HEARTIEST congratulations to Richmond on their splendid victory over Cambridge University. A very large crowd, one of the biggest for a long time at the Athletic Ground, saw a very fast and exciting game in which Richmond played better football as a team than for some seasons past. The success and the grand team work augurs well for to-day's game with Gloucester.

Gloucester are one of the outstanding West-country sides, always very welcome indeed when they come to London. Last year, on the Kingsholm Ground at Gloucester, Richmond took a rather severe beating by 29 points to 3, and provided Gloucester with their tenth victory running. This season Gloucester do not seem quite so strong, and have won only three out of eight games played. There must be a very sound chance for Richmond to take their revenge and to drive home the revival in their playing fortunes.

It must be remembered that the defeat at Gloucester was inflicted on a Richmond side which did not include T. A. Kemp, H. D. Cockburn or J. J. Remlinger, none of whom was able to travel. For this afternoon's match these three are back. Kemp and Cockburn are playing no small part in this Richmond revival behind a pack which has surprised most of its opponents by its speed and staying power.

There is one forced change in the Richmond pack, P. B. R. Mitchell, who was injured in scoring a try against Cambridge last week, has a torn shoulder muscle and is unable to play. Fortunately N. C. S. Barling is available to return to the front row. Only change behind the scrum is

that Campbell returns to full back in place of G. D. Schreiner.

It will be a disappointment to many London followers that Gordon Hudson is not able to skipper the Gloucester team. He was hurt while playing for Gloucestershire against Cornwall and full back W. Hook takes over the captaincy of the side.

The fine combination of the two Gloucester half backs, Willie Jones and Danny Evans is well known, and no doubt these two will be closely watched. Jones has a reputation second to none as a drop and place kick from almost any part of the field.

Next week sees the start of County Championship matches on the Athletic Ground. On Wednesday, Middlesex meet Eastern Counties in what may easily prove one of the most thrilling matches of the preliminaries. Eastern Counties won last year's match and went on to reach the final, in which they were beaten by Lancashire. They have the bulk of last year's team still available, led as before by T. F. Huskisson. New county cap is C. N. Clayden, playing in the centre for Richmond to-day, but on the wing for the Counties.

Middlesex have decided they cannot do better than put Kemp and Cockburn in their side, another tribute to the reputation this pair are earning for themselves.

On Saturday, Richmond receive a visit from Neath, who are having a very good season indeed with 9 victories in 12 matches.
