The matchday programme looks back to the late 90s and a previous top-flight encounter between Gloucester and London Irish on the opening day of the season.

REMEMBER, When?



Before the clash in 1998 is looked at, it's an interesting fact that it was 1973 before London Irish first made an appearance at Kingsholm. It was the season when former Gloucester hooker and stalwart Mike Nicholls captained the West Country club.

This afternoon will mark the eighteenth match played between the two dubs here at Kingsholm. Remarkably on five of those occasions Gloucester has scored 29 points against the visitors. Even more remarkable is the fact in three consecutive home fixtures Gloucester scored 29 points!

London Irish provided the opposition for the opening match of a season once before when they opened the Kingsholm campaign on 5 September 1998, a match in which Gloucester triumphed 29-22 in front of an attendance of 5,267.

Gloucester made a winning start to the 1998/99 season as Mark Mapletoft scored 25 points against the Irish in a 29-22 victory. The visitors took a third minute lead when fly half Matt Jones crossed after a move through a dozen pair of hands.

Winger Niall Woods converted and added a penalty after Mapletoft had opened Gloucester's account in the 6th minute with a penalty. Gloucester drew level when skipper Dave Sims took two superb line outs and hustled the Irish into conceding two penalties. Gloucester opted to take scrums and after repeated infringements referee Steve Savage awarded a penalty try which Mapletoft duly converted.

Peter Rogers the English born South African was sin binned for twice collapsing the scrum. Six minutes after returning to the field he was sent off! The former Transvaal prop had failed to retreat at a tap penalty taken by Scott Benton. A 45-metre penalty by Mapletoft gave Gloucester a comfortable half time lead so it seemed but in four minutes of injury time, Woods landed two penalties.

The sin bin received another visitor when Mark Mapletoft was sent there for shirt pulling after ten minutes of the second half. The 14-man Irish outfit took the lead in the 53rd minute when Woods landed another penalty.

Mark Mapletoft ensured victory in the final quarter with two more penalties and also scoring a superb try.

The England captain has walked the plank, and the chief coach jumped ship a few days later. The prospect of a new set of hands at the helm of the England side can't have been good for the concentration of aspiring members of the national side.

In Gloucester last Sunday's win at Headingly was highly praiseworthy. Leeds are harder to beat on their own patch than many give them credit for and could have been a banana skin at the best of times.

We do live in interesting times, don't we? But mark my words, winter's coming and you'll soon be testing the central heating. checking the anti-freeze and wondering where your hip flask has got to after you discarded it last year.

There you go. Grouch over for this season.



Former Kingsholm scrum half Clive Stuart-Smith has accompanied Thinus Delport onto their playing staff in a summer move from Leeds Tykes.

Heavy recruitment has also been the order of the day at Edgeley Park, the home of Sale Sharks. Former Kingsholm director of rugby Phillipe Saint Andre has recruited former Gloucester back-row forward Kingsley

Jones to assist with coaching duties. Kingsley previously held a similar role with Doncaster RFC last season. 

new roof now so it would be a shame to leave just yet.



NM: I guess if I'd have been asked that when I started playing I'd have said the free gear! But I suppose it depends on why you play the game. Times have changed. Before it went professional we were just playing for the enjoyment, but I'd be lying if I said that was the only reason. I like being involved in a team environment because it gives you a focus in life. If I wasn't playing rugby I don't really know what I'd be doing.

BBCIR: What was your


NM: I've had some rough jobs. The first was probably doing a paper round, fairly typical for a school kid, but I got fed up of being chased by the neighbourhood dogs so that fell through. My first full time job was as a storeman for a fruit and veg business, putting together orders for supermarkets back home. It gave me some pocket money for the weekends.

BBCIR: Who has been the biggest influence on your life?

NM: Probably my two uncles, who both played for the All

Blacks. When my brother and I were growing up they were both playing for Canterbury and we both aspired to be like them. It's quite a unique story as I grew up in a little town called Littleton, about 30 minutes out of Christchurch. It's able to boast four All Blacks, my two uncles, my brother and myself. They provided a lot of direction for us in terms of wanting to be like them.

BBCIR: What can you cook to impress people?



about three or four years ago I only knew two dishes, one was a beef one and one was a chicken one. We joke that he always knew what he was getting for dinner because it would be the same every other day! After that I went to cooking classes to branch out a bit. It was a course with 20 sessions, and so I'm pleased to say I've added 20 dishes to my repertoire. If I have to get the cook book out then there is something decent I can produce.

BBC IR: What would you like for your next birthday?

NM: I'm not a big celebrator of my

birthday. I've never been into material things to mark it, I'd rather just have a dinner with friends or family.

BBCIR: What's your worst habit?

NM: Do I have to answer that? I've been spotted picking my

nose at the traffic lights before now. Will that do?

BBCIR: What's the one piece of advice you would give to a young player?

NM: There are a lot of young people

who aspire to be rugby players and the one thing I've learned coming through the age grades is that a lot of them don't make it. That can be because of the opinion of one person, generally the coach. That happens at the top of the game too. It's important to realise that it IS ONLY ONE person's view, and that you just need to keep working on your game. Hopefully in the end you will get seen by the right people.

Gloucester claimed a 21-16 win over Leeds Tykes at Headingley last Sunday to open their 2004/05 **Zurich Premiership** campaign with a victory on the road.

It was grafting performance from the Kingsholm club, but enough to keep Leeds at bay with Kiwi-import Henry Paul leading the way for the visitors.

Leeds took an early 6-3 lead as Tykes fly-half Duncan Hodge slotted two penalties to Paul's single effort.

But Paul soon sparked the visitors into life as he broke the Leeds defence with some fancy stepping and Gloucester applied the pressure for centre Terry Fanolua to finish the attack with a five-pointer.

Paul then converted to give his side the lead for the first time in the match. Gloucester, however, were wittled down to 14 men when Olivier Azam was yellow-carded for collapsing a maul, but Leeds failed to drive home the advantage - opting for a scrum instead of the resultant penalty and let the chance slip away.

Paul stretched Gloucester's lead further with another penalty, but he failed with another attempt during extra time for the visitors to go into the break with a 13-9 lead.

Following the restart, Gloucester were again reduced to 14 men when fly-half Duncan McRae was sin-binned, but Leeds were still unable to take advantage, as Jake Boer and his team held strong in defence.

The introduction of Gordon Ross for Leeds added more to the hosts' attack, but they were still unable to cross Gloucester's line - with Ross only managing to narrow the gap by three with a penalty.

McRae put his yellow card behind him with a dropgoal three-minutes from time, and then fired out an inch-perfect long pass to winger James Simpson-Daniel, who went over for his team's second try.

Gavin Kerr went over for Leeds in the dying seconds of an already over-extended injury time, but it was too late to have any bearing on the final result.
