O HERE WE ARE AGAIN CONTEMPLATING ANOTHER MASSIVE GAME AT KINGSHOLM.

The quality of the premiership with the influx of many top international players- not to mention the current crop of domestic internationals- has meant that this season, nearly all the games will be very hard and extremely keenly contested.

The situation Gloucester find themselves in with only one win in three (at the time of printing), has not been ideal. The injury crisis has been well documented. But this is not a time to ponder any shortcomings. Today's game will always have a special place in the heart of every passionate shed head.

Today we welcome Bath and few fixtures in the domestic season stir more emotions in local fans of both sides. Last year Gloucester enjoyed a mixed season against today's visitors. Bath started the 1999-2000 season well as they endured retirements and injuries to key players. They managed to mix a cocktail of young raw players and a dash of Southern Hemisphere talent. Players like Tindall, Balshaw and Borthwick all received International recognition. The Kiwi Jon Preston and Aussic Shaun Berne both stood out, with Berne scoring a Hat-Trick against


us in the first of three fixtures between the two sides.

Two league encounters brought the best out of Bath and, in contrast, Glos failed to fire on all cylinders. This however, made for an even more important Tetley's Bitter Cup match sandwiched between them. Bath had an enviable record of not loosing in a cup match to Gloucester in nearly fifteen years. A hard fought game under floodlights, however, lead to a well overdue Gloucester win.

This pre-season has brought a change in management for Bath, the successes of their player turned coach Andy Robinson has seen him snapped up by England and then the Lions. This should not bring a complete disruption in the sides tactics and practices. Former England full back, and local hero Jon Callard has since taken over in the hot seat.

On the field, they have had a mixed start, loosing their first fixture to Sale they then beat Harlequins at the Rec and Wasps at Loftus Road. They have indeed, managed to score over 30 points in every game. Gloucester's results this season have all been reasonably high scoring although not always at the right end as far as shed heads are concerned. Today's game therefore suggests to be full of enterprise, but, at the same time each scrum, lineout, and set piece keenly fought as if the premiership depended on it.

COACH'S CORNER

WITH JOHN BRAIN

MATCH REPORT: GRFC ACADEMY VERSUS CINDERFORD RFC VENUE: AWAY.

INDERFORD PLAYED HOST TO GRFC ACADEMY XV AS A PRE-SEASON WARM UP GAME AT DOCKHAM ROAD. BOTH SIDES USED THE GAME TO LOOK AT A NUMBER OF PLAYERS AND DIFFERENT COMBINATIONS AND SEVERAL CHANGES WERE MADE THROUGHOUT AUGUST 2000 THE GAME BY BOTH SIDES.

RESULT: WON 35:34

DATE: 26TH

The early exchanges saw Cinderford apply all the pressure and their stronger tight scrummage take advantage and forced GRFC on the defensive. The pressure was rewarded with an early try through their scrumhalf, which went unconverted to give them a 5-point lead.

GRFC gradually came to terms with the Cinderford forwards and forced a lineout close to the home side's try line and from a clean catch and drive by Richard Ward, Tom Miklausic was given the touch down which Joe Goatley converted to give GRFC a 7-5 points lead. Although under pressure up front GRFC held the advantage of extra pace behind the forwards with a good break by James Forrester led to a try by full back Jon Goodridge again converted by Joe Goatley. This resulted in him pulling up with a thigh strain and being replaced by 17 year old Brad Davies. This brought the first half to an end with the score at C'ford 5: GRFC 14.

The start of the second half saw the best move of

the match when the academy ran turn over ball through Rick Doble taken on by Ollie Smith to Brad Davis who put young lock Nick Southern in for a thirty yard dash under the post to score GRFC's 3rd try again converted by Joe Goatley to give the visitors a 21 - 5 lead.

The Academy suffered an injury to LH prop Mark Baker and it was agreed by the home team to have uncontested scrums as no suitable cover was available. This stunned the home team into life and they scored two quick unconverted tries in succession through their driving forward play to bring the score closer at 21:15. GRFC. Reply was immediate with good turn over ball again being ran back at the opposition through centre Ross Thompson on to fellow centre Duncan Murray to score by the posts, again converted by Joe Goatley. (28:15 GRFC)

Cinderford determined to give a good account of themselves started to play some very good rugby through their man of the match centre Rob Jewitt formerly of Lydney. He made several breaks and moved the ball on intelligently for Cinderford to take the lead with 3 unanswered tries 2 of which were converted by Matt Sherratt to put the home side in the lead by 34:28 with just injury time to play.

The academy's reply was excellent, winning the restart kick with a break by lock Marcus Cowles

onto John-Paul Goatley to race over for a try close to the posts which was successfully converted by brother Joe on the final whistle to give the Academy side a good winning start to the season.

The match has given the newly formed Academy squad a good basis for the coaches to work on and they will improve before their first league match at home to Sale Sharks U21's team. The Academy had a further warm up game at GRFC on Saturday 2nd when they took on Bath U19's at Kingsholm....

HE GLOUCESTER CLUB ACADEMY PLAYED IT'S SECOND WARM UP GAME OF THE NEW SEASON, THIS TIME AT U19 LEVEL, WITH A HOME MATCH VERSUS BATH AT KINGSHOLM.

Gloucester had all their new Academy signings available apart from James Simpson-Daniel who was on the bench for the 1st XV and Nick Southern at lock who pulled out minutes before kick off with a thigh strain.

The Gloucester Academy had all the play in the first half and were dominant in all phases, but were unable to convert this dominance into a big points advantage with only a try a piece from winger Marcel Garvey and centre John-Paul Goatley, both converted by Brad Davies at outside half to show for their efforts.

The Academy coaches made wholesale changes at half time to give every player an opportunity to play before finalising the full Academy squad. This disrupted the flow of the match for GRFC and their half time advantage was gradually eroded by Bath taking advantage as the young Academy team tried to reorganise their defence with the new players on show.

Three quick tries, two if which were converted to a penalty by Gloucester's Brad Davies, put Bath into a 17:19 lead. Gloucester continued to make changes to the side, but were unable to get the winning score on more than one occasion.. With GRFC still chasing the game a move broke down in mid field allowing the Bath centres to hack the ball fully 40 meters to score under the post with the visitors conversion being the last kick of the match.

The coaches were generally pleased despite the result with the first team line up, which if kept on the pitch would have undoubtedly won the match for the Academy. But this was a trial match and was used as such to look at various combinations and several new players in a match situation.

The Academy team fixtures start in earnest next Saturday with a curtain raiser at U19 level with a local derby versus Worcester prior to the Bath Premiership game at Kingsholm.


It seems an eternity ago that rugby went "open" though in reality only five seasons have passed since. In some ways the sport has made giant strides. In others it still has a long way to go. In any case, without the intervention of men like Tom Walkinshaw, Nigel Wray and Keith Barwell, the game would not have the base it does now, and few would argue it's not yet ready to stand on its own two feet.

The restructuring, although in name only, of the Premiership and the National Divisions over the summer indicated further that England cannot support more than a dozen professional clubs.

Analysis of the fan bases of the top twelve - in terms of numbers rather than fanaticism - show only Leicester with the sort of average that makes financial sense. Football clubs have for some time used a simple equation that for some off the field stability, the gate money must pay the players wages.

The concept of the salary cap, fixed at £1.8 million, is a sensible one but it's not rocket science that virtually all the clubs - including Gloucester - won't be taking much more than half that through the turnstiles in a season.

One possible answer to raise attendances has been the idea of franchised teams spread throughout the country. The promotion of Rotherham has given the north a much better balance, but what would happen in both the home counties and the west country? Bristol, Bath and Gloucester might be forced to compete for two spots, and at least one of the clubs in the south east might lose their place as well.



Suggestions for "new" franchisees included the west midlands - an area recently in the doldrums - and Cornwall - where surely 1 side would galvanise passion for the game in Penzance, Launceston and Redruth.

Even if this concept should be discarded, the fact is that the Premiership now stands alone as an elite League, and the gap between it and the rest is in danger of becoming a chasm.

We've already seen in other sports how some clubs "yo-yo" in and out of the top flight, not quite good enough to establish themselves, but too good for the level below. It begs the question whether clubs need to apply to move up, whether promotion should be automatic, or - as has been the case - there's an end of season play-off. Rotherham have experienced both sides of the coin against Bedford in that situation in the last two seasons.


My own view is that promotion should not be denied, but that maybe stiffer off the field criteria might be enforced. If you compare


relative levels, Lydney are playing ABOVE that of Cheltenham Town in football's Nationwide League, and the four Gloucestershire clubs in South West One are parallel with Forest Green Rovers in the Nationwide Conference, who operate a very strict admissions regime. With respect to Gloucester Old Boys, Berry Hill, Cinderford and Old Patesians, none of them, with a good enough side, would trouble the Conference committee with an application. It's an area I believe all clubs need to address.

As far as this afternoon's business is concerned, Gloucester do need a victory after that disjointed display here against Sale, and who better to turn over than Bath. With so many games in these early weeks of the season, the injury situation hasn't been kind, but that's one of the vagaries of sport. It something Gloucester have to rise above if they're to climb the table.






