A GREAT OCCASION

For more than 60 years, Gloucester's rugger team has played almost under the shadow of the Cathedral. That lovely Tower, one of the most beautiful in the country has looked down upon Kingsholm, itself the site of a Roman camp, and of a manor of Saxon and Norman Kings. Both to-day are household words to every Gloucester man, whether at home or in exile.

The fabric of that great Cathedral, because of time and from other causes which cause decay, is in great peril. To preserve it the sum of £100,000 is estimated as necessary. To-day all Rugby enthusiasts are asked, by various means, to give to that fund, so that the Gloucester R.F.C. can send to the Bishop a sum worthy of its supporters.

Ready co-operation

In this, the Club has had the very willing co-operation of the Cambridge University XV. and we are most grateful to them for so readily agreeing, once they knew the admirable object we had in mind, to the change of venue so that they come to Kingsholm to play Gloucester in the Cathedral Appeal Fund Match.

The Light Blues are old rivals of ours, for the sides have been meeting ever since 1901-2. Cambridge have had a brilliant playing record this season and who among Rugby fans will ever forget the 'Varsity Match of 1952? Cambridge had not won since 1947; all the prophets spoke of a fifth successive Oxford win. How dramatically were they proved wrong!

Memorable 'Varsity Game

The record says Cambridge won by a penalty goal and a try (6 points) to a goal (5 points) but that single point triumph represented something more than just a mere close result. Storming forward play, the dour determination to hang on, despite one man off and another crippled, gave the Light Blues a victory that will always live in the annals of the game.

Roberts (Mill Hill and Christ's) I. S. Gloag (Oundle and Trinity), Captain; H. P. Morgan (Wycliffe and St. John's), T. C. Pearson (Oundle and Clare), M. J. O. Massey (Oundle and St. John's), F. R. Beringer (Methodist College, Belfast and St. Catherine's), D. G. Massey (Kings School, Macclesfield and Christ's), I. D. S. Beer (Whitgift and St. Catherine's), V. H. Leadbetter (Kettering G.S. and St. Catherine's), O. P. Woodruffe (Sherborne and Trinity Hall), P. H, Ryan (Harrow and Caius), P. J. F. Wheeler (Rugby and Magdalene). H. P. Morgan, the former Wycliffe pupil, lives in the Usk area. His defensive kicking did much to keep Oxford out in those last tremendous 20 minutes at Twickenham.
