FINE CHESHIRE SIDE.

WE do not, here in Gloucester, get much opportunity of seeing North Country sides and if for no other reason, we extend the hand of friendly greeting to-day to Birkenhead Park, a side which supplies much of the playing strength of the Cheshire County side.

The Park's record up to and including last Saturday reads:—Played 33, Won 13, Drawn 6, Lost 14. Points for 368, against 324. Their game a week ago was in London with Rosslyn Park and the match ended in a six points all draw. We do not now meet Rosslyn Park and so there is no comparative basis which can be used. After this programme was prepared (early to meet the printer's demands because of a short holiday week), Birkenhead played at Bristol and the result should help you to assess the capabilities of the visiting side.

Their record, however, shows that they prefer an open game to a tight one and there is nothing that gives our spectators greater pleasure than to see the ball given plenty of air. That is what we expect to-day and we feel we shall not be disappointed.

When Gloucester met Birkenhead Park on the last occasion two years ago, the City won 9 points to 3 points.

BOYS' RED LETTER DAY.

HIS, as has been pointed out in previous programmes is a red letter year for football in Gloucester's Schools. For 50 years now the Schools' Union has been operating and the devoted band of teachers who has sought to instil a love of Rugger into their pupils have the great satisfaction of knowing they have done their job thoroughly well. Our Schools' XV is unbeaten this season and we ask every supporter of Rugger to come along and cheer the boys and those who have stood behind them all through this half century of Rugger history.

CHANGES IN RULES.

EXT season sees an attempt by the International Rugby Board to deal more firmly with what is known as misconduct.

Unlawful interference and misconduct, WHILE THE BALL IS OUT OF PLAY, will be dealt with by the award of a penalty kick where the ball would next have been brought into play if the infringement had not occurred.

The referee should either caution the offending player or send him off. For a second offence he must order him off (the word "must" is given in capital letters in the official statement).

Instead of "a note to referees" it is now made law that "a player must not risk a penalty kick in order to gain or save a try by foul or unfair play."

It is added "OBSTRUCTION OR INFRINGEMENT MUST BE VERY SHARPLY DEALT WITH BY THE REFEREE."
