For all that, we came up just short. We could have snatched it in the final few minutes and have to view it as a missed opportunity. But, we will learn from the experience as we have done all season.


Today though is all about London Irish, who are rapidly becoming a very familiar foe as we face them for the third time in three weeks!

We want to win to maintain our position in the top four, while they're desperate for points to stay ahead of Sale. It's all set for a passionate encounter.



Both teams will be determined to win today which, for ourselves, will mean that we will remain within the top four.



THE GREATEST EVER CAPTAIN

'Respect the shirt, represent the city – and for god's sake, they're just humans!'

They talk about a look so piercing it would make you enlist.

They talk about a man so committed that despite working cross-country, he never missed a match – not even a wet Wednesday night in Wales.

They talk about probably Gloucester's greatest ever captain.

There's no question they talk about Mike Nicholls. God rest him.

The indomitable Gloucester hooker died just before Christmas. Sincerest condolences to his family: that must always rank above all.

But let's hope it is some comfort to them that Nicholls' passing leaves a chasm in the

The 1972 Cup winning Gloucester team, captained by Mike Nicholls Kingsholm heart.

Those that played with or were coached by the legendary front-rower all say the same – Nicholls was a hard man with an even tougher spirit – but also a Kingsholm absolute, who never let a friend or teammate down.

Mike Burton rates Nicholls as the greatest captain he played under, Mickey Booth still shudders at the thought of his teamtalks and Robin Cowling thinks he shaped Gloucester's history.

Nicholls' Kingsholm legacy is off the scale. In next to no time he swapped Old Centralians for Gloucester, and there he stayed for 17 years.

When all outside rejected Gloucester's claims, Nicholls told the Cherry and Whites to bite back.

The Kingsholm 'dawg' well and truly ravaged the competition in 1972, as Gloucester pilfered the inaugural RFU Knockout Cup from the envious eyes of the establishment.

Gloucester played every round away from Kingsholm, then saw off Moseley 17-6 at Twickenham.





World famous London Welsh boasted nearly half the British Lions team that won their first – and still only – series victory in New Zealand in 1971.

No one gave Gloucester a chance, except the men themselves, and none more than Nicholls.

'Respect the shirt, represent the city – and for god's sake, they're just humans!' he barked to his troops at Old Deer Park.

He shot out that look that could raise an army, off Gloucester went to the trenches – and they returned triumphant.

To repeat the feat at equally-powerful Coventry in the semi-final set one of Gloucester's finest hours in motion.

In every change of era Gloucester have always boasted men to catch the changing trends, and ensure the Cherry and Whites kept pace.

Tom Walkinshaw clearly took that

mantle for the professional shift, and Don Rutherford is credited with ushering in the first formal and regimented coaching.

While some were unsure of this newfangled national cup's credence, Nicholls simply saw a fine opportunity to rubberstamp Gloucester's power.

Some 40 years on that entire cup run remains imprinted on a Gloucester generation – and imagined in glorious hyperbole by those too young to bear witness.

A draughtsman by trade but a Kingsholm stalwart at heart.

The best of Gloucester's hugely-impressive best all look up to Nicholls.

Maybe that above all, reveals everything. Such men never act for recognition – thankfully in Nicholls' case justice will be done – Kingsholm and Gloucester will never forget.



THE PRIDE THE PASSION THE HONOUR THE HISTORY

FOR THE STATISTICIANS

Today is the 62nd occasion on which Gloucester and London Irish have locked horns.

To date, Gloucester have won 37 and lost 24 – there have been no drawn matches, and only 6 defeats for Gloucester at Kingsholm. Gloucester are ahead on points scored by 1332 to 1126

Since league rugby was introduced, there have been 18 encounters at Kingsholm, with Gloucester emerging victorious in 16 of them.

FIRST MATCH

London Irish date back to 1898 as a club, but only came onto the Gloucester fixture list in 1973, when Gloucester beefed up the standard of their opposition for their centenary year.

In the event, for that first match on 24th November 1973, both clubs were shorn of players away playing representative rugby or struck down with the flu'.

In the first half, Gloucester spurned several chances to score, and had a "try" by Keith Richardson disallowed. So, Gloucester found themselves 3-9 behind at half-time.

Eric Stephens kicked a couple of penalties to level the scores, before, in the last 13 minutes of the match, tries from John Dix, Bob White and Dick Smith, all of whom had been dropped from the County side, turned the match on its head.

In the final flourish, "Jardine slashed through the bhoyo's defence to put over Smith". Eric Stephens converted all 3 tries and kicked another penalty, as well as narrowly missing one from well inside his own half, which led to White's try when The Irish knocked on under the posts. With 24 unanswered points in the second half, Gloucester ran out winners 27-9.

However, the Irish generally had the better of the early encounters, winning five out of the first seven games between the clubs.



for a 44-3 victory.

For London Irish, the game at the end of last season, on 5th May 2012, when Gloucester completely disintegrated, produced their biggest win, 52-18.

MEMORABLE GAME

On 20th May 2000, the teams played out a thrilling league encounter, described in the Citizen as "heart-stopping stuff", when "Gloucester's season reached an astonishing crescendo at The Stoop with a white knuckle ride that secured third in the Premiership".

A pulsating first half saw Irish turn round with a 25-13 advantage, but cracking breaks from Terry Fanolua and a leggy sprint from lan Jones swung the balance of the game for a while

The Irish again stormed back to establish a 40-25 lead, before Adey Powles burrowed over for a try on the stroke of time to edge Gloucester ahead 42-40.

Even then the Irish had a last chance with a penalty from the half-way line, but it sailed wide, and Gloucester's celebrations started.

Gloucester's tries came from Adey Powles (2), Chris Catling (2), Rob Jewell, Adam Eustace and Mark Cornwell.

AN IRISH TAKE ON Kingsholm

After captaining an International XV v Gloucestershire at Kingsholm to mark the County's centenary, Willie John McBride said: "I've always wanted to play at Kingsholm, and it's good to be here at last. Before I came I'd heard a lot about your ground, I'd heard a lot about your rugby, and I'd heard a lot about your crowd.

"As soon as I arrived this afternoon, I knew everything they said about your ground was true

IRELAND AT KINGSHOLM

In 1991, one hundred years of rugby at Kingsholm was celebrated with the visit of the England and Ireland national sides,

who were playing final warm-up games ahead of their World Cup campaigns.

Gloucester first took on an England side captained by Mike Teague, and were soundly beaten 34-4.

Next up were Ireland. It was a great day for Gloucester. They produced a remarkable performance to comprehensively outplay a near full-strength Ireland, captained by Gloucester-born Phil Matthews.

John Hawker took three strikes against the head, Dave Sims dominated the lineouts, Ian Smith was first to the breakdowns, and the defence just insisted "they shall not pass".

This superiority was not adequately reflected in the final 14-13 scoreline, made up of tries by Jerry Perrins and Simon Morris, and 2 penalties from Tim Smith.



HROWN straight into the deep end of life in the Aviva Premiership, full back Rob Cook has barely had chance to catch breath as he reaches the middle of his first season at Kingsholm.

After finishing last season in the Championship play-offs as a member of the Cornish Pirates, Cook was already preparing for the new Championship season when the call came offering him the chance to join Gloucester.

"The season finished quite late with the Pirates, I was on holiday when I got a phone call from Nigel (Davies) and I was obviously quite happy. I had a week down at Pirates sorting everything out and then I was away, it did happen pretty quickly but I was really happy with it".

Barely had the Lincoln born Cook had a chance to secure a peg in the changing room at the club's training base at Hartpury College, when he was off on pre-season training camp with his new team mates.

"The first month here was weird. I had a day training at Hartpury followed by a few days off, then we were away to Tignes. So, from Cornwall to France in the space of a week. It was good to get to meet with all the boys and basically learn how we were going to play."

After 3 years and over 1000 points at the Mennaye Field with the Pirates, the chance to play for Gloucester in the Aviva Premiership was one Cook relished and he was determined to make the step up from the Championship.

"The main thing is the intensity, not just in the game itself. The training intensity is massive, and everyone is watching you constantly, monitoring you all the time.

"The step up isn't massive, but it's just little bits in each area which allows you to improve your game. And being surrounded by quality

Cook isn't the only player at Kingsholm this season making the step up from the second tier of English club rugby.
Sione Kalamafoni joined from Nottingham and Shane Monahan spent time at Rotherham Titans last

season - both of them have excelled in the Aviva Premiership so far this season.

"If you look at a lot of the boys from the Championship, like Matt Hopper from Pirates, who have made that step up from the Championship, it's a great testimony to the quality of rugby at that level.

"Even if you look at London Welsh, how well that they're doing, it shows those lads can step up and is a great advert for the league."

It didn't take Cook long to record his first Gloucester try, and there was no better way to introduce himself to the Kingsholm crowd than to score a try in the West Country derby against Bath

"It's always nice to score a try, especially in the first West Country derby. It was a really nice moment for me – made by Sinbad but it was good to get in for the try, especially in front of The Shed! It's probably the loudest anyone has celebrated one of my tries."

And, after attending school in Leicestershire, the game against Leicester Tigers was always going to be a special one for Cook.

"The game against Leicester was amazing; the atmosphere was like nothing I'd experienced before. The way the crowd got behind us was fantastic. I think that game



really set us up for the season.

"Growing up in Leicestershire, I have followed Tigers for a long time and to play against them and then beat them was amazing. Even getting carded, but we won't mention that! That was an awesome game!"

Most recently Cook got to show off his attacking skills with a try in the 47-3 win over London Irish with a super long range effort

"Getting on the score sheet is always nice, but it didn't really much when Shane scored four! It was really nice to bring more of my attacking game, as I felt I haven't really shown what I can do with ball in hand so it was nice to get a little run"

Looking ahead to 2013 Cook has high hopes for Gloucester and himself.

"For the team, we need to keep going well and really nail down a top four finish as that's our aim and, in the other competitions, just keep doing what we've been doing and qualify in both of those and hopefully we'll be flying.

"Personally I'm just happy to be here at the moment. I've been given my chance and I've taken it, and it's now just a case of going on consistently and keep doing what I've been doing.


"There's things I need to improve on which I'm addressing then we can just go from there."

But what does he think about England's latest series win in India?


"I think Monty (Panesar) should've been picked in the first test but they did really well to win the series.

And last weekend Irish gave table topping Harlequins a close run for their money. You can't help feeling that their position just above the dreaded 12th position in the table is a bit false, and that it's only a matter of time before they put things right.

A look back over their fixtures through the first half of the season shows that an awful lot of their games – particularly at home - have been close run things. Away from the Mad Stad though, they have not fared so well.

I've always had a bit of a soft spot for London Irish, maybe because when I was exiled in London I lived very close to their spiritual home at Sunbury, and a good friend's son was on their books as a junior, so I spent quite a bit of time down there.


No place for sentimentality though, and I'm hoping that our own exiled Irishman – Shane Monahan – can repeat his four try heroics and become a one man bonus point again.

May 2013 bring you all you dream of – so that'll be a top four finish and a great win over Saracens at Twickenham in May then!



Two of the Aviva Premiership's in form teams went head to head at Kingsholm three days before Christmas, both looking to secure a morale boosting win.

Gloucester were in fifth place in the table before the game, and Exeter sixth. Precious little separated the teams, and it remained that way at the final whistle with Gloucester clinching a narrow 18-16 victory.

Either team could have won on the day to be honest. There was very little in it.
But Gloucester found themselves in the ascendant at the final whistle and, as a result, took the spoils.

Weather conditions played a huge part in the way proceedings unfolded. Heavy rain leading up to the game made the pitch heavy, and the rain continuing throughout the 80 minutes, rendered ambitious ball handing inappropriate.

A strong wind also blew towards the Lion's Den, and the Chiefs opted to play with this advantage at their backs in the first half.

They did so adroitly, not hesitating to pin Gloucester back whenever the Cherry and Whites coughed up possession.

The move ended with Jimmy Cowan being held up over the line. However, Rob Cook's contribution deserved a better outcome.

The full back produced a sublime chip and catch over the Chiefs defensive live, which set up the position from which Cowan so very nearly scored the first try for Gloucester.

Gloucester had created the best try scoring opportunity when Jimmy Cowan was held up over the line, and could feel positive about their second half prospects.

They reckoned without a resilient second half performance from the visitors. They certainly wouldn't have underestimated Rob Baxter's side. However, they probably didn't expect the Chiefs to dominate possession quite so much.

Playing into the wind, the Chiefs kept it tight and kept the ball away from Nigel Davies' side. Trailing 12-6 as Burns added two more penalties, Exeter took control of their own destiny.

Steenson kicked his third penalty to narrow the gap to 12-9, before a patient build up, maintaining possession for nearly 30 phases, ended with hooker Simon Alcott scoring the game's only try.

The scene was now set for Exeter to squeeze the life out of the game. However, a dogged and resolute Gloucester weren't quite done yet.

They kept their heads and got their hands on just enough possession to maneouvre themselves into position for Burns to keep his cool, kick two penalties and ease his team into a nervy 18-16 lead.

Cool heads were now called for, and Gloucester shoved the ball up their collective jumper to take time off the clock.

The Chiefs had one last scrap of possession, deep in their own 22, but a knock on killed their hopes and ensured a Merry Christmas for Gloucester.




Several months ago, Gloucester Rugby travelled to Welford Road on the back of three very good victories, but slumped to a heavy 36-3 defeat.

The 2012-13 Gloucester team are a completely different outfit though, and came incredibly close to clinching a rare away victory at Leicester.

Backed by a sell out 24,000 crowd, the Tigers threw the kitchen sink at Gloucester, whose defence buckled at times but never broke.

Even when under the cosh at scrum time, and with prop Shaun Knight in the sin bin, Nigel Davies' side refused to capitulate and

restricted the home team to a solitary penalty from fly half George Ford.

However, Gloucester made more of their rare forays into Leicester territory, with Freddie Burns landing two penalties to give his team a 6-3 half time lead.

The Welford Road crowd was getting restless, and the boos directed towards Gloucester hinted at a job being well done by the Cherry and Whites.

When Burns added a third penalty early in the second half, after another spell of pressure from the Tigers, the atmosphere was becoming distinctly hostile.

Gloucester needed a period of consolidation, a few minutes to keep Leicester at bay and increase the frustration in the home camp.

However, direct from the kick off, Gloucester failed to clear their lines and a try eventually resulted for former Kingsholm favourite Anthony Allen. Leicester were back in the game and so was the crowd.

Ford added two penalties, but Burns kept his side in the match with a well struck effort to set up a frantic final few minutes.

The Tigers tried to close out the game, as they have done so many times before, but Gloucester were in no mood to simply roll over.

The home side were forced to defend their line as if their lives depended on it, pressure that was built up even more when the Gloucester pack destroyed a Tigers scrum with no time left on the clock.

Again, the action was all on the Tigers line but a timely turnover saved the day and Gloucester were left to reflect on a case of so near and yet so far.
