



We know Kingsholm doesn't need to have an artificially enhanced matchday atmosphere, and that our supporters are the best around. There is no doubt in my mind about that!


Shout, cheer and get behind the boys today and hopefully it will be a memorable afternoon.



Mike talks to Mike Tindall and Dave Attwood, two players who know a few things about the famous Gloucester-Bath rivalry and what it means to play in the derby.

A REAL TRADITION



After being dumped out of Europe in the most unceremonious of manners, there can be no better game to return to action than in a West Country derby.

Gloucester failed to turn up for the first 50-odd minutes at Adams Park and were made to pay as their hopes and dreams of silverware were left in tatters yet again.

But as James Simpson-Daniel pointed out this week, a local derby is the perfect remedy when things are not all rosey in the Cherry and White garden.

In a season where there has been very little to cheer, a victory over the great unmentionables would finally give the Gloucester faithful something to shout about.

Gloucester versus Bath is one of the great rugby rivalries and the envy of domestic leagues across the world.

It is local derbies such as this, the biggest in the West Country, that make the Aviva Premiership such a rich, exciting and vibrant league – it is the lifeblood of the game

Real history. Real traditions. Real supporters. Real clubs.

It says it all about not only about

the current plight of Welsh rugby but what is so great about this derby, that a group of Cardiff Blues season ticket-holders, two of whom are family members, will be in attendance today.

In a time where the soul of Welsh rugby has been all but ripped out, a match of this traditional magnitude and built upon local bragging rights in a meaningful competition, offers a trip down memory lane.

Tradition and heritage is, and always should be, one of rugby's greatest strengths.

Few would have dared to cross

Rec before signing for Gloucester, it remains one of the standout fixtures in the rugby calendar.

Tindall said: "The West Country derby is one of the standout great games of the Premiership, the local rivalry between the two clubs.

"Leicester-Northampton and Gloucester-Bath are the two big local rivalries and that hasn't really changed.

"It's the same both ways, from my experiences, at Bath we had always had a proud record against Gloucester. But now I've been here, it's always Bath and how much the

silence the sell-out crowd by flexing Bath's collective muscle up front.

He added: "Kingsholm is traditionally a stronghold for Gloucester but it is not something they have managed to establish this season.

"So it will be important to take the game away from the Kingsholm crowd as early as possible, because they really can be the 16th man and get in players' heads. We have to match that emotion from the offset.

"The pack has been a strength of ours all season and that's testament to the players. We would be daft



the great divide between Bath and Gloucester in days gone by, but Rob Fidler was one of the first in the modern era - making the switch in 2003 following nine years and more than 250 games in Cherry and White.

Many have followed suit in the years since and both teams currently boast players who have played for the enemy.

He expects a typical warm welcome at Castle Grim but aims to

MATCHDAY PROGRAMMES



THE Gloucester Rugby Heritage Project's website currently holds something in the region of 1600 Gloucester programmes dating from about 1900 to 2001/02 - and we're actively working on the later years.


As we've been scanning and uploading we've noticed the dramatic change in style and format - and what better to illustrate this today than to take a look at the front covers of Glaws v. Bath programmes?

The earliest programme we have for matches between the two sides is dated 16 November 1946. It's a single folded sheet, showing the two teams, with just ten scant lines of notes, information on how Gloucester Rugby Club members can apply for international tickets (at 10/- a pop), and a list of First XV fixtures for the season with the results to date.

Six years later the design had changed, the fixtures and results appeared on the front cover, and there was almost a full page of notes.

The programme for 8 February 1958 carried a comment on the





8 Feb 1958

RAF "during the last war", and which had led to many enquiries as to just how old he was.

The club rapidly withdrew the "during the last war" comment. The cover design was cleverly augmented for floodlit matches, as for the one against Bath on 7 February 1969.




(Left): 13 Dec 1958 (Right): 7 Feb 1969

The 1975/76 season finally saw the end of this long-running cover,

and the programme for the match against Bath on 17 February 1976 displayed a new cover featuring, for the first time, a monochrome photograph.

This design lasted for a couple of seasons before being replaced by the design seen for the match on 10 December 1977.



There then followed a regular change of design for the remainder of the amateur era, gradually introducing a limited amount of colour.

Full colour programmes arrived when the game went professional in 1996, when we were introduced to the "First Division Rugby Promag", a production of English Rugby First Division Ltd and containing both syndicated articles and local contributions.




The cover format was the same for all clubs, although the cover photographs differed. This lasted for just one season before the clubs all went their separate ways again and the present programme style was introduced, gradually increasing in size until we reach the 82 page full colour glossy magazine we see today, packed full of information - and advertisements.

But adverts are by no means a new concept, as they appear in the c. 1900 programme - no doubt providing a useful source of funds for the club, supplementing the income from the programme cover price.

Space doesn't allow us to take a look back at the many contributors to the programmes over the years, but a special mention should go to Arthur Russell, who produced his "Kingsholm Kackle" from 1965/66 until 1979/80, and to Peter Arnold whose notes first appeared in 1980/81 and who was still writing his column in 2012/13.

LET'S PUSH THINGS FORWARD

FOR A YOUNG MAN BROUGHT UP WATCHING GAMES FROM THE SHED, THE WEST COUNTRY DERBY DAY IS ONE THAT REALLY CATCHES THE IMAGINATION AND, FOR BEN MORGAN, IT IS NO DIFFERENT.

After starring for England in the RBS Six Nations, it's back to domestic battles for the number eight and being back in Cherry and White.

"It's been really good, obviously

you have to learn as much as you can from it.

"It's more about slotting in the best that you can, and adding bits where they need to be and improving the squad.

"I think the atmosphere there, it's pretty incredible. I think that it's something that they're trying to focus on there at Twickenham. The whole experience, the long walk in, that kind of thing all helps.

"I think on a smaller scale, it's the same situation at Kingsholm. The support really is the sixteenth man on the field for the players and it really does make all the difference to us."

At the back of many players' minds is the prospect of the Rugby World Cup on home soil next year, but Morgan is fully focused on putting right the wrongs of this campaign and putting in a starring role at Kingsholm.


"I think you have to look after your club form before you can focus on any international business. We have set targets now back here, and it's all about hitting those targets. It hasn't been the season that we would have wanted but we have a chance to end it on a real high.

"We're in control now of what goes on, we have four Aviva Premiership clashes left to go and only we can control what happens now.

"It's going to be a great game today against Bath. It's the sort of game that, as a player, you want to be involved in and at Kingsholm. There is a lot of history behind it.

"It means so much to everyone at the club, but as well, everyone in the area. It's those bragging rights for the rest of the year, and all about getting one over on your local rivals."


be good, because at least that way my heart rate might stay somewhere close to where it is supposed to be.

WHEN IT COMES TO CLUB OCCASIONS, FEW DOMESTIC GAMES CAN MATCH THIS AFTERNOON'S FIXTURE.

YOU only had to see the "sold out" signs last Monday to realise that, and the feeling today will be heightened a little because the prospect of another game against the blue, black and whites in two weeks time was taken away by events last weekend.

While Bath were crushing a Brive side without an away win in the Top 14 all season, and with most of their leading players rested, Gloucester's interest in the Amlin Challenge Cup ended at Wasps.

I recall seeing details of the Italian officials and wondering what impact that might have in a game between two English sides. I'm not one of those who suggests that Gloucester get the thin end of the wedge every time from referees - that simply doesn't wash - but when some of the injured players take to social media in disbelief at a key decision while the game is still in progress, that says to me that the

use of the TMO has to be looked at.

The score in question was the second Wasps try, awarded early in the second half with the score at 13-3. There were two elements of doubt - had the ball been touched down short of the line, and was there a knock on in the build up.

The TMO was introduced to make sure the correct decision is made, but sometimes the conversation between the referee and the TMO makes that difficult. It shouldn't be.

Ultimately, the referee goes to the TMO because he isn't sure if a try is scored. He should only ask the TMO if he can confirm the touchdown. If neither are sure, it's not a try. What we often hear is "is there any reason why I cannot award a try?" which is a very different question.

Moreover, the decisions, as on Sunday, are taking far too long. The body language of the players directly involved usually says a lot, and if the officials can't decide

within a limited time (maybe 2 minutes) then it should be a five metre scrum. Sunday's decision for Festuccia's try took an eternity.

It must be said however, that Wasps deserved to win. Nigel Davies said afterwards that Gloucester "didn't fire any shots" until it was too late, and those shots only came when Nathan Hughes was in the bin.

After feeling as if the team had taken a step forward at Exeter, it looked to have lost ground again at Adams Park. The hope will be that today's occasion can be a lift once more, because all Gloucester's eggs are now in the Premiership basket.

At the time of writing, the belief remains that the team finishing 7th will be involved in a play off with the 7th placed club in the Top 14

for the last Champions Cup place next season, although this is still to be signed off. It looks like a three way scrap, with the top six now clear of the remainder.

A victory today, especially with Wasps, London Irish and Worcester

Newer or younger supporters may wonder how long the rivalry has existed between Gloucester and Bath. Both teams were, in 1987, part of the first

along with the final in 1990. All of those games were won by Bath.

I remember talking to PA announcer Graham Spring about this fixture. "It felt like the world had ended when we lost at Twickenham 24 years ago" he said. "The will to beat Bath stems from memories of disappointment."

Overall, however, results have been re-balanced since. The League record is now close, with Gloucester



A WIN OVER HARLEQUINS THE WEEK PREVIOUS GAVE NIGEL DAVIES' MEN A BIG BOOST GOING INTO THE TRIP TO FRANKLIN'S GARDENS TO TAKE ON THE LEAGUE LEADERS.

For an hour of the contest, Gloucester matched their opponents and were doing a grand job of frustrating the home crowd but, as the hosts flexed their muscle and unloaded their bench, the result was only going one way.

Everything the hosts were throwing at the Cherry and Whites was being dealt with until the closing stages, when the Saints pulled away to make the scoreline look impressive, backing up their determination to display how hard done by they felt following the reverse fixture in September.

Saints struck first - a loose ball wasn't dealt with and it bounced into the hands of Ken Pisi who turned and burst through a gap to run home untouched.

Then, with the Saints looking to add to that, Henry Trinder pounced on a loose pass, gambling on making the interception and he ran in from his own try line to level the scores.

It was a lively game and Gloucester were making hay in attack. Twice in quick succession Huia Edmonds gathered and kicked forward only to be taken out - both times neither was punished, much to Gloucester's frustration.

Both teams were giving it their all, but mistakes were creeping into the match and it would come down to who could capitalise to seize the upper hand in the arm wrestle.

Myler added a penalty after Gloucester were harshly adjudged to have infringed at the ruck, but Freddie Burns leveled the scores

with a quarter of the game gone.

Gloucester had to work hard in defence in the phases before the break, a strong home maul was held just short but Myler knocked over the succeeding penalty to give the home side the ascendancy at the break.

Burns converted an early second half penalty after good running from Edmonds and Hudson before, tied

in defence but, from the moment Calum Clark touched down after wriggling out of a tackle, the momentum sat firmly with the hosts.




