WELCOME TO THE ARMY.

The fixture with the Army has become a popular mid-week one on the Gloucester card. Unlike the R.A.F. we play the Army when that side is in the course of team building for the Services' Annual Tournament which begins this year on February 14th when the Royal Navy and the R.A.F. meet. The Army's first engagement in this triangular trial of strength is not until March 7th, when they clash with the Royal Navy.

NUCLEUS OF FIVE.

Of the team announced for to-day's game with Gloucester, five played against the R.N. and R.A.F. in the 1952 Services Tournament. They are Pte. J. Broome (R.A.O.C.), Lieut. A. B. Edwards (R.A.E.C.), Major R. A. Neale (R.A.), Cfn. S. G. Owen (R.E.M.E.), and Lieut. H. C. Phillips (R.A.)

AND FIVE R.U. CAPS.

The Army, of course, have plenty of first-class players from whom to choose and in the selected side to-day are five Rugby Union Internationals. They are O/C. Thomson (Heriots F.P.), Sig. Brewer (Newport), Lieut. Macdonald (Edinburgh U.), Capt. Baume (Northern) and Major Neale (Rosslyn Park).

Thomson, full-back, has five 'caps' for Scotland in 1951 and 1952, but he has not played against England. Lieut. Macdonald, another Scottish International is a 'cap' against all four countries in 1950.

Major Neale played three times for England in 1951 but he was not chosen against Wales. Capt. Baume was one of the English side in the Calcutta Cup Match in 1950 and Brewer, of Newport, played for Wales against England in the same year.

Whatever the result of to-day's game, we wish our red jerseyed friends the best of luck in their effort to keep the Services Championship which they regained last year in so brilliant a fashion. Twelve months ago the Army beat Gloucester at Kingsholm by 5 points to nil, and in season 1949-50 by 26 point to 5, the heaviest home defeat for a long period. We have not beaten the Army since 1947-48.
