where we'll be looking to improve this season. I've been around too long to suggest that we're going to go out and win away from home every week."

"However, I hope that we'll be in a better position this season to close out a few of those tight matches where the result went against us last season. Playing away at the likes of the Ospreys and Munster will help that process."

Q. WHAT'S DIFFERENT THIS **TIME AROUND?**

"We're certainly more settled as a squad. We reported back a year ago having been through a lot of change in the close season. I was new to the role and we'd seen a lot of turnover in the squad."

There are obviously some new faces this time around but it's been about continuity for us. We've kept the bulk of the squad together and that will be a real bonus."

"I think everyone will agree that the second half of our season was a huge improvement on the period before Christmas and

If you talk about the Kingsholm pitch last season to most Gloucester Rugby supporters, their immediate reaction will probably be to think back to the game against Sale at the end of February When near monsoon conditions shortly before kick off turned proceedings into a mud bath.

The pitch actually bounced back quite well following that game, thanks in part to a one month gap until the next home fixture but Stadium Manager Dave Balmer was determined that there would be no repetition.

So, this summer Dave and his team have been pulling out all the stops in order to deliver the lush green surface that you'll see Gloucester and the Scarlets performing on this afternoon.

Dave explained:

"Basically, because we didn't do anything on the pitch last year, we've tried to improve the surface drainage so that the water gets off the surface a little bit quicker than it did last season so that we don't end up with the same scenario that we did this spring."

Gloucester, like a number of other sports clubs, suffered from an extraordinary run of bad weather last season. A wet autumn was followed by a freezing December and January with two European matches, Glasgow and Biarritz, only taking place thanks to the herculean efforts of the Kingsholm staff.

Once the snow and ice melted, torrential rain followed and the Guinness Premiership fixture at home to Sale was the one most affected.

Had Dave seen anything like it before?

"Not really, no. That's probably the worst winter t've seen in the 14 years that t've been here. It was almost a throwback to the winters of the 60s and 70s."

So, what exactly has been happening over the summer?

"First of all, they took the top surface off. This involved stripping off the existing turf layer which was predominantly full of annual meadow grass, a shallow rooting grass which doesn't bind into the surface.

Meadow grass is an invasive species, blown in on the wind and not one that you'd plant."

"Once that was done, they then installed 100 tonnes of sand in bands which are 35mm wide by 250mm deep at 250mm intervals across the pitch."

"The next step was to spread and mix 100 tonnes of sand into the top 75mm of the pitch surface which will help with the drainage and allow the root structure of the grass to develop better."

"Finally, it was over seeded and fertilised ready for this season with a mix of four types of perennial rye grass."

For a while it all looked pretty bare out on the pitch but Dave promised that he'd be out there mowing it within four weeks and his prediction was spot on.




He confessed that, in contrast to the winter months, he'd been aided by some helpful weather conditions.

"June and July were pretty good really. We had lots of sun and also quite a bit of rain which helped matters." "We still had to water it quite a bit though and I've been out there cutting it every single day."

"The result will be a stronger, more resilient and better drained surface for the team to perform on. I think players and supporters alike will notice the difference."




