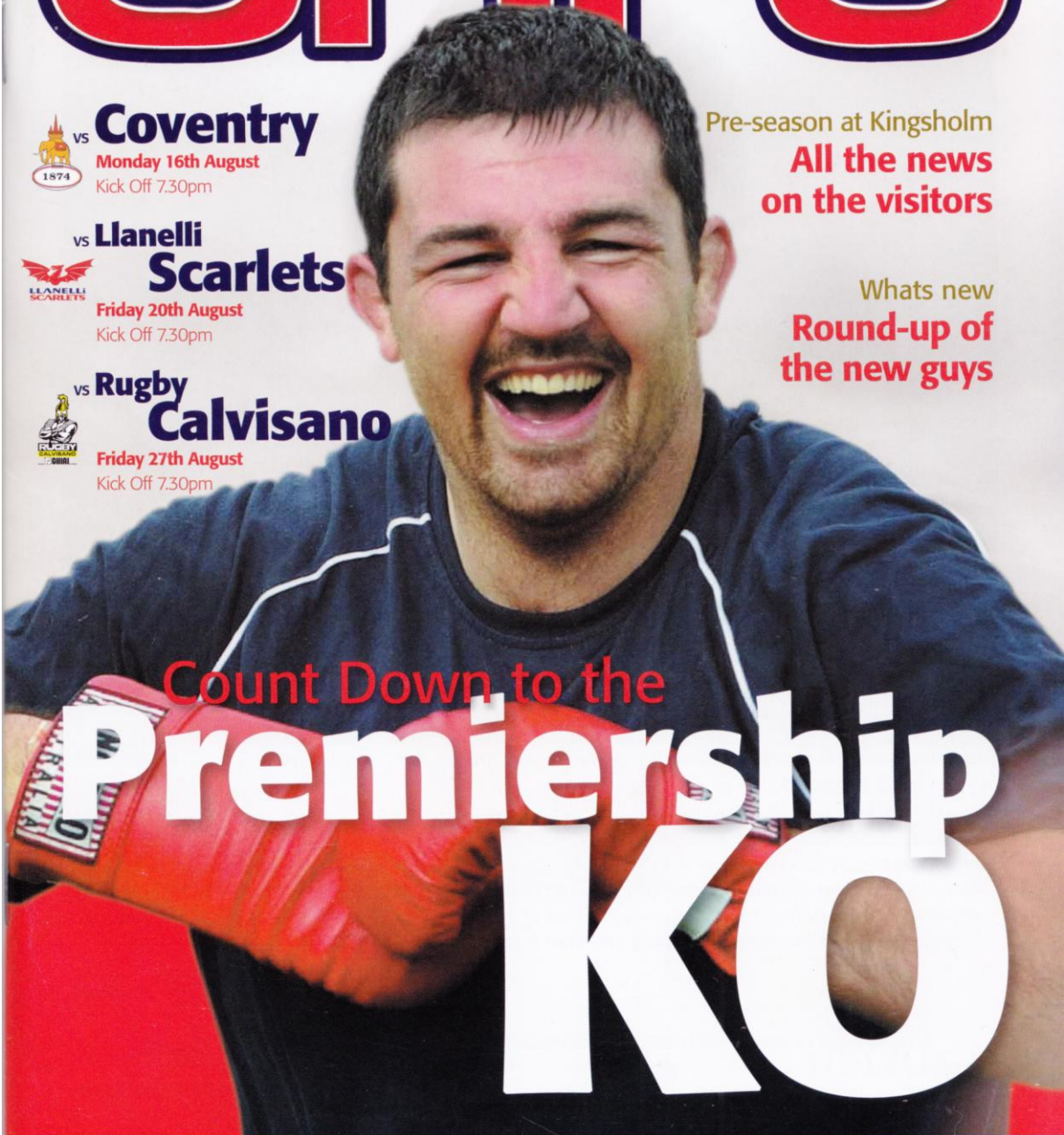

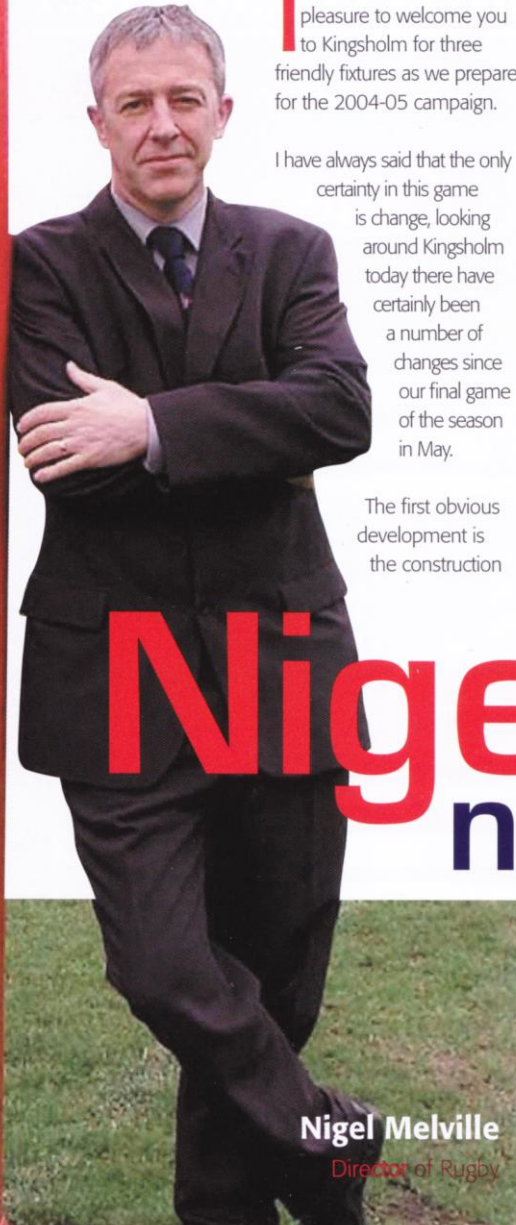

The first obvious development is the construction

of the new East Stand, which will raise Kingsholm's capacity to 12,500, and just as importantly offer quality covered seating to nearly 3,000 supporters.

The benefits are numerous, but the one the players are really looking forward to is the increased intensity it will bring to the atmosphere on match day! Not to be out done, 'the Shed' has also undertaken a makeover, a new roof, which I am sure will keep everyone dry in the months to come.

Only time will tell how successful we have been, but the new players have settled well into their new environment, some of the more established players have started to look over their shoulders, and the young Academy 'Gold' squad are beginning to make their presence felt.

The three games we are now playing in preparation for the new season are designed to test the squad to the full, Coventry have recruited well this summer, whilst Llanelli and Calvisano offer a European flavour to the 2004-05 season.

I would like to welcome them and their supporters to the new-look Kingsholm and wish them all a successful season.

Finally, I would like to thank everyone at Gloucester for their continued support of the players, we are proud of the support you give us, and assure you we are committed to taking things forward again this season

Kingsholm Supporters Mutual To Offer Travel Packages

The Kingsholm Supporters Mutual has launched a new Zurich Premiership travel scheme for Gloucester supporters for the forthcoming 2004/05 season.

The independent supporters' group will be offering coach travel to some of the 11 away Zurich Premiership fixtures, after it teamed up with Gloucester Rugby Club to help promote the initiative.

Members of the KSM will be able to benefit from a discount on the travel packages. Full information on the new initiative, including prices and booking details, will be available soon from both the KSM website at www.ksmglos.org and from the official club website at www.gloucesterrugbyclub.com

KSM chairman Bob Rumble said: "We all know that Gloucester supporters travel to away matches in great numbers. In launching this service we hope to help even greater numbers of fans to support Gloucester.

"KSM members using the service will see a tangible return for their membership

and the commitment they have made to the Club.

"Right from the outset we have said that we would look to fund-raise to support any future redevelopment of Kingsholm in ways that gave supporters something for their money."

In addition to the Zurich Premiership travel, the KSM will also be teaming up with Travelscope offering two supporters packages for away Heineken Cup fixtures.

For the match versus Stade Francais in Paris there will be two alternative packages. The first is a 'budget' option by coach rather than air, which will include coach travel, pick up points around the county, hotel accommodation and a match ticket (numbers may be limited for these packages).

The second option will be an independent supporters' package for those that prefer to arrange their own transport. This will include hotel accommodation and a match ticket. This package will also be offered for the Ulster match in Belfast.

These packages will be in addition to those offered by Mike Burton Sports Travel, the Club's Official Travel Partner. Travelscope's Heineken Cup tickets will



not come out of the Club's allocation.

For the match against Stade Francais in Paris in October, it is anticipated that the bus package, including two nights hotel accommodation, all transport and match ticket will cost £139, and the hotel and ticket package £99. KSM members booking any Travelscope Gloucester package will also receive a £5 cashback from the KSM.

For the Heineken Cup clash against Cardiff in Wales the KSM has been approached by the Holiday Inn Hotel in Cardiff with a pre-match meal offer.

ON-LINE MEMORABILIA AUCTION

Gloucester Rugby Club supporters had the chance to get their hands on a great item of Kingsholm memorabilia at an on-line auction on the official website over the summer.

Two of the four goal post flags were up for auction after the posts were taken down as part of the Kingsholm development.

The flags were part of the seven metre post extensions put in place by previous director of rugby Philippe Saint Andre, after two Ludovic Mercier penalties were kicked so high they were ruled to have gone wide at the beginning of the 2001/02 season.

The Kingsholm goal posts were extended seven metres upwards, and finished off with the four six foot tall red flags.

PARK AND RIDE

The new East Stand is gathering pace and when it is ready for the opening home game of the Zurich Premiership season against London Irish on Saturday 11 September it's going to be an impressive site.

The new East Stand has increased capacity at Kingsholm from 11,000 to 12,500 and to accommodate the increased number of people set to attend Gloucester games, the Club has formed a new partnership with local bus company Swanbrook.

The new partnership with Swanbrook will see a Park and Ride scheme for all home Zurich Premiership and Heineken Cup games.

The Park and Ride scheme will be based from the British Energy Car Park at Barnwood. The Club will bring supporters into Kingsholm, direct to the

Club, every 20 minutes.

The service will run for the two hours leading up to kick off, followed by the two hours after the game has finished.

The Club has agreed a free car parking facility with British Energy and will charge, for a return fare, just £1 for adults and 50p for all other users.

It is hoped that this service will ease congestion within the Kingsholm community on match day and allow all supporters the chance to benefit from better communication links into the Club.

The Park and Ride service will be signposted by new AA road signs on the routes into the City from the east/M5.

Also, the new partnership with Swanbrook will benefit



a number of season ticket holders and match day ticket holders through the season.

As part of the partnership, supporters with a valid season or match ticket will be able to benefit from free travel on the current Swanbrook routes on a first XV home match day.

These services are route numbers 12A and 12B from Waterwells Business Park in Gloucester and

the 351 and 352 from Tewkesbury. The latter regularly services the villages of Maisemore, Hartpury, Ashleworth and Staunton. Swanbrook are looking to extend their service to Tewkesbury to allow for a collection service after a 3:00 kick off.

All services, routes and timetables are subject to confirmation with Swanbrook, whose website holds all the details at www.swanbrook.co.uk.

What Azam said when he signed:

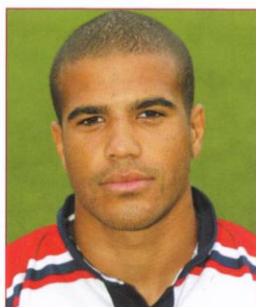

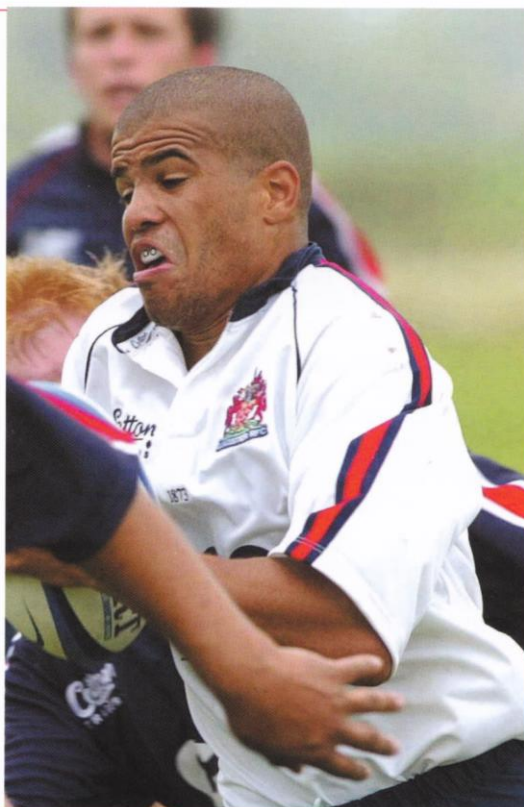

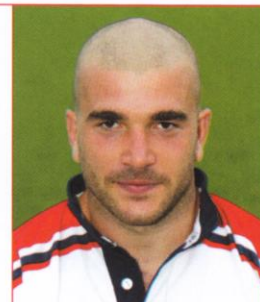

"Joining Gloucester is a new fresh challenge for me. I had the opportunity to chat to Nigel Melville and Dean Ryan and their plans for the future are impressive.

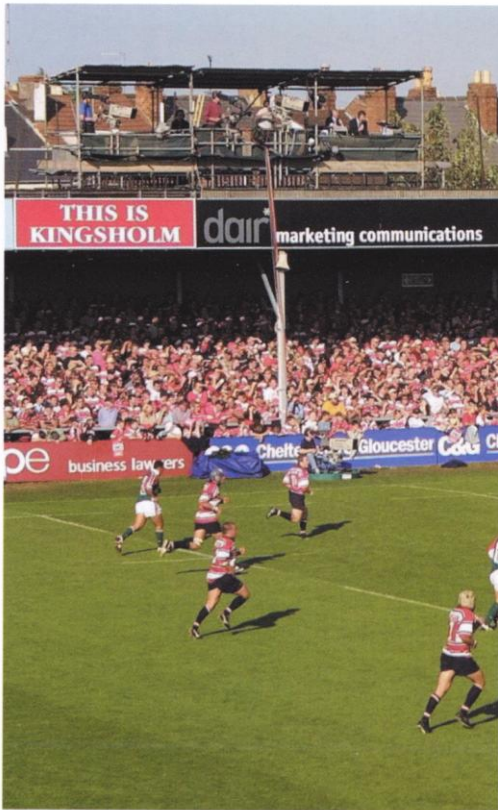
"With Olivier Azam and Chris Fortey the Club has two quality hookers and there is everything for me to do to impress.

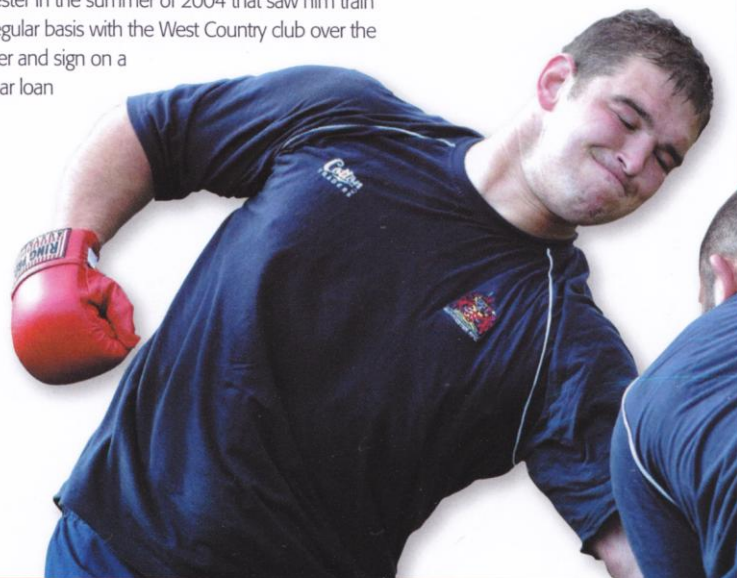

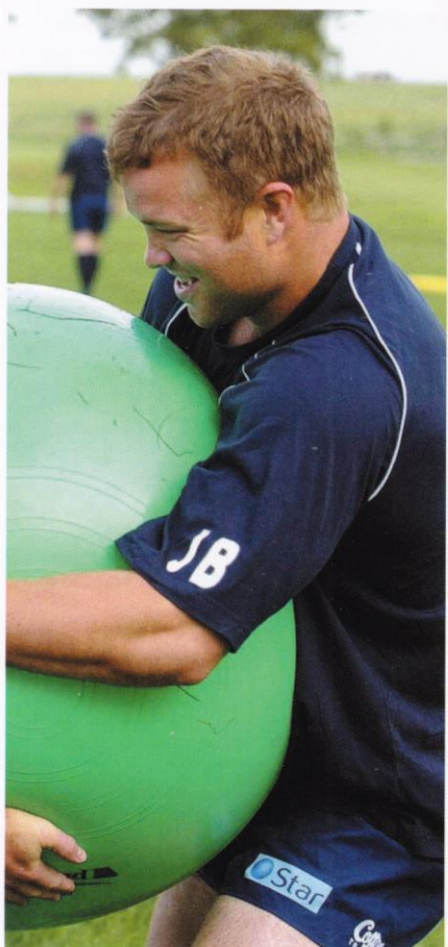

I think you'll enjoy the experience.

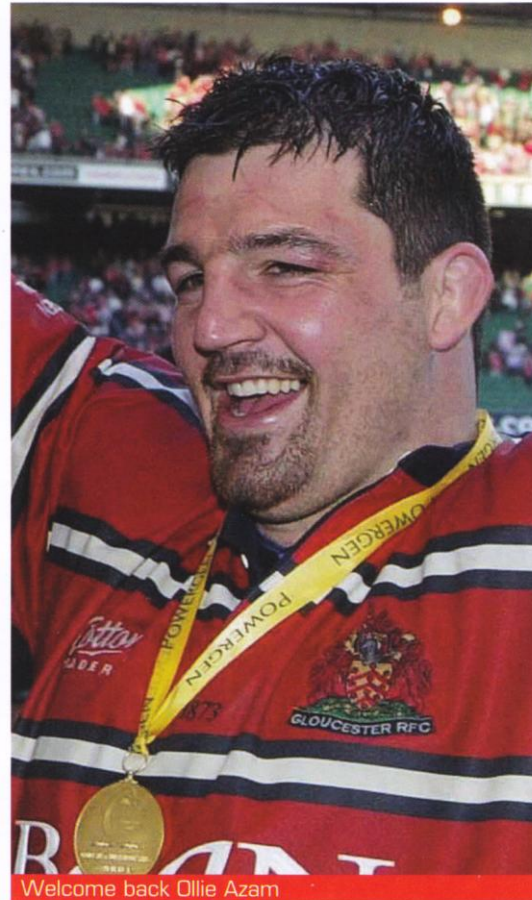
SO WHERE DO WE GO FROM HERE?

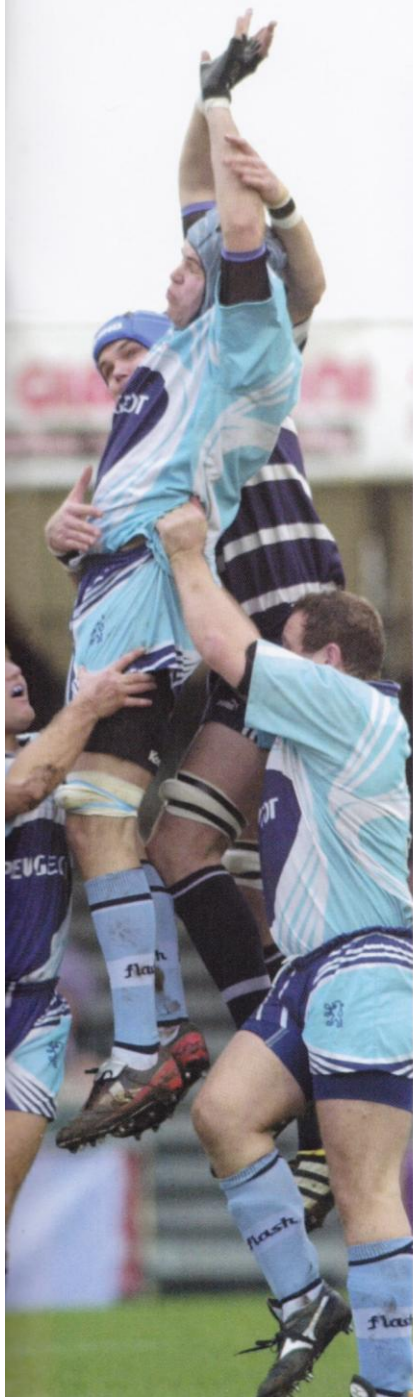

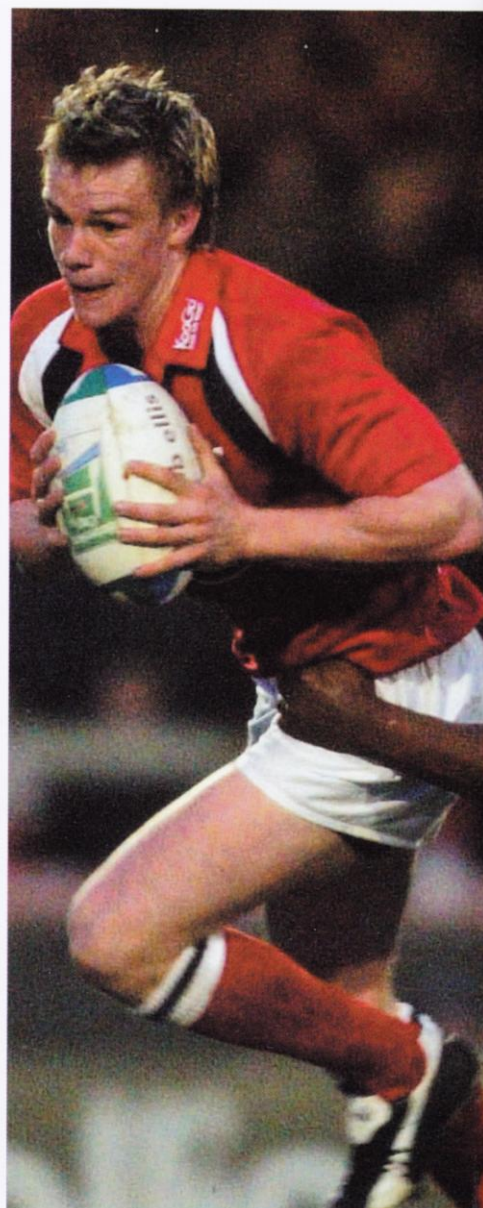

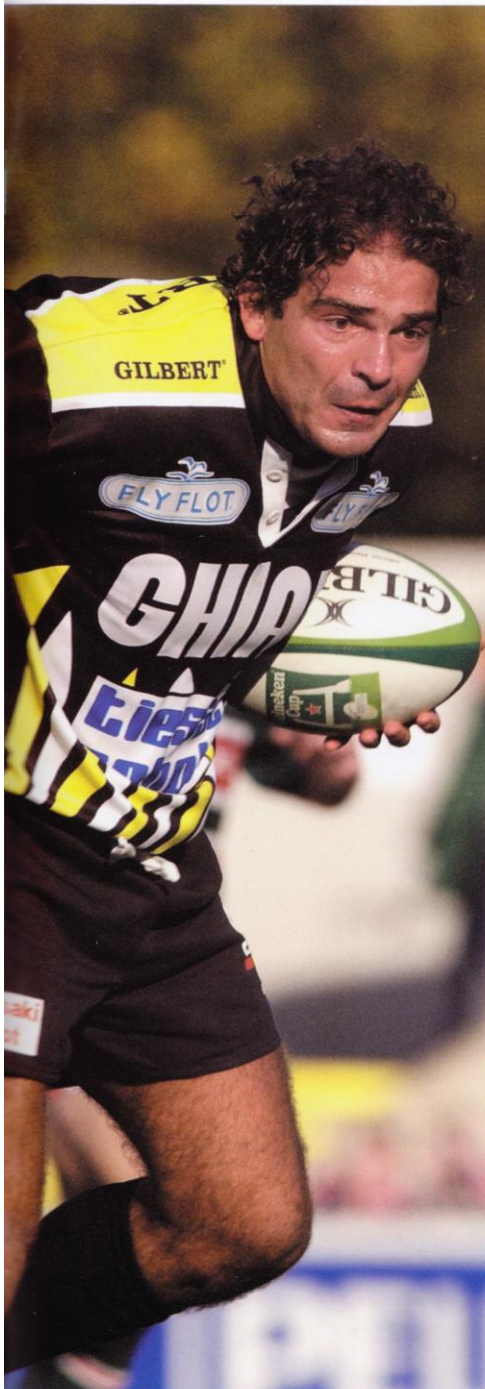
