


CAPTAIN'S Corner Jim Hamilton


T'S good to be back home after two away games, to welcome London Irish in this crucial Amlin Challenge Cup fixture.

"I feel as though I'm in the form of my life so far this season, but I know there's still a lot more to come..."

If Carlsberg did England debuts, Freddie Burns' international bow might just be the blueprint.

The 22-year-old could hardly believe his luck in just taking the Twickenham field in itself. But to step into something approaching a hammering of the world champions was unheralded.

Burns landed two penalties, guided England home to 38-21 victory – and then had all and sundry suggesting his name is already inked into Stuart Lancaster's revised Elite Player Squad to be announced in January.

The maturing playmaker could not stop some of that pride bursting out onto Twitter, with pictures of his cap and holding his shirt sure to be central among his scrapbooks of

If there were any danger of him letting all that run unchecked though, it all stopped dead the moment he walked back into Gloucester training at Hartpury College.

And the Cherry and Whites fly-half admitted he enjoyed copping the stick from his Gloucester team-mates just as much as every other part of the whole experience.

"I knew it was coming and I didn't mind it one bit," he explained. "If anything it just confirmed what a big job we had on our hands getting ready for the London Irish game, and getting our heads around that.

"It was great to cop a bit of banter from the lads and be reminded in no uncertain terms that the club is the beginning and end of everything really.

"I love playing for Gloucester at the minute, it's just a great place to be and the feeling among the lads is excellent. So I couldn't wait to get stuck back into things with the club after that New Zealand experience.

"There were times when the whole thing just felt a bit surreal, and you can't really top beating the world champions, unbeaten for 20 games, at your home ground behind a crowd like that.

"It's exciting for the whole squad and it's exciting to see what comes next.

"But as it has been all season, the challenge for me is to try to keep improving with Gloucester and battle to help the team keep winning and keep moving forward."

Burns stepped into the inside centre role for the first time last weekend, as Gloucester saw off London Irish 29-22.

His 24-point haul helped Gloucester overturn a 22-9 deficit in the game's final 25 minutes.

Gearing up for today's return Amlin Challenge Cup clash against the same opponents, Burns said Gloucester will be ready for a backlash from the Exiles.

Admitting he hopes his shift to 12 is more cameo than long-term project, Burns said he still feels best suited to fly-half.

He continued: "I was happy to step up when I did, it was a good experience.

"I wouldn't say it's one that I'd like to keep going back to, but if I'm asked to play at 12 I'm more than happy to do so.

"If I'm honest I just want to be considered as a ten, I don't really want to move about too much.

"I'm more than happy under the circumstances to play 12, for whoever, but

I think my position is fly-half and that's the position I'll be working hard to push and progress at.

"Nigel has challenged us to expand our attacking game, and it's nice to have that licence to play, but to be fair he's given it to us all year and now he wants us to take it to a new level.

"But then there's knowing when to chuck the ball about, and when to kick. In the first half we didn't kick as much as we should have, but we wanted to see where we were as a running rugby team.

"It was nice to see we kept hammering away at that running game though, and in those last 20 minutes it came good.

"I feel as though I'm in the form of my life so far this season, but I know there's still a lot more to come.

"And I think there's still a lot more to come from us as a team as a whole this season too, and that's very exciting.

"We know Irish will come at us again this time, they will be desperate to make up for last week in their eyes.

"But as long as we concentrate on what we've got to improve, hopefully we'll be ok."

KNOCKOUT MATCHES AGAINST IRISH EXILES

The London Irish club was formed in 1898, but Gloucester did not appear on their fixture list until 1973-74, Gloucester's centenary season.


The Irish travelled to Kingsholm on 24th November 1973, and were sent packing to the tune of 27-9.

Since then the clubs have met regularly, and have been drawn against one another in cup competitions on several occasions.

Gloucester had travelled there earlier in the season, and lost 9-10, but they were up for the cup, and won 22-13 thanks to tries from Steve Boyle, Richard Mogg and Padraig Conway, and 2 conversions, a penalty and a dropped goal from the boot of Peter Butler.

Gloucester went out in the next round after a 9-9 draw at London Scottish, who progressed because they scored the only try.

FIRST EUROPEAN CLASH

The clubs first met in European competition in the 1996-97 season, the first season of

Greening (2) and Alastair Saverimutto scored the tries, Mark Mapletoft converting two of them.

During 1999-2004, the teams met three times in domestic cup competitions, once in the Tetley's Bitter Cup and twice in the Powergen Cup, the Irish winning all three. However, Gloucester triumphed (just) in the big one that followed:


It all boiled down to a matter of inches when James Forrester touched down his own kick ahead just before it crossed the dead ball line for the winning score in extra time of this pulsating European Challenge Cup Final.

Peter Richards began the move from his own 22 with a chip kick that was swept up by James Simpson-Daniel. Anthony Allen burst through into the Irish half and, from the ruck, Forrester pursued his kick to the line.

Gloucester had led 31-19 with only ten minutes remaining, through tries by Foster,

Mark Foster had outstripped Topsy Ojo to reach a delicate grubber kick by Mike Tindall to score the first, Andy Hazell had charged through a breaking lineout for the second and Simpson-Daniel had run 60 metres following an interception to score the third.

However the pack was tiring and had conceded two tries in the later stages, both to rolling mauls, to tie the scores at 31-31 at the end of regulation time.

When Barry Everitt kicked his fourth penalty goal to take Irish ahead in the 9th minute of extra time, the writing appeared to be on the wall, but Gloucester had one shot left in the locker to give them a memorable victory.

DATE FOR YOUR DIARY: THEY PLAYED FOR GLOUCESTER AND FOUGHT FOR THEIR COUNTRY

When war broke out in August 1914, the British Government called for volunteers.

Within two weeks practically all of the players from the Gloucester Rugby Club had enlisted. The Gloucester Club announced the cancellation of all fixtures.

By Christmas 1914, William Hancock (Gloucester A, full-back) and Bernard 'Peter' Roach (Gloucester A, centre) were already dead.

By the end of the Great War, twenty-two players who had represented the Gloucester Club, had been killed with their worst day being July 23rd 1916 during the Somme



"One good thing is that we have already qualified because of our performances in 2011. Now we can focus on developing and improving for the next tournament.




For now though, he's just looking to keep things simple.



Although Gloucester played it down as just another game, the world of rugby, looking for an obvious headline, billed this game as Bryan Redpath's return to Kingsholm.

Qera bulldozed his way over from close range to finally break the thin blue line, and the rampaging Gloucester pack bullied their way to a penalty try as the Sale scrum splintered.

The Kingsholm crowd, secure in the knowledge that the points were in the bag, were able to amuse themselves by good naturedly booing Redpath and Diamond when they appeared on the big screens, as well as offering sarcastic consolation to Danny Cipriani when he was shown sporting an ice pack on his knee.

It was a professional job done by Gloucester, but not a return to remember for Bryan Redpath.

Nigel Davies' team maintained their top four berth while the Sharks continued to prop up the table with just one win in the Aviva Premiership to date.

As one Gloucester fan remarked on his way out, "Karma's a funny old thing."







Gloucester left Vicarage Road reflecting on a missed opportunity to secure a valuable, and rare, away win at Saracens.

Gloucester led the game for long periods. In fact, although there was always very little to choose between the teams on the scoreboard, Saracens only nudged their way in front midway through the second half.

However, the Men in Black are good at defending a lead, and doggedly kept Gloucester at bay in a final few minutes which saw the Cherry and Whites pushing hard as time ran out.

Nigel Davies' side may well have had a good shout for a penalty try in those final moments. Two lineout catch and drives were halted illegally, as were two 5 metre scrums.

However, referee Sean Davey, who hadn't been averse to acting decisively throughout the match, didn't see any reason to consider awarding a penalty try and Saracens held out to clinch a 28-23 win.

Davey had played a key role. Gloucester were leading 13-12 just before half time, and were awarded a more than kickable penalty, only for the official to reverse the decision for back chat. It was a big call.

And Gloucester were also made to suffer as they played 20 minutes of the game with only 14 men. Dan Murphy and Sione Kalamafoni were both sinbinned, and the key Saracens try came with the big Tongan kicking his heels on the touchline, waiting to return to the action.

It wasn't a game which featured many stand out, individual pieces of skill.

However, Dan Murphy deserves credit for keeping his head when following up an Akapusi Qera charge down, controlling the ball with his foot before picking up to score.



However, he obviously didn't miss the full ten minutes and his offence was to collapse one of the Gloucester catch and drives heading towards the line....

The simple fact of the matter, though, is that Gloucester gave the returning Charlie Hodgson far too many chances to kick at goal.

The former England man has been a thorn in Gloucester's side in the past, and he chipped in with seven penalties and a conversion.

Gloucester started well and quickly opened up a 6-0 lead as Billy Twelvetrees confidently slotted two penalties.

However, the indiscipline that haunted Gloucester throughout, started to take its toll. Hodgson kicked four penalties either side of Dan Murphy's close range try as he pounced upon a loose ball following Akapusi Qera's charge down.

Gloucester led 13-12 at half time, without ever looking totally in control or at ease, but it could have been even better if not for the controversial reversed penalty.

Hodgson quickly nudged his team in front with his fifth penalty but Gloucester responded well with a close range try for the ever impressive Oera.

Crucially, though, the home team seized the initiative with Gloucester reduced to 14 men, and despite some gallant defence, worked an opening for Wigglesworth to score in the corner as Gloucester crucially failed to find touch.

Twelvetrees and Hodgson swapped penalties to leave things on a knife edge going into the final minutes, but Gloucester's hopes of a memorable comeback win came up just short.
