NEXT SEASON'S FIXTURES.

LOUCESTER'S Fixtures for the season 1954-55 have been made public and there are several features which calls for comment. The greatest disappointment is that, for next season only, Llanelly are not among the teams to be played. We all remember that 15-13 victory here this season and the splendid display the Scarlets gave. There is one consolation, Llanelly will come back to our card in the season 1955-56 and in all probability on the basis of home and away fixtures regularly. County claims will as usual make calls on Gloucester players next season and while that must of necessity cause some interference with fixtures, the position will not be so bad as it was this season when we had to travel to Coventry and Leitester with weakened sides and face the clever Cardiff combination disorganised by County calls. Next season Gloucester will be at home to Blackheath and Coventry on County dates. On the day the County meet Somerset at Kingsholm (November 13th) our engagement is at Moseley.

There are several new sets of opponents to be met next season, notably Ebbw Vale and Aberavon and in February, 1955, the National Civil Service side will be seen at Kingsholm, while New Brighton and Sale

will be Easter visitors.
