MOSELEY v. GLOUCESTER

Coming up from the South West it is a pleasure for us to once again welcome the Gloucester XV. Our Visitors are enjoying a successful season and their playing record to date reads:—

Played 11. Won 9. Lost 2. Pts. for 129 Pts. against 57.

Perhaps their best win so far was over Newport, which must have given intense satisfaction to the Kingsholm crowd. Unfortunately, Saturday County calls have taken away some regular players in such key games as against Leicester and Coventry, at full strength. Although Gloucester were beaten in both cases the margin was so slight that it clearly indicates the Gloucester Reserves are a force to be reckoned with. In fact, some good judges have gone so far as to say that Gloucester were a trifle unlucky not to win these games even though on paper they were depleted in strength. We shall see four of the so-called reserves to-day in M. Baker, R. Stower, D. G. Bowden and G. Counsell who come into the senior side to replace John Taylor and three others who are playing for the Combined Counties against the All Blacks Touring XV. Their Vice-Captain John Gwilliam is also away being engaged in the Welsh Trial Match.

Players who we hope to see to-day include Bill Cartmell, who is an old County Cap; Peter Ford, a wing forward who may well be destined for higher honours; J. Hobbs, a scrum-half who is an East Midlands cap; and Gordon Hudson the well-known veteran player who gained an England Cap in 1947, and can still mix it with the best of them.
