ODAY WE WELCOME OUR GREAT WEST COUNTRY RIVALS BRISTOL TO KINGSHOLM

"THE SUPPORT IN THE SHED IS THE BEST ANYWHERE, THEY ARE FANTASTIC."

It is a fixture that has spanned well over a century, the first game being played on the 24th September 1892 here at Kingsholm. It is indeed the oldest English senior club fixture and was continuously played until Bristol lost their promotion/relegation play-off and had to endure the 98-99 season in Division two.

This fixture is slightly marred for Gloucester Rugby Club as it comes at the end of a week when one of our players has finally lost his fitness battle, and has been advised to quit the most prized game of Rugby. Brian Johnson has been forced into early retirement buy a serious back injury he has been unable to recover from. BJ made his Gloucester Debut nearly four years ago in December 1997, away at Newcastle. Since signing from Newbury he has made 39 appearances for the club scoring 9 tries, playing his final game against London Irish in the last game of last season.

He has gained 5 caps at England 'A' level his debut coming against South Africa 'A' here at Kingsholm. He has also represented the Barbarians in various 7's tournaments. He recalls "I love that style of rugby it obviously suits my game, and to win the Middlesex 7's in 1998 was a truly great occasion".

Brian has managed to combine a successful Rugby-career with a commission in the Army. He has served as a Captain in the Royal Signals and has indeed represented the Army and combined services, most famously when playing against Philippe Saint –Andre who was called up for the Bar-Bars in a game here at Kingsholm.


He Said "I would like to take this opportunity to thank both Gloucester and the Army, specifically the Royal Signals, who have both been excellent and given me tremendous support over the years. It has been a great honour to represent both parties. I have made some very good friends here on both the playing and coaching staff".

When quizzed on his relationship with the shed he retorted "The support in the shed is the best anywhere, they are fantastic". He Added, "Playing on the wing I'm always right next to it at least 40 minutes each game and I can tell you; Northern Ireland, Bosnia, or Kosovo, there is no-where like playing in front of the shed if you are having a shocker!"

Brian has assured us he intends to stay round the club and perhaps enjoy a beer in the shed now on match days.



Gloucester were not helping themselves by there first up tackling and could not get their lineout to function properly. Their cause was not helped with a missed penalty in front of the posts and their skipper LH prop Nick Cox sin-binned two minutes before half time for use of the boot in the ruck! The whistle went for the end of the first half with the Gloucester team well aware they were not performing to their potential. With skipper Nick Cox with a full eight minutes still to run in the sin-bin, Gloucester started the second half in much better fashion, winning a scrum from the kick off and driving into the visitors 22. The forwards recycled quick ball, which allowed John-Paul Goatley at centre to go over for Gloucester's first


Gloucester were now playing some good rugby and putting the bigger Bristol forwards under pressure as they tired noticeably. The ball was being moved confidently behind the scrum and the outstanding John-Paul Goatley stepped two players before putting full back Adrian Hand through a gap to score. The home side were not having the best of days with the boot and the score stayed at 15:11 for Gloucester, the first time the home side had been in front all match.

The Bristol No.8 was also sin-binned for the last 10 minutes of the match for a late tackle. Gloucester found touch and drove into mid field where Nick Cox made amends for his previous ill discipline to break through the centre of a ruck and sprint under the posts to score. This was met with a tremendous roar from the shed, now filling for the 1st team match versus Richard Hills Harlequins!

Gloucester's final try was converted by outside half, Brad Davies to put Gloucester 22:11 points ahead and although the home side continued to put pressure on the Bristol line, they were unable to score more points. With the final whistle a 22 points to 11 victory for the Academy team was ensured!

Gloucester meet Bristol U19's again at Kingsholm on the 9th December in the first round of the National Knockout Cup for Colts and will need to improve their overall performance if they are to progress further in the competition. Bristol will get better and their bigger forwards who caused Gloucester problems in the first half before they tired, will become fitter and more able to sustain the pressure they put the home side under. It promises to be an intriguing local derby and Cup-tie!

MORE THAN LIFE OR

ISTORY RECORDS THAT GLOUCESTER V BRISTOL IS THE OLDEST ENGLISH SENIOR RUGBY CLUB FIXTURE.

"THE AMBULANCE WAS CALLED ON THREE FURTHER OCCASIONS" Played at least once, and mostly twice, a season - apart from a couple of years ago, when the South Gloucestrians opted to spend a season in Division Two, but we won't dwell on that - the Clubs first met on September 24th,1892 at Kingsholm, and to date have played more than 200 'games'.

I have to question the word 'games', which my dictionary defines as 'pastimes' or 'sporting contests', as a correct description of these matches, as it seems that only in quite recent times has a ball been an essential item to the contest. The presence of a ball has ensured that results are more meaningful to the wider audience, and gives referees the opportunity to demonstrate their knowledge of the Laws of the game other than number 26 (Foul Play and Misconduct). Not that foul play would have been condoned by any of the players from previous eras, but since these games were not competitive in a league or Cup sense, the honour of the Cities they represented added just a little spice to the occasion

I well remember arriving at Kingsholm some years ago to watch an early season West Country battle. As I approached the ground, a few minutes late for the kick-off, an ambulance, bells ringing, sped past in the direction of the hospital. Inside the ground, another ambulance was on the pitch to collect an injured victim on a stretcher. On its departure, I discovered there were only 27 players on the park.

The ambulance was called on three further occasions. On one journey it brought back a heavily bandaged Dave Rollitt, before collecting another of his unfortunate colleagues. Throughout the remainder of the game, as more players went off for 'treatment' while others returned, there were never more than 27 taking part in the 'battle'. This was, of course, before the days of replacements.

Recalling this particular game which ended, after 15 minutes of injury time, as a 7-all draw, John Fidler said: "People were getting lumps kicked out of them. I remember the ambulance coming on the field a few times. I was carried off and then ran back on because I was missing the fun. It was brilliant!" The participants are now men of distinction - Mike Burton, John

Fidler, Mike Nichols, Robin Cowling, Alan Brinn, Jim Jarrett, Mike Fry, David Watt, Dave Rollitt - who will tell you that their memories of West Country derbies have been among their richer experiences of life.

Those of you of a similar generation will not need to be told that they were all forwards. You see, with so much at stake, and the ball rarely seen, the backs were superfluous - they could fight among themselves to decide who should take the penalty kicks. The fact that the players were born and bred within a couple of miles of Kingsholm or the Memorial Ground induced the pride. But there was another factor which made these epics so vital. And that was County Rugby!

The County Championship was the stage watched by the England selectors. And Gloucestershire, along with Lancashire, were the two strongest County sides. With two of the top clubs within their boundary, the Gloucestershire selectors need look no further than Bristol and Gloucester for their team. It created the North-South divide for both players and selectors. There was as much skull duggery going on among the selectors as there was on the field by players needing to 'score' a point or two over their competitor for a County place. The County selectors held meetings behind closed doors at a hostelry 15 miles down (or up, if you're a Bristolian) the A38. The meetings were heated. Bribes and threats were rife. Ambulances were put on stand-by. But, compromise was reached. It was decided that half the team would come from Bristol and half from Gloucester.

The decision had been made, and the selectors retired to the Bar, happy in the knowledge that they had bridged the divide. It was a few days later that someone, almost certainly a Gentleman from the Media, asked the obvious question. It flawed the selectors; they hadn't thought of that one! More meetings were called. The problem was not who to select, it was should he be Bristol or Gloucester. The North-South line was again the problem.


Deliberations went on long into the nights.

Pubs along the A38 were in danger of running dry! At last, they found the solution, but the public had to wait until the team was announced. It included, at scrum-half, John Cannan from Clifton RFC........... and he was a good player too.

AT THIS POINT OF THE SEASON IT WAS FELT APPROPRIATE TO ASSES THE MOOD OF THE LOCAL SPORTSWRITERS WITH REGARD TO THIS MOST IMPORTANT OF SEASONS. OUR FIRST GUEST COLOMIST THIS YEAR IS ALASTAIR DOWNEY OF THE CITIZEN, TODAY HE GIVES US HIS VIEWS ON THE SEASON SO FAR.

TWO WEEKS BEFORE THE START OF THE SEASON, THEN CAPTAIN IAN JONES COULD NOT WAIT TO MIX IT WITH THE REST OF THE PREMIERSHIP.

Gloucester had been training hard and all they wanted to do was just play. That must seem like a lifetime ago now for coach Philippe Saint-Andre and his squad. Amazingly, today's visitors to Kingsholm, fierce rivals and proud west country neighbours Bristol, will be Gloucester's eighth Zurich Premiership game in less than two months.

It is an astonishing thought. It leaves just 14 Premiership games until the end of the season that is still eight months from completion. The hectic schedule has given Gloucester little chance to recover from their crippling injury list but their season to date is not too difficult to evaluate. Saint-Andre's team has simply not played to its potential. The very foundations on what Castle Saint-Andre was built last season have not functioned with the same competence or stability.

The shuddering home defeat at home to Sale was their blackest hour and in some respects, they have not fully recovered. Victories away at Rotherham, predictably enough and Newcastle, far more fulfiling gave glimpses of what this squad can achieve. But defeat against Bath was debilitating after they dominated the game and their visit to Wasps proved disastrous, but then again it always does. Saint-Andre must have been kissing Simon Mannix's right foot last Saturday after his 27 points put the boot into Harlequins for their first home win of the season.

So where does it all leave us? Two more penalties, one each against Sale and Bath, would have handed Gloucester eight more points and they would now sit roughly third in the Premiership.

It proves the gap between success and failure is hairline in today's cosmopolitan professional world. Ian Jones' decision to stand-down was an honourable one, but the position needs to be resolved quickly.


Gloucester enter the Heineken Cup at Llanelli next Friday and they must have their house in order before that trip. In the opinion of many, including this scribe, there is only one candidate. He led Gloucester to third place last season and Kingsley Jones should now once again be handed the Gloucester captaincy on a permanent basis. He is the natural choice and fit or not would give Gloucester sterling service when times are hardest. When he talks people listen. He only says what is necessary and the time now for talking has stopped.







TOP LEFT: Gloucester's Kingsley Jones and Harlequins Ben Golling in action.





It occurs to me that that comment could have been made at almost any time during the last seventy years or so.


