Two clubs that, during their 'amateur' days and early professional era were as far removed from each other on the Rugby spectrum as can be, now find themselves sharing similar fates. A cursory glance at the two clubs former players reveals a leaning towards high flying London business men at the Middlesex club whilst here at GL1 our players were locals who generally plied their trade using manual skills. A look now however, reveals eerie similarities.

Both clubs have recruited heavily in the past two seasons, securing the services of International legends as players who both have since taken high profile positions on the coaching staff. I am of course referring to the great all black captain Zin-Zan Brooke, and our very own Philippe Saint-Andre.

Both clubs during the summer sought to buy the very best international rugby had to offer buy each signing members of the world cup winning Australian team. Our own Jason Little who arrived on Tuesday and David Wilson (his brother-in-law indeed), the Wallaby flanker who has already made his debut for Quins.


Both clubs now have on their playing staff players who each topped the charts as top point scorers for the Cherry and Whites. The present holder of the number ten jersey Simon Mannix, who is racking up the points and the player he deposed Mark Mapletoft who in his time also became the league top scorer. Tofty left Sarries this summer for Quins.

These comparisons are easy to find if a little tenuous. A look at the league table and a conversation with the coaching staff of either club also leads to another comparison. Both clubs have had a stuttering start to the season, and both are having problems in producing the quality rugby that, on paper at least both clubs should be playing consistently. Their league positions, (9th and 10th at the time of writing), believe the obvious quality and ambition both clubs posses and the coaches are at a loss to explain why. (Save a few injuries on our part)

There and I didn't even mention Richard Hill!

Last year was a bit of an oasis in what was becoming a serious drought of wins for the Cherry and Whites in this particular fixture. We hadn't beaten Quins home or away in a league fixture since November 5th 1994. Last campaign however we beat them home and away. By a point in a closely fought match at Kingsholm and more comfortably away at the stoop last spring. While we wish the Quins team and supporters the best for the season including Mr Hill and 'Tofty' let us hope the waters have not dried up again just yet.



The match started well for the home team with Gloucester having the better of the opening exchanges keeping Sale under pressure both in the forwards and in the backs with centre Duncan Murray making a superb break only to find no support on either side. From the resulting ruck Gloucester were awarded their first penalty of the evening, which outside half Joe Goatley converted to give the home team a 3-nil lead.

Sale's reply was immediate, when a high tackle in mid-field allowed Sales No 10 Charles Hodgson to convert the penalty to bring the scores level. A penalty by Gloucester's Goatley and Sale's Hodgson brought the scores level again at 6-6 before young Academy winger Marcel Garvey became the first player at U21 level to be sin binned for foul play. Sale piled on the pressure and scored a converted try to lead 13-6. Garvey returned to the fray only to see Sale go further ahead with another converted try to lead 20-6 at the break.

Gloucester were disappointed to be down by this score, but a very good defensive display by the Sale team and Gloucester's misunderstanding in defence led to both tries and a deserved half time lead for the visitors. The second half started poorly for Gloucester with Sale converting a penalty within a minute of the restart to lead 23-6 and continued to

put themselves under pressure losing restart kicks and dropping the ball in maul situations to gift possession to the visitors.

Finally Gloucester woke up and in their best passage of play following a break by Garvey, scrum half Chris Walton took the play to the opponents try line and from the ensuing ruck Sale were penalised to allow Goatley to score his 3rd penalty of the match and bring the score to 9-23. Gloucester made several changes bringing on hooker Luke Thomson, brother Chad at 6, Ollie

lamb on the wing and Josh Frape into the centre

bringing immediate results.

Gloucester through there forwards took the game to Sale driving lineout and mauls to keep Sale pinned in their own half and were rewarded with two converted tries scored by skipper Tom Miklausic and hooker Luke Thomson to a sole penalty by Sale. Now with the score at 23-29 Gloucester looked to be in the driving seat only to lose the ball in the tackle and see Sale break away for another converted try by the outstanding player of the night, outside half Charles Hodgson. A further converted try on the final whistle saw a disappointed Gloucester lose their first league game of the season with a final score of 23 – 39.

Gloucester had some good spells and had a very good scrummage, plus the lineout worked well, but they will need to work on restart kicks, retaining possession of the ball and there defensive strategy before there next league match away to Rotherham.

GLOUCESTER RUGBY CLUB ACADEMY

HE ACADEMY HELD THE FIRST OF 3 PROPOSED CURTAIN RAISER'S TO 1ST XV MATCHES PRIOR TO CHRISTMAS AT KINGSHOLM AND IT PROVED A SUCCESS FOR THE SQUAD.

The Academy kicked off and immediately put pressure on the Worcester defence, being quick into the tackle and harassing their opponents into giving away a line out in an ideal attacking position for Gloucester. They drove the lineout several times towards the visitors line and eventually Nick Southern, one of this years new Academy signings from England Schools U18 group, broke through to score to give the Academy a 5 point to nil early lead.

Gloucester continued to put pressure on the visitor's line, winning recycled ball only to have the final pass go astray. This combined with good defensive work from Worcester, denied them further try scoring opportunities. It was from one of these passages of play that lock Tom Skelding created a little bit of history for himself and the Gloucester Club when he became the first player at this age group to be sin-bind for being over enthusiastic at the ruck!

Gloucester used this disadvantage to good use continuing to pressure the visitors line and were rewarded with a penalty from John-Paul Goatley before Tom Skelding rejoined the fray. The referees whistle a few minutes later ended an entertaining first half with Gloucester 8:0 ahead.

At the start of the second half, Gloucester replaced former England U16 group prop Rob Tipper with Nick Kibble after he had been injured at a ruck and a few minutes later the outstanding locally born scrum half Clive Stuart-Smith, who played at half back with James Simpson-Daniel at England U18 group, had to leave the field with a cut head which required 5 stitches. He was replaced by Ollie Sills from Cheltenham.

Gloucester kept up the pressure and had the best passage of play of the whole match, with a succession of well taken tries through Tom Skelding, James "Sinbad" Simpson Daniel, who collected his own kick ahead to score and again it was "Sinbad" who made the break for Drybrook centre and former captain of Welsh schools, Duncan Murray to score under the posts.

John-Paul Goatley converting two of these to put the Academy 27:nil ahead.

Gloucester made several changes now and as against Bath in the previous match, relaxed lost their concentration and were put under pressure by the visitors who sensed they were not performing. To their credit Worcester coached by former Gloucester players Tim Smith and Larry Cummings, now enjoyed their best period of the game and were rewarded with two well executed tries, both converted to bring the score to 27:14. The Academy spurred on by the "Shed" now filling up prior to the 1st team game, gave them great support and were rewarded by an excellent run from another of the Academy's England U18 schools player wing Marcel Garvey, followed by a try from his former team mate at St.Peters, wing Ollie lamb.

The Academy again had it's own piece of history when the referee blew for full time before the conversion attempt could be taken, deciding Gloucester had taken more than the allotted time of one minute allowed this season for kicks at goal!

This was a competent display by the newly formed Academy side, which will play matches at U19 and U21 level this season. Coach's Nick Marment and Andrew Stanley will be pleased with the result knowing they have a talented squad and a goods basis to work from.

All the Academy player's agreed the best moment of the day for them, was the ovation given to them by the "Shed" as they ran around the Kingsholm pitch to warm down, this is some thing which remains in the mind and hearts of any player who has represented G.R.F.C.

REMEMBER IT WELL. SEPTEMBER THE 22ND 1995 - A FRIDAY. I HAD ONLY BEEN AT BBC RADIO GLOUCESTERSHIRE ON A FULL TIME BASIS SINCE THE PREVIOUS APRIL, WHEN GLOUCESTER WERE TREADING WATER FOLLOWING THE DEPARTURE OF BARRIE CORLESS.



Then, club Chairman Allan Brinn announced that former Bath and England scrum half Richard Hill was to be the new Director of Coaching. Imagine it. One of the stalwarts of many a titanic struggle against Gloucester by the men from the Rec coming up the A46 to Kingsholm - but we needn't have worried. Hill may have played for Bath, but first and foremost he was a lover of rugby.

On a personal note I must say here Richard is head and shoulders above anyone else I've ever had to deal with on behalf of the station. He understood the role of the media, never shirked a question (even in defeat), and nothing was too much trouble. I even remember him, before one big match, doing a mock TV interview for some media students after an evening training session - AND it was raining. Many would have refused.

My own memory tells me it didn't take supporters long to warm to Hill. He wasn't blue and black to the core despite his time at Bath, and he set about turning round a Gloucester team with some deep rooted problems with the sort of vigour that would characterise his spell at the helm. On more than one occasion I recall him referring to the players "busting a gut" both in training and match situations, but effort can only take you so far. Quality then takes over. I'm sure Gloucester have less contact sessions now under Philippe.

But back to "Richer Dill" as he was known in some publications. One wonders where Gloucester would be if his policy of recruiting young English players had been maintained - remember rugby was in that transitional phase.



With all deference to the likes of Craig Emerson, Mike Lloyd, Mike Peters, and a few others of their era, extended training couldn't bridge the gap with the first influx of foreign stars - Sella, Lynagh, Stransky, and so on. But Hill's legacy remains. Catling, Fortey, Woodman, Vickery, even Ewens (a target even though he ultimately arrived after Hill left) have all been major players. Hill started what we see today.

Richard's return to Premiership coaching follows a spell out of the limelight after leaving Gloucester in February 1999 after a run of 7 defeats in 9 League matches. Despite this I probably wasn't the only one to be surprised - Gloucester (with the exception of Barrie Corless didn't do this sort of thing mid-season - let alone to someone only half way through a five year contract. The actual conversation between Hill and the club remains the stuff of legend. Telling a trialist he's not wanted at a training session at Oxstalls may be par for the course, but your Director of Rugby? I'd like to think


Gloucester would do things differently given another chance.

In the intervening year Hill has been working as a coaching consultant, mostly at Ebbw Vale but also in schools with projects run by Alistair Saverimutto, the Coventry centre who had a spell at Gloucester under Hill. Then Zinzan Brooke offered him the chance to work at The Stoop - and soon he and Mark Mapletoft were reunited after Tofty failed to uproot any trees at Saracens. The two obviously have mutual respect for each other - and Mark, if he plays, will be assured a warm welcome this afternoon.

Form suggests today could be a close game, especially as matches involving Quins this season have been high scoring affairs. Gloucester desperately need a home win. Let's hope they get it.

Much has been written since the news was first leaked that he was considering joining Gloucester RFC, and the moment finally arrived on Tuesday when he was unveiled at a press conference held in the members bar.

Jason begins a two-year contract with a wealth of experience and a pedigree of utmost integrity. He remains one of the worlds finest backs, still in the Australian starting line-up 11 years after making his debut in 1989 against of all countries France. (Another country well represented at Gloucester this year)

Little's 75th and final test for the Wallabies was in their clash against the South African Springboks in Durban on August 26-the great three-quarter's 30th birthday. Jason has enjoyed a most distinguished international career. He is one of only a handful of players to have played in and indeed win two world cup finals (in 1991 and 1999). He also joined a select band of individuals to captain his country when he led Australia against the United States in last years World Cup.

Little played 105 matches for his native Queensland before moving to New South Wales in 1999. In 2000 he was appointed the NSW Waratahs captain.

A former Australian school boy and Australian Under 17 representative, Little, playing outside centre, made his Test debut against France in Strasbourg in what was to become the first of his many overseas campaigns with the Wallabies.

He established a slashing midfield partnership as a youngster with his good friend Tim Horan which carried on through the two players magnificent careers at international level. Without question, at their peak, the Little-Horan combination was the most celebrated pairing in world rugby.

Success at this level will come only with passion hard work and attention to small detail. As support staff we must ensure that players have everything necessary to recover after matches and training, and to best prepare for the next fixture.

The rise in domestic rugby standards was illustrated by the national teams' performances in South Africa this summer. This has been possible because of the improvement in


players' conditioning. Physically our present squad lines up in a different league to the squad of even two years ago. They are now faster, stronger and capable of working harder for longer periods. To develop our performance still further we constantly seek new information through regular contact with some of the best sports doctors in England and France, and through meetings with fitness advisers and physiotherapists from England, South Africa and New Zealand. We are now better equipped to scientifically monitor and develop players' physical preparation.


The need to focus on detail means that time between games is now measured in hours rather than days: hours of sleep, hours between meals, hours between training sessions and hours late a certain new parent in the squad runs for training! Food quantities are now talked about in terms of grams rather than platefuls and alcohol in units rather than kegs (except in Berry Hill)


The discipline and hard work paid off last season and with continued effort and improvement behind the scenes at Gloucester RFC we will develop still further into a regular at the top of European Rugby.



RIGHT: CHRIS FORTEY IN ACTION AGAINST BATH












CENTRE: Chris Catling is blocked by Baths Kevin Maggs.

BOTTOM LEFT: Chris Yates out paces Bath's Mark Regan.



For me, another plus has been provided by Jake Boer. He was one of those players I had sort of heard of, and I suppose, must have seen on the odd occasion, but I must admit that he had left no impression on me.

When I learned that he was coming here, along with Robert Todd, I felt he


was decidedly the junior partner in the transaction. After all, we're not exactly short of quality back-row men, are we? As things have transpired, I couldn't have been more wrong.

It's never easy fitting in at a new club, especially one as close-knit as Gloucester. Jake Boer however, seems to have taken to the Kingsholm scene like a shark to water, and his slightly mind-boggling work-rate, on both sides of the scrum has been a sight to behold. Competition for back row places is now intense, especially with young Andrew Hazell impressing some very good judges and being tipped for an England 'A' spot.

The third plus concerns the re-emergence of Andy Gomersall as a very real force in the England scrum-half reckoning. From his very early days, he looked like a very special player, but then, he seemed to lose his way at both Wasps and Bedford, and his career was blighted, more than most, by injury. Indeed, he seems to have been around so long that it's quite a surprise to learn that he's still only 26.

Now, he looks to me to be a very high-class performer indeed, and it will be very interesting to see him up against Augustine Pichot next week.

So - there are bright sides to look on, and why don't we do just that ?

It's quite an attractive proposition: sit there enjoying the odd bevvy or two with a group of like-minded mates, watching the Premiership Rugby on Sky up there on the pub's big screen.

The only problem is that it might all come crashing around our heads.

My spies in the trade tell me that Sky are to restructure their payment schedules for the gig pub systems at the end of next month. I don't pretend to be conversant with all the detail, but apparently it all has to do with their new deal with the Football authorities to screen Premiership soccer next season. I gather that landlords will be asked to pay a flat fee rather than taking advantage of the pay-per-view facility. Or something like that.

To give you an idea of the implications, one licencee of my acquaintance has been told that he will be asked to pay around £800 per month, rather than his current £187 for the same period!
