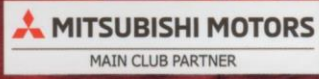

GLOUCESTER RUGBY HERITAGE

THROUGHOUT THE GREAT WAR FROM RECRUITMENT, TO ACTIVE SERVICE AND HOME FRONT MORALE, THE GLOUCESTER RUGBY CLUB AND ITS PLAYERS ACTIVELY 'PLAYED THEIR PART' WITHIN THE CITY.

By August the 1914-15 fixture list had been finalised and both players and spectators alike were eagerly awaiting the new season. Although war was predicted, its impact was unexpected as the Gloucester Rugby Club announced on 2 September that the season was cancelled as it was unable to field any sort of XV.

Those players who had previously served in the Army had, as Reservists, been immediately recalled to the Colours and many were now in France. The remainder – both former and current players – had volunteered en masse with their local 'celebrity' providing an inspiration to join the Colours as the Citizen urged all eligible men to follow the lead of the players. Most enlisted in the infantry, particularly in the 1/5th and 8th Battalions of the Gloucestershire Regiment.

Very quickly intensive and probably inadequate training began at camps with the majority of players billeted at Chelmsford

(Essex) or Perham Down (Wiltshire) by the end of September.

As the fighting intensified the progress of the Reservists was followed in the newspapers but soon casualties were reported as before Christmas the first players, William Hancock and Peter Roach had been killed in action.

On 9 May 1915 the Club's most celebrated player, Henry ('Harry') Berry, a former England International, was killed in action at Aubers Ridge with the 2nd Gloucesters. A flurry of letters from Gloucester men published in the Citizen, described the charge towards the German line which after an advance of 200 yards into No Man's Land was halted as machine gun batteries supported by rifle fire decimated the British troops.

The survivors and wounded lay in No Man's Land until darkness arrived. Private Thomas Priday, a friend of Harry Berry, described how the two of them immediately before the charge, had shook hands and kissed the photographs of their wives and families. Harry Berry's body was never found and he is amongst the Missing of the Great War.

As the volunteer players became soldiers, the 1/5th Gloucesters

XV gained a reputation amongst British and Canadian Army units and challenges were soon issued. With the team sheet of the 1/5th Gloucesters XV reading like the Gloucester Rugby XV, all challengers were vanquished.

Once at the front they continued to be challenged with the games taking place behind the front although sometimes within range of the German artillery! Despite casualties, the 1/5th Gloucesters XV always fielded a core of Gloucester players and went undefeated throughout the war.

In 1915 the front line became populated with the newly trained rugby players who had anticipated facing opponents such as Llanelli, Newport and Bath and not the German Army.

Although a relatively quiet year as they acclimatised to trench warfare, there were still casualties. Ernest Cummings, a scrum half and son of Gloucester legend Car Cummings, was shot in the head by a sniper within 6 weeks of landing in France.

The casualty numbers were

steady but spiked in 1916 during the Somme Offensive when six players were lost on 21 July 1916 alone. The 1/5th Gloucesters had been tasked with capturing a German trench complex at Pozières. The attack lay over ground that was shell-holed, uphill and because of the contours of the land had German defenders in front of and on both sides; there were also undiscovered German machine gun emplacements on the left flank of the attack. The charge by the 1/5th Gloucesters resulted in failure due to the intensity of the machine gun and rifle fire and only five British soldiers managed to enter the German line. All five were killed - four of them were Gloucester rugby players. A fifth rugby player lay dead in No Man's Land. A mile away a sixth player was killed in an attack at High Wood by the 8th Gloucesters on the same day. As a consequence of further battles in 1918 over the same ground, all six of their graves were lost and they are all listed amongst the Missing of the Great War.

While games at home had been declared as unpatriotic in 1914, by December 1916 the Government realised that games could boost home front morale and send a clear message to the Germans that normality was being maintained.

For the next two years the Gloucester Rugby Club organised fixtures at Kingsholm using



players either home on leave or recuperating from wounds to play against other military-based sides. Large crowds generated gate receipts which were donated to the three volunteer-based Red Cross Hospitals within the city.

By the time of the Armistice on 11 November 1918, thirty Gloucester players had been killed, seventeen of which have no known grave and are listed amongst the Missing of the Great War. In addition there were those severely wounded who would suffer throughout the rest of their lives. In recognition of acts of bravery throughout the war, twelve gallantry medals were awarded to the rugby players.

Immediately after the Armistice the Club organised a scratch fixture list although struggled to put out teams as the players gradually came back from the war as the Army strived to demobilise vast numbers of soldiers. The first full season proper began in September 1919.

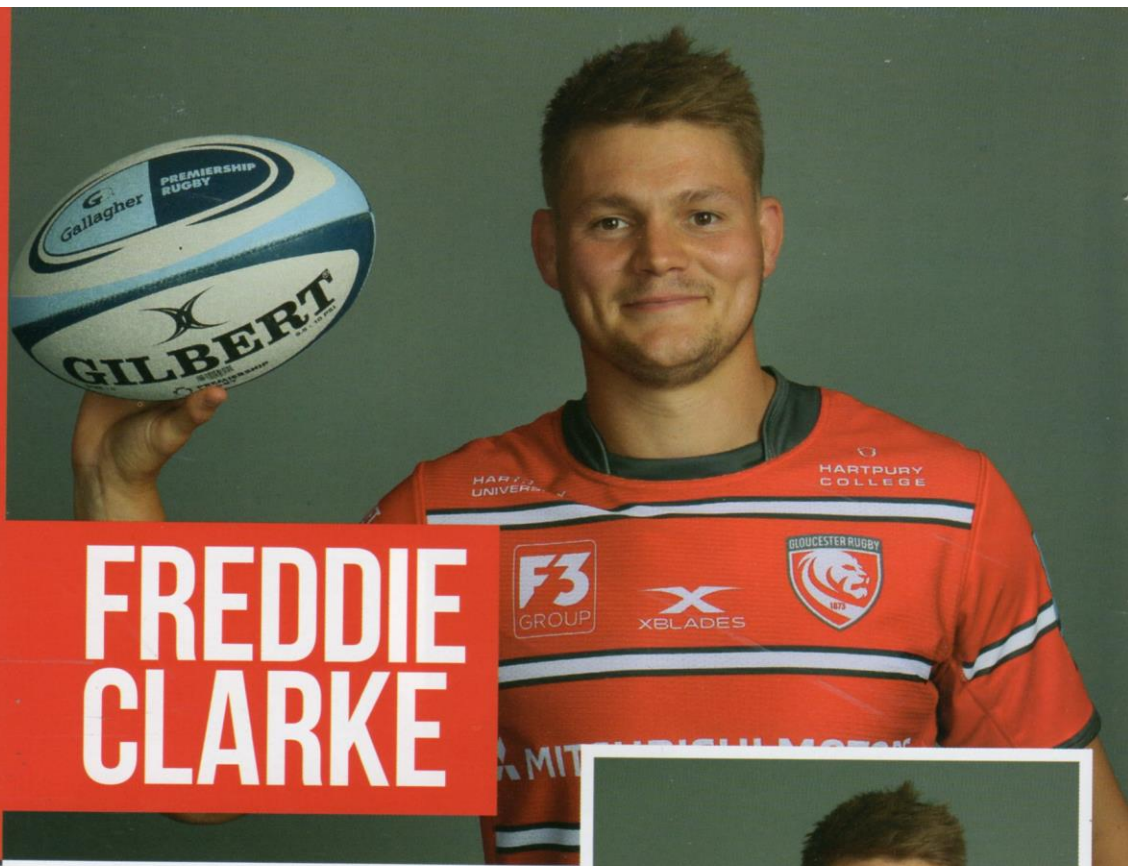
A number of players returned to play and whereas some completed their rugby careers others struggled and only played a few games.



On 25 June 1920 an oak war memorial which now hangs in the Lions Den was unveiled which listed the names of eighteen players who had died in the war. On 12 September 2013 a new war memorial bearing the names of the now known thirty players who had lost their lives in the Great War, along with those from the Boer War and Second World War, was unveiled on the outside of Kingsholm Stadium adjacent to main reception.

OVER THE PAST FEW SEASONS, THIS TOURNAMENT HAS BEEN A KEY OPPORTUNITY FOR THE BEST OF GLOUCESTER RUGBY'S YOUNG UP AND COMING PLAYERS TO PUT THEIR HANDS UP FOR SELECTION, AND NONE MORE SO THAN FREDDIE CLARKE.

Ahead of the 2016-17 season, Clarke arrived at Kingsholm, and the Anglo-Welsh Cup as it was then known, allowed the Wandsworth-born back rower to get his foot in the door as he featured in the four pool games.

He hasn't looked back and, with involvement in all of the first team games before this block of games, Clarke is looking to build on what has been a good opening chapter of the campaign.

"On a personal level, I'm really happy to have



been involved in the first eight games before the Premiership Rugby Cup, and to have been involved with the team, whether it be playing a small part of the game or the whole match.

"I was delighted to get two starts in the Champions Cup block, and on the whole, I've been pretty happy with how things have gone."

A year ago, Clarke was breaking his way into the first team conversation with a plethora of impact performances in the back row, and twelve months on, he is excited to have settled in the squad and pushing on from there.

"I'd like to think I've settled in really well. If you compare me to last year, I was grateful for the opportunity and willing to play wherever. Whereas this year, I'm expecting a lot more of myself, and now I'm disappointed if I'm not involved. So the standards I've set myself have definitely raised.

"I've still got a lot that I want to achieve so I am determined to keep pushing on."

Clarke's opposite numbers in October's Heineken Champions Cup double header in the back row were newly crowned French Player of the Year Mathieu Babilot for Castres, and Peter O'Mahony in Limerick, and the 26-year-old enjoyed his battles on Europe's top stage.

"Definitely enjoyed those, especially at Thomond Park, taking on Munster and the spectacle over there, and it was great to play against those boys.

"You look at those players obviously when you're growing up and coming through the ranks. However, when you come up against them they are just another opponent and you shouldn't really give them too much respect. I really enjoyed it."

When Clarke arrived at the club from London Scottish, he made a great first impression in this part of the season and knows first hand how the young members of the squad thrive when handed the opportunity to impress.



"So, my first year here, I was involved in most of the games in what was the Anglo-Welsh Cup, and that was my first real taste of first-class rugby.

"For everyone, it's a great chance for everyone, boys have got their opportunity to play and make their debuts in the shirt on big stages in the last two weeks.

"From the first team side of things, we can use it to bring back in some of the guys to get some game time after injuries, and prepare for a return to the Premiership."

With Jaco Kriel returning to fitness last week at Ashton Gate, the Springbok adds to a back row unit that is full of exciting talent, and Clarke knows that this is huge for the squad going forward.

"Competition for places is a good thing for us, Jaco is a great player, and will drive our standards up even more and you can see glimpses of what he can do and hopefully that will drive us.

"As a back-row group, we're all driving to start, all driving to improve and all driving to benefit the team."

I have to say that I like the format of this competition a lot more this season, no longer do we have the mind bending conundrums that the old competition gave us of trying to work out what was going on – a simple group structure with a bonus round of derby games to add a final bit of intrigue.

Our first round game against Wasps was a very interesting affair, a bonus point after about 25 minutes and then 55 minutes of not very much really. It would have been nice to have ended the game without conceding a point, but it wasn't to be – Wasps eventually getting over the line long after the 80 minute mark had been passed.

It was hardly surprising that the match staggered to a conclusion, the weather conditions were horrible, so cold – especially for yours truly who had just returned – literally at about 3am the day before – from 30 odd degrees of sunshine. In fact it was so cold I had visions of one of the player's parents coming on and saying to the ref that four tries had been scored, the game was over and the little boys were freezing – like something from an under 14s match. They could have all run in to the clubhouse for hot dogs!

Next up the trip to Bristol, played in what seemed to be an empty stadium. I don't know how many people were there but it seemed hardly anyone, even though one stand behind a goal was pretty full. I guess that's what happens when you play in big stadiums, smaller crowds look tiny – a bit



like London Irish at every home game at the Madejski Stadium.

The game didn't go our way, the first half was simply awful. Nothing much seemed to stick for both sides and the ball spent longer on the floor than in the hands. Bristol got their act together though and managed to take control, eventually securing the four points from the game.

Which sets up today's contest with Northampton very well – the Saints top our group having scraped a score at the death to beat Wasps. So, two teams on five points and Saints on 9. If we can get a good win and five points – and keep them out of bonus point range – then we could end up on top of the group and in a good position for the bonus derby game round.

It was great to see Jaco Kriel making his debut in a Gloucester Rugby jersey against Bristol – his first game for about 11 years or something crazy like that. He must have been burning to get out there to show what he is all about, shame it was such a dull game to do it in. There's no doubt he is one quality unit though and will, as he gains match fitness, be a huge contributor for us.

Talking of huge, we also have Franco Mostert getting himself ready for a run out soon and Ruan Dreyer also recovering from injury. When you add in a few others who are on the sick list at the moment – Willi Heinz and Ruan Ackermann to name a couple – it's almost like getting a third of a new team coming through. Hopefully all will be around soon for the last half of the season.

Maybe some of the more experienced players will be among the squad today as we build up for the return of the Gallagher Premiership next week when Leicester come to town. The stop-start nature of the season is sometimes a bit mind boggling, but then it's the same for everyone so we can't



grumble too much. We have to create space in the season for the international matches after all.

For me there are far too many of them now – not just up north but everywhere. The Rugby Championship down south seems to span around four months on its own. But as we head on into World Cup year these games become a bit more important.

As I've said before, the

international fixtures don't mean all that much to me – the club game is far more important, not least as you can actually get in to watch them! Getting tickets for an international match is almost impossible unless you want to pay a King's ransom for average tickets.

And that's without Eddie's somewhat 'interesting' squad selections. Then again, England won last weekend so I suppose he must be doing something right!

Gloucester Rugby got their 2018-19 Premiership Rugby Cup campaign off and running in some style with a comprehensive 31-7 victory over Wasps at Kingsholm a fortnight ago.

The game was played between two relatively young and inexperienced sides in bitterly cold conditions, with steady rain also having an increasing impact as the game progressed. In the circumstances, both teams contributed to an entertaining game of rugby.

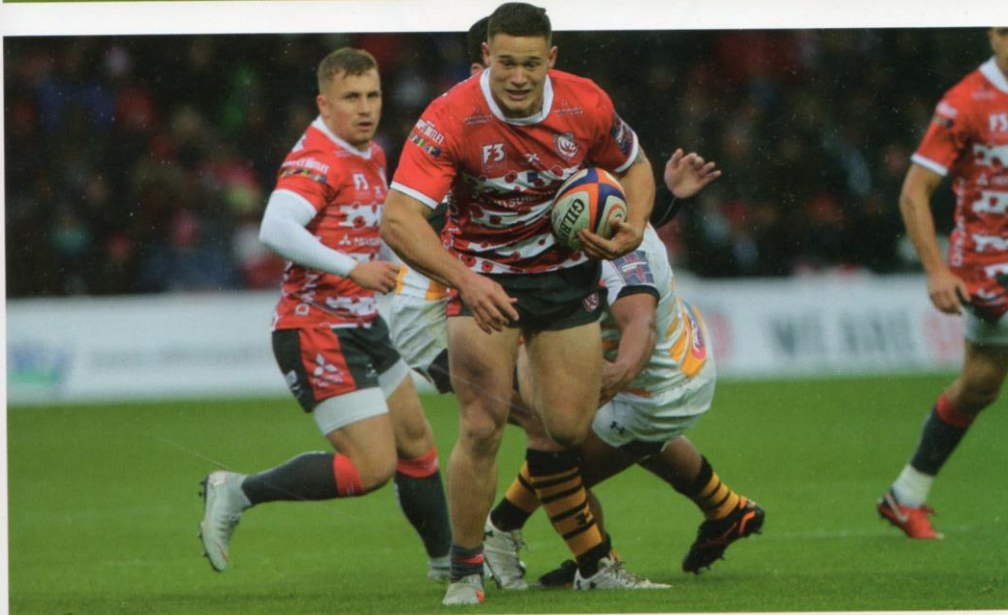
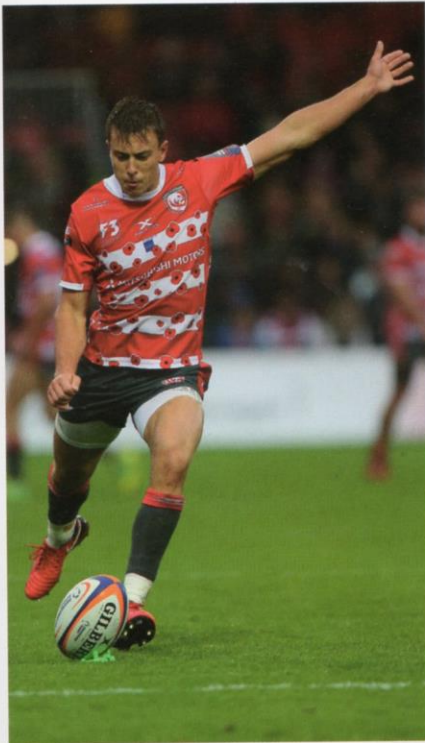
The Cherry and Whites, sporting their commemorative Poppy shirts, took a grip of the game in the first half hour and, despite some spirited resistance from Wasps, always looked in control. Four tries in 23 minutes had the try scoring bonus point in the bag early on and Gloucester Rugby were in cruise control from that point on.

In fact, the young Cherry and Whites looked rampant in those early exchanges, and the visitors simply

couldn't live with the pace. A nice mixture of testing chips over the top, combined with neat handling from backs and forwards alike had Wasps at sixes and sevens.

Cameron Terry had already forced his way over from close range for the game's first try, when Wasps skipper Will Porter was sinbinned as the pressure on his team's defence told.

In Porter's absence, Ben Vellacott



scampered over in the corner unopposed put in by Gareth Evans from a five metre scrum, Lloyd Evans showed good strength to touch down despite seemingly being held in the tackle and Dom Coetzler scooped up a knock on by Wasps to dart over.

Up by 24 points to nil, everything had come off for Gloucester Rugby and the visitors looked stunned. To their credit, Wasps did stem the flow and did threaten briefly as half-time

approached only to lose the ball forward in their best attack.

As conditions worsened in the second half, and both teams made multiple replacements, the momentum of the game was badly affected and scoring chances were few and far between.

However, as full-time approached, Gloucester Rugby sought to finish in style and were held up over the line twice before Joe Mullis showed good

awareness to touch the ball against the foot of the post for his team's fifth try.

With time almost up, the Cherry and Whites continued to try and move the ball wide but actually contributed to Wasps' consolation score as a handling error gifted possession to the visitors and set up a try for replacement hooker Alfie Barbeary. Sunni Jardine's conversion completed the scoring and a 31-7 win for the Cherry and Whites.
