Scots boys made when they came off the bench a fortnight ago when we played here against Sale Sharks.



Coach's NOTES

with Head Coach, BRYAN REDPATH

ON BEHALF OF EVERYONE AT GLOUCESTER RUGBY, I'D LIKE TO WISH THE PLAYERS, SUPPORTERS AND STAFF OF SARACENS OF VERY WARM WELCOME TO KINGSHOLM THIS AFTERNOON.

We're now entering a fascinating stage of the season. Some would say it's when the Aviva Premiership really kicks off given the number of players who have been away at the World Cup.

However, I think that would be to downplay the efforts of all the players who have been on duty during the first few weeks of the season.

The Aviva Premiership has still seen some great rugby played in that time and a number of previously unheralded players have taken their opportunity and made the most of the chance of some first team rugby.

The World Cup itself has certainly aroused comment from all walks of life. Some feel that it's the best tournament to date while others feel that it didn't live up to expectations.

What I do know is that I was fortunate enough to play in three Rugby World Cups and those tournaments were the highlight of my playing career. And, speaking to some of the boys who returned last week, they wouldn't have missed it for the world (pardon the pun!)

With the benefit of a few days of reflection, I think the right team won and not just because New Zealand were the home side!

Although the final itself was incredibly close and one kick could have seen the Webb Ellis trophy heading for France, over the course of the tournament, the All Blacks were comfortably the best team.

Fair play to France. They managed to overcome two defeats in the

tournament and still make the final. They didn't play the rugby we know they're capable of but still won games. That's the mark of a good team, one that can win without being at its best.

New Zealand winning though was the correct result. They are the best team in the world and managed to win despite the huge weight of expectation that would have been on their shoulders. Well done to them!

For my part, I'm glad to be able to call upon our players who are back with us – who wouldn't be happy to get seven international players back in the squad!

We knew before the season started that we would have a tough few weeks without them.

We needed players to rise to the challenge of playing week in and week out in the Premiership when they hadn't necessarily done so before.

We also needed to have a fairly kind run with injuries and that unfortunately didn't happen. We've been missing the likes of Alex Brown, Andy Hazell, Tim Molenaar, Luke Narraway and James Simpson-Daniel for fairly lengthy periods.

The squad has been stretched but, overall, they've coped superbly and, if things had gone slightly differently at Northampton and Sale, we could have been looking at a won five and lost one record – I wouldn't have complained at that!

That's all behind us now and there's no point about wondering about what might have been. It's all about looking forward from here on in as we've got a tough run of fixtures lying ahead of us.

And that all starts this evening with the visit of Saracens this evening for what promises to be a massive encounter under the lights here at Kingsholm.

Over the course of the Premiership season in 2010-11, they proved themselves to be the most difficult team to overcome and that's why they were rightly crowned champions.


Yet, we managed to go toe to toe with them. We squared off four times, twice at Kingsholm and twice at Vicarage Road with the home team winning on each occasion culminating in that 12-10 semi final defeat.

This season they've picked up where they left off. They've won five out of their six games in the Premiership to date and what's most impressive is their form on the road where they've managed to win at Bath, Leicester and Exeter. Coming here won't hold any fears for them.




ESITANT Gloucester must smash straight into attack mode in the scrummage against Saracens, calls frustrated Dan Murphy.

The 25-year-old loosehead admitted Gloucester deserved their set-piece shaming at Welford Road last Friday night – because they failed to fire straight from the off.

The Cherry and Whites slumped to 40-14 LV=Cup defeat at Leicester, principally thanks to a total scrummage shortfall.

Bulldozed backwards at a rate of knots in a number of scrums, Murphy and co could not withstand the intense Tigers pressure. And the former London Irish man said nothing smarts for a front-rower like





a knockout blow at scrum time.
Friday's demolition was the first
time this term that Gloucester
have not been in charge in the
scrummage. And Murphy said they
must resume expected service when

they host powerful Saracens at Kingsholm tonight.

Admitting there was no excuse for the Leicester lethargy, Murphy said Gloucester went to Welford Road to prove their power, and were quickly disabused of any such notion.

He explained: "Maybe we felt our way into it a little which we shouldn't have, we should have attacked straight away.

"That stings a lot as a front-rower when you go there and you get sent walking backwards like that, it stings a lot. You learn from your mistakes plan, it was just one of those things, I think we adjusted better into the end of the first half and beginning of the second-half. We will bounce back, definitely.

"You can't really excuse it, because to be the best you've got to test yourself against the best, and you go there and play Leicester, who've obviously got a good scrum with all their internationals back, and go there to Welford Road to prove yourself to be the best, and you've got to beat the best.

"And last weekend we didn't, we


the padding around the post, and Murphy stole over.


scored, it put us 7-6 up with the conversion and we were going strong, but the set piece really let us down. So there wasn't long that we could be pleased with that try to be honest.

No-one can excuse Will James of slacking this season.

HE'S sometimes unheralded outside the confines of the Gloucester Rugby camp, the likes of Alex Brown and Jim Hamilton grabbing more headlines.

However, following the close season departure of Dave Attwood and the as expected absence of Jim Hamilton on World Cup duty, there was always going to be a large burden on James' shoulders in the early weeks of this campaign.

What no-one could have predicted, however, was the unfortunate shoulder injury to Brown meaning that the 34 year old James has had to step up to the plate and assume the role of senior pro in the Gloucester second row.

It's his sixth season at Kingsholm so he's well qualified to comment on how things are progressing so far in 2011-12.

"We set ourselves some goals at the beginning of the season and it's been a tough few weeks as it has been for everyone. There have been some good performances and some not so good performances."

"But we've got something to build on. We've got lads coming back into the mix which will help us but, overall, I'd say we've had a reasonably good start."

From a personal point of view, becoming almost a mentor to the likes of Tom Savage and David Lyons who have featured in the first team squad is a different role but one he's enjoyed so far.


"It's been good, I've really enjoyed it. Having to call the line outs makes you think a lot more when you're out on the field."

"In terms of the younger players, Sav (Tom Savage) in particular has been fantastic. He's come in from playing last year with Hartpury and made a huge step up to playing Premiership rugby."

"Fair play to him, he's done really

well and taken his chance. He's definitely someone who is in the mix and putting his hand up for selection."

"I'm pleased to see him come on the way he has. I'm just trying to help him out and encourage him where necessary. But, for all the advice I can give him, he's the one

who still has to do the business on the pitch and he's done a good job."

James has played his part in some pretty good Gloucester packs over the past few years but this season's vintage, whilst perhaps lacking some of the big names of recent times, really seem to have stepped it up a gear. What does he put that down to?

"Well, we've worked really hard on our scrum in the latter part of preseason and the first few weeks of the season and that's really paid dividends for us."

"We just work well as a group together but the test will come over the next few weeks when the teams we're going to be facing, like Leicester and Saracens, have a few of their more established forwards back."

By his own admission, he's one of the senior pros in the squad and, like a few of his contemporaries, is already starting to think about life after rugby although he's still got a lot of games in him just yet!

"Yes, I've been thinking about what I do after I finish playing for a few years now although I want to keep on playing for as long as I can."

"I've done some coaching down at Yatton for a few years and I've also got a small property management business down in Bristol which my wife runs which is doing well."


"I've also just taken on the chairmanship of the RPA, taking over from David Barnes, which is a new challenge for me which will take up a bit more of my time although it won't impact upon my training I hasten to add!"

(Laughs) "Well the good thing is that although Atts is now living in Bath, Yann Thomas also lives in Bristol so he's taken Dave's place and travels in with us."


"When he drives, we have to squeeze into the back of his Focus which is quite a sight but at least we're cost neutral compared to the last two seasons!"

AFTER the dour 13-11 slugfest served up by the same two teams only seven days earlier, Gloucester and Sale contributed to an 85 point thriller at Kingsholm in the opening round of the LV= Cup.

Bryan Redpath's side took the spoils, winning 58-27, but the Sharks can take heart from having more than played their part in a great spectacle.

In fact, with an hour played, this game was very much in the balance with both sides having scored 27 points.

Gloucester looked devastating in attack with sheer pace sending the Sale defence into panic mode at regular intervals.

However, the Stockport based

outfit were more than capable of creating chances themselves, running hard with ball in hand and offloading before the defence could re-organise itself.

Every time that Gloucester had looked set to pull away, Sale dragged themselves back into the game and even took the lead on a couple of occasions to hint at an unlikely win.

It was only in the final quarter that Gloucester's superiority up front really took its toll and a number of late tries made the winning margin a comfortable one as the Sale forwards wilted under the constant barrage.

Gloucester started off like a house on fire. Lesley Vainikolo scored after less than a minute and a second try immediately looked to be on the



cards until Sale snaffled possession and promptly launched a length of the pitch move to level the scores.

Freddie Burns kept the scoreboard ticking over with a couple of penalties, Andrew Higgins scored for Sale and Jonny May added a spectacular solo try to earn Gloucester a narrow half time lead.

However, this was promptly wiped out when Rob Miller touched down for the Sharks but the Gloucester pack then took over.

A penalty try looked on the cards but referee Hennessy opted to sin bin Alasdair Dickinson instead. With a back making up the numbers in the Sale back row, the pushover try for Luke Narraway was a formality.

Both Lawsons then made the scoresheet, Scott from a catch and drive while Rory dotted down after Alasdair Strokosch charged down a kick before Sharples and Burns rounded off the scoring to ensure a smooth start to the LV= Cup defence.





Gloucester actually took a surprise 7-6 lead as Dan Murphy pounced upon two errors from the home side in their own 22 but this merely seemed to spur the Tigers into greater effort.

Flood soon added two more



penalties as the Gloucester scrum creaked and, eventually, the defence was breached as Dan Cole and Manu Tuilagi scored tries before half

Hooker Tom Youngs added the third just after half time and it seemed as though the bonus point try for the Tigers was just a matter of time.

However, Bryan Redpath's side dug deep and actually enjoyed their best spell of the game with Lesley Vainikolo's try on the hour reward

for their efforts.

A full blown comeback was never really on the cards but spirited defence seemed set to deny the Tigers the bonus point until the very last minute when the younger Tuilagi split the midfield defence and Horacio Agulla was on his shoulder to complete the scoring.
