Fired Up Gloucester Extend 'Friendly' Greetings To Glasgow

It seems rather an injustice to describe the fixture tonight at Kingsholm as a friendly. Nigel Melville has commented earlier this week that the idea of a fixture where nothing matters is 'rubbish' affirming that, if they weren't already acutely aware of this fact, players careers are on the line from the word go this evening.

True, that Gloucester have not studied their opponents with the same fine-tooth comb mentality that Premiership and European adversaries can expect this season, but that is all part of the development for the Gloucester squad tonight.

"We will know little about them, our focus will be on our performance, we will react to what they do and see what we do well and what works", explained Melville earlier this week.

I might be pilloried for suggesting this but, the result of tonight's fixture, save for local pride and Kingsholm's proud unbeaten record, is largely irrelevant. The Kingsholm coaches will judge the success of tonight's game on the performance. Get that right though and the result will look after itself as the old saying goes.

With new players, Brown, Brotherstone, and Johnstone looking to make an instant impact on their home debuts and young Academy graduates seizing this World Cup year to make a lasting impression on the senior management, however, commitment and pride are two elements that should be in abundance tonight.

Gloucester has named a squad containing a mixture of youth and experience for tonight's game. The squad resources of each Premiership Club will be tested to the extreme this year, as Premier Rugby and the England Rugby board announced that the Premiership will continue throughout the previously sacred Six Nations period.

A lack of domestic structure through this period was identified by a recent survey of Premiership Rugby fans as an area of major concern. This was cited as a reason for this decision but allied to this must surely

come the commercial viability of the Premiership Club who, as in Gloucester's case last season, often found themselves without a home fixture for over two months during the spring.

Club coaches are understandably vexed by this situation, as they tackle the prospect of being without World Cup tied players for an even greater amount of the season, but they are somewhat appeased by the lack of mid week games, which this new season structure eradicates.

The new season has brought with it a new main sponsor for Gloucester Rugby Club in the shape of one of Britain's leading residential mortgage lenders C&G. 

Obviously the result will not be the most important feature of tonight's game, we will be focused on our performance, and I believe that if we get that right then the result will follow.



Gloucester get to Grips with Judo Training

This pre-season the players at Gloucester Rugby Club had to get to grips with a new type of training schedule as they were introduced to a six week block of Judo lessons.

As coaches strive for the innovations that will give their player's the edge over opponents, they commonly look to other sports for inspiration.

"I gave them specific judo skills and then told them to use them on a rugby pitch."

Gloucester's fitness and skills coach, Rudi Meir, who introduced the Gloucester squad to climbing last season, has once again looked at sports where the physical mechanics can be seen as intrinsic to rugby. "It's easy to look at your own sport and never look outside of it for ideas, but I like to look at a number of different sports and try to relate that into something we are doing. Certainly there are a lot of common areas in Judo that are relevant to us", said the Australian.

"We didn't want to teach the players to be Judo players-it wasn't about that-but we wanted to talk to a massively experienced Judo coach about areas of contact in rugby where he would have highly tuned skills that might be applicable to us", he added.

Gloucester enlisted the help of current JudoWorld Masters Bronze Medalist and former Ju-Jitsu World Champion Dave Kavanagh.

Kavanagh, a Judo coach since the age of 19, is based in Cheltenham and has taken the Gloucester players through a six-week training programme geared to their specific needs

"I have not trained them to be judo players, I have given them body mechanics to suit their needs. I gave them specific judo skills and then told them to use them on a rugby pitch"

"The judo skills were about helping a player to move an opponent to free up the ball for a second player. The skills they have learnt will help them control the opposition players".

"Of the twenty players that I trained regularly, I believe that at least nineteen could



achieve a black belt if they were to take up the sport seriously when they finished playing rugby. They are athletes who learn very quickly", he added.

For Meir and the Gloucester coaches there were two main areas of focus for their judo training. First of all the players were taught how to fall safely, or more specifically they were taught how to fall safely and in the same motion return to their feet.

As Meir explained quite often a tackle may not be completely effective, for instance a tap tackle, in this situation a player's momentum is not necessarily stopped and he can use this to his advantage to maintain his progression.

"Obviously when someone is being tackled, there can be no right or wrong way to fall, it can just happen and you try to do the best you can to protect yourself and look after the ball. But there may be a situation where one of our attacking players is half tackled but knocked off his feet, what Judo is quite good at is teaching you how to get to your feet quickly, and how to keep your momentum and get going forward again", said Meir.

"There is a high degree of repetition needed to do the skill intuitively, which is what you would like to see on the field of play eventually, but that is true of everything we do", he added.

The second area of focus was the specific contact areas that are common in rugby. Players meet head on or as in a tackle situation may be prone on the floor in the case of the tackled player or wrestling for possession in the case of the tackler.

"What you see on the pitch, in terms of the physical confrontation, is usually not very subtle. It is about me being stronger than you, and just dominating you physically to get you out of the way for me to get hold of the ball, or for me to keep the ball or change the point of attack", explained Meir "What we have tried to get through to the players is that there may be times when this is still the case but if you can actually go into a physical confrontation situation and you have some skills where you think a bit more about what you are about to do and you have some specific techniques that you can use to make

you much more

effective and use much less energy in the process, Then during a game you will spend less time exhausted" he added.

"Physically the first two weeks were very demanding. We did a lot of grappling, and wrestling on the floor, which has a lot of physical fitness benefit because it was developing strength and muscular endurance by getting the players into positions they are commonly in on the field-on their back and trying to get them on their fronts to protect the ball, while someone of 115 kg holds you down".

"In the third weeks we looked at strategies and concepts that became applicable to the contact areas of the ball", said Meir

Judo Coach Dave Kavanagh was entrusted with the task of teaching his skills and techniques to the Gloucester players to help them seek new methods of creating gaps in an opposing teams attack and defence and new ways of securing possession in an energy efficient way.

"The judo skills were about helping a player to move an opponent to free up the ball for a second player. The skills they have learnt will help them control the opposition players", said Kavanagh.

"I think I have woken them up a bit. Its not about how big a player is, quite often a

player is on all fours protecting the ball, but you can control a whole person from their elbows", he added.

Kavanagh earned instant respect form the Gloucester squad for his nononsense style and his ability to throw even the largest squad member off balance or wrestle for he ball against any opponent.

"He is not a very big man but he can throw a guy like Pasty (Mark Cornwell) off his feet easily by using a specific technique", said Meir.

Time will tell whether Gloucester's Judo training will be a success, the new levels of driving, grappling and wrestling skills however, will make them all handful's for the opposition.

Meir meanwhile is confident that the results will be seen on the field.

"If the players only learned two things, and we practiced and practiced these things in the context of a rugby game, then we would consider it a success".

"The most pleasing aspect of it all though is that by the third week the players who were involved throughout the programme could see the relevance of it all. Until you try it you don't have a concept of how it will help you", said Meir.

Brother's in Arms

Tonight, Gloucester's Scottish International hooker Steve Brotherstone, who joined this summer from the Newcastle Falcons will step out onto the Kingsholm pitch for the first time in a new Cherry and White shirt.

Keen to make a big impression with his new Club, the former Edinburgh Reivers, Brive and Northampton player will be taking no prisoners against his fellow countrymen this evening.

This fixture will go down in the history books as a 'friendly', but be assured the competition pitch side will be very serious come kick off.

The new look 2003/04 Gloucester squad returned to pre season training, barely a month after completing a marathon season, on July 1st and after six weeks of toning, strengthening and conditioning and re-introducing their bodies to the rigours of professional rugby they will, once again, be put to the most gruelling of tests as they each try to earn their place in the all-important first Zurich Premiership game of the season.

Steve Brotherstone, for one, can't wait.

"Everyone is working really hard, there is a very good work ethic amongst the squad from the young guys to the experienced guys. I think everyone is prepared and looking forward to the warm up games", said the eight-cap Scottish hooker.

"We work hard to play games; you can only do so much pre season training. It has been six weeks of hard work but the real enjoyment comes from playing games. Everyone will be focused on these games and I'm sure we will see another lift in everyone's approach towards this game tonight".

"Nigel has emphasised to everyone that this is not a knock-about game, it is not a trial for everyone, this is actually it, the season starts here and he doesn't expect anyone to try and play themselves into the season. This is why we have been training so hard for six weeks and he is looking for a big performance", he added.

This August period is when Gloucester must lay the platform for the forthcoming season and for players like Brotherstone, who have no World Cup commitments, their efforts from now until Christmas will be crucial in ensuring Gloucester's high League position and ability to challenge for domestic and European honours later in the year.

Despite his absence from the Scottish World Cup squad, Brotherstone admits to still harbouring international dreams, but he is also acutely aware of where his priorities must lie during the autumn and early winter.

"I think that every player new to a Club wants to earn the respect of his team mates first and then the fans and I am certainly looking forward to the game this week. It is going to be a massive game for me; first impressions last and I intend to have a good game".

There is a big squad of players at this

Club and you want to play as many games as possible but first and foremost you want Gloucester to be successful and if you are involved then you give everything, but if you're not involved in your position on Saturday. It is a tough season and we need everyone to be involved and hungry to play.

"International rugby is still something I want to aspire to, as does everyone in the Premiership, it is something that does give you extra incentive. It drives you on to train hard and play hard. But you have to do it for your Club first. If you do well for your Club you can get recognised at international level. particularly as the Premiership, although a step down from international rugby is full of players in every premiership team who could play international rugby"

"During the World Cup period guys that are still here have things to live up to. Players who might have been frustrated last season have a chance to show what they can do and stake a claim for their shirt all season. The guys on international duty will not come straight back in so the boys here will have to work hard to put Gloucester on the Premiership and European map".

Despite his roots north of the border, and his first professional contract with the Scottish Rugby Union and a place in the inaugural Edinburgh squad, Brotherstone has spent much time away from the place of his birth gaining invaluable experience at the highest level across Europe. He admits to knowing little about tonight's opponents, as the focus for the Gloucester players will be very much on their preparation and performance. Brotherstone does though expect tonight's game to be ignited with all the fire of a true Anglo-Scottish clash.

"They will have been training hard for six weeks this pre season, and will be well

prepared and very fit. I expect them to be a young team but will put up a good challenge and that is what Gloucester need. We need some good games before certainly provide that", said Brotherstone.

"The main part of the squad is Scottish now they have moved away from signing overseas players and are concentrating on their own youth. They have their own brand and identity at Glasgow Rugby, which will be important to them tonight and they are starting to build up a good support base up there. They are becoming a true provincial

London Pride Middlesex 7's



The London Pride Middlesex Sevens, one of British Rugby's great bastions of tradition has announced the teams and first round draw for this season's tournament.

For so long a welcome climax to a long season, the tournament staged at Twickenham is quickly becoming an integral part of the Zurich Premiership Club's pre season build up.

Nigel Melville explained that "The Middlesex Sevens is an important part of our pre season schedule. It gives our players meaningful games at a crucial part of the season".

The tournament will involve all twelve Premiership Clubs, who will look to gain any advantage possible ahead of another marathon season, and four invitational sides, who this year will be Loughborough University, Young England, St Helens Rugby League side and the British Army.

The latter will provide the sternest of test to the Cherry and Whites in the opening fixture on August 16th.

The 2001 Tournament winners and 2002 runners up (to Bradford Bulls) are made up of a mixture of Britains and Fijians and the side's Coach, Andy Hickling, is confident the team will give a good account of itself this time around.

"We thoroughly enjoyed the experience in 2001 and consider it a further honour to be invited to join such illustrious teams in 2003. We were disappointed not to retain the trophy in 2002 - a couple of silly mistakes made it easy for the Bulls. Many of the squad have recently returned from Iraq, Kosovo and Bosnia. The boys are fresh, morale is high, the bits of the jigsaw will shortly be in place and it is now a matter of making certain the worn edges actually fit.

Because of tonight's fixture, Gloucester are leaving it late to confirm a squad for this year's tournament, but one player whose name is certain to be mentioned seriously is the England Sevens Captain, Simon Amor.

The half back who joined Gloucester from Cambridge University at the start of last year lead England to second in the IRB World Rankings and to victories in the Brisbane, Hong Kong and London legs of the IRB World Sevens Championship.

"it's going to be great. Come that time in pre-season everyone is keen to get some competitive rugby. It is also good for some of the youngsters who will come through and enjoy playing in a Gloucester shirt", he said.

"I have been watching it (the Middlesex Sevens)since I was young and it is a fantastic day out for everyone, especially if the weather holds", he added.

"The Middlesex Sevens is an important part of our pre season schedule. It gives our players meaningful games at a crucial part of the season".

"The Army will be one of the favourites on the day. They are as close to a professional Seven's team as there is, and that includes the national sides", said Amor

"But they are not professional rugby players, so individually, I hope that we will show superior quality in some areas".

Gloucester can also call on Amor's England Sevens colleague Henry Paul and a number of up and coming youngsters who will have the chance to impress coaches Melville and Rvan.

"We have the potential to pick a very strong squad but sevens is much different to fifteen-a-side and on the day any anyone can turn up and beat anyone".

But, Amor expects whoever wears the Cherry and White shirt to be raring to go come August 16th.

By my reckoning, with Gloucestershire's cricketers in the C&G final against Worcestershire on August the 30th, the summer isn't yet over, but with rugby returning to Kingsholm tonight, the best of it may be behind us. It's certainly been a busy time at the club. Ten players have left, to be replaced by four established signings and a clutch of promotions from within the ranks. Season tickets sales are ahead of last year, and there's a share offer imminently due as Gloucester nail their colours to the mast labelled "Kingsholm" and start the redevelopment of the old place with the main stand side of the ground.

A lot of the transfer activity in the Premiership was over within a fortnight of last season ending, but Nigel Melville wasn't as busy as some directors of rugby. There were a multitude of reasons for that, but above all Nigel likes stability. He's not one to sign a raft of players at one point and let a big group go at another. For him,

it's more evolution than building and dismantling. Last year's summer crop was a prime example. Only Thinus Delport and to a lesser extent Peter Buxton played a prominent role in the success that was to follow. Simon Amor was learning his trade, and the fruits of that apprenticeship may be seen more regularly this season. It's a strategy Nigel adopted at Wasps, and they didn't do too badly by it at all.

It would be remiss of me not to acknowledge Jake Boer's selection as club captain for the new season. He follows lan Jones and Richard Tombs in being a foreign player chosen to lead the side, and that after three seasons where he has become a huge favourite for some consistently aggressive and high quality performances. His leadership of the team last season in the absence of the injured Phil Vickery made him a natural choice with Phil heavily occupied with England this autumn.

One supporter said to me over the summer that Gloucester had signed three "journeyman professionals" in Steve Brotherstone, Paul Johnstone and Duncan McRae. Player movement post the game going open in 1996 has meant it is not unusual now for a man to play for four clubs in his career - one where he breaks through, another two where he is established, and one where he is a squad player and reliable cover rather than an automatic choice. While the other new boy, Alex Brown, is now at stage two, McRae is probably at stage three and Johnstone and Brotherstone possibly at stage four, but I would argue you can achieve a lot with journeyman professionals if their attitude is good and the blend is right. Their contribution of this quartet will depend on how Dean and Nigel go about getting the best out of them.

The pre-season programme is short in terms of matches but not quality. Two matches against fellow Heineken Cup qualifiers Leinster and one at Northampton follow tonight's visit by Glasgow, who were in the Heineken last year but failed to make it this time. This isn't a training match of four quarters but a proper game, and the first of four that should blow some of the match rustiness off with the Premiership season just over four weeks away. I'd expect to see all the main movers get a run out, and with a lot expected from some of the Academy players it will be good to see them get some match time in a less pressurised situation before the real business starts against Rotherham on September 13th.
