

The official matchday programme looks back at a previous meeting between the two sides in 1993.

REMEMBER, When?



When Cardiff visited Kingsholm on Saturday 16 October 1993, they were participating in the 2,183rd match to be played at Kingsholm. Gloucester's 16 points to 5 victory on that Autumn afternoon ensured that the Club celebrated its 1,620th victory. At that stage 417 had been lost while 146 matches had been drawn.

So the stage was set prematch for one of the oldest Anglo-Welsh club fixtures. There had been a span of 10 seasons since the great Welsh club had visited Kingsholm. On that occasion they had celebrated a comprehensive 26 points to 10 victory over Gloucester.

Going into the Cardiff clash in 1993 Gloucester had gone

five weeks without registering a win in its Courage League campaign. It was a match where the Club's selectors chose to give Ashley Johnson, Bruce Fenley, Andrew Martin, Peter Miles and Rob Baxter their first senior test of the season.

Within two minutes of the kick off Martin Roberts put Gloucester into the lead with a penalty. The rivalry between the teams erupted into a mass brawl in the centre of the pitch. The game then settled into a pattern with Martin Roberts missing a kickable penalty. However, after seven minutes Roberts made amends adding a simple penalty. Shortly after, referee Doug Chapman awarded Gloucester two short arm penalties, and from the

second Bruce Fenley fed Bobby Fowke who was stopped short of the try line. The ball was then passed to winger Tim Smith on the blind side, who crossed in the corner. Martin Roberts kicked the conversion.

It took Cardiff 35 minutes before they launched their first major attack and it took determined defence to stop Colin Laity short of the line. Ashley Johnson took the ball up and fed it to Paul Holford who made a terrific run up the right touchline, but his final pass to Tim Smith went awry. Cardiff managed a short spell of pressure but failed to reduce the arrears.

A tremendous touch kick from Johnson gave Gloucester a good attacking position but Cardiff took the line out ball and cleared. A break by Damien Cummins, the Gloucester captain for the day, saw Paul Holford in support, and he passed to Tim Smith who was tackled into touch near to the line.

After 17 minutes of the second half Martin Roberts kicked another penalty to take the lead to 16 points to nil. A disallowed try when Gloucester thought Peter Miles had crossed the line annoyed the home contingent in the crowd, and further frustration was shown within two minutes when Gloucester hopes were not enhanced with Martin Roberts missing a penalty.

Cardiff had the final say when probing runs by their three quarters eventually enabling Steve Ford to score a try in the corner.

Simon Davies missed the conversion and the Welsh club failed to add to their score, before the Kingsholm faithful wend their way home in the late afternoon air after witnessing Cardiff's defeat on their 71st visit to Kingsholm.

The last time Gloucester played Cardiff at Kingsholm was on Saturday 27 January 2001, and a certain Gary Powell was learning his trade at the Arms Park at the time.





Wind the clock back to May 2002, a year after Cardiff last visited Kingsholm, and Powell was involved in a car crash on Cardiff's Newport Road while sat alongside then Cardiff colleague Spencer John.

He was out of action for nine months recovering - but John was not so lucky with the neck injuries he sustained being serious enough to force him into retirement a year or so later at the age of 28.

"We were coming down Newport Road on the way to the gym when we got hit from behind," recalled Powell, whose form for Gloucester has earned him an invitation to train with the Welsh squad.

"Both of us suffered really bad neck injuries and we all know what has happened to Spencer. My injury was bad enough that I had two discs out and a fusion of the vertebrae.

"It was very painful and very frustrating to have to spend so long away from the game. In the end, that injury probably cost me a new

contract.

"Thankfully, and touch wood as well, I don't have any problems now and I am fully fit. The doctors say there are no long-term complications as long as I keep my neck fit and strong."

But a silver lining arrived in the form of a move to the toughest dub in English rugby, via Leeds Tykes, allowed the tight-head prop to get his career back on track.

Now some of his closest friends are homing into view for Saturday night's Heineken Cup clash.

Yet Powell insists he has nothing to prove to the Blues management who allowed him to leave the Arms Park - and he won't be trying to rough up any of his old pals.

"That's all gone, I've moved on now and feel comfortable playing for Gloucester," said Powell, who sports a four-inch scar down the front of his neck as proof of his injury hell.

"I still live in Cardiff and hang around with the likes of CQ (Craig Quinnell) and Spencer. I will just try to do my best for the team. I won't be thinking too much about friends or enemies, just the job in hand.

"If we all do that, hopefully we can win the game and take a step closer to reaching the last eight."

What they said back in 2001

Philippe Saint Andre, director of rugby for Gloucester: "Today we play Cardiff, but I don't consider us the favourites. Cardiff is a big team in Europe with very experienced players, including the Welsh halfbacks. We are still growing as a team, but have a big appetite, so the game should be interesting."

Kingsley Jones was captain for the game against Cardiff, and said: "It's a one-off game today, and as I have said all along, on the day anyone we play will be a very good team, but anything can happen. Cardiff are the form team going into the last eight and will be formidable opposition. Cardiff haven't got far to travel today and I'm sure that this would be their first choice of away venue."

BBC Radio Gloucestershire's early morning sports presenter Paul Furley looks back at a difficult week for Chris Fortey, and helps shed a little light on the type of injury, after all, Furls is also recovering from a broken ankle!

Ouch! You have to have every sympathy for Chris Fortey, I certainly did stood at the Exec box end last Friday night.

After the opening twenty minutes when the ball seemed like a bar of soap to some players, I remember thinking it was typical of Fortey's current solid form that he safely caught the re-start after Marcel Garvey's try, and set up the ruck.

Only minutes before there had been a few shenanigans between the two front rows at a scrum which had to go down for a second time and one nearby spectator offered to wage a few quid that a certain Gloucester number two was sure to be involved, before his mate turned round and announced with a big grin "nah, he's a reformed character now."

You could make a decent case for both points of view (especially with Fortey not having been carded all season), but as the ball was fed back, Jon Goodridge kicked to touch and the ruck broke up, it quickly became clear something was wrong as Fortey remained prone on the ground.

In our commentary box

Andy Deacon made the point long before the referee took both sides off the field to give the medics time and space to do their job: "I know Chris Fortey inside out and he doesn't act like that unless it's a bad injury."

A broken fibula, low down the leg region - effectively a broken ankle - seems like richly undeserved bad luck after his sterling performances of late, where he had been one of the club's few senior players able to step in to the breach amid multiple absences due to injuries and international call ups.


To classify Fortey merely as cover for Olivier Azam would be seriously unfair, and despite Azam getting the nod in the early part of this season, he returned to Kingsholm admitting he would have a fight on for the number two jersey.

Nigel Melville's reaction last Friday night after the Sale game said everything for how Fortey had been playing of late.

Melville who quipped with a hint of irony in his diagnosis "I'm not a doctor, but I'm becoming one," described Fortey as having "done fantastically well" of late.

"We're so disappointed for Chris, he's come in for Olivier Azam and got stronger and stronger, everything was going well for him, he'd curbed his temper a little bit, got a lot more discipline in his game, and he's

been



a highlight of the last few weeks for me.

By the time you read this, hopefully Fortey will have had his operation, but he has had to play a waiting game with the injury swelling up.

The hope in these cases is that a surgeon can operate in the hours following injury before it swells up, if that passes then it takes six to 10 days for the swelling to go down before they can operate. The reason is that a swollen ankle is like a ripe tomato, cut the skin and you can never manage to join it back together again.

All I can say is I know what he is going through, so too does Adam Eustace who also broke his fibula in the Parker Pen Shield quarter final win over Ebbw Vale back in January 2002 and was out for eight months.

The road back is a long one.

I broke my ankle in July, but unlike Fortey mine simply went "CRACK" under my own body weight and not at the bottom of a ruck. The first thing the specialist said to me was: "you can resume your playing career at the start of the 2005-06 season."

I had six weeks in plaster, and could drive again two months post op and now on good days I can walk without a limp, while bizarrely I run better than I walk. I have had plenty of physio, but you can guarantee with all the expert help on tap at the club, he will recover far quicker than me.

In the meantime everyone at BBC Radio Gloucestershire will miss talking at training to the liveliest interviewee in the Gloucester squad, a man seemingly known to everyone as Four-o, who's local accent and "make no bones about it" style of talking often makes for entertaining radio.

We wish him well and a speedy recovery.

That surgeon when he opens Fortey up will no doubt find he is cherry and white through and through.

I never thought I'd hear myself saying this, but I'm actually glad to have a rest from the

Premiership for a while. That's not to denigrate the Heineken Cup, or today's welcome visitors in any way. It's simply that the last three weeks or so have been traumatic, to say the least.

The Autumn international season was always going to be a problem for any dub with players with England aspirations. Almost by definition, that means for the best and most successful sides, probably the leaders in the Premiership table.

That's fine for the dubs in the mid-to-low reaches of the table because it gives them a chance to make up a little



ground on their more illustrious rivals, but it's very hard on the others, especially when, like Gloucester, they have an injury list to contend with too.

Last week's game provides a case in point. On paper, given the evidence of results so far this season, and remembering the pulsating equivalent match last time round, Gloucester Vs Sale at Kingsholm should have been one of the highlights of the season, but in the event, both sides were castrated to such an extent that it virtually became a United fixture.

We all know that such circumstances can produce some exciting rugby, and give a chance for young hopefuls to show what they can do, but one does have to say that quality of play inevitably suffers, and as last week, what should have been a trial of strength between two giants of one of the best and toughest leagues in the world became a travesty of what it should have been.

You can't blame the management of the clubs. At the start of the season, Gloucester looked to have a squad quite strong enough to cope with the depredations of the England squad, but no one could have foreseen that we would have to cope with an injury list of almost a dozen players just at the time when three more were required for the Autumn internationals.

We're not alone, of course. I see that Leicester had to call Richard Cockerill from the coaching team to start as firstchoice hooker last weekend, and that Rob Andrew could well have been without Jamie Noon for Newcastle's game against Saracens about 48 hours before the game was due to take place, which had him spitting blood.

Bath have had their problems too, but I think that we can claim to have been more badly affected than anyone.

One thing we can't deny. That is that you can't knock the sheer commitment, effort and spirit that the tattered remnants of the squad have shown over the last month or so. They've played their hearts out, and we're grateful to them for that.

For certain, the situation is unsatisfactory from the point of view of the dubs, the players and the supporters. Surely, something has to be done because, if nothing else, qualification for next year's Heineken Cup could well be affected by results from this time of the year, and that has enormous ramifications. financial and otherwise.

I'm too senile to pretend to have an answer, but better rugby brains than mine must find one, and quickly. Didn't there used to be a rule that allowed clubs with three or more players away on international duty to postpone the fixture?

I hope all this doesn't sound like whingeing, because I do think we have a right to feel hard done-by.

G. R. F. 62 1961 - 62 World Lost 18 Draws

A. TOWNSEND P. MEADOWS P. FORD A. HOLDER IT. HOPSON A question asked by Justin Hopwood the Club's Media Manager during the summer months was, 'Did Gilbert Jessop play rugby union for Gloucester RFC?' The enquiry eminated from the Bible of Cricket – Wisden. The mind boggling and statistical marvel stated that he did play at Kingsholm.

Gilbert, lived at nearby Churchdown when he appeared for Gloucester Rugby Club. He was always referred to as the 'Croucher' and appeared as a wing three quarter. Gilbert was also a fine sprinter at athletics.

At 5'7" tall and weighing 11 stone he appeared in nine matches for the Club. He played cricket for Gloucestershire from 1894-1914, scoring 18,936 runs from 605 innings for an average of 32.53, and scoring 36 centuries. The former Cambridge University Blue played 18 tests for England.

There have been others who have played for Gloucester Rugby Club and excelled in whites. Tony Lewis the outgoing MCC President played cricket for Glamorgan and England. Tony represented Gloucester Rugby Club while stationed at RAF Innsworth where he was serving as a National Serviceman.

Tony, who played at full back will be replaced at his MCC post by none other than Tom Graveney, one of the finest of Gloucestershire's batsman. Tony led England to India, Pakistan and Sri Lanka in 1972-193. Born on 6 July 1938,he played in nine tests scoring 457 runs for an average of 32.64.

Graham Parker, who played at full-back for Cambridge

University, Gloucester, Blackheath and England, became the County Secretary. Graham, who competed for the full back position at Kingsholm with Harold Boughton, was a double Blue.

Graham also played soccer for Gloucester City. His playing career for Gloucestershire spanned the period 1932-1951. In 70 matches he scored 1,954 runs for an average of 18.97. He took 32 wickets at an average of 42.68. Graham died in 1992.

Willie Jones, who played for Neath Rugby Club and also here at Kingsholm, played for Glamorgan CCC. The diminutive Welshman was a fine left hand bat and a brilliant fielder.

Born on 31 October 1916 in Carmarthen, Wales. He passed away on 25 July 1996 in Gloucester at the age of 79 years. Willie played 345 matches for Glamorgan CCC, he had 563 innings for the Welsh County, and was not out in 64 of them. Willie totalled 13,536 runs at an average of 27.12, his highest score was 212.

Willie hit 11 centuries and 78 half centuries. One of those half centuries came in the Cheltenham Cricket Festival of 1951 in a drawn match between the host county and it's Welsh visitors. Willie actually made 65 runs in completing his half century.

Willie was a reliable catcher and held onto 119 in his career. He bowled 11,750 balls to emphasise his all round prowess, bowling a career 439 maidens, and conceding 5,782 runs in taking 192 wickets at an average of 30.11. His best bowling figures were 5-50. Willie was capped by Glamorgan in 1946 and in his benefit season he collected £4,460.

In his career here at Kingsholm Willie Jones recorded 38 dropped goals, three behind Micky Booth's club record of 41. Willie had a hat trick of drop goals versus Bedford in the 1946-1947 season. He also landed a career total of 83 conversions. Willie scored 17 dropped goals in the season of 1947-1948, still a club record!

E.J.Stephens played for Gloucester Rugby Club and Gloucestershire, and once upon a time had a cricket coaching school at Longford. His career with Gloucestershire spanned 10 years from 1927-1937. In 216 matches he scored 4,593 runs for an average of 17.73 and took 29 wickets at a cost of 40.37 runs average. He was the uncle of Eric Stephens the point scoring legend who totalled 1,562 points in his career with Gloucester.

Maurice McCanlis, played for England, Oxford University, Gloucester, Gloucestershire, Kent, Blackheath and the Barbarians at Rugby Union. He made one solitary appearance for Gloucester CCC, he did not bat and his bowling analysis was Overs 7, Maidens 0, Runs conceded 32, failing to take a wicket.

Maurice gained three cricket 'Blues' for Oxford University from 1926 to 1928, captaining the University in 1928. Maurice later played for Surrey CCC making 30 appearances. In 45 innings, he averaged 15.40 runs. He also played for Ragputa in India. Born on 17 June 1906 in Quetta, India he attended Cranleigh School and later Oxford.

He later tutored at Cheltenham College, but passed away on 27 September 1991 at Pershore in Worcestershire. Maurice was capped twice by England at Rugby Union as wing three quarter in 1931 versus Wales and Ireland, both matches were played at Twickenham.

Another player who played for Gloucestershire was H.V.Page who played for Gloucestershire CCC from 1883-1895. Representing the County in 102 matches he scored 2,538 runs for an average of 17.03. He took 112 wickets for an average 24.10. A photograph of the Gloucestershire CCC team of 1888 shows H.V.Page

sat alongside the great W.G.Grace and his brother E.M.Grace .

H.V.Page captained Gloucestershire RFC in their losing semi final against Lancashire in 1891 at Manchester. All but one of the players were from Gloucester RFC. The one outsider was Welsh International S.H.Nicholls of Cardiff. A former master at Cheltenham College he had the career distinction of scoring four half centuries for the County in Cheltenham Cricket Festivals! Herbert Page died in a Cheltenham nursing home in 1927.

Seven players who proved that they were accomplished at both sports, will we see their like again? A muddied oaf in winter and the tranquil run maker in summer or is it a sense of 'de -ja-vu' for the multi talented?

many last-ditch tackles did he miss? None, I think you will find, so to make such an assertion is just daft.


So a short break for a couple of Zurich Premiership matches, and now we're back to the Heineken Cup and back-to-back matches with Cardiff.


Amor converted but Sale, eager to stay in the top three, clawed their way back into the game before the break with Gloucester old boy Robert Todd powering through.


