

our own fans following a slightly nomadic end to last season.


With Rugby World Cup involvement ceased for most, we know Saracens will be able to call upon a lot of quality to add to their squad and they looked impressive in their opening game.

I WASN'T SURPRISED TO READ THAT KINGSHOLM WAS RECENTLY RATED AS THE SECOND BEST STADIUM AT RUGBY WORLD CUP 2015 - A HUGE COMPLIMENT FOR ALL THE SUPPORTERS AND STAFF OF GLOUCESTER RUGBY AND I'M SURE YOU'RE ALL EXCITED TO BE BACK AT HOME FOR OUR AVIVA PREMIERSHIP FIXTURE AGAINST SARACENS THIS EVENING.

THERE have been some great games in Gloucester over the past 12 months, but Friday night under lights creates a unique atmosphere at Kingsholm. The whole squad is really looking forward to the first home game of the season and building on last weekend's performance

The win at Newcastle was a great start to the new season. After a long and tough preseason for the players, everyone was ready to get back into competitive rugby. 



INTERNATIONALS BACK TO PROVE A POINT

TWICKENHAM WILL PLAY HOST TO AN EXTRA ROUND OF THE RUGBY CHAMPIONSHIP THIS WEEKEND AS THE WORLD CUP SEMI-FINALS TAKE PLACE WITH NO NORTHERN HEMISPHERE REPRESENTATION.

THERE will also be no Gloucester representation as the quest for the Webb Ellis Cup comes to a culmination – Jeremy Thrush overlooked by New Zealand and Mariano Galarza cruelly banned by a disciplinary panel with no room to wriggle.

With the exception of the second-row duo, however, the Cherry and Whites' remaining international talent is back at 'Holm and ready for a renewed assault on domestic honours.





Ben Morgan and Jonny May both came off the bench in last week's victory over Newcastle Falcons, Gloucester's first opening night win since 2009, and quite frankly they will be relieved to be back on the pitch.

Enough column inches, myself included, have been dedicated to the failings of England in a home World Cup and they will relish being surrounded by their home comforts and in a team that lacks no clarity.

Looking beyond the wilted Red Rose, while disappointed to be out of the tournament, Gloucester's Test stars will be enthused with their own performances and brimming with confidence

Greig Laidlaw has arguably been the finest scrum-half in the tournament and almost single-handedly dragged the Scots to the quarter-finals where they burst into life with no reward.

The diminutive number nine



dictated the pace of games, led by box-kick on a six-pence and was deadly in front of goal. Only Aaron Smith of New Zealand has been as consistently good.

James Hook will be frustrated by his lack of opportunities, but it is maker and he is the consummate professional.

Then we have Tonga duo Sione Kalamafoni and David Halaifonua. We did not see a lot of Halaifonua for Gloucester last season and he was restricted to a limited role with Ikale Tahi.

But Kalamafoni was his usual self and following a disappointing collective campaign he will be champing at the bit to get back out on the Kingsholm turf.

So where do Gloucester year? Well, you can say with no uncertainty they are in a much better position.

There have been no wholesale coaching staff and no mass influx

The new additions have added a dose of class and depth to their relevant positions and the squad have been together for an elongated pre-season – the World Cup omissions of the likes of Hibbard, further strength throughout.

Gloucester were attempting to through their squad and starting line-up last season.

This season, Afoa-Hibbard-Savage-Kvesic-Morgan-Laidlaw-Hook-Twelvetrees-May-Sharples runs through the core and is established.

But make no mistake, the side does not pick itself. At second-row you have Savage, Galarza and Thrush, Laidlaw and Willi Heinz at Tom Marshall?

These are wonderful luxuries to have and very necessary with the nature of rugby and the injuries the club will sustain.

But the club are now far stronger in terms of both playing resources and preparation. Ninth place was not good enough last year, it would be a disaster this time around. Top six must be the minimum.

He made his sole appearance for England against South Africa in 1932, where he started as a prop, but moved to hooker at half time. He was a reserve for England on more than twenty occasions.

"Bumps" played 61 times for Gloucestershire, which is the most by any Gloucester player. He appeared in five County Championship finals and was on the winning side four times, 1930, 31, 32 and 37.

He was as tough as teak. He would often work a shift at Lightmoor Colliery, and then come on to play for Gloucester

and addressed the whole team

"This is the babby we've brought down. He'll take anything fair and square, but you drop anything below the line and I'll be looking for you." Then beckoning to Bill, "Come on me babby, you'll be alright now."

And he was; at one stage he was tackled by one of Bristol's England internationals, who enquired solicitously as they lay on the ground together, whether Bill was OK. Bill said it was the easiest game of his whole career, and what is more Gloucester won 6-0.

Denzel made 354 appearances for Gloucester which, at the

Forwards these days are very big fellows. Sixty years or so ago they were not so large, but even by those standards Cyril Thomas was referred to as "slight", weighing in at 12 stone.

He was, however, a brilliant hooker, who seemed to win endless strikes against the head in every game. He first played for Yorkley and Lydney before making his debut for Gloucester in February 1948 against Oxford

Although acknowledged as an outstanding hooker he only played in one England trial game and that was towards the end of his career, in 1959. It is also surprising that he only made 13 appearances for Gloucestershire, but this was largely due to the fact that John Thorne, the Bristol and England hooker, was selected in preference most of the time.

Ironically in 1960 when retirement approached he broke back into the county team and displacing Thorne he made three appearances. However, he played his last game for Gloucester on 31 December 1960 against Newbridge having made 357 appearances for the Club.

Cyril captained Gloucester in the 1958-59 season, which was not a successful one, where only 17 out of 42 games were won. From 1947 to 1960 he played in









Reg Chamberlayne was a good hooker whose career corresponded with that of Cyril Thomas. Consequently he was invariably his understudy. However, he still made 127 appearances from 1948 to 1962.





and would have walked into the first XV of most first class clubs. He did though play in 43 games in the 1950-51 season, when Cyril returned to Lydney for one season.

Mike Nicholls was born in September 1940 and played his early rugby for Old Centralians. He had a baptism of fire when making his first appearance for Gloucester in September 1961 at Cardiff. It took him until the 1965-66 season to become first choice hooker, but for the next ten seasons there was no shifting him.

He was an uncompromising player and like a terrier around



with great success from 1970-72 and again in 1973-74, each of which were record-breaking seasons in terms of games won. In the 1970-71 season he played in all 51 games, and in 1973-74 in 52 out of 54.

Perhaps the most memorable season was 1971-72, when Gloucester won the inaugural National Knock-Out Competition. The team played all their games away from home at Bath, Bristol, London Welsh, Coventry and, in the final, at Twickenham, Moseley.

The most memorable game was the win (9-4) against London Welsh, whose team contained four British Lions and



seven internationals. Nobody gave Gloucester a chance against such star-studded opposition. Much of the success must be put down to the leadership of Mike, who inspired the team. His pre-match talks. players freely admitted, were frightening.

The style of play did not endear Gloucester to the purists, or the press. It was a case of a formidable pack, rock hard tackling and well directed kicking. But it worked. The whole team was galvanised by Mike's leadership.

Although so successful at club level, Mike only made 10 appearances for the county from 1961 to 1972. He was unfortunate in that John Thorne and John Pullin, both of Bristol, were his competitors for the hooking berth. He also played in one England trial game.

Mike played his last game on 22 October 1977 against Nottingham. In his career he made 434 appearances for the club. After retirement he became team coach and a long serving Committee man for the Club. After a long illness he died in December 2012.

THE return to Kingsholm has also been a long time in coming - May 24th's European Rugby Champions Cup play off victory over Connacht was the last time the Cherry and Whites ran out at their spiritual home, in front of their own fans, so this Friday is a long awaited return.

In the sweeper role at full back, Cook was in prime position to marshal and coordinate the Cherry and White defensive effort which forced countless penalties on the artificial turf of Kingston Park, and Cook is backing the

fact that they gave away so many penalties shows how threatened they were by us.


"It's a shame we didn't get the bonus point, but at the start of the game we would've probably bitten someone's hand off to get four points at Kingston Park.

"It was a great start, a good performance and we want to crack on. It has been a long preseason and of course we played a few friendlies but at the end of it, we really wanted to get started."

Newcastle Falcons' DoR Dean Richards was quick to lament the Falcons' indiscipline last Friday evening in the North East, but Cook believes that it was the pressure applied from the visitors that forced the indiscretion and subsequent points.

"One thing we said that we wanted, was to be disciplined, as that is what Falcons based their game on and working territory. And I think in the first half we stuck to it really well.

"Our game and our intensity caused them to give away a lot of penalties, and Billy kicked superbly.



"Billy's kicking on Friday night was exceptional to score 29 points and they weren't all just in front of the posts, they were from all over the pitch. He was 10 from 13 in the end and they were all tricky kicks and that was excellent.

"Billy controlled the game, and at ten it is a pivotal position and he bossed the game."

The return to Kingsholm this weekend is long awaited for the squad, but with the Rugby World Cup roadshow rolling off, the squad have been able to familiarize



themselves with the famous old ground which rocked for four pool stage games over the past month, as Cook reveals.

We're obviously still undefeated at Kingsholm in 2015, and we are massively excited to go out and put a performance in and I am sure the supporters are bang up for it too.,

"It's been a long time away from Kingsholm now, and we have been there for several training sessions so now we need to concentrate on getting the W."

With the home nations' involvement in the tournament ceased, it is to the benefit of the Aviva Premiership clubs as numerous players will be available for this Friday's game on both sides.

Cook admits that although it's been a difficult few weeks for some of the squad, they have been welcomed back with open arms and all have turned their focus onto a big Cherry and White effort.

"We've had such a long preseason without the Rugby World Cup guys and I know that a few of them have been in and out of squads, but the bigger picture now is that it is a big bonus for us as a squad.

"This week we welcomed back Ross and Hooky, and that adds to us a squad. Even though there have been a few sessions where we have felt like we are down to the bare bones, we have still been together as a strong unit.


"Now we have got Ross, James as well as Sione and David back after Jonny and Ben, we are in a good place. It adds depth to our squad now they are back, and we can all crack on together."

The tough test in the North East was passed with merit, and this Friday, reigning champions Saracens roll into town, perhaps with one eye on redemption following James Hook's last gasp penalty kick in the January fixture between the two sides.


NO, that's harsh. Rugby World Cup has been a tremendous event, some outstanding rugby, some amazing highs and some terrible, terrible lows.


It's going to be a majorly intense season this one, no little cup competition halfway through to give people a bit of a rest – it's going to be relentless. Strap yourselves in for the ride!

SHORTLY AFTER 9:15PM LAST FRIDAY NIGHT, PAUL DORAN-JONES REACHED 49 COMPETITIVE APPEARANCES FOR GLOUCESTER RUGBY AND COULD WELL MAKE HIS 50TH TONIGHT

HIS 48th was in the Premiership play off semi final against Saracens in May 2011 and a lot has happened in between, not all of it positive, and you sense there is catching up to do in terms of his career.


"There was a lot of heart in the decision to come back here" he told me. "It's not a secret I had a terrible two years at Harlequins, I didn't get on the pitch very much and, as a competitive guy who only wants to play, it was hard.

"For whatever reason I just couldn't stay fit and I knew it worked here for me before so I'm trying to recreate that. In hindsight it would have been easy to say you should never have left but I did so to try and further myself."


When he did depart Kingsholm that summer, the 26 year old Doran-Jones had played for England against Scotland and Ireland in the Six Nations and in the Barbarians match at Twickenham at the end of the season.

His destination was Northampton, who had the formidable Brian Mujati as first choice tight head and who had just lost to Leinster in the Heineken Cup final after the Irish province produced a thrilling second half comeback.

Four years on, Doran-Jones prefers to look forward rather than back.

"I don't want to pick holes in the decisions I made, I can't change them and I don't necessarily think I would anyway," said Doran-Jones with a certainty that you need as a professional sportsman.

"I don't regret them and I do think I read the game better now. I have belief in my own ability and I know what I can do when I am fit and firing and I don't think 30 is a bad age for a prop. There is still room for improvement in my performance and that is what I am looking to extract."

Doran-Jones' last international duty was on the summer tour to Argentina in 2013, when he had been head-hunted by 'Quins after they lost James Johnston to tonight's opponents, Saracens.

There appeared no reason why he should not remain in the international picture, but Doran-Jones admits what transpired was very different.

"My form wasn't great at The Stoop after I picked up a neck injury in my second game and carried it on and off for the whole season" Paul said.

"The scrum rules changed and I never had a consistent run to adapt to them, and then last season I tore my calf early on and didn't play again, which is why I can't wait to pick up where I left off here if I can, I had a call to meet David Humphreys and Laurie Fisher and they gave me the opportunity to come back."



It's fair to say Doran-Jones hasn't put many miles on the clock over the last four seasons. His total tally of Premiership appearances is less than half that of Nick Wood and there is only two years between them, and that may work in Gloucester's favour in the long run, especially if Paul's enthusiasm carries from our chat onto the pitch.

"Last season Gloucester were probably the form team after Christmas and there are some great people in and around the playing group" he said.

"It's a tough old schedule this year so we're all going to be needed but we're all buzzing to get out here again especially after the atmosphere which has been around Kingsholm with the World Cup.

"Saracens are an astute and hard nosed side and any indiscipline plays right into their hands but we'll look to take them on up front and cause them problems."


As we welcome Mark McCall's team, my mind goes back to January and James Hook's booming last minute penalty that secured victory and started an 11 match unbeaten run at home through until the end of the season.

It's hard to see it not being just as close this evening after last weekend's opening round of games saw both sides dominate at the breakdown and in the scrum, with Billy Twelvetrees' accuracy from the tee accounting for Newcastle and Sale conceding five tries at Allianz Park.

It was a bruising encounter at the Memorial Stadium, with several Gloucester players leaving the field with knocks even before the half hour mark was reached.








