You're looking ahead to the next game and conscious of the risk of picking up a couple of injuries. But players who have missed a couple of weeks do need a good hit out.

For what it's worth, I think Nigel got it spot on. The lads coming back were quickly up to speed, and the game was pretty much won by half time.

Nigel then made a couple of changes at half time and a few more as the second half progressed. We were well clear, the lads had enjoyed a competitive run out and there was no sense leaving them out there longer than necessary.

It all means that we're in good shape coming into this afternoon's meeting with Sale Sharks.

It's back to Aviva Premiership rugby, which is our bread and butter. We've all worked hard to get into the top four and we want to stay there.

Sale's league position is a bit misleading. They haven't had a great start in terms of results, but they've shown signs of getting things together in recent weeks.

It's all pointing towards a tough, close encounter and hopefully, at the end of the 80 minutes, we'll come out on the right end of the result.

Firstly to see how he adapted, which early on he did very well. But, more so to see and hear the reaction from our supporters when, towards the end of the game, he did less well!


Obviously, we all realized that the game was won by the time Mike went to outside half but I still don't think there is a club or support base like we have anywhere!!

# REVITALISED & REJUVENATED

Recriminations have been at their bitterest in the fallout from Gloucester's Bryan Redpath era.

Last season ended in turmoil for the Cherry and Whites with accusation and rumour flying from all corners.

The last time Sale came to Kingsholm, the Cherry and Whites were flummoxed, floored and disparate.

Gloucester's players were pulling in different directions – the victims of circumstance and events beyond the Cherry and Whites' control.

The deeper issues of Redpath's Gloucester departure bit hard the day Sale skulked out of Kingsholm, 24-19 winners in last term's penultimate Premiership fixture, pilfering the final Heineken Cup spot in the process.


Sale Chief Executive Steve Diamond gave as good as he got to the crowd that day, in typically bullish fashion.

Kingsholm's anger and confusion was understandable.

But this weekend there will be nothing to gain from a repeat.

The Gloucester of seven months ago and the Gloucester of today are poles apart.

Much ire and bile has been directed at Redpath himself, but all of that must be




Tins is part of the revamped coaching team.

shelved this afternoon – if for no other reason than the visitors would feed off the attention.

Certainly that is the feeling among Gloucester's current squad, so revitalised and rejuvenated by the Nigel Davies revamp.

Sale's miserable start to the season is unlikely to continue unchecked, and Mike Tindall for one expects a serious examination

from Redpath and co today.

But the 34-year-old former England centre also believes it would be fruitless to stoke the Redpath-Diamond fires.

Tindall explained: "We know it's going to be a massive game for the fans, and it's also a massive game for us too – but probably for different reasons.

"This game is crucial for us in terms of where we're going and how our season is developing.

"We want to make Kingsholm a very difficult place to come and play, and also we want to get back to where we were a few years ago where no one came here and won. And that's our challenge.

"We're treating this like a normal game – and although the external factors will be there, we've got to focus on what our job is.

"It would be counter-productive to let everything that's happened around the wider situation cloud what we do in any case.

"That maybe was the case with the game here last year, and we won't let that happen again.

"From our point of view we've just got to keep pushing in the same direction we have

all year. We've got to keep getting stronger at our game.

"Freddie's been awesome at putting us in the right areas of the field this year. And that's what we've got to keep doing.

"If we can keep control of that we're a tough side to beat, so that's the plan."

Tindall said upholding the gritty resilience that has underpinned Gloucester's season to date is far more important than any points-scoring against their former coach.

He added: "One of the pillars we've built this season on has been staying in the contest, having that dog.

"I was reading in the programme last week people saying that the dog's back, and I hope it is. It's been there every game for us and it needs to stay there.

"It's a difficult season that we came into, but we've made no excuses from the off. We've wanted to be hard to beat, home and away, and we've managed to do that so far.

"The job is far from done though, we've got to keep representing the jersey as we've started, and if we can do that then we'll be in the mix come the end of the year."

## HISTORY LESSON

Sale has a long history as a club - founded in 1861, it pre-dates Gloucester, but the two clubs first played one another in 1933.

Today will be the 80th encounter. Gloucester have won 44, and Sale 33, with just 2 matches drawn; Gloucester are ahead on points by 1791 to 1299.

The home advantage is marked, Gloucester having recorded 34 wins and 14 losses at Fortress Kingsholm:

### **EARLY MATCHES**

# Sale travelled south for an Easter tour in 1933, with a fine record for the season behind them.

They played at Kingsholm on 15th April and Gloucester won 18-7, with 2 tries from Vernon Sheppard on the right wing, one of which was converted by full-back Harold Boughton, who also kicked a penalty, while centre Roy James added a dropped goal.

Sale scored first with a try from Wilf Wooller, and almost added a second, but for a saving tackle by Don Meadows, before Boughton relieved the pressure with some long touch kicks, and kicked a penalty to level the scores.

Sheppard then scored a great try, described by WB in the Citizen – "...the right wing was partly tackled by three different men in succession, but he shook himself free on each occasion, and with a brilliant burst at the finish touched down in the corner for a grand try".

He added another in the second half – "At the centre Fifield served Meadows, who slipped an inside pass to Sheppard, who was playing centre now. With a tremendous burst of speed, Sheppard cleared Davey and rounding Hart

finished a glorious run by scoring behind the posts".

During that Easter weekend, Gloucester played 3 matches in 4 days, and then took part in two 7-a-side tournaments before the end of the week.

This match started a tradition of an Easter visit by Sale, which continued almost unbroken until the early 1980s. Most of the matches were played on Easter Monday.

Two years later, Sale

returned to Kingsholm with similar result – Gloucester won 17-6.

Sale's first win, 14-13, came in the third match on 29th March 1937.



### RECORD SCORES

In the first year of national leagues, Sale were demolished 61-7 at Kingsholm on 16th April 1988.

On an afternoon when everyone performed well, centre Ruari Maclean, prop Malcolm Preedy and full back Paul Mansell were the pick of Gloucester's line up.

Gloucester ran in 11 tries from Marcus Hannaford (2), Paul Ashmead (2), Jim Breeze, Ruari McLean, Richard Mogg,

Richard Pascall, Nigel Scrivens, Ian Smith and Paul Mansell, who also kicked a penalty and 6 conversions, with Mike Hamlin adding a seventh.

Sale lost all 11 league games that season and were relegated. When they returned to the top flight in 1994-95, they did the double over Gloucester for three successive seasons, including their record score of 52-12 on 12th April 1997.

### **MEMORABLE** MATCHES

PARKER PEN SHIELD SEMI-FINAL, 28th April 2002 SALE 28 - GLOUCESTER 27

Gloucester started the semi-final of the Parker Pen Shield (since renamed the Amlin Challenge Cup) as strong favourites on a neutral ground at Northampton, and after 17 minutes, were 13-0 up thanks to a storming run by Terry Fanolua and a conversion,

penalty and drop goal by Ludovic Mercier.

For the next 40 minutes Sale dominated the game with superb handling resulting in tries for Cueto, Hanley, Marais and Harris,

Back came the Gloucester pack, creating tries for Jamie Forrester and Fanolua from short range to take the score to 27-28



A penalty in the final minute provided a chance for Mercier, but it was missed, and Sale deservedly won the game.

### **GUINNESS PREMIERSHIP** 27th February 2010 **GLOUCESTER 47 - SALE 3**

Gloucester played 30 minutes of superb rugby in appalling conditions at the start of this Premiership game.

The Sale pack was completely outplayed and the Gloucester backs ran the ball at will. Penalties were turned down in front of the posts in the first ten minutes, so complete was the domination. The result was a four try bonus point in the first half hour as the pressure told.



A penalty try in the seventh minute for a collapsed scrum was followed by two tries for Lesley Vainikolo, the first after the ball had passed through six pairs of hands, and one for the equally powerful Akapusi Qera, Nicky Robinson kicking three conversions.

As the conditions worsened, Gloucester lost some of their momentum and Sale scored through a Charlie Hodgson penalty.

But Sale began to tire late on, and the tries started to flow for Gloucester again, first Robinson and then James Simpson-Daniel kicking through and hacking on to touch down.


Robinson's replacement Tim Taylor made the break for the seventh try, which Andy Hazell touched down. All three tries were converted.



Viewing events from afar was a strange experience for Dan and his Gloucester team mates Koree Britton and Ryan Mills, but they soon received positive vibes.

"It was all a bit weird really. I
was chatting to some of the boys
back here in Gloucester, and they were
saying how much things had changed, it was

"We were out there playing as hard as we could in South Africa but, at the same time, we were all really excited about getting back and seeing what it was like.

"It was a tough game for me, the whole day was a big experience and a pretty special moment all in all."


Looking back on that game with the benefit of hindsight, Robson feels that he's actually a far better play now then he was then and one of Gloucester's new signings has to take credit.

"I've learned so much since then, especially since Jimmy (Cowan) came in. He's been that leader who you can turn to when you have questions and that's helped me a lot. I feel a much better player.

"Jimmy's a top lad. He's been there and done it all and you can't learn off anyone better than that. He's also still very critical of himself, continually pushing himself to get better.

He's modest when he states that it didn't go badly. He ended up kicking the winning points – not that he realised it at the time!



Of course there is a long way to go until the final decisions are announced, but what a coup that would be to get a fixture or two here.






Gloucester Rugby's 2012-13 LV= Cup campaign got off to a frustrating start at the Liberty Stadium as the Ospreys snatched a 33-27 victory with the very last play of the game.

In all fairness, Gloucester had very nearly carried out the ultimate smash and grab raid.

Trailing 26-13, with just over ten minutes to play, Gloucester looked dead and buried with the Ospreys having dominated the second half.

However, the Cherry and Whites dug deep to battle their way back into the game and stun the home crowd with a try from Dan Murphy and a penalty try.

Both clubs fielded young sides, but it was Gloucester who settled the better of the two teams.





Kingsholm welcomed Fiji for the first time in 42 years – the Islanders took on the Western Counties in 1972 – and a crowd of 8,147 enjoyed a cracker of a game.

Commentators often talk of a 'game of two halves'. And this one certainly was! In a contrast of styles, Fiji's backs dominated the first half as the visitors threatened to run riot, while the Gloucester pack seized control after the break.

It left the game completely in the balance as the game went into the final quarter, but it was Gloucester's young guns who held their nerve to secure a memorable win.

The crowd loved every minute of the occasion. They warmly applauded Fiji performing the I Bole before kick off, they admired the skill of the Islanders in the first half and they roared their approval of Gloucester's fightback.

The Fijians, loudly backed by some enthusiastic supporters, made a lot of friends on the evening and it's to be hoped that it won't be another 42 years before they visit again.

in an expansive fashion. However, whereas Fiji's big, powerful runners looked dangerous whenever they touched the ball, Gloucester's smaller, nippier equivalents were frequently outmuscled.

On the scoreboard at least it was one way traffic. Jonetani Ralulu opened the scoring with a penalty before hooker Talemaitoga Tuapati scored a fine try.

Ralulu added a second penalty before Timoci Matanavou, who scored two tries for Toulouse here back in January, finished off a midfield break in style.

Gloucester may have been rocked but they hit back. Matt Cox bullied his way over from close range to give his team hope. Dan Robson converted and added a penalty for an 18-10 half time scoreline.

After the break, Fiji scored another cracker as Watisoni Votu latched onto a superb cross kick from Ralulu to score his team's third try.

But then, the Gloucester pack took control. Twice the Gloucester pack muscled their way to a penalty try. Twice Ralulu responded with a penalty.

The crowd were loving this encounter by now and erupted as Koree Britton peeled off a driving maul to touch down. Dan Robson held his nerve to convert and give his team the lead at 31-29.

Ralulu had a late penalty opportunity from inside his own half but was short and wide with his attempt, before Gloucester needlessly conceded a 5m scrum to set the nerves jangling.

The defence held out, however, and the crowd celebrated a home win whilst generously acknowledging the contribution of the Fijians.
