We extend a very hearty welcome to our visitors from Gloucester to-day. Their record for this season resembles our own very closely except that they have won two more games (12 as against our ten), but both have drawn two and lost six. The Westerners have, as usual, a fine pack of forwards of whom Bob Hodge, their captain, is reserve at Cardiff to-day, and also the redoubtable John Gwilliam is leading Wales. Hodge, of course, is a local product, but Gwilliam has joined them only this season and is a master at Bromsgrove

Gloucester have, of course, produced many internationals, but none so famous as that great forward Tommie Voyce, who figured in that almost fabulous pack led by Wakers—surely the best pack of all time. Voyce had seven consecutive caps, 1920-1-2-3-4-5-6, against Scotland and Ireland; six against Wales and France, and one against New Zealand—27 in all. Only two other Englishmen have ever exceeded this number, and singularly they were both fellow-scrummagers in that famous pack—Wakers himself (31) and R. Cove-Smith (29). Arthur Hudson, the present Hon. Secretary of Gloucester and father of Gordon Hudson the forward, played eight times for England at three-quarter, while S. Smart was another great forward with 12 caps.

Our thoughts to-day will be of the game at Cardiff and our two boys taking part. It may, after all, be only an average match, but one has a sneaking suspicion that it will be something out of the ordinary. At lot will depend on R. Burnett, of Newport, playing his first International—previously he has always been overshadowed by the brilliance of the Cardiff halves—somehow, I fancy, he will find Don White, the Northampton wing-forward, more than a nuisance. It is surely time for England to win again, for out of the five matches since the war England have only won the first, there was next a draw and Wales have won the last three.

To-day W. A. Ledwidge, the Yorkshireman who played centre for the First in a number of matches, is figuring on the wing—he has been doing well there for The Vandals, and it is really his proper position. Another native of the largest shire in R. Jolliffe (from Shoreditch Training College) has been selected to play scrum-half.

Last week we had a mud-bespattered win over Cuys. We never looked anything like losing this game, but a number of scoring chances were frittered away. Cuy's looked a better side than for a long time past.
