Certainly not us. The nearest top level professional Saturday afternoon sport is at least


40 miles away and Gloucester is probably the only city in the UK of 100,000 people that does not have a team playing in the Football League.

The reasoning behind the selection was that we have a squad of 36 players at our disposal, in this squad we feel there is a lot of quality. Some guys had not played for sometime and therefore had something to prove. This made them hungry. On Saturday we picked a hungry team. This was thought to be the best way to utilise the squad.

Gloucester V Bath games are such that players don't need any extra incentives. I think many players came out of last

Saturday's game with a tremendous amount of credit. Jake Boer has had to adapt to a different game plan but we knew what a good player he was, and his performance was very encouraging. Andrew Hazell also, he has had few first team chances but he is a quality young open side and proved this on the day.

The situation we find ourselves in this week is very encouraging and very unique. With the squad of players we have, no one is certain of who the number one choice is, in any position. This is a healthy mentality as far as the coaches are concerned as it keeps players on their toes. This is sometimes difficult for the players, but competition for places is very good for coaches. They all have points to prove and as the injury situation improves this can only increase.

Leicester is a very functional team, they go out to do a job. They have some very good players in their squad with some very mentally hard characters in the side, who are used to winning. They have been together for a very long time and have a very good team spirit. They are traditionally a very difficult team to beat and today will be no exception.

Having said that I still believe that we are capable of putting out a strong team that will be high on confidence, and very capable of getting a result.

Having lost the opening league fixture to Sale, the Gloucester team were determined to make amends and gain some valuable league points to get their season underway.

Gloucester pressurised the Bath line from the Kick off, and within 2 minutes were awarded a penalty which Joe Goatley converted. From the restart Gloucester drove Bath back to their own line with aggressive tackling and rucking, knocking the visitors out of their stride. They were awarded a second penalty as Bath infringed at a ruck. The penalty was successfully converted to give Gloucester a 6-0 lead.

The Gloucester forwards continued to dominate the Bath pack. But it was Bath who scored next. Gloucester encroached offside and the penalty was successfully converted to reduce the deficit to 6-3 after 20 minutes.

Gloucester won the restart kick and forced Bath onto the back foot. Good breaks from full back Jon Goodridge and No.8 Nick Southern, combined with good aggression in the rucks and mauls, forced Bath to defend desperately and prevented them from having any real platform to work from.

The pressure told after 32 minutes, when fly half

James Simpson-Daniels broke right and slipped a deft pass behind him for centre Duncan Murray to latch onto and crash over under the posts.

Joe Goatley converted to put Gloucester into a 13 – 8 lead.


Bath started the second half with more purpose but overstepped the mark when their lock forward was sin-binned for fighting. Not put off Bath raised their game still further to force a line out close to the Gloucester line. A good catch and drive form this lineout saw Bath score a deserved, unconverted try. The score line 13 – 8 Gloucester.

But Bath undeterred, came back again at the Gloucester team who were beginning to tire form their first half efforts and were awarded a very kickable penalty, which fortunately for the home team went unconverted.

Gloucester were finding life difficult against a resurgent Bath team, but were defending well and drawing on the support of the "Shed". They were unlucky not to score when a superb break from James "Sinbad" Daniels took play deep into Bath territory but could not be capitalised on for a score.

LOUCESTER SUFFERED THEIR SECOND LEAGUE DEFEAT OF THE SEASON WHEN THEY PLAYED BRISTOL U21'S TEAM AT THE OXSTALLS, IN A MATCH WHERE THE PLAY WAS DETERMINED BY THE WEATHER RATHER THAN THE DIFFERENT STYLES OF RUGBY!

With heavy rain and wind driving down the slope at the Oxstalls, the elements were going to be a decisive factor. Gloucester lost the toss and started the match with the elements behind them. From the kick off they forced Bristol to give away a good attacking position in their 22, but the size and strength of the Bristol pack was to have an immediate effect shoving the Gloucester 8 off their own ball and enabling them to clear their lines!

This pattern of play was to be repeated in the early stages of the match as the heavier Bristol scrum dictated play preventing Gloucester from gaining any kind of hold on their opponents.

It was from one of these Bristol driving plays that the first score came. They crashed over near the posts for a converted try to lead the contest 7: nil after only 12 minutes. Gloucester, replied immediately, their forwards driving the Bristol 8 back in the ruck and maul through sheer determination and passion forcing Bristol to concede a penalty. Joe Goatley converted bringing the score to 3:7 Bristol.

For the remainder of this half it was all Gloucester. Their pack getting stuck into the Bristol forwards and rattling them. Bristol gave away two further penalties bringing the half time score to 9:7. Gloucester led but faced the elements in the second half.

It took Bristol only 10 minutes to score. A catch and drive from a line out lead to an unconverted try, bringing the score to 9:12. Gloucester clawed back to 12:12, but in the next 15 minutes the game changed in Bristol's favour. They scored two quick tries, one from driving forward play, the other, from some weak Gloucester defence.

The home side then lifted their game. Prop Ollie Smith lead by example with some great driving play. Aided by scum-half, Clive Stuart-Smith, a score was sure to come and indeed it should have but with the line at their mercy, a pass went astray. Still Gloucester kept the pressure on and a fine break by Joe Goatley took play to underneath the visitor's post, the ball only had to be fed wide and another score was on. But in their enthusiasm to score, the ball was kept tight instead and another try scoring opportunity went begging.

Had these opportunities been taken the score line could have been 22:24 and possibly 26:24 in Gloucester's favour, instead Bristol escaped and the score stayed at 12:24 to Bristol. Rocked by the missed opportunities, Gloucester tired and subsequently gave away a penalty, extending Bristol's lead to 27:12. They were unfortunate to concede a converted try at the final whistle, and the score line flattered Bristol.

A GENERATION REWARDED

O, WHO NEEDS PHILIPPE? NO, ONLY JOKING....BUT THE ROLE OF JOHN BRAIN IN BRINGING US HERE TODAY SHOULD NOT BE UNDERESTIMATED.

"Brainer" is a real stalwart of Gloucestershire rugby, bowing out of a long playing career at Twickenham in a winning County Championship XV. His knowledge of the game - and his ability to transmit that to the players in a way they understand - was never better demonstrated than at the Rec 7 days ago.

It's a sobering thought that our 24-18 win was the first at Bath in a competitive game for 29 years. A generation of Gloucester fans had trooped to the Rec, and home again, with little more than "what if's" to debate....although I recall one draw when, ironically, Viv Wooley was in temporary charge. Perhaps that's the policy. Dispense with long term contracts and make everything based on results. Certainly several of last Saturday's team played as if their lives depended on it - with flankers Hazell and Boer particularly keen to prove a point. Today's squad selection will be interesting indeed.

This is the first of three home games on successive Saturdays, and also the first since the match in Colomiers. The evaporation of that 19-9 lead will no doubt be mentioned elsewhere but the 400 or so supporters who made the trip will acknowledge that even in defeat, the weekend was an enjoyable one. Having bumped into Richard Hill and his Harlequins squad at Stansted airport - they were on their way to play Dax in the European Shield - the status of Gloucester's game appeared to be on a different level altogether - as was shown by the way Colomiers found that bit extra when it mattered.

The group now has 3 teams genuinely chasing Heineken Cup quarter final qualification, and the game against Llanelli here now becomes a "win or bust" situation. On the assumption Colomiers will beat Roma at home, Gloucester could still win both their last two matches and not finish top of the group - and therefore risk not getting into the quarter finals at all - though

it would need a complex mix of results to leave them out in the cold with 9 points. Should Llanelli lose here and then beat Colomiers at Stradey Park, Gloucester could finish top - but still probably facing an away quarter final. On the basis fans have been to France already - and are going to Italy - the consensus on the way back from the Stade Selery was that somewhere new would be nice.

Today's game of course rekindles memories of a few other Cup matches against the Tigers down the years. My first Twickenham trip was for the 1978 Cup final, won by Richard Mogg's solitary try. 22 years on, some of the names still trip off the tongue. Sargent and Burton at prop....Paul Howell and Chris Williams at half back and of course, BBC Radio Gloucestershire summariser Peter Butler at full back. More recently, the semi final here in March 1997 was the closest we've been to a Twickenham final for a decade, when hopes were dashed by South African Joel Stransky, who had a vintage day with the boot.

As expected Leicester rattled up a big score against Otley to be here today, and they looked impressive against Pontypridd in their last Heineken Cup game, but if you need any encouragement - other than that from last Saturday's gutsy performance - how about the results of a scientific experiment undertaken by BBC Radio Gloucestershire.

Gloucester and Leicester are, of course, both famous for their cheeses - so we tested the merits of the one against the other. The Red Leicester has been around for some 200 years, while a cheese similar to Double Gloucester was being made in roman times. The result ? A win for the "DG"....because, apparantly, it was more mature, and had more bite than its' more more crumbly east midlands rival.



THE MEN OF GLOUCESTER

THIS EDITORIAL IS BASED UPON A REMARKABLE STORY, WRITTEN BY DAVID KAY, CONTAINED WITHIN THE RECENT NEW ZEALAND V. LEBANON RUGBY LEAGUE WORLD CUP MATCH PROGRAMME.

It concerns the Great Britain v. Australia rugby league test match held at the Sydney Cricket Ground in 1914.

Remarkably, there were four Gloucestershire men playing for the British team on that day, three of them from the city itself. Their names were Alf Wood, Billy Hall and Dave Holland and another Gloucestershire man, Jack Robinson from Stroud, joined them.

This legendary game was the third and final test match of the series. The previous internationals had been played on the 27th and the 29th of June, making this game the third international to be played within eight days! This was the deciding test of the series and the touring team was exhausted and beset with injuries whilst the Aussies had all of their home players available and fit. The British team was depleted and demoralised but received a telegram telling them to "play the Test ...if you lose, lose like Britons. All England awaits." As the weary British team, containing four sons of Gloucester, walked onto the pitch for this deciding Test match, one astute writer, seeing the look in their eyes, scribbled down on his note pad that, "they are going to play like demons today. There is grim determination all over them."

And play like demons they did and they led 9 – 0 at half time, but having lost another two men to injury and with no replacements allowed, they turned around 11 men against 13. The second half was a war, against the odds, of immense ferocity. The British defended their line with such resolve and guts that this game became known as the Rorkes Drift Test Match, after the famous Boer War battle where 130 British troops fought against 4000 Zulu warriors.

According to those who were there, the Men of Gloucester were heroes amongst the heroes. Alf Wood kicked another pressure penalty to make the score 14-0, but Billy Hall was knocked out and had to leave the field with concussion. Then in the last minutes of the game, Dave Holland saved a certain try. Down to ten men against thirteen, after eight days of rugby that had contained three test matches, the British team dug deep and eventually won the game 14-6.


This is what the Aussie press had to say about the British victory: - "Never before in a football match was such defence seen", "the tourists hurled themselves at the man coming head on and sent him crashing back" and "the thin red line held."

Heroic battles against the odds are a Gloucester speciality, a part of the Kingsholm folk-lore and the reason why the supporters accepts nothing less from the team every single time they put on the Gloucester shirt. Is there another club like us, with a heritage like this, anywhere else in the world?


Well I joined the colts a long time ago played well for them and got my chance. I'd say to anyone keep trying hard, train well and don't drink too much. You have to look after yourself.










Don't know about you, but I can't think of a better description of last Saturday's Tetley Bitter Cup win down at the Rec. It will rank alongside other such events, including, I hasten to add in present company, that pulsating last-gasp victory over Leicester under the Kingsholm lights a few seasons ago.

You'd have to admit, however, that most of those memorable victories, with a few exceptions, were won at Kingsholm. This was an away win, secured at, of all places, the Bath fortress where success has eluded us for far too long.

This win, alongside the one at Llanelli, should bury any psychological barrier to winning away from home once and for all. If you can win at Stradey and at the Rec, you can win anywhere.

So let's raise a glass to the Bath ground staff. Without them, there would have been no 'remembered fight'.

AD AN E-MAIL FROM MY OLD MATE MIKE PRICE THE OTHER DAY. THAT'S THE ARTIST FORMERLY KNOWN AS "PRICEY OF THE TUMP"

Actually, he beat me to it by a short head. I had intended to pen a few lines about the sad passing of Wally Burrows, that trenchant three-quarter of the late forties and early fifties.

I'm quite happy to admit that I know Wally best as an occasional drinking companion in the Hucclecote Community Centre, and the Royal Oak where we were sometimes joined by two other departed heroes in Willie Jones and Sid Dangerfield. My job, on those occasions, was simply to get the beer in, and that was a pleasure, just to have the privilege of listening to those old warriors reminisce.

I'm also quite happy for Mike Price to deliver the eulogy, so to speak. So here's what he sent me.

Dear Peter,

I wonder if you could kindly find room in the programme for these few thoughts and memories of 'Whizz' Burrows.

I was so sorry to note in Wednesday's Citizen that another of my boyhood heroes, 'Whizz' Burrows, had passed away. So sad to see his career summed in so few lines in the report. He was, of course, part of Gordon Hudson's great post war team along with Johnny Thornton and the rest. They were a formidable side indeed.

Wallace was involved in the incredible victory over Cliff Morgan's all-conquering Cardiff team. A side unbeaten that season until they arrived at Kingsholm. Gordon Hudson later described it as Gloucester's greatest game of his career and lifetime.

I was only nine or ten at the time standing among the faithful on the Tump and praying for the final whistle. As it is over 50 years ago and maybe the old memory is not what it was, but Whizz was in the three quarters and on the receiving end of Willy Jones inch perfect passes who in turn had been fed by Danny Evans at number nine.

The game was Gloucester's finest hour for Cardiff had no less than nine current Welsh international players on duty that day and all the others were former internationals. The game was later described in the press as the Cherry and Whites versus a Welsh All-Stars fifteen.


