

"THE COLOMIERS TEAMS ALWAYS PLAY WITH A LOT OF PASSION, BUT ALSO THEY LIKE TO GET THE BALL WIDE AS OFTEN AS POSSIBLE." N FRANCE, RUGBY IS A VERY IMPORTANT PART OF EVERYDAY LIFE.

Colomiers is very close to Tolouse were rugby is very big, but, also in Colomiers it is very important. Last year they were in the final of the French Championship, and three years ago they were also in the final of the Heineken Cup. Colomiers are a very good team at the moment, with world class players in the squad, Jon-Luc Sadorney, Fabien Galthie. These are players I have played against and also with for the French national team.

In France I know that after Colomiers lost last week, and other French teams lost the week before this will cause a revolution, and rebellion the next week. This will mean that our game will be very physical and very hard.

The Colomiers teams always play with a lot of passion, but also they like to get the ball wide as often as possible. They like to get the ball through the hands and can be very dangerous. If we want to win this game we will need to have a very strong foundation, and have excellent organisation in defence. We will also

have to match them and be very physical ourselves.

Colomiers teams are the best at getting the ball wide, we must be very fit to match them and have concentration for the whole match. We cannot afford to switch off for five or ten minutes. Colomiers like to play on a dry hard pitch so they will have to cope with our conditions here, this may help us.

Tonight is a very big game for us. We are live on television and I hope we get a big crowd. We have the opportunity to win three games consecutively in the Heincken Cup and this will be very good for the club. To win though we must play the best rugby we can. We must follow the game plan and play like we did away at Llanelli. We must be very organised in defence and aggressive and committed in attack.

I am looking forward to playing under the lights it will make the game very exciting. I will have to concentrate even more as we are playing a French team. The next two games will be very hard. We need good support this week and then focus on what will be a very tough game in France.

# THE FRENCH CONECTION

F YOU TRY TO DISCOVER COLOMIERS ON A MAP OF FRANCE, YOU WILL FIND IT WAY DOWN ON THE SOUTH MEDITERRANEAN COAST, NEAR TO A NUMBER OF PERHAPS MORE FAMOUS FRENCH RUGBY TOWNS, SUCH AS BEZIER, NARBONNE AND TOULOUSE.

It is a beautiful place, also famous for its fine wines.

There has been a remarkable rugby migration from this sun drenched Mediterranean coastal region to the less blessed terrain of Gloucester. Our European Cup squad contains no less than four French players, three of whom previously played in this region - Oliver Azam and Stephane Sanchez played for Montferrand and Franck Schisano played for Narbonne.

Gloucester's French Connection is amazing. As well as having four frenchmen in today's squad, our Head Coach, Phillipe St Andre, is one of the great all time French International players.

We should not forget that in France this man is a legend. He played 69 times for his country and was captain a record 35 times. He holds this record jointly with Jean Pierre Rives, but stands above him as he was captain for 29 consecutive games. He also played for Montferrand in Southern France and has the explosive temperament native to that region - just ask the players!

Gloucester's cosmopolitan chemistry is now begining to ignite. Take a dash of Mediterranean temperament, add some solid Westcountry Grit, stir in Southern Hemisphere power, then put it before a fanatical local crowd in the world famous stadium that is Kingsholm and let battle commence!

Tom Walkinshaw has enabled Gloucester to transform itself from being the most traditional club in British rugby to what is now a truly international team. Miraculously, this has been acheived without losing the essential character of Kingsholm and Gloucester. Good rugby is still good rugby.

Sunday was a big day for you; do you remember much about it?

I remember being just behind Tom when he caught the ball for his last try. I just shouted 'Go

Beimy', I new I didn't have the legs to catch him but then no one else did either. The game was a bit of a blur really, you can't think about much when you are actually playing. There's too much going on.

You looked very confident when you stripped off, were you nervous at all?


I was very nervous when I went on. I went on as hooker, which is a position I've not played in a match before. So instead of lifting at the line out I was stood there thinking oh no the ball will come to me and I'll drop it. Kingsley was great; he just said play your own game.

How did you calm your nerves?

They got offside quite quickly and so we had a scrum early on. Then a ruck formed which I hit and I thought to myself, there is only 10-15 minutes to go so just get on with it.

When did you know you were in the squad?

John Haines phoned me on Wednesday morning, as I was about to get on the bus to go down and play Exeter Uni. He phoned back Wednesday night to confirm.



You had a long time to think about it then. What was going through your mind?

All week people were saying you'll get on and it will be a great win and it will be great. I was just

trying not to think about it too much. In my own mind I was dying to get on, but I didn't want to be disappointed.

Did playing on Sunday affect your build up to a the weekend?

Saturday was a bit weird, I decided not to watch the colts game because I don't like watching games I could be playing in. I went home to my parents. I stayed in Saturday night and just watched T.V.

Did you get chance to celebrate your call up with a couple of beers then?

No not at all, I didn't drink after the game either. I want to concentrate on personal fitness this week. We have played so much rugby that I haven't had chance to focus on my own fitness.

You have been named in the 34-man squad for the European Cup campaign, you've been on the bench a few times, you have now had your debut, what are your plans for the rest of the season?

Obviously I would love to be included again and play, but to be honest any chance I get this season is a bonus. I'm focusing really on the next two years to try and establish myself as a contender for a first team place. I've had a couple of good games for the United this year and I think that has drawn more attention to myself from John Brain and Philippe. Coming from schoolboy rugby where the scrummaging is non-existent to first team is a big step.

I've had to work very hard with the forwards here improving my scrummaging technique. I think it has helped enormously but there is still a long way to go.

Has the Academy helped bridge the gap from junior to senior rugby for you?

Definitely, the greatest benefit of it is being able to train with the first team. I've been living here since July and trained hard all summer with the first team. The U21 fixtures introduce proper scrummaging, added to these games John has invited me to first team training. This was the


difference. I did something like 25 scrums in training last week that must be good.

And what a game. The European Cup at home to Roma?



**OSELEY TRAVELLED TO** GLOUCESTER WITH THE RECORD OVER THE PAST THREE SEASONS OF BEING ONE OF THE BEST U19 TEAMS IN THE COUNTRY. HAVING ONLY LOST TWICE IN THIS PERIOD.

The game played at the Oxstalls saw Gloucester start the match with the slope and wind, this proved a definite advantage as the Gloucester team drove deep into the Moseley 22 and encamped there with Moseley unable to break free. This pressure was eventually converted into points when centre John-Paul Goatley stepped inside the defence and slipped the ball to scrumhalf Ollie Sills who made a tremendous 30 metre break before passing onto No.7 Canadian debutant Ben Olsen, who scored under the post. CONFIDENCE The try was converted by winger Nick Daniel who minutes later raced over for the second try of the match and his second conversion, to bring the score to 14-0 Gloucester.

> Gloucester were playing with great confidence winning turnover ball in the loose, stealing their opponents lineout ball and taking three strikes against the head, to keep the pressure firmly on the Moseley team. Unfortunately the Gloucester team, over played their hand at times and at least two try scoring opportunities were thrown away. Just before half-time, however, they scored again. A strong break by centre Duncan "Red" Murray led to lock Tom Skelding crashing over in the corner for an unconverted try. The half-time score 19-0 Gloucester.


The first 10 minutes of the second half saw a reversal of roles as Moseley pressured the Gloucester line and continuously upset the Gloucester scrummage. The home team lost prop Robin Tipper to the sin bin for continued infringement at the scrum. Never the less perhaps against the run of play, Gloucester broke out of defence and scored an unconverted try through

winger Joe Pointon, to extend Gloucester's lead to 24-0.


Gloucester, back at full strength picked up where they had left off in the first half winning much turn over ball. They were rewarded with a superb individual try by James Simpson-Daniel which was converted by replacement fly half Brad Davies. The final score then Gloucester 31-0 Moselev

Although the Gloucester team were pleased with the final score line, both players and coaches realised they had missed the opportunity to inflict an even bigger margin of defeat. The need to be more clinical when try scoring opportunities are offered must be paramount as they progress to the high standards they have set themselves for this season

# FROM THE COMME



HETHER IT'S FROM OUR COMMENTARY POSITION IN THE STAND OR IN "THE SHED", WEEK AFTER WEEK WE ALL WATCH THE THUMPING TACKLES, EXPLOSIVE RUNS, STEAMING SCRUMS, AND OF LATE, ACCURATE KICKING HERE AT KINGSHOLM, ALL ON A SURFACE THAT'S HAD RUGBY PLAYED ON IT SINCE THE LAST CENTURY.

For the last five years the pitch has been the pride and joy of Dave Balmer, and, latterly, son Gareth. Personally I love to see the grass rolled to give it that wonderful chequer board effect which immediately gives the impression of loving care and attention. I have no doubt that many supporters will remember days when Kingsholm was often a quagmire, but with fewer matches in a season in the professional era, and better management of the ground, fortunately those days have gone.


I recently spent some time talking to Dave , and was fascinated to find out just how much work is involved in maintaining Gloucester's most famous lawn.

The last home game of last season was on May the 6th against Bedford, and no sooner had the last spectators filed out of the ground than Dave was scheduling his summer of work. He had already booked a company called "Euro green" to bring a machine to relieve the ground compaction and to remove half inch diameter, four inch long cores from all over the pitch to improve the drainage. The whole ground is watered regularly during the closed season, with sand, fertiliser and grass seed - a four way ryegrass mix - all applied - some 40 tonnes of material in all.

On a day to day basis Dave is always assessing the state of the Kingsholm pitch. In the warmest weather he often cuts the grass every day, although with the drop in temperature just lately he's not mowing it quite so often. Regular cutting, he says, encourages stronger all round growth. I must remember that with regard to my own lawn!

Preparation for tonight's match really kicked into gear on Thursday. The players normally have Thursday off or don't train at Kingsholm, so it's an opportunity to cut and roll the pitch. Friday is for marking the lines and painting the logo's, with maybe another cut and roll depending on conditions, while on matchday he'll secure the pads around the goalposts and put in the flags, as well as giving the pitch a final check over. I have noticed that since Philippe took the reigns, the grass has seemed that little bit longer. That's the attention to detail nowadays - Dave Balmer will generally ask Philippe, John Brain and kicking ace Simon Mannix for their thoughts before setting the height of the mower.

January is often Dave's most difficult month. Both 2 seasons ago against Quins, and last season in the Cup against Bath, the pitch was cut to ribbons, but it's the effort that's put in throughout the year that helps it recover quickly, and I think you'll agree Dave and Gareth's

efforts go a long way towards making Kingsholm what it is - a superb place to play and watch rugby football.

Two final thoughts. First, Graham Spring's request for spectators to stay off the playing surface at the end of the game is backed by Dave Balmer because compaction is one of his greatest enemies and 1000 pairs of feet tramping across it certainly doesn't help! Finally - if you think Dave's work is over at the final whistle today, think again. There's clearing up to be done - AND he'll be in tomorrow - Sunday - treading down any divots, putting a sand and seed mixture on any bald patches and starting preparations for the next match. Dave , from us all - "Thankyou".

Let's hope Colomiers leave tonight having enjoyed the fruits of Dave's labours but having been beaten by a superb Gloucester performance.



OA: And every game is very hard, there are no easy games. There are 12 very good teams so every game is a big clash. In France sometimes you play against teams that are quite weak. It is very different.


HGM: There are more games and they are much harder.

FS: No,that is not the reason. One team in the region plays on a Saturday night the other on a Sunday to encourage the crowds to come.


Herve how are you finding Gloucester. We have a lot of good players who can play back row. This is good for the club but not so good for you. Are you learning much in your time here?


Franck, because of the way Colomiers play have you done any special training?

And finally, Herve what happened to your hair? it is orange now.


It is not orange it is gold, I always wanted to do it and I did it here because if I had this hair in France my Father would not let me in the house.







TOP LEFT: Jason Little squeezes past Roma's Giovanni Raineri (right).


TOP RIGHT: Terry Fanolua brings down Roma's Luca Corona (bald head).


BOTTOM RIGHT: Tom Beim scores one of his five trys.

In congratulating Tom Beim, it's worth adding that the five-try blitz gave considerable satisfaction to those of us her were very disappointed when he left us to go to Sale. We thought, at the time, that Gloucester had lost the services of a young winger who showed signs of genuine class. It's nice to have one's judgement vindicated in such an emphatic way.


All three players thoroughly deserve the recognition. Back-row turned lock, Adam Eustace, freely admits to being in the midst of a steep learning curve, and doesn't expect to gain much more than the invaluable experience of training with some of the greats of the game.

I'm not sure he's right there. Adam has looked a better and more complete


