
They've got to work their way out of it. As a team you have to be able to cope with the bad times and work hard throughout it.

The official matchday programme rounds up the latest news from the Zurich 'A' League.

An amazing 9,207 people turned up at Welford Road on Monday night to witness the top of the table clash in the Northern Conference between the Tigers and Northampton Saints.

Despite the crowd, the Tigers crashed 20-14 to the Saints. In a major coup for the Zurich A League there were over 2,500 more people at Welford Road than were "over the road" at the Walkers Stadium for Leicester City's league cup tie against Preston North End.

In the Southern Conference NEC Harlequins kept their 100 per cent winning record intact with a 31-19 victory over London Irish at Sunburyon-Thames, but they cannot rest easy as London Wasps also won on the road by a single point out of 85 scored in a thriller at Kingsholm.

Elsewhere, the standout performer was Sale's wing Ollie Viney who scored a hat-trick of tries in the Jets 53-17 victory over Leeds at Headingley. Wasps Ed Thrower helped himself to 21 more points and took his tally this season to 49.

There were two more points for Harlequins Adrian Jarvis taking his A League career total to 93, he is poised to become the first player to score a century of points in the competition. Team mate Joe Mbu grabbed his seventh try of the season and his 13th overall moving him to joint top spot on the Zurich A League career try scoring list alongside Northampton's Andy Vilk.

The matchday programme, through the eyes of Dave King, looks back to the mid 1990s and a previous encounter between Gloucester and Harlequins.

REMEMBER? When?



Saturday 29 April 1995 saw the final roar of two Lions and the birth of another. Mike Teague and Brian Moore bade farewell to distinguished careers, and Phil Greening made his debut for the Cherry and Whites.

The game itself, between Gloucester and Harlequins, seemed almost a side show. Mike Teague a veteran of 291 club first team appearances, 27 England Caps and three British Lions Test Caps, said farewell to a distinguished career.


The quality number eight had returned to Kingsholm after two years at Moseley. Teague made his debut in the 1978-79 season and scored a remarkable 75 tries in 291 appearances in a career that spanned playing for Gloucester All Blues,

Cardiff, Stroud, Moseley and the Cherry and Whites.

Mike Teague (35) and Brian Moore (33), were to witness the young and upcoming Phil Greening making his debut and lock forward Mark Cornwall celebrating his first home League game with two tries!

Team mates formed a guard of honour as Mike Teague took the field and he was given a hero's send off. The farewell performance of Mike Teague and Brian Moore almost overshadowed the game itself and particularly it's meaning for Harlequins. For defeat would have consigned the London club to Division Two.

Gloucester were the first to score with a penalty from Lee Osborne but by half-



time they were 15-3 in the lead. With Jason Leonard having pulled a hamstring it was a notable achievement for the men from The Stoop.

A try by Crawford Henderson, a penalty by Jim Staples opened the proceedings. A penalty try was awarded when the Cherry and Whites captain Andy Deacon made a premature tackle on a certain W.D.C.Carling as he chased his own kick ahead, and match official S.Piercy awarded a penalty try.

A further penalty by full back Jim Staples put the Quins 18-3 up, but two tries by Mark Cornwall, both converted by Lee Osborne reduced the arrears.

Had Lee Osborne succeeded with two penalties, soon after the first Cornwell touchdown, it may have been a more satisfactory outcome. Despite the valiant efforts of captain Andy Deacon and his team mates in that intervening period, the Quins had added a drop goal from Jim Staples and a try by Peter Mensah to put the result virtually beyond doubt.

A guest at the Kingsholm club that particular weekend was England Colts prop Phil Vickery. Phil, who at the time lived in Cornwall, was put in touch with Gloucester by debutant Phil Greening.

Phil Vickery who was with Redruth RFC had been approached by Bath RFC but chose to come to Kingsholm. Phil had spent two seasons playing for England Colts and in that time they had won five of their eight matches and drawn one.

Rugby Union Schools and Youth Technical Director, Ron Tennick thought highly of Phil Vickery, 'He is 6ft 2" and 18st and he is going to be an immense power". He commented at the time.

After the match Mike Teague commented:

"The modern game is now making such demands on players that many cannot give it the time it needs. I think the game just has to go professional to survive."

Adding further comment, Mike advised pundits to keep a close watch on 19 year-old Phil Greening.

"He took a strike against the head against Brian Moore and I think he has got everything to become a full International." What prophetic comments they were to become!

At the completion of the season the former Rugby Football Union marketing manager Mike Coley was appointed as the Club's chief executive.

DID YOU Know?

The 1994-95 season saw Gloucester record one away victory in the League and that was versus Harlequins at the Stoop! Paul Holford scored two tries, converted by Lee Osborne in a 14-10 victory. It was a season where we finished seventh.

Gloucester were knocked out of the Pilkington Cup by Wakefield 19-9 in a fourth round encounter. 10 years later, sadly, Wakefield RFC are no longer in existence.

Paul Holford was the leading try scorer with eight tries.

Mike Teague scored his final try for the Club in a 17-21 reverse at the Memorial Ground versus Bristol on 8 April 1995.

Andy Deacon was the Club Captain in 1994-95.

It was a season where we drew 19-19 with Bath Rugby at the Recreation Ground. Martin Kimber was on target with two dropped goals. That season Martin totalled six drop goals. All but one came in away League fixtures. His sole success at Kingsholm came in a narrow 9-6 victory versus Orrell.

Simon Morris scored a hat trick of tries in a comprehensive 48-12 victory against West Hartlepool on 17 September 1994.



In the new regular series of interviews. BBC Radio Gloucestershire's Ian Randall catches up with Phil Vickery, who goes under the 'spotlight'!



B B C RADIO GLOUCESTERSHIRE

BBC IR: What's the best thing about rugby?

PV: The team camaraderie I think, all working together and going through thick and thin. You've got the successes like standing at Twickenham after winning, as well as the down side of losing but that's the chance in any game. You want to do well but ultimately, however good a game YOU have, you rely on everyone else, and that's a side of it I've always enjoyed.

BBC IR: What was your first job?

PV: When I left school I worked on my Dad's farm. We used to keep about 100 dairy cows and I was a herdsman and a milkman. It's a great way of life. I feel very privileged to have been able to do what I did, and obviously my father, my brother and my mother's side of the family are all still involved in it. I don't regret it at all.

BBC IR: What would be your preferred alternative career?



PV: I don't think anything can replace

running out here and taking part in a game that you love. People talk about coaching, but I sit in the stand with Dean and Nigel and seeing the boys not doing what we've practiced makes you pull your hair out! I enjoy working with people but you can't beat playing.

BBCIR: Who has been the biggest influence on your life?

PV: I don't think that's down to just one person. I've been really lucky with some of the people I've met. When I came here Richard Hill was director of rugby and I learned a lot from him and the way he went about things. At that stage the game wasn't fully professional, so a guy called Ben Pullen gave me a job on his farm, and he and his family were just fantastic in the way they looked after me. Mike Teague, Phil Blakeway, I could go on. It's a long list, and I couldn't possibly remember everyone.

BBCIR: What can you cook to impress people?

PV: I can cook when I have to, though I'm not sure I could cook to impress! I'm alright at fairly simple things that would stop you from being hungry. I wouldn't say a roast is a speciality but something like that is fairly straight-forward

and I'm quite good at them.


What's the one piece of advice you would give to a young player?

WHY, OH WHY!!!

Why can't we win at Bath? To be fair, we have won there twice in recent years, both in the Cup, but Premiership points continue to elude us. Certainly, it gets more and more difficult to pick up away points these days, and we know better than most what an effect a vociferous crowd of supporters can have on the home team.

There are also those who contend that some referees are influenced into making 'hometown' decisions, but that doesn't explain the

Rec syndrome. After all, if we can win at Leeds and Northampton, by no means the friendliest places to go, we should be able to win anywhere, but the Bath hoodoo persists.

There's nothing new about such bogey sides of course. Some of us can recall a period when we simply couldn't beat, of all people, Richmond. True to the way these things seem to happen, we always seemed to draw them in the Cup. They were a fair side, but on paper, shouldn't have been able to beat Gloucester. Even when we tied with them, we

lost on the away rule.

There have been other jinx sides, too. London Irish had the evil eye on us for quite a period. So did Gosforth, the forerunners of today's Newcastle Falcons. That particular hex came to an end on one memorable Saturday at Kingsholm when they were, at the time, the holders of the Cup.

The result prompted Nigel Starmer Smith, old boy of Barnwood C. of E. School, to proclaim the whole affair as 'a real shock' on air. That caused enormous derision which persisted every time he came

to Kingsholm thereafter.

However, the longest hoodoo ever suffered by Gloucester was the Cardiff jinx. We beat them, just occasionally, here at home, but it took 35 years for us to win at the Arms Park. I remember a conversation I once had with Bill Cleaver, a no-nonsense Wales and Cardiff outsidehalf, who told me that there was a saying down in the Valleys that Cardiff could turn out fifteen men with wooden legs against Gloucester and they'd still win. We shall see if there are any traces of the old hoodoo in the Heineken Cup matches a little later on.

We can console ourselves with the thought that all does not seem sweetness and light down at Bath. I see that Mike Catt, talking about his defection to London Irish, describes the Bath management regime as 'Selfish and back-stabbing'. I also note that the club is also supporting a scheme to supply rugby coaching for 14 to 16 year-old girls. Getting worried about their strength in depth are they?

PLETHORA OF PROPS

For a club with such a remarkable record for producing prop forwards, the start of the 2004/5 campaign was a bit worrying. We had lost Messrs Woodman and Roncero, there were injuries, notably to Phil Vickery himself, and Christo B. (I'm not even going to attempt the spelling) wasn't due to arrive for weeks. To cap it all, Andy Deacon had retired. In fact, it seemed to the uninformed



outsider that Gloucester, of all clubs, didn't have two props to rub together.

We needn't have worried. The two young hopefuls who stepped up to take their chances have put in a couple of storming performances. Neither the Northampton nor the Newcastle front rows are to be taken lightly, yet they certainly knew they had been in a game when the respective final whistles went. It has been quite an achievement, especially when you recall that young Master Sigley has been playing out of position.

So where do we go from here? With Christo and Vicks, subject to Monday night's runout, now available, Dean Ryan and Nigel Melville are faced with a considerable dilemma. By the time you read this. No doubt we shall all know how the puzzle is to be resolved, but it would seem to be an injustice for the two youngsters to be discarded after their achievements.

However, everyone knows that it's a tough old game these days, and there's no real room for sentiment. You simply have to pick the combination that you think will do most to help secure the vital points, taking into account the relative strengths and weaknesses of the opposition.

Anyway, with the Heineken Cup games and the Autumn Internationals on the horizon, you need all the front-row options you can get, and there would seem to be opportunities for everyone to get stuck in somewhere along the line.

I suppose it's what an old American friend of mine would call the 'Grade A problem – the one you don't worry about'. The Grade B problem would arise if we didn't have enough top-quality performers to call upon.

But I shall be fascinated to see how the management mix and match their various permutations.

Gloucester maintained their 100 percent record against the Falcons with a 31-17 win in the Zurich Premiership at Kingsholm.

A Kingsholm record 13,000 crowd guaranteed an intense, intimidating welcome for the Falcons, whose last victory on Gloucester soil came during their 1997-98 Premiership title-winning campaign.

Gloucester announced their intentions from the kick-off, gathering Jonny Wilkinson's kick-off and launching a superb forward drive back to the halfway line.

It was an immediate sign of things to come, and Gloucester's early territorial control produced an eighthminute Henry Paul penalty. But while Newcastle did not look unduly alarmed by that setback, they were rocked by two tries in five minutes from the home team.

Newcastle were their own worst enemies for the opening score. Having conceded a penalty, they then committed another offence which referee Ashley Rowden punished by marching them back another 10 metres.

With the Falcons unorganised, scrum-half Andy Gomarsall spotted space, kicked into the gap and before Newcastle could regroup, Marcel Garvey gathered and sprinted over.


Paul added the conversion, before Gloucester struck again on 18 minutes, capitalising on number eight Adam Balding's clean lineout catch and driving the Falcons backwards for lock Alex Brown to touch down.

Wilkinson kicked three penalties during the second quarter, one from 50 metres, but further penalties from Paul and fly-half Duncan McRae ensured a comfortable 20-9 interval lead for the home side.

The Falcons made a lively start to the second period, appearing a much tighter unit than in the first half.

Wilkinson's fourth successful penalty, on 58 minutes, underlined the strength of a growing Newcastle revival.

Gloucester recovered their composure during the final quarter, with their forwards rekindling the earlier mood, turning the screw up-front




and putting pressure on Wilkinson, who was at his most ordinary.

A Henry Paul penalty seven minutes from time opened up a 24-12 advantage.

And Gloucester secured the victory just two minutes later when England wing James Simpson-Daniel intercepted Wilkinson's pass 30 metres out and sprinted to the line. Paul converted to take his personal tally to 13.

Newcastle had the final say with a Michael Stephenson consolation effort, but it was far too little, too late.





Gloucester continued their bad run of results at Bath on Saturday, going down 29-14 to their West Country rivals.

Fortey started at hooker, Eustace in the second row, and Buxton moved to blind-side with Jake Boer taking the number seven shirt.

Bath's Mike Tindall grabbed two tries in the result that meant Gloucester extended their run of 13 consecutive league defeats at the Rec. A try in each half from man-of-the-match Tindall saw Bath grab the points against a Gloucester side that looked a shadow of the team that had won four out of four so convincingly. The Kingsholm club's lineout struggled all afternoon, and Bath did well with their penalties to ensure they crept ahead early on. Fly-half Olly Barkley totalled 19 points, but Henry Paul missed four from six for Gloucester.

It was Barkley who drew first blood with just a minute on the clock - his penalty saw Gloucester punished for straying off-side.


England 'A' winger Marcel Garvey threatened with an arching run followed by a chip ahead but there was too much weight on his kick and the ball bounced out of danger, allowing Bath to breath a sigh of relief. Gloucester continued to pile on the pressure and were rewarded by a Paul penalty, but three points from Barkley soon restored the home side's advantage. Gloucester continued with the upper hand in opening 20 minutes and Henry Paul's boot levelled matters once again.

But John Connolly's side were back in front in the 29th minute after Gloucester failed to clear a high ball from Olly Barkley. Mike Tindall was on hand to gather the ball grab the try. Barkley added the conversion and a third penalty. Bath went down to 14 men in the 39th minute after referee Dave Pearson spotted Robbie Fleck's late shoulder charge on James Simpson-Daniel and sent the former Springbok to the sin-bin

McRae slashed the deficit with a drop goal before Melville beefed up his front row by bringing on monster South Africa prop Christo Bezuidenhout and French hooker Olivier Azam in the 45th minute.

But Azam saw a yellow card for impeding Danny Grewcock at a line-out, and Barkley slotted the ensuing penalty to add to his fourth moments earlier.

Barkley was required to convert Tindall's second try in the 58th minute after the 25-year-old combined with Martyn Wood following a line-out and secured his second try of the afternoon. A spell of driving rain took its inevitable toll on the match in the final quarter but the wet weather did little to dampen Gloucester's spirits as they took advantage of Bath's overstretched defence to score through Goodridge. Paul pushed the conversion wide once again and the visitors could make no further headway against Bath's defence, leaving Bath to grab the points.
