


CAPTAIN'S Corner

For all that, we showed the team spirit that has characterised so many of our performances so far this season, and we very nearly snatched it at the end.

The initial reaction was huge disappointment at having come so close and having led on the hour mark but, having had a chance to think about it, we did at least take the two points.

The important thing is not to waste the effort of the past two weekends, and to kick on against Worcester this evening.

The games between Gloucester and Worcester are always hard fought affairs and they'll come here tonight looking to bounce back after losing at home to Northampton last weekend.


It's not far for their fans to travel, so they'll probably have decent support but, hopefully, the Gloucester fans will more than drown them out!

elcome to Kingsholm for our latest Aviva Premiership fixture of the season.

It's been a slightly unusual week for us in terms of our preparation. The fact we played at London Wasps on Sunday, and have been dealing with a five day turnaround, has meant that we've had to work a bit differently this week.

we channel our emotions in the right way to be effective.

Worcester are fighting hard in the Premiership to ease clear of the bottom three teams, while we're trying to force our way into the top four. There's a lot at stake for both teams.

They're going to be a tough opponent, there's no doubt about that. They've

put in some good performances recently, without necessarily getting the results that their efforts deserve. They will be hoping for more this evening at Kingsholm where they've had some good results in recent years.

One other change for us this week has been that we've had a couple of training sessions here at the stadium. We've been on the road for a couple of weeks, so I felt it was important for us to reacquaint

ourselves with our home stadium.

There has been the odd occasion when our players have looked a little bit on edge when playing at home. I think if they can relax a fraction, then we'll really see the type of performance here that our fantastic supporters deserve.

We've played some good rugby away at Northampton and Wasps and, I think that if we play that way here at Kingsholm, the crowd will really respond to that and a big performance could follow.

This is our only home game in this batch of four fixtures. We've taken six points from two games, which isn't a bad return. But it's important that we deliver a performance this evening that backs up those two displays.

Counting the casualties must not derail Gloucester's train of thought for this vital clash with Worcester, believes Nick Wood.

Sunday's battle royal at Wasps and its lingering toll on the Kingsholm squad has comfortably crept into midweek.

The Cherry and Whites had a tight turnaround from Sunday to Friday in any

case – but the bruising, brutal nature of the 33-29 Wasps defeat has only exacerbated that

Akapusi Qera slumped out before halftime with a stinger to the neck restricting arm movement. Wood was proud with how the team fought back to get a bonus point against Wasps last weekend His replacement Matt Cox played throughthe pain of a hand problem, while Rupert Harden battled manfully as Gloucester's only available frontline tighthead prop.

This has been a week where finding enough fitness to take the field has been a challenge in itself.

But the unfazed Wood said Gloucester must strike the war wounds from their minds, patch themselves up – and win a battle of mental fortitude against the Warriors tonight.

"You can't ask too much on the training field in a week like this," admitted the 30-year-old from Cirencester. "It's got to be light, to give guys a chance to recover, and be in a fit state to get out there again.


"Everyone knows that's the case and no one has any qualms about it – but it's important to be aware of the impact that has, to give people the time they need to be ready.

"In weeks like this the biggest battles are the mental ones. You've got to be switched on and focused all the time.

"We can't rely necessarily on certain things from the training field to put us in the right frame of mind to go and produce the kind of performance we'll need against Worcester.

"So instead we have to get to that place internally almost – we've got to be ready for another massive battle."

Gloucester's late two-try rally at Wasps



brought both the losing and the four-try bonus points on Sunday.

Wood reckons a wayward quarter-hour in the second-half cost the Cherry and Whites a potentially pivotal Premiership victory.

But he remains confident Nigel Davies' men can still force their way into the league's top-four play-off places – provided they build on six match points from their last two matches, at Northampton and Wasps.

He continued: "At the start of that 15 minutes of madness, we kicked off, regathered the ball, they knocked on, and we had a scrum.

"Then we failed to control the ball in the contact from the scrum. Once they've done that the challenge is not to let them do it again, or not to let them break down the wings certainly.

"We started to get a little bit loose, and so it was up to us to focus on what had been our strengths in the game to that point, ask ourselves what had we done to control things and get ourselves in that position.

"It probably took us 15 minutes to recover that, gather our thoughts and challenge for points at the end.

"We're always going to come under pressure in matches – but it's about how you respond to it that counts.

"And hopefully we can be that little bit quicker at countering that kind of pressure this weekend.

"I think we can carry 60 to 65 minutes of the Wasps game into Friday night. We've just got to cut out that 15 minutes of mayhem that played exactly into Wasps' hands.

"We've got to look to the bigger picture. We said we had to go to Franklin's Gardens and Adams Park and come away with something from both games – and we've done that

"We're not happy that we didn't win at Wasps, but we know where we came up short

"But look at the situation at 33-17 down, we could have left with nothing and that would have put a totally different complexion on what comes next.

"It's an 80-minute game and we fought all the way, and we should be proud of that.

"We recovered from that terrible 15 minutes – even if it was slightly sluggish – and we have to carry that forward."

NEIGHBOURS RARELY MET

Although Gloucester and Worcester first met in 1877, today's match is only the 21st between the clubs. In the series to date, Gloucester have won 13, lost 4 and drawn 3, with a points difference since modern scoring values were introduced of 388 against 279.

Three of those matches have been cup encounters – all won by Gloucester. In 2008-09, Worcester did the double over Gloucester, but this is the only occasion on which they have won at Kingsholm.

FIRST ENCOUNTERS

17th November 1877 Worcester - nil Gloucester - 8 goals, 4 tries

This fixture was arranged when the Worcester club was re-formed after a gap of 2/3 years.

Worcester won the toss, and elected to play with the hill, but it quickly became apparent that the visitors were too strong, and by half time Gloucester had racked up 5 goals and 3 tries

Gloucester were led by Frank Brown, who was in the second of his seven seasons as captain. Also in the team were the legendary Boughton brothers, Jimmy and William. Frank Brown scored four tries; there were three for William and one for Jimmy, who also kicked eight conversions.

12th November 1881 Worcester - nil Gloucester - 1 goal, 2 tries

Four years passed before the next fixture between the clubs. Although Gloucester won again, the margin was much closer, with H V Jones and H E Taylor scoring tries, and H J Berry converting one of them.

However, there were problems. The home crowd prevented the second conversion from being attempted, and invaded the pitch several times during the game.

Whether this caused a fracture between the clubs at the time is not known. However, there was a return fixture scheduled at the Spa on 7th January 1882, for which Worcester failed to put in an appearance – it went into the Gloucester records as "Not played; Worcester funked".

Following this, the clubs did not play each other again at 1st XV level for 117 seasons. For most of this time, the reason was the

relative status of the clubs, with Gloucester's fixture list featuring the best clubs in England and Wales, whilst Worcester had a more parochial and less demanding fixture list.

THE PROFESSIONAL ERA

9th January 1999 Tetley's Bitter Cup Gloucester 31 - Worcester 17

It was the Tetley's Bitter Cup which finally brought the clubs together again. Gloucester's tries were scored by Chris Fortey, Steve Ojomoh, Philippe Saint-Andre, and Mark Mapletoft, who also kicked a conversion and 3 penalties.

PREMIERSHIP DEBUT

Guinness Premiership: 16th October 2004 Worcester 13 - Gloucester 18 29th January 2005 Gloucester 28 - Worcester 16

Worcester were promoted to the Premiership for the 2004-05 season, and so began a regular sequence of matches.

Gloucester won the first league game with tries from Jon Goodridge and Henry Paul, who converted one, and Duncan McRae kicked a drop goal.

Gloucester also won the return match at Kingsholm later in the season, by 28-16, with tries from unusual sources - Seti Kiole (his first and only league try, during his one season with the club), Andy Gomarsall (his only try that season), and Terry Sigley (his only try in his two seasons with the club), 2 conversions and 2 penalties by Henry Paul, and another drop goal from Duncan McRae.

MEMORABLE MATCH

22nd April 2006 European Challenge Cup semi-final Gloucester 31 Worcester 23

The clubs met for the second time in two weeks in front of a packed Kingsholm to play for a place in the European Challenge Cup Final.

The premiership encounter of the previous weekend had gone Gloucester's way but they

had a fight on their hands in this stirring cup tie.

The first half served up some terrific rugby. After an exchange of penalties between Ryan Lamb and Shane Drahm, Lamb ran back Nicholas Le Roux's kick ahead and James Simpson-Daniel finished off the move.

Then a long pass from Lamb sent in Anthony Allen and Lamb's conversion gave Gloucester a 15-3 lead. Back came Worcester and converted tries by Drahm and Pat Sanderson put the visitors 17-15 ahead at half time.

When Drahm scored a dropped goal and penalty early in the second half, Gloucester had some work to do, but Worcester then tried to sit on their lead.

With their pack tiring, they conceded three penalties and Gloucester were back in front by a single point.

Then came the highlight of the half when Lamb put a perfectly weighted cross field kick into the grateful arms of Mark Foster who scored the match clinching try. Lamb converted to make the final score 31-23.

Gloucester then went on to win the trophy, beating London Irish 36-34 after extra time in a memorable final at The Stoop.



here are few sights on a rugby field that send a buzz of anticipation around Kingsholm more than Jonny May receiving the ball with a bit of running room.

The 22 year old has provided some genuine highlight reel moments over the past year or so. It's difficult to choose the best – the solo score in the LV= Cup against Sale Sharks last season? Maybe you prefer his brilliant effort against Harlequins in the Premiership?

And he quickly caught the eye of rugby followers well beyond the GL1 post codes. He was named LV= Breakthrough Player of the Year for 2011, that try against Harlequins was voted Try of the Season and he was called up to England's tour of South Africa in the summer.

All was set fair for this season until, in the home fixture against London Wasps, the Swindon born player injured his knee. It was a frustrating injury, one that lasted longer than originally thought.

"We looked at it, and it tested quite well, the specialists said that it was only a grade one and they thought it would be five weeks. But you don't really know until you start running so I was only about 90% for about two months.

"So, it took three or four months to be back where I wanted to be which really took a lot out of my confidence. I said to myself I had to make the most of a bad situation and try and come back mentally stronger."

He's not been alone in the treatment room, of course. Several of the Gloucester squad have been sidelined for lengthy periods. But they all laud the work put in by the medical team to get back to fitness, and the sterling work put in by the strength and conditioning staff in helping them back to action as soon as possible.

"We all say that we take so long to get fit because we're getting worked so hard! We're all up at 7am for a swim with Paddy Anson and then weights, watt bikes, all sorts.

"But, to be fair, Olly Morgan deserves a mention, he's leading the

standards in all aspects. He's got a longterm injury but he comes to work every day and works really hard. He's looking in good shape and hopefully we'll see him playing by next season."


Despite the plaudits last season, May was already looking at ways to improve his overall game. His untimely absence has given him further time for reflection.

"I set out for the season by almost taking a step backwards from my game in terms of going away and working on some defensive work and kicking to improve myself and become a more rounded player. I felt that was going really well, and I was about to start kicking on again. But then I got the injury, so that was frustrating, but it's given me time to focus on my game and where I want to play.

"My main focus is on the left wing now and my plan is to come back stronger. I'm working harder than ever and I'm running quick again. I even ran my best 10m time last week."

After all that time in rehab and work in the gym and pool, May's opportunity to return to the first team was in the Amlin Challenge Cup, and the narrow win in Bordeaux which was a massive relief for him.

"My first goal for that game was to get through it. To be honest, my knee was still feeling a bit niggly, but I trusted the medical staff and it's got better week on week now, and I'm not really feeling it anymore. But I was pleased to get through those 70 minutes in Bordeaux without getting hurt!"



With Gloucester experiencing injuries to almost a whole backline at times with himself, Olly Morgan, James Simpson-Daniel, Henry Trinder injured in addition to Freddie Burns and Billy Twelvetrees being away on International duty, May appreciates the strength in depth within the squad, and is pleased with how the team has done in the meantime.

"We have no real superstars in our backline, other than Mike Tindall really, but we're just a bunch of really hard working lads working towards something special. We've got good strength in depth with lads like Martyn Thomas, Shane Monahan and Cooky (Rob Cook) who have come in and done as good a job as the rest of us so huge credit to them."


Now May is back in the action, it's time to make an impact at the crunch time of the season.


"Obviously, it's worked out better that I missed the start of the season than the end, so hopefully we can all get together, push and get that top four spot!"

"I need to keep working hard during the week and do my role for the team. If we all pull together there is no reason we can't get into the top 4.


"We're in the middle of a tough set of Premiership games, we'll know where we are at the end of them and we're determined to do well.

Kingsholm and lights though... there can only be one outcome!



Gloucester Rugby rounded off their 2012-13 LV= Cup campaign, knowing that even a victory over local rivals Bath would not be enough to secure qualification for the semi finals.

The last minute defeat away at the Ospreys in round one, and 26-7 reverse at Northampton the previous weekend had put an end to Gloucester's ambitions, but there were still local bragging rights at stake.

Gloucester were also defending an unbeaten record at Kingsholm against their local rivals that stretched back to February 2006.

The Cherry and Whites, backed by a vocal and passionate crowd, gave it everything in the first half but things didn't go according to plan.

Bath kicked off with a strong wind at their backs and made the most of it to dominate territory. Gloucester were on the back foot, and their cause wasn't helped as referee Davies issued yellow cards to Andy Hazell and

Olly Woodburn crossed for Bath after 11 minutes following a good spell of pressure, but Gloucester simply refused to allow the men from the Rec to accumulate any more points.

In fact, Huia Edmonds touched down after a powerful catch and drive, and Gloucester very nearly added a second. Shane Monahan and Charlie Sharples were only denied by superb defence by Horacio Agulla.

Given that Gloucester would play the second half with the wind at their backs, and that they had been under the cosh for most of the first half, there was reason to be optimistic as the teams came out after half time.

Indeed, Gloucester started well and Lua Lokotui was only a yard short of the line following a superb long clearance from Mike Tindall which set up great field position.

However, that was as close as Gloucester got. Bath started to keep the ball in hand to make progress into the wind, and looked a better side. Nick Abendanon's try on 50 minutes was the result of slick hands across the backs.

Gloucester continued to fight, but the defensive effort of the first half seemed to take its toll and Bath took advantage of some tired tackling to run in three tries in the last 15 minutes and give the scoreboard a lop





Gloucester Rugby kept their Aviva Premiership top four hopes alive with a disciplined and well executed 27-11 victory over Northampton Saints at Franklin's Gardens.

It was an impressive performance against a side who, going into the game, were just ahead of the Cherry and Whites in the standings and who had already beaten Gloucester twice this season.

And this wasn't a victory that was squeaked in the final few moments of the game. Once Rob Cook had nudged his side into a 6-3 lead with the second of his five penalties, Gloucester took control and never looked likely to concede the lead.

Cook, enjoyed an afternoon to remember. His unorthodox kicking style was initially jeered by the Franklin's Gardens crowd. However, as kick after kick, bisected the posts, the hecklers

were silenced.

Eor Gloucester fans, there are few more sights in the game more exciting than Jonny May in full flight. Such sightings have been rare this season due to a niggling knee injury. May bounced back in style against the Saints.

His first try saw him come in off his wing to shred the Saints midfield defence. His second showcased the blistering speed that has become his trademark.

However, May will be the first to doff his cap to the shift put in by the men up front – the Gloucester pack.

Apart from the opening few minutes, when the Northampton forwards looked to be flexing their muscles, the Gloucester eight simply dominated the physical exchanges.

The defensive effort was particularly impressive. Time and again, the big Saints ball carriers like Soane Tonga'uiha were simply scythed down behind the gain line.

As a result, Northampton couldn't get any momentum, grew frustrated and started to force things when they simply weren't on.

Gloucester soaked up the pressure, executed well when they had possession and took the points when they were on offer. It was a clinical display.

There were some moments, of course, when Gloucester found themselves under pressure. Phil Dowson's close range try in the second half gave the home side some hope, and there were a couple of key defensive stands from

But, as time ticked on, Northampton grew more desperate and Gloucester's confidence grew. The home crowd started to drift away well before the final whistle, and Nigel Davies' side were able to reflect on a job well done.
