The Tigers' sheet to date reads: played 22, won 12, drawn 0, lost 10. Points for 245, against 247. Last season we lost at Leicester by 13 points to 8 and won on Kingsholm by 19 points to nil. Our loss has indeed been Leicester's gain.

A week ago Leicester were down in Somerset where they beat Bath by 12 points to 6. You may remember that our own win over Bath here by 11 points to 3 has been our one success in a run of fifteen matches.

has been good to read the City Captain, George Hastings, now selected for

England v. Wales—a fact on which we proudly congratulate him—giving his views on the reasons for Gloucester's run of ill-luck this season. No man has cause to be more upset by that non-success than George, but like the fine sportsman he is, he truly appraises the causes and does not try to put the blame on to any particular set of people, either playing or administrative.

Sickness and injuries have played havoc with our playing strength, both actual and potential. Some men who were "key" players have left the side and the luck has not always gone our way—the Cardiff game was the great example of this. So does George sum up the position as to the facts and he points out the truth that so many seem to miss—that the Club is perserving with a number of young players. Sooner or later the answer to all our present worries will he found and with the standard of local rugby said by good judges to be steadily improving, we shall, before long, see the Gloucester XV once more on the crest of the wave of high success. Until then, let us sportingly give the young players all possible encouragement, for it takes some time usually for a man to bridge the gap between
