



Simpson-Daniel joined Gloucester Rugby as a teenager straight from Sedbergh School, and quickly gave a glimpse of things to come, scoring a try on debut against Rotherham in 2001.

He proceeded to light up grounds all over the country with his dazzling talent, a sensational score for England against the Barbarians when he outfoxed Jonah Lomu living long in the memory

He won 10 England caps, untimely illness and injury robbing him of what should have been many more appearances for his country, but he will be

remembered primarily for wearing the Cherry and White of Gloucester.

Across 14 seasons, he made more Premiership appearances for the club than any other player, scoring 118 tries from 250 starts.

Director of Rugby David Humphreys spoke of his regret at not being able to see Simpson-Daniel in competitive action.

"He was a unique talent. I played against him and, even though he was an opponent who could really hurt you on the pitch, he was a joy to watch.

"It's a real blow for him and, personally, I'm disappointed that he's had to retire before I had the opportunity to enjoy seeing him play as a colleague.

"But his influence on this Gloucester Rugby side will continue to be felt. He's helped to develop and mentor the likes of Jonny May and Charlie Sharples, both international wingers in their own right. And he will have inspired countless others to play the game.

"On behalf of everyone at Gloucester Rugby, I'd like to thank him for everything he's done for the club and wish him all the very best for the future."

Sinbad will be leading the team out today, so there is one last chance to show a true Gloucester Rugby legend exactly how much he means to us all.

THE FEEL-GOOD FACTOR

WEEK one and a record Premiership defeat in the first competitive match of the David Humphreys-Laurie Fisher era. Hardly the perfect start.

All of that optimism, a new dawn at Gloucester with a world class squad and a coaching team to boot.

The club did their best to temper the feel-good factor surging through the corridors of Kingsholm and the city of Gloucester, but supporters were still brimming with hope for the new season.


At the official Aviva Premiership launch, journalists, coaches and players alike were all cooing about the impressive summer of change, top four finishes and what lies ahead for the Cherry and Whites.

Now we know...or have at least had our eyes widened.

Make no mistake now is not the time to push any panic buttons. Humphreys always maintained that the rebuilding process at Gloucester would take time.

Northampton Saints gave a realistic appraisal to exactly where the Cherry and Whites currently stand.

It displayed just how big the gulf in quality is between the champions and Gloucester who finished ninth.

Unlike today's hosts, Saints have been building this ruthless squad for five years, they signed just two players in the summer and know exactly what each player brings and where they fit in. They possess a sixth sense of what their teammate will do next.

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As Charlie Sharples said:
You can't justify losing the
first game of the season by 50
points which was incredibly
disappointing after all the

expectation and all the hard work.

"It was difficult to know what be expect going into the game because we had only been begether for a few weeks, I don't think anyone expected us to lose that and that was the most disappointing aspect - we weren't able to compete.

"But it was a good lesson of the improvements we need to make if we want to be the top team in the eague.

We will address what went and quickly turn our focus

to Sale. In all the times I have faced Northampton that was the best they have played."

There is no reason why Gloucester cannot substantially close the gap, maybe we just need to be more realistic in our expectations.

You cannot deny that Gloucester boast a squad packed with the quality to compete with any team when they are at the top of their game.

You cannot deny that Gloucester boast a coaching team with a formidable and widespread experience which would be the envy of anyone else in the Premiership.

As pointed out by several

players and pundits on both sides of the fence, Sharples included, Northampton's performance on Friday was good enough to beat any side.

They were ruthlessly efficient and clinical, confrontational and disciplined. Everything they touched turned to gold.

So while the defeat was a dose of reality there is no immediate need to be downbeat. Today's clash with Sale Shark provides the perfect opportunity to bounce back and right a few wrongs.

One thing is for sure, we all know that there is much more to come from Gloucester.

THE LION'S DEN

IN THE NORTH-EAST CORNER OF THE GROUND IS THE LION'S DEN, THE OLDEST BUILDING ON THE KINGSHOLM GROUND.

N match days, the main room acts as a watering hole for spectators, who can enjoy a drink whilst admiring the team photographs and honours boards, which adorn the walls.

Covering most of the history of the Club, these display the players and the playing record for each season. At other times, this room can be hired by those who want to enjoy a function surrounded by Gloucester Rugby heritage.

The building also houses the Glo'ster Boys Bar, home of the Players' Association, where former heroes of the Shed gather to reminisce amidst photos of their exploits. The rest of the building is given over to offices and storerooms and, during the week, the Club's Community and Stadium Management departments operate from here.

ORIGINS

The Club suffered a big loss from hosting the England v Wales International in 1900, and it took some years to get the balance sheet back onto an even keel.

Five years later they were confident enough to contemplate paying more rent, and therefore asked the Gloucester Football and Athletic Ground Company, who owned the ground, to develop the facilities there.

The Company Board decided



that they should build a gymnasium, training quarters, Club office and committee room, for which the Club agreed that they would pay extra rent of £100 a season

Shareholders in the Company were invited to a meeting at Kingsholm in June 1905 to hear about the plans, which were presented by the Company architect, Harry Dancey.

The Company Chairman, A W Vears, said that the cost would be £1,012, and admitted that the

The meeting degenerated into a debate about the relative merits of electric or gas lighting. Messrs Moffatt and Robinson both argued strongly against "the electric light", believing "incandescent gas as an illuminant" to be more economical and efficient – "electric light was a thing of the past" and four times as expensive.

Others were just as vehement in favour of electric lighting. Mr Jennings contended that "the electric light in Gloucester is especially good", and Mr Grant insisted it was cheaper than gas, on the evidence of the two lights (one gas and one electric) in his home.

Eventually the Chairman managed to put the motion to the meeting, erection of the gymnasium was approved



Club rather than the Company and its shareholders would benefit from the new facilities, but nevertheless recommended the scheme as a means of supporting the Club.


unanimously, and the pressure was then on to have it erected for the start of the season.

The building work (including electric lights) was entrusted to Mr A J Dolman, the cold-water









plumbing to Messrs Turner and Pritchard, and the boiler and hot-water supply to Messrs Woodward and Co.

The gymnasium was opened with some fanfare by the local MP, Russell Rea, before the first match of the season on 23rd September 1905. The presence of the great and the good of Gloucester, who made speeches galore, and Fred Rowland's band, made it quite an occasion.

Company took out an additional mortgage of £1,000 with the Gloucester Conservative Benefit Society, and issued a further 150 shares in the Company, which were all bought by the Club.

THUMBS UP FROM THE ALL BLACKS

A month after the gymnasium was opened the first All Blacks side to tour in the Northern Hemisphere came to Kingsholm. Gloucester were pulverised 44-0, but at least the gymnasium was admired by the visitors, who reckoned it housed the best facilities they had come across on their tour.

Indeed four of them were so keen on their Kingsholm experience that they came back at the end of their tour to don the Cherry and White in a match against Leicester. They were instrumental in Gloucester winning 20-0 and Leicester were not amused.

WAR MEMORIAL At the end of the First World War, the Club erected a



As can be seen on the plans, the original design included a balcony overlooking the pitch, described as an additional grandstand. This was not included in the original construction to reduce costs, the intention being to add it later, but that never happened.

The total cost of the gymnasium turned out to be £1,140. To fund this, the Ground memorial to those players who had lost their lives in the war. It was placed just inside the door of the gymnasium through which the players exited on their way out to the pitch to start a game, and it became a tradition that the players all reached up to touch it as they passed as a mark of respect. The memorial now hangs in the entrance corridor to the Lion's Den.



ALL A QUESTION OF TIMING


The original clock on the gymnasium also dated back to the years following World War One, when it was presented by the Club President, Sir James Bruton. A man was paid £2 a year to keep it wound up.

By 1946 Mr Brunsdon had this job and was being paid 2 guineas a year. He demanded an increase in salary to £5 per year, but the Club committee reacted by dispensing with his services altogether, and adding the job to the groundsman's duties.

MEAT OR NO MEAT For several decades the two teams were served teas in the gymnasium after a game. These teas became so popular, and the number of gate crashers so great, that the Club had to issue tickets for entry. However, the standard of the teas did vary.

In 1947 the Committee decided that the caterer should provide teas for 55 people in the Lions' Den. Normally this would be plain teas with cakes and sandwiches, at a total cost of £5.

Only on special occasions would they splash out £7.50 on meat teas, an honour first accorded to Cardiff and Leicester.

Following in the footsteps of recent Scots; Lawson x2, Strokosch, Hamilton and Redpath the multi-talented Laidlaw is enjoying things, as he explained ahead of today's game.

"Pre season has been good, and the boys have gelled behind

the scenes. It's been good to get down, settled well and I'm very much looking forward to getting my first Aviva Premiership run out at Kingsholm this weekend

"I've settled in really well in the area, I'm enjoying it very much. It's a busy enough place but it's also quiet enough to get away from things, and that is something that I like."

With the noise of the preseason friendlies still fresh in his mind, Laidlaw is raring to go against Sale Sharks, and cannot wait to experience Kingsholm in full voice. "Ah, the crowd during preseason against Munster certainly took me aback, around about 13 thousand here, it was magnificent. It just shows what the club means to the local people around the area and, for us as a playing group, we really appreciate that support."

Greig got a fortnight of tough pre-season under his belt at Kingsholm and Hartpury College before returning to Scotland for the birth of his first child Ruary, and he already has plans to introduce the youngest Laidlaw to the glawsfamily!

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"As long as the game is during the day and it's not his bedtime! I'd be delighted to get him along and show him what it is all about, and my wife is also excited to come along and enjoy Kingsholm too."

On the pitch, Laidlaw's career has seen him take on some of world rugby's finest, both domestically in the Pro 12 for Edinburgh and as a key part of the Scotland side, and Friday's defeat at Northampton Saints definitely confirmed his assessment of the challenge ahead in the Aviva Premiership.

"When I signed, that was the big draw, playing in the Premiership, along with Gloucester being such a fantastic club. I

his half-back colleagues, Dan Robson, Callum Braley, Aled Thomas, Billy Burns and James Hook, all players with varying experience.

"We're working together well as a six, and that's the way you get better as players and as a squad. You need your squad in a competition like this; it's so attritional and confrontational.

"Working together and training hard helps you get the best out of your squad, and ultimately that makes you better players."

In the Sale Sharks ranks this afternoon is another experienced Scottish halfback in Chris Cusiter, and Laidlaw is relishing locking horns again with his compatriot.

"That is what you want, and you can get the most out of yourself as a player. It's really important that we get our home form right this season, and that is a really key part of having a successful campaign."



I don't know about you, but by


that point my head was spinning. The talent we had on and off the field was awesome. We went from laughing stock to jaw-dropping

For me the first was more significant that the second. On September 2nd, the following few words appeared on Twitter: "It's with a heavy heart I announce my retirement from rugby...



Everyone will have their favourite Sinbad moment, turning Lawrence Dallaglio and Simon Shaw inside out in one fell swoop, running rings round Jonah



Lomu... and Christian Cullen... and Percy Montgomery - a list of Sinbad moments would fill this programme and more.

Rugby fans up and down the country, regardless of their clubs, lined up to pay tribute and to wonder how such a talented player only clocked up 10 caps for his country. I'm with them, had he been born in any - and I mean any - other country he could have opened a milliners shop to cope with the number of caps he would have won.

Twitter went nuts, hundreds of people saying great things. And being the bloke he is, Sinbad spent the next few hours (days probably) responding to everyone personally. That, my friends, is pure class.



N a way the game was a shot to nothing. Gloucester could lose by 10 points at Franklins Gardens at any stage in the season and barely an eyelid would be batted. Net outcome, zero points.

To lose by such a wide margin to an impressive Saints team (net outcome also zero points) merely emphasised what David Humphreys had stated repeatedly since he arrived. Moulding this group won't be done overnight.

Following James Simpson-Daniel's retirement - which is reflected elsewhere - he is now the longest serving member of the squad, and is working with his fifth different Director of Rugby at Kingsholm, having been signed by Nigel Melville.

"It felt strange sitting in a team meeting at the start of the season, looking around and realising that from the old guard there was only Sinbad and I left" said Wood.

"Obviously now it's only me, although Alex Brown and Tim

"It has felt like a gear change though, on the coaching side as well as the playing side. It's a real investment from the club. Only Trevor Woodman remains from the previous coaching set-up, and he was only part of it towards the end of last season.

"The new players have come in and pushed training levels because everyone is trying to keep up with James Hook, John Afoa and Richard Hibbard. The average age is down even though some of the guys are over 30 but they have a lot of rugby left in them and I think it's a good balance of age and experience."

One man unable to help stem the green, yellow and gold tide was Nick Wood, who has been troubled since pre season by spasms in his back. Taylor have non playing roles. It's a bit daunting in a way but I've been around long enough and seen the squad change enough times to realise you have to make

rated highly by his peers, even if that hasn't translated into a bucket load of England caps. He's conscious too, that in terms of honours he has some catching up to do, having been loyal to Gloucester throughout his career.

"I missed out on the 2006 Challenge Cup final through injury, so I didn't feel 100% part of it, and in 2007-08 I was part of the squad that fell at the final hurdle in the Premiership. To me, that still stings even now.

"Gloucester is one of the four teams to have constantly been in the top division and the other three (Bath, Leicester and Wasps) have all won it. That tells a tale of nearly men and I want to be around when we are up there again and finish the job off, although as a squad we're not talking about titles or top four or top six because we are effectively starting from scratch.

"We're talking about a philosophy and brand of rugby that we want to play, based on individual performances of a certain calibre. Nine times out of ten the result should take care of itself in that situation.

"David (Humphreys) runs the show but he trusts his team underneath him to do their jobs. Laurie (Fisher) has an instinctive feel for the game and Trevor (Woodman) continues in my opinion to make a real impact because he offers real insight in terms of individual technique."

It has been unusual for Wood to miss games on fitness grounds in recent times. The odd minor operation at the end of the season has been down to wear and tear, and he's working harder than ever to stay in the best possible shape, conceding that, in his early days



at Gloucester, youth and overall fitness would carry him through if he had a beer after a match. Do that these days and you'll soon be out of the team, such is the competition for places.

"We've made some incredible signings. We've got three international class fly halves now (Hook, Laidlaw and Twelvetrees)

and guys like Mark Atkinson and Jacob Rowan have come in and impressed me.


Wood frowns as I mention it, recalling how the Sharks caught Gloucester napping with two tries off first phase possession on the way to victory.
